

International Women's Day 2025 "Accelerate Action"

In 1908, the action taken was a protest by women in New York to improve their working conditions. That was a brave action for the times and was the birth of a National Women's Day in the USA. By 1910 it became a global movement to advocate for the right to vote. In 1975, the United Nations adopted International Women's Day and marked March 8 as the date. The COVID-19 pandemic



years had a disproportionate impact on women. Domestic violence and sexual assault increased, job insecurity for women worsened, access to sexual and reproductive health services was eroded and girls' enrollment in schools reduced dramatically in many places. Many organizations around the world are taking action on these issues.

Amnesty International is one such organization. As Agnes Callamard, Amnesty's Secretary General has said. "The world's crises do not impact equally, let alone fairly. The disproportionate impacts on women's and girls' rights are well-documented yet still neglected when not ignored outright." The local Amnesty group has a display in the LE Shore library for March. Grey County Affordable Housing Action

A County owned site in Dundalk was identified for redevelopment as part of the Affordable Housing Action plan. The site is located at 130 Rowe's Lane in Dundalk, the current 11-unit building is being demolished. This site has approximately one acre of developable land.

Proposed is a three story, 40 unit building consisting of 16 bachelor apartments and 24 one bedroom apartments be developed to meet the greatest need according to the Grey County wait list in Southgate. At the August 1, 2024 Community Services Committee meeting JPM Architectural Inc was awarded the architectural tender for the build in the amount of \$348,250 exclusive of HST. JPM Architecture Inc formerly Allan Avis Architects is a local firm out of Goderich. They have successfully completed over 50 affordable housing, long term care and medical service projects and have worked with Grey, Bruce and Huron Counties. JPM Architecture is familiar with the typical project requirements for affordable builds and working with staff to meet Provincial or Federal funding guidelines and schedules.

The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation announced a new funding program called the Affordable Housing Fund which provides up to 75% of the costs of a build through a combination of a loan and a grant. The grant is significantly higher than previous programs at 30% of the 75% in eligible expenses. This fund is available to organizations that have partnered with another organization or level of government and have secured some funding. To apply a Class B estimate must be included in the business case.

Seniors Matters Today

We are now a few weeks away from the deadline for filing Income Tax returns for 2024. April 30th is the due date.

Beaver Valley Outreach's Seniors Centre Without Walls, is offering information sessions about both provincial and federal tax benefits and credits for Seniors. There will be 2 sessions at L.E. Shore Library with tax experts attending by Zoom. There will also be 1 phone webinar.

Filing your income tax return on time (by April 30th) is essential if you receive benefits such as the Guaranteed Income Supplement, (federal), or Guaranteed Annual Income Supplement (provincial). It means that your benefits continue without a break. You don't need to reapply every year as long as you file your income tax by the deadline.

Dental Coverage and tax return filing. – If you are covered under the Canada Dental Care Program, (CDCP) you need to renew your coverage each year. It is a check to confirm that you meet all of the eligibility requirements. The deadline to renew is JUNE 1, 2025.

Once you have filed your 2024 tax return and received your Notice of Assessment from the Canada Revenue Agency, you can renew your coverage. It can be done online, OR in My Service Canada Account OR through an automated phone service available 24hours a day, 7 days a week. You can renew after the deadline but there will be a gap in your coverage.



Wallace Fredrick Gabler III

June 9, 1944 - Feb 9, 2025

Wallace (Wally) Fredrick Gabler III passed away peacefully on February 9th, 2025 at his farm in Beaver Valley after a courageous battle with brain and prostate cancers. Wally was born in 1944 in Royal Oak, Michigan, son of former Oakland County Commissioner Wallace Fredrick



Jr. and Carolyn Mae (Hagelstein) Gabler, brother to John Howard and Carolyn Esther Gabler. Raised in the family bakery business, Hagelstein's Bakery Inc., combined with an upbringing rich in politics and the United Methodist Church, Wally learned the value of hard work, leadership, humility and service. Wally's drive, determination, and strong people skills steered his later successes as a professional football player, television colour commentator, high school teacher, investment advisor, and Bay Street executive.



