Hannah Wins Gold!

Hannah Woodhouse, a grade 12 student at GBSS, a resident of Heathcote and now the Canadian Junior Women's Cross Country Champion recently attended the Thornbury Clarksburg Rotary Club's meeting and started off by thanking the club for their support of her trip to Vancouver to compete in the Canadian Championship race. Her slide show showed her running here at home - in the snow. She said she runs six days a week in all kinds of weather.

They arrived in Vancouver a few days ahead of time to enable Hannah to adjust to the local time zone. In that time, she had an opportunity to take in some sights as well as to jog the race course and develop her strategy. When she and her coach Kevin Hooper iogged the course the day prior to the race, they ran on grass. But, on race day, snow covered everything, almost shutting Vancouver down. went with her and challenged Despite this, Hannah ran in her for the lead. Hannah stayed just racing shorts at zero to – 1 C.

The plan was to run with the leaders through two laps of the



what she could do in the last lap. As it happened, she felt the leaders were slowing in the later stages of the second lap so she took the lead. Another older and taller runner behind her, well into the third lap, when she took the lead for good.

As she put it, "When I take the 2 kilometre course and then see lead I don't look back so, I don't

know how close the challengers are. It spurs me on." The result was that when she hit the finish line she had an enormous 21 second lead over the second place finisher and no one else was in sight!

The top six finishers were granted a place on the Canadian team with funding from Athletics Canada to go to Colombia on February 22nd for the North American Cross Country Championships and on March 28th for the World Cross Country Championships in China.

Hannah actually won two gold medals: the first for her individual win and the second for being part of the winning Ontario team.

After the medals she was given an opportunity to try on the new Canadian Team uniform and racing gear and had another slide showing it off. But, she had first to wade in the ocean to wash the mud off her racing shoes - "Cold but it cleaned them off."

Hannah has considered fullride scholarships to several US universities but has decided to stay in Canada and hopes to attend either Guelph or McMaster to study Biomedical Science. by Richard Bowden, TC Rotary



Ashley Howell, a Canadian filmmaker is coordinating this event to help a group of children in the Dominican Republic gain access to information by installing an inverter at their school. The inverter works like a generator, storing the energy it takes in throughout the night when the power is running so

that in the morning when the power shuts off and the children arrive, the inverter powers up their computers and electronics for learning all day long.

Pablo Santigua is the principal at Escueal Primaria Carabello. Currently, he has one hour of power to teach his students, it comes on randomly. This school is located directly across the street from a well funded international school. Pablo says that "...it's has been very hard..." and feels badly that "...the students have little to no help from the government." Pablo built this school and has been principal of it since 1986. Since then, he has been collecting computers and other electronics, so that one day when he gains access to power, he can use them. Pablo uses a projector during their hour of power but would like access to the internet. By doing so, his children will get the school experience they need in order to fulfil their potential. Hopefully we can fund the purchase, transportation and installation of the inverter for this school. With access to internet we will change the lives of the 46 children that attend that school.

The estimated cost for this project is \$2,500. Ashley will be filming the installation process at Pablo's school and posting it to a crowd funding campaign for the film, this will begin upon her arrival to the Dominican Republic on March 19th. Please plan to attend and show your support.

News from Councillor Michael Seguin

As we fall into a deep freeze (hopefully the last cold blast before spring), the monetary position of the Town, and more importantly your services and taxes, are being debated before Council and staff.

The Budget started on a very positive note in January with a proposed increase in the Town levy at around 2.85%. Council is advised that the County is (was) proposing a -1.56% increase indicating a blended tax rate of less than 1.0%. However, as we approach the middle of February, the Town's levy is slowly working itself up to 4.0% (3.74% so far).

Three matters still remain outstanding that may impact a greater than 4.0% Town levy: 1) the hiring of three more employees (two in Engineering and one in Planning) which will be subject to a pending Development Application Review Process; 2) road assumption and regular maintenance of the Thunderhill Subdivision roads; and 3) the reconstruction of 33rd Sideroad and a portion of the 10th Line to County Road 113. These three items could add another 2.07% to the tax levy, if approved as proposed. As we approach the beginning of March, the Town's levy is slowly working itself up to 4.0%. Are you still with me? If not, you need to attend a

Budget Public Information Session on March 23rd, 6:00 to 7.00 p.m. and a Public Meeting on the same date at 7.00 p.m.

Oh, by the way, there will be no increase in your water and wastewater fixed and variable rates.

Council has approved an application by the Director of Community Services, Shawn Everitt, for the **2015 Bicycle Friendly Community Program**, which is sponsored by the Share the Road Coalition. The Coalition is a provincial advocacy organization working to build a bicycle-friendly Ontario. Application in this Program is an opportunity to identify work that has been completed and also work that is underway to enhance cycling and support the Town and the Region as a cycling destination.

The Blue Mountains Collingwood Public Transit Link (a partnership that includes the Blue Mountain Resort/Village Association) continues to improve with 22,693 riders in 2014 or approximately 1,890 per month, which is more than double what had been identified in the business plan (750 riders per month). Based on Gas Tax Funding and increased ridership, the total net cost to the Town (or contribution) over the next three years is expected to be only \$18,000 per annum.

