Message from Deputy Mayor Gail Ardiel

Council has been busy this past year with many issues; far too many to list individually. A couple of the really important issues that recently happened in the town and the province is Bill 131 Opportunities in

the Sharing Economy Act 2015. This bill was given 2nd reading and was sponsored by MPP Tim Hudak. This bill undermines the local municipal efforts to address our local issues. Short Term Accommodations has been an issue in the town for as long as I have been on Council. Bill 131 as proposed would allow homeowners to rent out their premises in residential areas for up to 120 days a year without the requirement of being regulated and licensed.

Our Town has worked very hard to establish a licensing system for Short Term Accommodations and have spent thousands of dollars over the years to, control, regulate and now license. I'm appointed to the provincial body of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario where this issue came up and I spoke about the importance of addressing this bill and how this will affect our wonderful unique region.

Another important issue that Council heard loud and clear was to be Open for Business. The town has now completed the Business Retention and Expansion Survey and this was a good news story. This event was well attended by businesses from the town and the Resources from the region that helped with this survey.

I have at been elected this month as Vice Chair to Social Services at the County, this is a very important role that I feel will be beneficial to the taxpayers in our town.

I will continue to advocate at the County level in the best interests of the taxpayers in the coming year.

"This year with so many refugees coming into Canada the clothing distribution will be strained by an already overwhelming need of clothing for existing low income families. Any effort on our behalf to collect new and gently used clothing in the communities we have our homes will benefit everyone" - mentions Christine Ozimek. "We want to do our part to help. These people have faced great hardship and maybe we can make a difference in being able to provide for them clothing, especially during winter". Be aware, for example, of: "I am Eric from Microsoft and your computer has a problem"; "Hi! - It's your favourite Grandson and I am in trouble"; "I am George from the Canada Revenue Agency – you have made a very serious error in your 2014 tax return which must be fixed prior to year-end or you will face prosecution and major penalties (and deportation if you a new Canadian!)"; "I am here to do a free test on your water quality - you may need a new water purification system. You and your family's health may be at risk"; On the internet -" I am a retired engineer and my wife has recently passed, let's chat!"

(Current Canadian record -- \$1.3 million!!); "I am from your bank and we need your help!" Or the latest one – "When will you be home to receive a gift delivery (wine and flowers from an anonymous friend), just sign here pay by credit card for a modest delivery charge!!" – Surprise, watch the fraudulent charges on that credit card escalate!

This list goes on and on! And given our demographics and relative wealth, our Town of the Blue Mountains is a prime target for these fraudsters and scam artists. They are very skilled and compelling – don't you, your family or your friends and neighbours be victims. Spread the word -- If it sounds too good to be true – yes, it will be too good to be true! 

Errinrung and the Town Celebrate the Accomplishment of an Extraordinary Person

McKean, Jim Wilson MPP and Lionel. The Lifetime Achievement Award was introduced in 1986 and is an opportunity to honour the significant and extraordinary lifetime achievements of residents in OLTCA Member homes.

In 2012, Lionel was admitted to Errinrung Residence and given two weeks to live. He was confined to a wheel chair and could hardly speak.

Every day he woke up alive he would make three goals, little attainable goals. If at the end of the day he was able to accomplish one of them, he felt it was a success.

In 2013, he had the goal of one day walking again. He set out to achieve his goal by climbing steps. He first climbed seven steps at Errinrung, slowly growing his strength. A short time later, he climbed 44 steps at the Town Hall by the fish ladder. On May 3, he walked to the stairs and climbed them 45 times, a total of 3,974 steps. In October 2014 over 100 students from the Beaver Valley Community School participated in the 1st Annual Step Challenge. Lionel's newest project is to grow the largest blue pumpkin for the Town of The Blue Mountains.

year old twins and 4 adults sleeping in the house at the time.



It's been almost two weeks since the fire that destroyed the Wilson farmhouse. Over 180 individual donations were made to a Go Fund Me campaign which raised almost \$18K in 15 days! A trust fund has also been set up for the family at TD Bank in Thornbury The money will be used to help support them in this time of distress, for food, clothing, and to rebuild their lives. How safe is your street? By Michael Seguin, Town Councillor

There are many small and older neighbourhoods in The Blue Mountains, especially along the waterfront areas, which were not built to today's road standards i.e. larger road widths with shoulders, sidewalks, street lights, etc. Often you see families who reside or visit these neighbourhoods walking and biking to access various recreational features or just enjoying the day out.

