## Ontario Helping The Blue Mountains Build More Homes Faster



Brian Saunderson, MPP for Simcoe-Grey recently announced that the Ontario government is investing \$1,337,250 in critical infrastructure to facilitate the construction of up to 1,041 new homes in The Blue Mountains.

The funding is being delivered through the Housing-Enabling Core Servicing Stream under the Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program, which includes \$400 million to help build, repair and maintain municipal roads, bridges and culverts that will promote housing growth in communities across Ontario.

"The Town of the Blue Mountains is a vibrant, growing community and a popular year-round tourist destination for families across the Province and beyond", said MPP Brian Saunderson. "This significant investment by our Government demonstrates our commitment to collaborating with municipalities to enable much needed growth now and into the future."

The Town of the Blue Mountains will use the funding for Bridge, Culvert & Guiderails Capital Works. This project will unlock more housing opportunities and support economic growth.

"Today's announcement means more families can call The Blue Mountains home, more local businesses can grow and succeed, and more people can enjoy a safer, connected community," said Mayor Andrea Matrosovs. "I'd like to thank Minister Surma, MPP Saunderson and the Ontario government for investing in the Town and providing this important funding".

"To keep pace with growing communities across our province, our government is helping municipalities build more homes faster than ever before," said Kinga Surma, Minister of Infrastructure. "Families and residents need safe and reliable roads and bridges to access these homes and travel safely to and from their destinations. That's why we are making targeted, local investments through the Housing-Enabling Core Servicing Stream to support the construction of municipal roads, bridges and culverts that keep residents safe and foster stronger, more connected communities across Ontario."

The government is also investing \$175 million to launch the Health and Safety Water Stream under the Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program. This new stream will support projects that will protect homes and create resilient communities by building, rehabilitating and expanding aging water, wastewater, stormwater, flood and erosion infrastructure.

Through the Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program and the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund, Ontario is providing nearly \$2 billion to support housing-and community-enabling infrastructure and build more homes across the province.

# Ontario Investing in Mobile Crisis Response Teams for Simcoe-Grey

Brian Saunderson, MPP for Simcoe-Grey is proud to announce that the Ontario government is providing \$241,677.90 to help the Huronia West OPP and the Collingwood & Blue Mountains OPP provide specialized support to people who are experiencing a mental health crisis. The funding is being delivered through the Mobile Crisis Response Team Enhancement Grant and enables police to utilize trained crisis workers when responding to those in need.

"This is very good news for the residents of Simcoe-Grey and is recognition of the great work of our local Mobile Crisis Response Team that has been at the forefront of this important initiative for many years," said MPP Brian Saunderson. "The Mobile Crisis Response Teams work cooperatively with many partner organizations to ensure that those in distress are connected with the critical services they need as quickly as possible."

Mobile Crisis Response Teams consist of police officers and crisis workers responding to complex situations where mental health or addictions may be a factor. Supported by the police, crisis workers can help determine whether an individual suspected of experiencing a crisis should be sent to an emergency department for treatment and provide connections to community programming and supports if necessary.

"When people need help, every second matters. That's why we're providing training and resources to the police officers and nurses on Ontario's Mobile Crisis Response Teams so they can best support those facing a mental health or addictions crisis," said Solicitor General Michael Kerzner. "This investment will put the right people in the right places to de-escalate situations that could pose a safety risk. Working together with our police community partners, we're keeping Ontario safe."

In 2024-25, the Ontario government is allocating more than \$4.5 million to 40 police services and Ontario Provincial Police detachments to strengthen their Mobile Crisis Response Teams across the province.

#### Ontario Investing \$35,000,000 to Help Build More Homes in the Township of Clearview

The funding is being delivered through the second intake of the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund, which includes a total of \$325 million to help municipalities build, repair, rehabilitate and expand drinking water, wastewater and stormwater infrastructure across Ontario.

#### Ontario Investing \$75.5 Million to Restore Safety to Parks and Public Spaces

Brian Saunderson, MPP for Simcoe-Grey was pleased to announce that Ontario has begun flowing up to \$75.5 million to municipalities in order to help them wind down encampments in public spaces by creating more emergency shelter spaces and affordable housing units. The County of Simcoe will be receiving up to \$3,039,900. These accommodations will provide vulnerable people with appropriate short and long-term housing alternatives to encampments and help restore safety and order to Ontario's parks and other public spaces.

"Homelessness is a serious, complex and growing issue in our Province and Simcoe County that requires coordinated action from every level of Government," said MPP Brian Saunderson. "This increased investment is part of our Government's ongoing

commitment to working collaboratively with the County of Simcoe to expand and enhance the important work the County is doing through programs like the Simcoe County Alliance to End Homelessness (SCATEH) and the Canada Ontario Housing Benefit (COBH), to provide safe and secure housing for all our residents."

"Our government has delivered significant support to municipalities to address the challenges encampments can pose to public safety across Ontario," said Paul Calandra, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. "Mayors have asked us for additional help and we have been clear that we will provide funding to municipalities that show results in winding down these sites. We can no longer accept encampments as a place to deal with mental health and addiction issues."

The funding that is being flowed to municipalities includes:

- \$50 million for ready-to-build affordable housing projects, allocated based on how close a project is to completion and its value for money, to help projects near completion but in need of additional targeted funding open their doors faster.
- \$20 million to expand shelter capacity and create additional temporary accommodation spaces.
- \$5.5 million to top up the Canada-Ontario Housing Benefit (COHB) to immediately free up emergency shelter spaces for people living in encampments by helping people living in shelters move into longerterm housing. This funding builds on the nearly \$400 million invested in COHB between 2023 and 2024.

As part of the government's commitment to ensuring Ontarians can safely use our shared public spaces, the province is working with local service managers to direct funding into communities where it is needed most. By helping municipalities and other project partners create more emergency shelter and affordable housing spaces, Ontario is helping vulnerable people move out of crisis situations and into stable accommodations.


#### What is being proposed?



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## Governments Investing In Ontario's Dairy Processing Sector

70 dairy processing businesses will receive funding to increase productivity and modernize food safety capabilities

The governments of Canada and Ontario are investing up to \$7.18 million through the Sustainable Canadian Agricultural Partnership (Sustainable CAP) in 70 projects across the province to enhance and modernize dairy processing capacity and food safety. The funding from this initiative, which is cost-shared by the dairy sector, is expected to generate approximately \$22 million in total capital investments, while reinforcing the supply of safe, high-quality Ontario milk on store shelves.

The Dairy Processing Modernization Initiative is over 90% subscribed and still accepting applications from cow, goat, sheep and water buffalo milk processors. Successful applicants can receive up to \$200,000 in cost-shared funding to enhance processing efficiency and food safety in their facilities. The funding can be used to help cover the costs of new or refurbished equipment, one-time training and more.

#### Examples of projects include:

Four All Ice Cream in Waterloo receiving up to \$200,000 for a walkin cooler with blast freezer/refrigeration capabilities, a pasteurizer with accessories, and a plate-heat exchanger to increase productivity and meet demand.

Max and Lion Production in Peel Region receiving up to \$119,692 to increase production capacity, improve product quality, reduce waste, and improve monitoring and traceability with a liquid filler machine, a high-pressure homogenizer for kefir production, and a new metal detector.

Ontario Water Buffalo Co. in Hastings County receiving up to \$53,925 to increase production and improve food safety through the acquisition of a batch freezer, heat combination machine, and a pasteurizer.

Sargent Family Dairy in Durham Region receiving up to \$40,609 to improve efficiency and reduce manual strain through the purchase and installation of a mechanical curd mill and a cream separator.