Council has directed the CAO, Troy Speck, to spend up to \$40,000 (from 2014 surplus) to retain a strategic planning facilitator to **Review the 2005 Strategic Vision**, mission statement, goals and actions with the idea of incorporating any goals identified in the Sustainable Path and the themes identified by the members of the new Council i.e. 'Open for Business' Economic Development; better planning and development; improving Town/County arrangements; and improving communications.

Property taxes -Good news & Bad news

(Terry Thompson, Chair of Blue Mountains Ratepayers Assoc. Budget Committee delivered the following message to an Open Council meeting 3/23/2015) www.bmratepayers.com

First the good news: the "blended" rate of 1.3% we will pay for 2015 looks to be the lowest in several years as Grey county is reducing its levy by about 2% and the Education portion is not increasing.

The bad news is that the Town portion is presently showing an increase of about 5.4% and could grow to 6% if new items are added. Council will vote on the final budget March 30th.

The Town's increase is primarily due to an increase of 2% planned for staff salaries and benefits and the addition of 3 new positions in the engineering and planning departments at an annual cost of \$250,000. The budget review committee recalls that 10 years ago the town staffing level was about 20 people less than the present level of 90. As the population of the Blue Mountains is 5.5% lower today than it was in 2006, we have begun an analysis of the factors involved in the staffing increase, as salary and benefit costs make up 46.6% of the towns expenses. The 2015 budget for salaries and benefits is 11% higher than the 2014 actual of \$7,352,917.

Grey County reduced its levy primarily because it is no longer collecting a special tax it put in place for the past three years and held in a designated reserve. We are getting a "one time" rebate for past "contributions".

As you may know, the county voted to return half of what it collected in the special tax to the municipalities and hold back the

remaining 50%, or \$728,621 to pay for future projects it says it needs. To their credit and with the full support of your ratepayers association, our town council requested the return of the full 100% but this was not supported by the other municipalities. We have asked our mayor to press harder, perhaps even holding back the amount from a future payment to Grey County or by setting up an account receivable from the County. In any event, our council has not yet made a decision or voted on what to do with the money returned from the County - we believe it should be returned to the taxpayers in the form of a reduced levy in 2015, not held back from us, as we paid the tax in the first place.

Water and Wastewater

recommend no increase in usage and fixed charges for 2015 and subsequent years. As readers will recall, the Budget Review Committee has pressed council for restraint in this area, with some success. Based on our previous analysis we believe these charges have been inflated in prior years.

Town passes Draft Budget

The 2015 Draft Budget passed with a 1.28 per cent blended tax rate increase, which included a 5.43 percent increase in Town taxes, and a 2 percent decrease in County taxes. Education taxes remained the same. No decision made on the refund from Grey County, yet.

In November, Woodhouse earned a spot on the Junior National Cross Country Team when she won the Canadian Junior XC Championships in Vancouver. She left Toronto with Team Canada on Thursday, Feb. 18th and headed to Barranquilla, Columbia for the 2015 PanAm Cross Country Championships.

This North American, Central American and Caribbean race [NACAC] took the best runners from each of the countries. Team Canada took 6 members in each of the Junior Women, Junior Men, Senior Women and Senior Men, with Hannah being part of the Junior Women's team. With all the snow and freezing arctic temperatures in our area this winter, to help Hannah prepare for the heat and humidity of Columbia, she spent some time indoors on a treadmill a week before her competition wearing a long sleeve shirt, the fans turned off and a heater cranked up to 27'C.

The Junior Women raced on a relatively flat and short 5.2km course under sunny and HOT conditions, but this didn't slow down the Heathcote native. Not only did Hannah lead the Canadian Junior Women's team to a 1st place team victory, she also ripped through the course to grab 2nd place overall in a field of 46 girls. Hannah cross the line in 16:35, only 6 second behind the race winner from Peru.

Hannah also participated at the Athletics Ontario Indoor Track and Field Championships held at York University on March 7th an 8th. Over 800 competitors were in attendance.

Day 1 brought one gold medal as Hannah posted the 2nd fastest Junior Women's time in Canada this

Suspension notices have gone out for 1,762 students across Grey Bruce.

Issued by public health, the notices require parents to provide proof of immunization for their child. If proof of immunization or a valid philosophical or medical exemption is not provided, students may be suspended for a period of 20 school days. Under Immunization of School Pupils Act (ISPA), all elementary and secondary students require proof of immunization against measles, mumps, rubella, tetanus, diphtheria, polio and new for the 2014/15 school year pertussis, varicella (chicken pox) meningococcal disease.

"All students must be up-to-date with immunizations in order to provide a safe school environment for everyone and reduce the risk of vaccine-preventable disease outbreaks," says Grey Bruce Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Hazel Lynn.

This is a large number of suspension notices compared with previous years. There were 698 suspension orders in 2012/13 school year. No notices were issued in the 2013/14 school year as student immunization records were being transferred to the new province-wide Panorama system. Additionally, the requirements for pertussis, varicella and meningococcal immunization are new to the schedule this year.