Do they ever worry about the dangers of traffic and speed from reckless and carefree drivers? You bet they do. These roads, if not posted, have designated speed limits of 50 km/hr. Recently, the residents of Fraser Crescent, in Craigleith, requested (18 by petition) a posted speed reduction on their street noting excessive speeds by non-residents, service vehicles, couriers, garbage trucks, etc., which put their kids and grandkids, as well as their own lives, at risk.

We have lowered the speed limits recently along Bay Street and Beaver Street from 50 km/hr to 40 km/hr for the same reasons – SAFETY! The cost of doing this is nominal (staff time and signs) and greatly appreciated by the residents of these neighbourhoods. We don't need a full blown study to determine the areas in need, as some Council members suggest, and we certainly don't need to study the rural areas. A study would take close to two years to complete and implement.

I proposed a motion that the Town reduces the speed limit along Fraser Crescent from 50km/hr to 40 km/hr. Only Councillor Martin supported me, while the rest of council basically rejected the change. Why, because they say it's not needed and do not accept the safety concerns of the residents. While this might sound like a small matter to some, I think it speaks to the general attitude of this Council towards the residents of this community, especially regarding safety and establishing HEALTHY neighbourhoods and HEALTHY lifestyles. 

News Update From The Blue Mountains Ratepayers Association

The Town of The Blue Mountains recently underwent an audit that revealed our books are in good shape and we are the envy of most provincial municipalities. In 2016 our municipal taxes will be going up a small amount; however, higher costs at Grey County will likely force up taxes more dramatically in 2017 and beyond. That is the main message the Ratepayers' Association presented on Wednesday, February 17, 2016 at the Public Information Centre and Public Meeting on the 2016 Draft Budget and 2016 Draft Water and Wastewater Budget and Rates.

After a presentation by Director of Finance Ruth Prince, calling for a blended increase in 2016 of 1.79%, Brian set the tone with something BMRA and TBM Council all agree upon: the historical arrangement with the County is "unsustainable" and our taxes will likely be blended up, instead of down (as in the past) by forthcoming County expenditures.

Although the blended tax increase is proposed to be 1.79%, Brian noted that costs at The Blue Mountains are increasing by 8.4%. The Town spent \$13.0 million in 2015 (although it collected \$13.5 million) and wants \$14.1 million for 2016, an increase of \$1.1 million or 8.4%. This percentage is the result of using actual expensed numbers rather than comparing budget to budget numbers. Council has asked staff to review this method for the preparation of the 2017 budget.

A 2016 Town budget item that is new has the BMRA concerned in the form of an additional 2% proposed charge for capital reserves. The 2% can be viewed as surtax being added on top of current taxation and is being voted on at another council meeting. The proposed 2% Capital levy is included in the proposed 1.79% blended rate and not in addition to. During the presentation BMRA asked that the 2% capital replacement levy not be on the tax rolls this year. We have a 2015 surplus, so this should be used to fund the reserve. Councillor Halos remarked that if the levy is approved, he would be asking that a portion of the 2015 surplus be allocated to it.

A second position the BMRA took is that before a future levy is introduced, the entire concept should be brought forward as a package, including the financial controls so the fund is locked away for safe keeping. The concern is that funds such as these will get raided in the future as the capital reserves grow, unless controls and legislation come with the package. We have seen raiding occur with wastewater reserves, it can happen here too. Bottom line: the Town must make sure we get legislated control around reserves to ensure the capital replacement reserve gets funded in a transparent and accountable manner.

The BMRA has learned from discussions with the CAO Troy Speck, as well as the Director of Finance Ruth Prince and Manager of Accounting and Budgets Sam Dinsmore, that the 2% proposed levy is a drop in the bucket; more has to come. The Linear Asset Management plan completed by Hemsen Consulting calls for \$7.5 million in capital expenditures for 2016 and the Town is planning to only spend \$2.5 million, mostly on roads. The Linear Asset Management Plan identifies the linear asset inventory and the replacement costs, timing and required funding. So the 2% in addition to that is only a tiny top up of \$271,000 as the Town continues to work towards closing the gap. Having said all that: At this time the BRC is unable to support these numbers without further analysis of the Hemson Asset Management Plan presentation. Again we trust our good relationship with Ruth Prince will help us get to the bottom of that and you can look forward to a "riveting" eBlast in March on

that subject.

