Farmers Invited To Apply For Experimental Acres Funding Program

Farmers in Grey County can now apply for funding to test new farm practices that could improve soil health and resilience to climate change.

The 2025 Experimental Acres program was launched at Grey-Bruce Farmers' Week



on January 14. The program provides up to \$3,000 per project to farmers to help reduce their financial risk of trying innovative new practices that align with the project's climate action goals.

Applications will be accepted through February 28th. Interested farmers can learn more and apply at www.grey.ca/experimental-acres.

Grey County Experimental Acres projects are funded by Grey County as part of Going Green in Grey, the county climate action plan. The program supports Action 3 in the plan, Capacity Building in Sustainable Agricultural Best Practices.

Applications can fall into one of three categories:

- 1) Living Roots and Green Cover projects which extend the time soil is covered or has living roots in it;
- 2) Innovation for projects that implement new farm practices; and
- 3) Integrating Animals on the Farm for projects that incorporate livestock into farm systems.

Experimental Acres is designed to minimize the financial risk associated with trying new practices while preparing farmers for larger funding opportunities in the future. In addition to financial support, the pilot offers soil testing and education and networking with other participants.

Local dairy farmer and past Experimental Acres participant Wade Deaken explains how the program let him try something new. "I got interested in Experimental Acres to dragline the manure and see how the crop responds from that lack of compaction," he said.

Other examples of past projects have included cover cropping, inter-seeding, rotational grazing systems, tarping to avoid tillage, no-till establishment of crops, and more.

"Farmers know their businesses best. Whether the practice is new to you or has never been done before, we'd like to hear your ideas," said Emily McKague, Project Coordinator for Grey Agricultural Services.

The Experimental Acres pilot was developed as a part of Guelph-Wellington Our Food Future, a project funded by Infrastructure Canada. The County of Wellington facilitated the program in Wellington and Dufferin Counties in 2022, and Grey County joined in 2023.

Highlights from the 2025 Proposed Base Budget

1st Budget Meeting held January 14th - video on town website 2nd Budget Meeting planned for January 17th -

The base budget represents the foundational costs of maintaining the Town's existing services and obligations, adjusted for known changes from the prior year. It serves as the starting point for identifying and explaining incremental changes that influence the municipal levy.

The 2025 Proposed Base Budget amounts to a total Municipal Levy of \$23,941,608 which equates to a tax rate increase of 10.06% over 2024, this includes growth of 4.53%. On a median assessed home of \$530,000 this will equate to an increase of \$213 per year or \$17.75 per month. The table below details the increase over a varying value of assessment.

Municipal Levy Walk - 2025 Proposed Base Budget

A key feature of the 2025 budget presentation is the detailed Municipal Levy Walk, which traces the changes from the previous year's municipal levy to the current year's proposed levy. This step-by-step approach categorizes adjustments into Committed, Uncontrollable, and Controllable expenses, providing a transparent view of the factors driving the budget. By presenting the levy changes in this format, the Town demonstrates how existing commitments, external influences, and strategic decisions have shaped the financial requirements for 2025. First Ministers' Statement On The Canada-United States Relationship

January 15, 2025, Ottawa, Ontario

"Canada and the United States have the closest and most successful partnership in the world. At their meeting today, Canada's First Ministers reiterated that the two countries are stronger, more prosperous, and safer when they work together.

"First Ministers discussed ways to protect Canadian families, workers, and employers from the consequences of possible U.S. tariffs, which would cause economic harm to Canadians and Americans alike. Trade and investment between Canada and the U.S. supports millions of jobs on both sides of the border and helps ensure the secure flow of goods and people between countries. They will continue to work together, standing up for Canadians in the face of unjustified and unreasonable U.S. tariffs.

"Collaborative efforts will continue to try to prevent U.S. tariffs, including actions taken by the federal government to strengthen border security and curb the flow of illicit drugs, such as fentanyl, into Canadian and American communities.

The federal plan announced in December invests in cutting-edge technology, empowering law enforcement, and ensuring that only those eligible to remain in Canada do so. First Ministers agreed that the federal government, in collaboration with all orders of government, local police, and authorities, will continue to bolster security at the border and strengthen the immigration system. The plan must also include measures to tighten the visa issuance policy to prevent arrivals to Canada under false pretenses. Law enforcement across the country will work together to further build trust and confidence among U.S. decision-makers that Canada takes its border responsibilities seriously and is taking action.

"First Ministers agreed that enhancing security must be undertaken by authorities on both sides of the Canada-U.S. border to

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stop the flow of illegal firearms.

"First Ministers agreed to continue united advocacy efforts with key U.S. Administration, Congressional, and business leaders to emphasize the negative impacts of U.S. tariffs on American national interests and the U.S. economy. Co-operation with Canada offers significant complementary benefits to U.S. priorities.