Parents who receive notices should submit their child's immunization information to the Grey Bruce Health Unit by phone, or email prior to the first day of suspension, April 20, 2015.





News From Councillor Michael Seguin

Here are some recent and important developments over the past month:

A Major Organizational Change is

in the works! Council has approved a switch in responsibilities that will see the Director of Planning. Building and By-law Enforcement now taking on all developmentrelated engineering services, as the new Director of Planning and Development. The Director of Engineering and Public Works will be assigned the new role of Director of Infrastructure and Public Works, with a focus on operation, maintenance, repair and replacement of existing municipal structure and the development and maintenance of a Town asset management plan.

The Fire Department is undergoing some major challenges to 'response times' and the ability to mitigate fire risks. At the present time, the net cost of fire service in our municipality accounts for almost 12% (\$1.66 million) of our net operating budget. Over the past 5 years, the Fire Department averaged 191 calls per year, of which

16 were fires and 4 were structural fires. The remainder of the calls for service were false alarms and other emergencies like auto accidents. In response to structure fires, we are advised that the department responds with approximately 20 personnel and the average 'on the scene' time is 10 minutes.

So what are the problems? The response times are high given our topography and limited volunteer program (should be closer to 4 minutes, which is considered the 'flashover' time for saving a building). In order to improve our Level of Fire Service, Fire Chief, Rob Collins, is recommending that we review our current Fire Master Plan immediately, maintain our current composite department comprised of existing permanent staff (now unionized) supported by a complement of up to 48 paidon call volunteers, investigate the mandatory use of automatic sprinkler systems in new homes and existing high risk buildings, and continue to work (or push) with neighboring municipalities as well as potential community business partners to develop assistance partnerships to facilitate enhanced response capabilities.

has been received and deemed complete that will require an Official Plan Amendment, a Zoning By-law Amendment and Site Plan Approval consisting of 2-storey, 3-storey and 4-storey low rise apartment style units located at the north-west corner of Grey Road 19 and Grey Road 21.

The development is being proposed as a 'Medium Density' one reflecting a density of 55 units per hectare (22.25 units per acre). A Public meeting was held on March 2, with close to 50 people in attendance and some 36 written letters/emails (as of that date) being submitted and objecting to this development. The area of concerns revolve around 10 themes, with the top 5 being;

- 1. high density is not compatible with the surrounding area;
- 2. height of 4-storeys is too high;
- 3. increase in traffic flows would create congestion, safety issues and diversion into residential communities:
- 4. there will be negative visual impact on the gateway to Blue and the character of surrounding neighborhoods;
- 5. increase noise will be created by traffic and density.

We understand that staff are in communication with the developer discuss mitigating concerns and will report back to Council Committee of the Whole sometime in May. If you have any concerns and haven't voiced your opinion, we want to hear from you.

Issues of Concern:

- 1) Staff provided a list of Community Services fees and Charges for 2015. If you have a favorite municipal service or facility that you use on a regular basis, you might want to check this list to determine what it will cost you in 2015 (see LINK). We are advised that new changes will result in an additional \$16,000 in revenue. The debate is still out in raising fees at Tomahawk and making it a full user-fee tourist/community facility and more sustainable.
- 2) Council approved a motion to reduce the speed limit along Beaver Street from 50km/hr to 40 km/ hr to help deal with safety issues around Moreau Park and more pedestrian movement into Town.

A 242 Unit Residential Application | 3) Frazil ice blockages on the Beaver River in Clarksburg this past winter have caused considerable concern and resulted in some damages to homes in the Margaret Street area. The cost of mitigating any further water damages (excavators, loaders, etc) has resulted in \$48,758.59 in costs to the Town. Council has agreed to bill 50% of these costs to the Grey Sauble Conservation Authority (GSCA), who responsible for river management.

Ouick Hits:

- 1) Council has agreed to enter the Heart and Stroke Foundation Big Bike Event to be held in Thornbury on May 11th, 2015. This means that a team of staff and Council will be assembled to ride a 30-seat bicycle along a proposed route (an easy one I hope) to raise awareness and funding to support the work of the Foundation. We might need to ask for volunteers from the community to replace some of us old folk.
- 2) We have been approached by Mountain Goat Film Company requesting that the Town consider creating a film policy to attract film and television productions to our area and the surrounding Georgian Triangle Area. Council directed staff to invite the producer of this company to provide a visual presentation and a business plan that could promote public-private partnerships as well as regional partnerships.
- 3) Grey County has commenced environmental assessment regarding Grev Road 19 and Grev Road 21 intersection improvements. This will be a joint venture with the County of Simcoe and the Town of Collingwood, who have jurisdiction over Mountain Road. There will be a Public Information meeting in the upcoming months. A number of views have been expressed stakeholders requesting the construction of a two lane roundabout that would support the existing roundabout at Gord Canning Drive and Grev Road 119 and help ensure better long-term, successful traffic flow in this area.
- 4) Grey County received \$100,000 provincial grant to be used to create a central dispatch to help the transit systems in the county work together to serve users. www.michaelseguin.ca

In 2011, the Grey Sauble Conservation Authority held an open house in Clarksburg to initiate feedback from the local community regarding the possible removal of the dam.