The much larger issue is where we are going in 2017 and beyond, given the growth and replacement capital requirements plus the new Asset Management System that will call for more and more reserves. TBM is much healthier than a lot of other municipalities which have been downright negligent in salting away reserves. It is ironic that The Blue Mountains has favourable economic conditions such that we are ranked near the bottom for grant applications from the Federal and Provincial governments. The Town continues to ask for change in the allocation of grant funding to municipalities.

But here is the point that Brian drove home: that ratepayers in TBM are very fortunate to have solid books, plus a staff and Council we can work with. So that is half the battle. The other half of the battle is the County.

Brian made it clear in his remarks that BMRA wants to help our County representatives, Mayor McKean and Deputy Ardiel, with their struggle to get us a better deal. The Deputy commented that "... we are lonely soldiers up there and we did not get support regarding the very expensive reno of the County building (that the Mayor says will add 1.5% to County taxes every year over the next 15 years) plus the looming expenditures of a similar amount up there for long term care facility Rockland Terrace".

Our current governance structure with the County is a reality that we have to live with until we find a better deal. Meanwhile our Council and BMRA should push to get the County Council to find corresponding cost reductions to offset the reno and the upcoming retirement home expenditures. You would think that the other 8 municipalities in the County would get behind that.



April - Autism Awareness Month

The eighth annual World Autism Awareness Day is April 2, 2016. Every year, autism organizations around the world celebrate the day with unique fundraising and awareness-raising events. Nearly a quarter century ago, the Autism Society launched a nationwide effort to promote autism awareness. inclusion and self-determination for all, and assure that each person with ASD is provided the opportunity to achieve the highest possible quality of life.

Kerry's Place Autism Services

During our humble beginnings in 1974, the community surrounding Clarksburg, in partnership with the Ministry of Health, rallied in support of the O'Neil family when they courageously opened their door to a handful of teenagers living within the spectrum of Autism. Their vision was to effect change in the way these individuals were supported. Through unwavering loyalty and tenacious determination Val and Ann O'Neil and the other founding families established a powerful movement

that became the catalyst for change in how we understand and support individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder. They formed the Ontario Society for Autistic Children out of concern that the needs of persons with autism approaching adolescence and adulthood were not being met in the educational or residential systems for the mentally handicapped.

Kerry's Place was incorporated in 1984 as a non-profit, non-share Ontario corporation. The program and corporate name were chosen in honour of the O'Neil's daughter Kerry, who was one of the original residents. Nearly three decades after the opening of the Clarksburg centre, Kerry's Place Autism Services' has grown to serve the regions of Peel/Halton, Dufferin, Durham, York/Simcoe, Toronto and Hastings.

Since those early days, Kerry's Place Autism Services has grown to support over 6,000 individuals of all ages and their families with a broad continuum of specialized supports and services across South Western Ontario. It is through the extraordinary dedication and efforts of the individuals themselves, or family members,

Konrad and his wife, Irma, retired to the area and now live in an area at the top of the Mountain. "I'm able to get up, put my skis on, and get out on the Mountain every morning," says Kuhn. "I always know I'm going to run into someone I know when I'm skiing. We meet up on the chair or in the lodge. It's a social part of winter that I love."

For many years, Konrad was easily recognizable on the hill by his green coat which has its own history. "My mother made my jacket using the same material she used to cover our windows during WWII. I would wear it every day and people came to recognize me by that coat."

Konrad shared that his children always referred to his green coat as his "pickle coat" and it will remain a special piece for him. But Konrad now dons a brand new ski outfit thanks to Columbia Sportswear who Blue Mountain partnered with to recognize Blue Mountain's most frequent skiers. When we asked our on-hill team to identify skiers or riders they can count on seeing at the lift any day of the season, the team almost unanimously suggested Konrad. As Konrad himself puts it, "Every day that I am here in the winter, I am skiing at Blue."

Konrad was able to select a new ski jacket, gloves, and pants all courtesy of Columbia Sportswear and although his friends now have to look a little bit harder to pick him out on the hills, Konrad is looking forward to sporting his gear on the slopes.

Electric Bicycles

With the ever increasing popularity of alternative forms of transportation, the electric bicycle has seen a significant growth in consumer base.