"While they are making every effort to prevent U.S tariffs, First Ministers are committed to continuing to work together on a full range of measures to ensure a robust response to possible U.S. tariffs, including supports for sectors, businesses, and individuals. If the federal government implements retaliatory measures, it will ensure the rapid availability of substantial resources that effectively mitigate economic impacts to workers and businesses. This includes, but is not limited to, the distribution of revenues from potential retaliatory tariffs as quickly as possible. They agreed to take a collaborative approach to U.S. engagement that recognizes the unique economic needs of all provinces and territories.

"First Ministers acknowledged the importance of increasing defence spending and meeting the NATO 2 per cent target as quickly as possible, recognizing its critical connection to strategic infrastructure and Canada's economic and security partnership with the U.S. and other allies. They further agreed that collective action must be taken to safeguard Arctic security and sovereignty.

"First Ministers agreed to advance development of high economic impact projects, including transportation and infrastructure projects, working in partnership with Indigenous Peoples toward economic reconciliation. These projects support Canada's economic growth and allow Canada to provide the U.S. with more of the energy, critical minerals, and other goods and services it needs to fuel shared economic growth.

"First Ministers will continue working closely together on Canada-U.S. relations and agreed to meet weekly following President-elect Donald Trump's inauguration on January 20, 2025.

"First Ministers agreed that Canada is a proud and sovereign nation, committed to upholding its values and responsibilities on the global stage. As a strong, independent country, we make decisions that reflect the best interests of our citizens, while actively contributing to global peace and stability. We stand firm in our resolve to protect our borders, support our communities, and collaborate with international partners to address common challenges."

The Government of Alberta did not approve the joint statement between the Government of Canada and the Council of the Federation.

- Controllable Expenses: Required expenditures where the Town has some flexibility in funding levels or sources. These are carefully reviewed to optimize resources and ensure alignment with strategic priorities. (#9-14)

The Ontario government is launching new energy efficiency programs, including the Home Renovation Savings Program, to help families and businesses in Simcoe-Grey save money. The programs are part of a new \$10.9 billion, 12-year investment in energy efficiency, the largest in Canada's history.

"These new Energy Efficiency Programs that all residents in our riding have access to will lower energy bills, put more megawatts into Ontario's energy grid, and ultimately put more money back into your pockets," said Brian Saunderson, Member of Provincial Parliament for Simcoe-Grey.

The new Home Renovation Savings Program will launch on **January 28,2025,** and offer rebates of up to 30 per cent for home energy efficiency renovations and improvements, including new windows, doors, insulation, air sealing, smart thermostats, and heat pumps, as well as rooftop solar panels and battery storage systems for people who want to generate and store energy at home. Later in 2025, the program will expand to include rebates for energy efficient appliances, including refrigerators and freezers.

The government's Affordable Energy Act, which came into force on December 4, 2024, ensures the new Home Renovation Savings Program, and other program offerings, will be expanded to homeowners who heat their homes by propane and oil, instead of being restricted to those who heat with electricity, as it was under previous governments.

The province is also expanding the popular **Peak Perks** program with a new program specifically targeted to small businesses, including convenience stores and restaurants. Businesses will receive a financial incentive of \$75 upon initial enrollment in the program and \$20 per year for each eligible smart thermostat connected to a central air conditioning system or heat pump unit.

In addition to the two new energy efficiency programs, the province will continue to support 12 Save on Energy programs, including the highly popular Retro fit Program for business, as well as other programs geared to low-income households, businesses, municipalities, institutions, the agricultural sector, industry and onreserve First Nation communities.

By 2036, it is forecasted that this expansion of energy efficiency programs will reduce the province's peak demand by 3,000 MW – the equivalent of taking three million homes off the grid. The province's \$10.9 billion investment is also estimated to result in \$23.1 billion in electricity system benefits, thereby saving ratepayers \$12.2 billion in electricity system costs by avoiding the build out of new generation.

Expanding energy efficiency programs to save families money is just one way the government is meeting the province's rapidly growing demand for electricity. Ontario's Affordable Energy Future: The Pressing Case for More Power outlines the challenges facing the province as demand for electricity continues to rapidly grow, as well as the government's all-of-the-above approach to meet this demand, including:


Energy Planning – Developing the province's first integrated energy plan, including all energy resources, including electricity, natural gas, and other fuels to ensure the province's energy needs are met in a coordinated and long-term manner.

Nuclear Energy – Advancing clean, reliable, and affordable nuclear power through pre-development work at Bruce Power on the province's first large-scale nuclear build in 30 years, four small modular reactors at Darlington and supporting OPG's plan for refurbishing the Pickering Nuclear Generation Station.

New Transmission Infrastructure – Designating and prioritizing transmission lines in Southwestern, Northeastern and Eastern Ontario that will power job creators, including EV and EV battery manufacturing and clean steel production.

Additional Competitive Procurements – Launching the largest competitive procurement of clean energy resources in the province's history in addition to successfully re-contracting existing capacity

resources at about a 30 per cent discount.