GSCA did not receive any negative comments regarding the removal and most were very supportive of the direction we were taking. Since then, GSCA proceeded with the process to have the dam removed. Provincial funding cuts and delays in receiving required permits have prevented the removal of this dam. In 2014, GSCA continued to move forward with this project and is in the process of obtaining permits with the hopes to remove this dam in 2015.

Take a Second Look: Motorcycle Awareness from the OPP

A second look for a motorcyclist might save a life this spring

The first full week in May has been proclaimed by the Province as Motorcycle Awareness Week. Collingwood and The Blue Mountains Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) would like to remind motorists to be extra aware of motorcycles during this time of the year. Motorcycle riders have been waiting all winter to bring out their bikes and the warm weather is here.

The OPP would like to offer a few safety tips to assist both riders and non-riders:

Motorcycle Riders:

- Dress to be seen and protected. Most riders wear approved helmets, gloves and jackets; consider wearing bright colours that are easily seen by other motorists.
- Slow Down. Driving at or near the posted speed limit will give the rider extra time to react to a situation on the roadway.
- Drive Defensively. Assume other motorist don't see you. Get eye contact with vehicles that might pull out in front of you.
- Take it to the track. The street is no place to test the limits of your sport bike. Take a lesson at a local racetrackor sign up for a track day.

Passenger Vehicles:

- Back off. Having a rear end collision with a car is one thing, but having one with a motorcycle could have fatal consequences.
- Give them room. Leave yourself time to react when motorcycles are around. If a rider were to fall off, could you avoid the downed rider?
- Look twice, at intersections and when changing lanes. Motorcycles are small and easy to lose in a blind spot. It is also easy to misjudge the speed of

an approaching motorcycle.Let them swerve. Motorcyclists will often be active in their own lane. Many times moving, to avoid pot holes or roadkill. Hitting any of these could cause an issue for the rider.

LED Streetlight Proposal

Local Authority Services (LAS), a wholly owned subsidiary of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), offers a turnkey LED streetlight program to the municipal market as LAS is confident that the technology is reliable, superior, and now very cost effective.

By upgrading the Town's existing inventory of streetlights to LED technology the Town will be able to reduce related energy consumption by 68% (\$46,800 in year one) and reduce maintenance costs by 80% (\$27,000 in year one).

Part of the project includes a GIS/ GPS mapping and design process that will update the Town's data base. The lighting design, once implemented, will provide an improved quality of lighting. LED lights minimize light trespass compared to existing streetlights, have improved dispersion patterns, have adjustable lighting levels, have better light colour and are dark sky approved. Also, LED's come on with full brightness. In theevent of inadvertent power loss the re-start would be instant improving safety for the road and sidewalk travelling public.

LED lamps offer multiple energy and environmental improvements over conventional gas-filled lamps. LED's have much lower power consumption, do not contain mercury, and have a long and predictable lifetime. They are less likely to fail than conventional lamps thus reducing the frequency of service or replacement. The net cost of the project will be \$408,700, to be paid through internal financing with a pay-back through savings in 5.5 years.

and Emergency Preparedness Week May 3-9

What is Emergency Preparedness Week?

Emergency Preparedness Week is an annual event that takes place during the first full week of May. This national event is coordinated by Public Safety Canada. In Ontario, we are using the opportunity to partner with United Ways, municipalities and first responders to build public awareness of the 211 service, and to encourage residents to make the right call when they need help.

What is 211?

211 is an award-winning 3-digit phone and online service helping Ontarians connect to the complete range of government and community-based health and social services. Calls are answered 24x7 by professional information and referral specialists who are trained to assess caller needs, and to refer callers to the most appropriate resources.

211's resource database contains more than 60,000 records, making it the most comprehensive human services database in the province.

211 in Ontario is supported by the Province of Ontario (Ministry of Community and Social Services), local United Way organizations, and some municipalities. 211 also receives project support from public and private sector partners such as Ontario Trillium Foundation and Green Shield Canada Foundation.

Since late 2011, 100% of Ontario residents have access to 211 through the phone or through the online portal at 211 ontario.ca.

Who calls 211, and what do they call for?

In 2014, more than half a million calls were answered by 211 in Ontario. Many callers are looking for help themselves, while close to 30% are calling on behalf of a friend, family member or client.

Last year, the top reasons for calling in Ontario included Health Services, Income & Financial Assistance, Housing, Legal & Public Safety and Food & Meals. At a local level, caller needs may be slightly different based on local environment or emerging issues, but at a provincial level, these represent a good snapshot of why people are calling 211 in Ontario.

211 During Emergencies

During and following an emergency such as a tornado, ice storm, flood, fires, or water main break, residents call 211 for nonemergency information.

Across Ontario, Municipalities are developing communication protocols with 211 services to ensure that the public will get the information they need. Using 211 for non-urgent calls during an emergency is a better use of resources. It reduces non-emergency calls to 911.

How do United Ways and other community organizations support 211 and why?