As our roads begin to see more ebikes, the more convoluted the rules, regulations, and laws behind ebikes get. To better protect yourself and those around you, it is important that you, the rider, spend some time getting to know what your rights are and what your limitations are.

What is an ebike?

An ebike, also known as a powerassisted bicycle, is essentially a bicycle with a motor. It is a bicycle that:

- has a maximum weight of 120kg (including both weight of the bike and the battery);
- has wheels with a diameter of at least 350mm and width of at least 35mm;

- minimum 2 independent braking systems for each tire;
- the brakes must be able to stop an ebike traveling at top speed (32km/h) within 9 meters of application;
- all electrical terminals must be completely insulated or covered;
 - battery and motor must be securely fastened to the ebike;
- has steering handlebars and is equipped with pedals;
- the pedals must be equipped at all times without exception;
- · is designed to travel with no more than 3 wheels with contact to the around:
- is capable of being operated with muscular power;
- has one or more electric motors no greater than 500w;
- the motor provides assistance when engaged by muscular power and ceases when muscular power ceases;
- if operable via a throttle, the motor ceases when brakes are applied
- is incapable of providing further assistance above 32km/h on level ground
- bears a label permanently affixed by the manufacturer stating that the vehicle is a power-assisted bicycle;
- has not been modified to produce more than 500w and to travel faster than 32km/h

There are various styles of ebikes, from conventional bicycles to scooter types. Regardless of style, an ebike is only classified as an ebike so long as it meets the definition of an ebike as listed above. Being classified as a bicycle, most of the road rules and regulations pertaining to bicycles also apply to an ebike.

What do I need to operate an ebike?

Ebikes are classified as bicycles as long as they fit the federal requirements listed above. Legally, there are only 2 requirements that one must fulfill in order to operate an ebike:

• must be equipped with at | • all operators and passengers must be 16 years of age or older

 all operators must wear an approved bicycle helmet at all times

As long as the operater fits the requirements listed above, the following apply to all operators of ebikes:

- no driver's license is required
- no written test is required
- no vehicle registration or plate • is required
 - no motor vehicle liability insurance is require

Where are ebikes allowed?

As long as your ebike fits the definition of an ebike as stated above, it is in the same classification as a conventional bicycle. This means that you are allowed to ride your ebike anywhere were a conventional bicycle is allowed, but with limitations.

This means that ebikes can be used on: roads, bike paths, bike trails, and bike lanes. However, you may only ride on "bike only" lanes and paths so long as the motor is not engaged at any point.

Open Letter

to the Community of the Town of the Blue Mountains and our valued library patrons following a press release dated March 8th

Terri Pope, CEO, L E Shore Library I would like to take this opportunity to respond to concerns about news that we are restructuring our library services.

Let me step back and explain what news was given to staff and then why we are restructuring our library services.

We informed staff March 8th that our Board will be taking over the management of the Craigleith Heritage Depot. We explained that the decision was made following an organizational review of our current library structure and services carried out by the Southern Ontario Library Service. The purpose of the review was to identify ways that we can provide better service to the community and incorporate the Depot into our structure.

As a result of the review, and the coming changes to the services that we offer, we have identified the need for nine new roles within the library, each of which will have different duties and responsibilities than what exist in our current structure. We do not intend to reduce the number of jobs within the library, but we will be changing the scope and content of the roles to better reflect a library service of our size and to be able to staff the museum. Unfortunately, that means that the staff assignments that we have right now will no longer exist in the new structure.

We believe that we have treated staff with dignity and respect. We spoke with each staff member individually and were transparent about the review process, the proposed restructuring and the elimination of current roles within the library. We provided each staff member with an outline of the new roles within the library, and we have encouraged each of our staff to consider the new positions and to apply for those roles that interest them.

The target date for completion of the restructuring activity is early May, at which time the new roles will be implemented. As we move through this process, library service will not be interrupted.

The restructuring will allow us to continue to offer the same great

programs that we do now and offer new services through the Depot. The Depot's core function will be to act as a Museum but we will also be offering library services such as material drop off or pick up, and a browseable collection including popular fiction and DVDs.

We appreciate all of the interest in our library. People are passionate about it. We would like to keep our Facebook Page open to continued dialogue and we value constructive feedback to our programming. However, we reserve the right to remove offensive comments.