For United Way and for the agencies they work with, 211 is critical to advancing priority goals. There are so many people in our community who don't know where to turn when faced with challenges in their lives. 211 helps residents to navigate the system and find the support they need, which takes the strain off agencies and other services like 911 which would be handling these calls. 211 also provides community organizations with meaningful data about the types of services people are looking for in what neighbourhoods, which helps to better serve the needs of the community.

What is the difference between 211, 311 and 911?

The N11 numbers are assigned by the CRTC to create easier pathways to help for Canadian residents, but it can be confusing if you aren't sure which one to call.

By now, most residents (including children) are aware that 911 is the number to call for life-threatening emergencies.

In larger Ontario cities, 311 is the number established to access information about municipal services (such as by-law enforcement, road repairs, garbage collection, municipal recreation programs, property taxes, etc.).

211 is the number to call for information on community-based health, social and government services. It is the number to call when you need help, but aren't sure where to turn.

Why is the message "Make the Right Call"?

211 (and 311 where it exists) can take pressure off the 911 system by providing residents with another easy-to-remember number to call for non-urgent needs. By educating people about the 211 service, and encouraging them to make the right call, emergency resources can remain focused on emergencies.

The Beaver River Watershed Initiative

Initiative and acronyms, when combined, (WWW-BRWI) describes a local geography that was formed thousands of years ago, and an undertaking that began only three years ago, that is really starting to get traction and interest.

The WWW-BRWI initiative is a non-profit association of grass roots volunteer individuals, stakeholders, landowners, friends of the environment and partners with a single purpose – To create awareness of our watershed heritage, and to leave it in a better state than we received it.

The Watershed covers an area of greater than 609, square kilometers meandering through portions of the Municipalities of Meaford, Grey Highlands & Town of The Blue Mountains. A vast area of recreational land for fishing, hunting, camping, skiing, boating and many other activities, including significant agricultural enterprises, and residential towns and villages.

The WWW-BRWI association was formed in 2012 by a local group of like minded enthusiasts that realized from other watershed histories that if we wanted to preserve and maintain the integrity of our watershed legacy, we had to take community action.

We have crafted a Governance structure, with policies, procedures, rules and regulations consistent with Bill C-65. We are a working group and sub committee of Grey

Sauble Conservation Authority through a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). As well, we have a great interest from local fishing, hunting and sporting clubs, associations and private individuals.

The MOU provides WWW-BRWI with grant opportunities, safety training, insurance protection, administrativeresources, permiting, CRA tax receipts for individual/corporate donations, advice sharing and networking for the management team and our volunteers.

The BRWI Management team meets once every month, at the Marsh Street Community Centre, to review plans and projects, progress, committee and subcommittee reports.

We have a significant membership of volunteers and donors to help us achieve our goals. Membership is open to all who wish to help move the initiative forward and, is very affordable. (Students \$5.00, Adults Others \$10.00, annually). The more hands, the lighter the load!

Update by Councillor Michael Seguin

Look for of a new grain and legume milling, packaging and delivery facility (Gibraltar Mill) to operate out of the old Ice River Springs Bottling plant located at the corner of the 4th Line and Osprey/Blue Mountain Townline. The new plant will process local agricultural products and employ up to 15 people.

Tenders for the Thornbury West End Road Improvement Project (or commonly known as the Sobeys Project) finally went out on April 15th, 2015 with an expected closing date of May 7th, 2015. Does this ensure the project is moving ahead? -NO! If the lowest tender bid exceeds estimated costs (still at \$2.8 million), then who will 'front-end' the difference - Sobeys (probably not) or the taxpayers?

Planning Department requested and received approval by Council (by McKean, Halos, Ardiel and Gamble) to mediate

a settlement with the Appellants of Mountain Springs Resort that would allow The Lodges at Blue Mountain to administer 125 offsite Short Term Accommodations (STAs) from the gatehouse building for three years, with a provision to easily obtain permanent status. I asked that all off-site STAs be Licensed but it was rejected by McKean, Ardiel and Halos - I wonder why?

Look for the former Bayview Park campground area to be renamed Cedar Grove Park to help promote the Cedar Grove Labyrinth.

The Town received a Silver Medal Bicycle Friendly designation from an organization called Share the Road Coalition. To help continue promoting us as a "Bicycle Friendly Community", Council has agreed to purchase and install appropriate signs to be placed at the gateways to our municipality and at major/ strategic locations.



Sharp Increase in 2015 Building Permit Activity in the Town of The Blue Mountains

June 15, 2015 - The Town's Chief Building Official Greg Miller, C.E.T., CBCO reported today that building permit activity issued by the Town of The Blue Mountains Building Services Division in the first five months of 2015 has been the strongest since 2006 and the second strongest on record.

The Building Services Division has issued 132 building permits with an associated construction value in excess of \$38 million in the first five months of 2015. Included in these permits were 34 new dwelling units with a construction value of \$8.7 million, up over 33% from 2014, and a new \$10 million clubhouse under construction at the Alpine Ski Club. Year to date in 2015 to the end of May, 215 building permit applications have been received compared to 118 during the same period in 2014, representing an 81% increase.

The accumulated number of dwelling starts over the past 12 months to the end of May 2015 is 92 new dwellings, versus 54 at the end of the same period in 2014, which represents a 70% increase.