I hope that this letter has helped clear up some of the confusion and concerns you may have and I am open to continuing the conversation. If you have any further questions or concerns please direct them to me as matters related to the library are my responsibility.

Open Letter to the Community of the Town of the Blue Mountains from the adhoc group, SOS L.E. Shore Library

As many of you have heard, the L.E. Shore Library in Thornbury is in the midst of a crisis we believe concerns everyone in The Town of The Blue Mountains.

On March 8, on the pretext of holding a "Staff Development Day," the library was closed and the staff of nine full and part-time librarians were handed letters of termination by an HR representative of the town, Jennifer Moreau, and the library's CEO, Terri Pope. The justification for such drastic and humiliating action, in the words of a "fact sheet" later released by the library (and apparently crafted by a Mississauga-based public relations firm, Redbrick Communications) was that the library was "transitioning to a new organizational structure to take on management of the Craigleith Heritage Depot, while putting in place staffing roles that are in keeping with a library of our size."

Most concerned library users were not fooled by such bland PR language, nor by assurances that the fired staff members could reapply for new staff positions in the "reorganized" library. A Facebook group in support of the library staff quickly acquired more than 800 followers; a public meeting in front of the library on March 19 attracted several hundred protesters; petitions demanding the reinstatement of the staff, and the dismissal of the CEO, have been circulating. And at a special library board meeting held at the library on March 22, a standing-roomonly crowd heard depositions from five concerned citizens asking the board to clarify their position on the firings and the restructuring of the library, and requesting that the deadline for the staff to reapply be extended.

Since then, although the reapplication deadline has been moved up to 4:45 pm on April 1st and the library board chairman, Olav Vanderzon, has resigned, there has been no response whatsoever from the board; the staff remain in limbo, their jobs in jeopardy; and the plans for restructuring are apparently still moving ahead, despite widespread public concern.

It is our opinion that, for the quickest and fairest possible solution, the matter of staffing and the matter of the Heritage Depot restructuring need to be treated as two separate issues. First, the staff must be immediately be reinstated. Once this happens, the restructuring of the library can be assessed and discussed in a cooler, more rational atmosphere.

There are hopeful signs that some members of the town council are beginning to think this way. In a story posted March 28th on Simcoe.com, Councilor Joe Halos, urging sober second thought, is quoted as saying, "I don't think we should have had a wholesale firing of everybody to restructure. Simple as that. I don't like seeing people lose their jobs and feel this could have been handled differently."

Please write the Council and encourage them to find a way to reinstate the library staff, and once this is done, to conduct a thorough, public review of the library restructuring. We believe this is the best way to prevent a bad situation from becoming even worse.

It's NOT an Emergency! It's not the CRA! It's FRAUD!

As part of the annual Fraud Prevention Month awareness campaign, the Emergency Scam and the more recent Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) and other agency-related extortion threats have increased the financial losses sustained by unsuspecting victims. In 2015, the Emergency (or Grandparent) Scam claimed 474 victims in Canada lost nearly \$2.5 million from more than 1,100 complaints. The CRA fraud drew 15,091 complaints, resulting in 751 identified victims who lost a combined \$2.49 million. Police admit 95 percent of the crimes go unreported.

In the typical Emergency Scam, the victim will receive a frantic phone call from someone claiming to be a grandchild or loved one. The caller will explain that they are involved in some sort of mishap or are having trouble returning from a foreign country and need money 'right away'. In the CRA scam, the criminals extort money from their victims by telephone, mail, text message or email, a fraudulent communication that claims to be from the Canada Revenue Agency requesting personal information such as a social insurance number, credit card number, bank account number, or passport number. Fraudsters impersonate the real CRA by telephone or by email. Fraudsters are either phishing for your identification or asking that outstanding taxes be paid by a money service business or by prepaid debit/credit cards. They may insist that this personal information is needed so that the taxpayer can receive a refund or a benefit payment. Cases of fraudulent communication could also involve threatening or coercive language to scare individuals into paying fictitious debt to the CRA. Other communications urge taxpayers to visit a fake CRA website where the taxpayer is then asked to verify their identity by entering personal information. These are scams and taxpayers should never respond to these fraudulent communications nor click on any of the links provided.

Here are some warning signs: **Urgency**-- The scammer always makes the request sound very urgent, which may cause the victim to not verify the story.

Fear-- The scammer plays on the victim's emotions by generating a sense of fear. For instance they may say, "I am scared and I need help from you."