Miller stated "While residential activity has sharply increased so far this year, so has the commercial sector. A new Foodland, LCBO and a ski clubhouse building will be under construction in 2015 which is an excellent sign for our local economy. While it is still early in the year, I am cautionly optimistic that we will continue to see strong permit activity this year and into next year. Also, Council is currently implementing a more streamlined development approval process which will result in getting the shovel in the ground sooner for our builders."

In addition to streamlining the development approval process, the Building Services Division has implemented a number of service delivery enhancements such as issuing minor residential projects such as decks and garages at the front counter, electronic plan reviews and electronic inspection notifications while maintaining our current staff compliment including two Building Inspectors.

The Town of The Blue Mountains Building Services Division has issued 3,987 permits with an associated construction value in excess of \$837 million over the past 9 years.



Georgian Trail Improvements Would Benefit Pedestrians, Runners and Cyclists



The Georgian Cycle and Ski Trail Association has made a proposal to the Georgian Trail Board of Management for additional maintenance and some upgrades to the Georgian Trail.

The Georgian Trail represents the major active transportation route linking Collingwood with Thornbury and Meaford, and its importance is continually increasing. Both Simcoe and Grey Counties have been actively promoting cycling tourism with the goal of making the South Georgian Bay area a destination of choice for cycling activities. To further develop the region's cycling tourism potential, a 1000-kilometre signature cycling route connecting communities around Georgian Bay, known as the Georgian Bay Cycle Route, is being planned and will utilize the Georgian Trail between Collingwood and Meaford as its route through the South Georgian Bay area.

The Association has requested that the Board of Management expend additional funds to increase

the level of maintenance on the Georgian Trail sufficient to return it to its original design specifications. Some of the issues that should be addressed are:

- 1. *The width of the Trail*. There are several locations where the width has narrowed significantly from the original design width of 10-12 feet in some cases to a width of only 5 feet.
- 2. **Soft surface.** There are locations where the surface has become soft with loose gravel a hazardous situation for cyclists.
- 3. *Inadequate drainage*. There are locations where water puddles after a rainfall an annoyance to all users of the Trail.
- 4. *Routing.* The eastern entrance into Thornbury continues to be a challenge for cyclists because of the twisting and turning section through the trees east of Grey Street North.

The Association believes it is essential that the Georgian Trail surface be appropriately maintained so that road cyclists, trail cyclists, and mountain bikers of all ages and skill levels can feel totally comfortable and safe on the trail while still co-existing peacefully with pedestrians, runners, and dog walkers on this world class multi-use trail.

This revenue, along with gifts from our generous donors, is critical in supporting the upkeep and development along the Trail.

COMMUNITY LIVING 60 Meaford YEARS

In February, 1955, the Kent Women's Institute saw a need for a separate school system for the developmentally handicapped children of the community. The Women's Institute called a general meeting, inviting the other five institutes that existed in the area, as well as the various service clubs and organizations. The meeting was held in the old Legion building, which later housed the first school for developmentally handicapped children. This building was formerly the residence of the first teacher of the school, Mrs. Kay Butchart.

It started as the Meaford and District Association for Mentally Retarded, then became the Meaford-Beaver Valley Community Support Services and is now a member of the provincially recognized Community Living movement. From 1987 until 2010, the Association had a meeting place on Clarksburg's main street. This move was due to overcrowding and long waiting lists for the Kay Butchart Workshop. A program, combining the elements of both Developmental program and the Workshop, was initiated. The program also enabled the Association to serve a high needs client from this area. Community Living Meaford still serves the areas of Meaford and The Blue Mountains.

This is the 60th Anniversary year for Community Living Meaford. They will be hosting a celebration on Sunday, August 30 with a free barbecue corn roast for the community, with food, fun and family activities at the Meaford Harbour Pavilion. All are welcome.



The preparation of a concept proposal in support of the above resolution will involve resources not available at the Town and thus need to be sourced from consultants. The intent is to present a concept proposal to the County before the end of November, 2015. Staff therefore recommend that a budget of \$25,000 be allocated to obtain skills from consultants as necessary to undertake engineering assessments, develop costing models, undertake financial analysis and prepare graphics. 





Green Bin Collection Starts October 1

Green Bins will start being delivered door to door on September 8th. Curbside and condo Green Bin organics collection starts October 1st.

How do I use the Green Bin?

It's easy! Place your food scraps in the kitchen catcher and then empty the kitchen catcher into the large Green Bin as necessary. Beginning October 1, on your waste collection day (same day as garbage and recyclables) roll the Green Bin out to the curb for pick-up

What happens to my Green Bin material?

The Green Bin is collected by the same truck as your garbage; the truck has a split body which keeps the material in separate compartments. The garbage is tipped at the Town landfill and the organic material is transported to a compost processing facility. After processing the compost the end product is blended with soil material and sold to consumers.

What goes in the Bin?

Food Waste, including: bread, grains, cereals, fruits, vegetables, meat and fish (including bones), eggs, egg shells and dairy products. Other Items, including: dirty napkins, paper towels and paper plates, wooden toothpicks and skewers, sawdust and wood shavings, coffee grounds and filters, tea bags and house plants.

Not in the Bin!

Do not include the following: diapers and personal hygiene products, plastic, glass, metal, Styrofoam, cigarette butts and ashes, soil, plastic bags, elastics, textiles, waxed paper, other non-compostable waste, pet waste and yard waste.

What do I do with my Yard Waste - (leaves, twigs and grass)?

Do not put yard waste in the Green Bin. The Town is now collecting yard waste seasonally. A maximum of 6 bags of yard waste will be collected per week. A 'bag' is defined as a standard compostable yard waste bag (maximum 16W"x 35H") or similar sized reusable rigid container. Compostable yard waste will be collected during the month of May and the last two weeks of October and the first two weeks of November – on your regular day of collection. Do not leave yard waste at the curb during non collection days – it will not be collected!



Batteries Dead? Recycle Instead!

During the month of November place your dead household batteries out for recycling collection. Cover 9V terminals with tape, place batteries inside a clear plastic bag and place the bag on top of your curbside blue box or in the centrally located pail at your condo. Do not place loose batteries in the blue or grey box.

Beaver Valley Outreach Launches New Community Food Program, Sat Oct 3



BVO Good Neighbours is simple. Shoppers at Foodland will be asked by cashiers to add 25¢ to their grocery bill. These funds will be used to "buy" Foodland Gift Cards pre-loaded with sums of money and distributed by BVO to people in the community needing help purchasing their groceries.

"This program will enable Beaver Valley Outreach to help people in the community in a better way," says BVO co-founder and Board member Norine Baron. "It is an unfortunate fact that food banks have become a part of our culture in Canada. We at BVO have never believed that food banks are a good idea for community development."



Purchase of Conventional Transit Bus for the Collingwood Blue Mountains Link

The Town of Collingwood and the Town of The Blue Mountains entered into a 5 year agreement for the provisions of transit service in the fall of 2014. In this agreement, there was a provision to jointly purchase a new conventional transit bus in 2015 to be dedicated solely to the Collingwood Blue Mountains Link service. The joint purchase would have each municipality contribute 50% of the cost towards the purchase of a new bus. Ongoing maintenance costs would also be split equally between both parties. Both the Town of Collingwood and the Town of The Blue Mountains included the 50% capital share in their approved 2015 budget and, as such, have moved forward to pursue the acquisition of the new transit bus. In August 2015 the Town of Collingwood issued an RFQ to purchase a new or late model conventional transit bus and included the option of purchasing a demo bus. With 3 submissions the Town of Collingwood Council has approved the purchase of the 2012 35' New Flyer at a cost of \$307,450.00 (exclusive of HST). The New Flyer has been used as a basic demo for New Flyer throughout the United States and has also increased seating capacity which is needed during the Blue Mountains Link peak ridership times. The Town of The Blue Mountains 2015 budget includes \$220,000.00 for this expenditure. The cost being incurred by the Town of The Blue Mountains will be \$153,725.00.

An only child, she was educated by nuns until high school in San Jose and then went on to college and then to graduate studies at University of California, Berkeley, where she met her husband George.

Together with George she travelled in Europe in 1964 and spent a year with him in the Soviet Union where he was studying Russian history. She accompanied George to Toronto and York University where George taught Russian and European history in the late 1960s. In 1971, following the death of George's father Jozo, founder of Blue Mountain Resorts, the couple moved to Blue Mountain and took up residence in the family home at the foot of the ski area.

In 1974 she founded the Blue Mountain Arts Council, later absorbed into the Blue Mountain Foundation for the Arts, and she organized a major national literary event, The Great Canadian Poetry Festival.

Another great passion was Theatre Collingwood, which Barbara founded and helped manage. The organization recently celebrated its 30th anniversary, with a gala event honouring Barbara.

After raising her children, Barbara embarked on a long and successful career as manager of the Georgian Triangle Economic Development Corporation, providing counselling and financing to small business start-ups.

She also admired George's father Jozo and was determined to continue Jozo's legacy in supporting Georgian College. She served on the Georgian College Board of Governors and was a tireless champion of the establishment of a Georgian learning centre in Collingwood. When the opportunity came she co-chaired with Peter Hodgson a major fund raising drive and was delighted when the campus was opened in 2013.

She is survived by her husband George; daughter and son Katherine and Michael; daughterin-law Kate McCartney; son-in-law, John Roos; brothers-in-law, Gord Canning, Josef Marik and Don McGillivray; sister-in-law Helen McGillivray; grandchildren Hannah, Sophie, Cece and Jozo; nieces and nephews Andrea Canning, Alec, James and Gillian McGillivray; Tessa and Tony Marik.

Barbara had many friends and associates who admired her passionate dedication to community service, organizational ability, skills in leadership, keen intellect, flair for the dramatic and kindness for all who crossed her path. She will be greatly missed by all who knew her.

Fall Seat Belt Campaign

The OPP are reminding motorists that wearing a seat belt while in a motor vehicle is the law and officers intend to actively enforce that law during the Fall Seat Belt Campaign that is on right now.