Secrecy-- The scammer pleads with the victim not to tell anyone about the situation, such as, "Please don't tell Dad or Mom, they would be so mad."

Request for Money Transfer--Money is usually requested to be sent by a money transfer company such as Money Gram, Western Union or even through your own bank institution.

To avoid becoming a victim, police advise you to first check with another family member or trusted friend to verify the information BEFORE sending money or providing credit card information by phone or e-mail.

If you or someone you know suspect they've been a victim of the Emergency Scam or someone posing as a Canada Revenue Agency official, hang up and contact The Blue Mountains OPP Non-emergency number:



Sheffield Park Black History and Cultural Museum

It was the dream of Howard Sheffield to gather and preserve the history of his ancestors and share with the family. Community friends also became interested in the history of the black pioneers and settlers of Collingwood and the surrounding areas. His collection of family photos and artifacts attracted donations of more items from white families who grew up with the original homesteaders.

Interest increased and various cultural artifacts were donated to Howard's project. Sheffield Park Museum now became Sheffield Park Black History & Cultural Museum. The museum includes pioneer life and times, the social networking of a community and the preservation of past generations.

It Is located at the former Nazarene Church Campgrounds in Clarksburg at 241 Clark Street. Sylvia and Carolynn Wilson had all the existing buildings renovated and created a Heritage Walk through the natural wooded area. Visitors and bus groups are welcome to view several displays featuring African Beginnings, Slavery and the Middle Passage journey, an Underground Railroad quilt created by Shirley Hartley, four large granite monuments, Great Lakes marine history, handcrafted model ships built by Edward Sheffield (shown above), Community Trades and Businesses, Military, a Sports display featuring the Ray Lewis collection and Black hockey players, Pioneer House, Church, Blacksmith Stable, Tool Shed, Farm Equipment Collection from Alex Wilson, School and the Doll House Black memorabilia collections.

As visitors arrive a brief summary of the former campgrounds and tabernacle is shared and tourists are invited to extend their visit to the many attractions in Grey County. Town of The Blue Mountains Agricultural Open Air Burning Guidelines

The Ontario Fire Code states that property owners conducting openair burning must do so in approved areas. This guideline will provide property owners in The Blue Mountains with the information required to ensure their properties meet the following minimum requirements for open air burning.

The Fire Department should be notified prior to the ignition of any outdoor fires, to ensure fire bans are not in place due to poor air quality or extremely dry conditions. The contact number is 519-599-5411. The information required from the property owner will be name, telephone number, and date of burning and civic address. This is a notification process only and should not be considered as an approval.

It is the property owners' responsibility to ensure that the following minimum requirements are in place prior to burning. They include but are not limited to:

- the materials to be burned must be limited to dry wood or by-products of wood
- Piles of material to be burned should be kept small 1m x 1m x 1m
- the fire is a minimum of ten meters from any buildings, overhead wires and combustible vegetation
- · a means of extinguishment is on site
- the fire is supervised at all times by a competent person

• the fire is completely extinguished when it is not being supervised By-law 2004-23 will also be enforced if smoke or particulate from open air burning becomes a nuisance to the public or could affect the health and wellness of the public. The By-Law Dept can be contacted at 519 599-3131 ext 249. Leaves and garden waste which produce excessive smoke should not be burned. The Landfill site on Grey Road 13 accepts leaves, garden waste and brush for disposal at no charge.

Even though a controlled burn is properly reported, the Fire Department will be required to respond in the event an emergency call is received; it is not uncommon for a neighbor or passer-by to mistakenly report controlled burns as a perceived emergency. There will be no charge for such response as long as the guidelines are being followed.

In the event the fire department is requested to respond to open air burning complaints where the above noted requirements have not been met or a fire is out of control, the fire will be extinguished and a user fee charged to the owner of the property in accordance with by-law 2014-3, schedule D.3, "emergency response services".



The Shoreline Chorus, has returned from an International Choir Festival in Dublin, Ireland, that also included performances in Belfast, Northern Ireland. The 27 singers (a little more than half of the full Chorus) were accompanied by nine friends and relatives.

Thornbury's Ann-Marie MacDairmid, the Chorus' founder, director and accompanist, summed up the experience as "a wonderful singing and touring adventure like we had in our previous trips to Holland in 2014 and to Cuba in 2012."