So far this year 42 people have been killed on OPP-patrolled roads who were not wearing a seat belt in comparison to 34 people last year for the same time period. The most recent OPP statistics are even more alarming; during the week of September 7 – 13, 2015, seven people were killed in motor vehicle collisions in Ontario – six of those people were not wearing a seat belt.

"Adult seat belt use is the most effective way to save lives and reduce injuries in motor vehicle collisions. Yet thousands of adults still do not wear their seat belts on every trip. Not wearing a seat belt can be a fatal decision even on short, familiar journeys and at low speeds. We know that enforcement of seat belt laws does make a difference in getting more people to buckle up, so OPP officers will be diligent during this campaign," says OPP Deputy Commissioner Brad Blair, Traffic Safety and Operational Support

A driver can be charged and face a fine totalling \$240 and two demerit points for seat belt infractions.

Frazil Ice Proposal

In July 2015, Council approved submitting a proposal to the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) to lower the water level in the Mill Pond with the expectation that it would be effective in stopping frazil ice from blocking the Beaver River thus alleviating flooding of private lands in Clarksburg. The MNRF has accepted the Town's proposal for a three year pilot project and is assisting the Town in preparing to lower the water level for the winter of 2015 – 2016.

In order to demonstrate that lowering the water level in the Mill Pond removed the conditions that lead to frazil ice blocking the Beaver River, the MNRF has asked that the Town prepare an Effectiveness Monitoring Plan. The goal of the Plan is to understand the conditions leading up to past blockage events and to determine if the same conditions happen again during the pilot period thus determining if the proposal worked. The Plan will also document what steps the Town will take to monitor the river upstream and downstream of the Thornbury Dam to watch for problems and take corrective actions.

Local Student Heads to Oueen's Park!



Congratulations to Sam Martin-Chase, a grade 8 student. who has been selected to serve as a Page for the Simcoe Grey Riding at the Legislative Assembly of Ontario in Toronto. During their term of duty, Pages will serve as a messenger on the floor of the Legislative Chamber, meet key parliamentary figures and learn about Ontario's parliamentary system of government. Each Legislative Page earned their spot in the program by submitting an application that included an essay outlining their achievements,

involvements and suitability for the program. Each Page must study and learn the faces, names and locations of the 107 MPPs before arriving at Queen's Park for their first day. During a typical day in the program, Pages arrive at Queen's Park at approximately 8:00 a.m., dress in their uniforms and then prepare the Legislative Chamber for the morning's debates. As the day progresses, Pages are involved in a number of activities including: delivering messages and water for the MPPs in the Chamber, taking classes in legislative process and mathematics, and meeting with key legislative players such as the party leaders and the Speaker of the House.

The Legislative Page Program is open to students in grades 7 and 8 who have an interest in current affairs, have an academic average of 80% or higher and get along well with their peers and adults. Applications for the Legislative Page Program are accepted for two deadlines each year: November 15th and June 15th. Grade 7 students are eligible for both deadlines. Grade 8 students may apply for the November 15th deadline only. Jazz At The Library

Standing Ovation for Chantry Island Quartet

A packed house rewarded the Chantry Island Quartet with a standing ovation at the conclusion of Jazz at the Library concert, Fri Oct 23. Quartet leader Mike Grace (double bass) was accompanied by Steve James (drums), John McLelland (piano) and Meryl Gillmore, principal flute with the Georgian Bay Symphony, as they performed Claude Bolling's Suite No. 2 for Flute & Jazz Piano Trio.

Claude Bolling is a renowned French jazz pianist and composer. Written in 1987, this work by Bolling was described by members of the quartet as "a project", "challenging", "intense" and "a whole concert in one piece". Played in eight movements, the quartet interpreted Bolling's score as only jazz musicians can: interpretations and changes in pace and rhythm were introduced. But, the complexity of the original score still made it a challenging accomplishment that stretched each member's skill.

In fact, it was the comments by the quartet that added so much to the audience's appreciation and understanding of the music. Jazz at the Library is brought to the Blue Mountains by two of its most senior musicians, Tony Bauer and Doreen Norris. They were the force behind the Big Band Festival and Jazzmania for many years. Although in their eighties, with the support of a dedicated group of volunteers these impresarios are bringing top grade jazz to the community. And there are spin-off benefits. At the intermission, two students sponsored by Jazz at the Library to this summer's Southampton Summer Music Camp were introduced and a cheque for \$1,000 was presented to the music teacher at Beaver Valley Community School.

The next Jazz at the Library concert is Friday November 27. Duke Ellington's life and music will be the subject for the Wayne McGrath Ouartet. Don't miss it!








Town Reviewing New Foodland Sign

to successfully support a refugee family in the community for a year a minimum of \$30,000 is needed.

At this time, one unresolved issue that was discussed is securing an appropriate home for the family to live in. Some options have been investigated however this still remains the biggest need in the sponsorship plan. The low number of affordable housing units available in this community was discussed. Plans were made for a sub-committee to address and plan for housing as one of the next

The meeting concluded with optimism and a set of concrete plans have been developed for the next steps. The group continues to fundraise money and donations are being accepted by the Grace United Church. 