Wally's football career began at Royal Oak Kimball High School and at the New Mexico Military Institute. After being selected as a Junior College All-American football player in his freshman year, Wally returned to his home state to play for the University of Michigan, and by his senior year started at quarterback for the Wolverines. While at Michigan, Wally earned his B.A. and Teacher's Certificate and notably played in the 1965 Rose Bowl when the Wolverines were victorious over Oregon State. At the conclusion of Wally's senior

season in 1965, he was invited to play in the Blue Gray All-Star Game in Montgomery, Alabama where he was recruited to play professionally for the Canadian Football League's (CFL) Toronto Argonauts. Wally's time in the CFL from 1966 to 1973 coincided with the 'heyday' of professional football in Canada when teams played to packed stadiums and when CFL television viewership rivaled that of the National Hockey League. Wally started as quarterback and was a strong, confident and consistent performer for the Toronto Argonauts, Winnipeg Blue Bombers, and Hamilton Tiger-Cats. During his five seasons in Toronto, Wally ranked 8th in career Argo passing yards, completions and attempts, and 10th in passing touchdowns. Wally was a highly competitive, motivated and committed athlete, a natural leader, and a humble, thoughtful and generous teammate and friend.

After retiring from professional football, he built a successful second career as a salesperson, manager and senior executive with Bongard and Leslie Co., Nesbitt Thomson Bongard Inc., Nesbitt Thomson Inc., and Bank of Montreal Nesbitt Burns (BMONB). A founding member of the Bank of Montreal's Private Wealth business, Wally was an excellent partner and his work with merger integration, the recruitment and hiring of new investment advisors, and strengthening organizational culture were instrumental in being a major contributor to the Wealth Management Group. Wally was a dedicated professional and a respected colleague whose contributions left a lasting impact on the organizations he worked for and all who had the privilege of working with him. Known for his enthusiasm, his ability to motivate, and his positive attitude, Wally always had his ear to the ground, with a deep understanding of the sales force and the street. His professionalism, integrity and friendship were hallmarks of Wally's leadership.

During his football and financial service careers and into his retirement, Wally's philanthropy and service stand out. Numerous charities and boards have benefited from Wally's contributions. One of Wally's proudest achievements was his early work for his CFL colleague and pastor, Bob Rumball's Foundation for the Deaf and Camp for the Deaf. More recently, Wally served on the Board of Directors of the Meaford Hospital Foundation, and along with his wife

Carole Cushing, were benefactors of the Hospital and instrumental in raising funds for a state-of-the-art Cataract Surgery Suite. One of Wally's greatest gifts to the world was his love for his farm and the Beaver River in Grey County, Ontario, including the environmental farm plan he implemented and the forest he planted. Wally was happiest on his tractor caring for the land. Indeed, many of the charities Wally supported like the Atlantic Salmon Federation and Trout Unlimited had a conservation focus. Wally was a member of Credit Valley, Lora Bay, and Lost City Golf and Country Clubs, serving in leadership positions on the boards of Credit Valley and Lost City.

Wally's love of golf and fly fishing, among other interests, immersed him in wonderful communities in the Greater Toronto Area, Grey County, St. Margaret's Bay, Nova Scotia, and Atlantis, Florida in which lifelong friendships were created. Moreover, a lifelong learner and voracious reader, Wally was frequently found in his favourite chair at the farm with a book in hand.

Above all, Wally was a loving husband and a committed father. Wally met his wife Carole through business at BMO Nesbitt Burns. They enjoyed many years of working together, worldly travel including a treasured trip to Africa, and spending cherished time with family and friends at their farm and homes in St. Margaret's Bay, Forest Hill and Atlantis. Wally was a dedicated and proud father/ stepfather and uncle, and an even prouder grandfather. He loved his son and daughter-in-law and daughters and sons-in-law and had special relationships with each of them. And as in football and business, Wally was an enthusiastic and optimistic life coach and loyal friend to his wife and children supporting their dreams and goals in all aspects of their lives. Wally leaves a wonderful and well-deserved legacy involving his hard work, leadership, humility and service.

Wally was predeceased by his beloved father Wallace Fredrick Gabler Jr. and mother Carolyn Mae Gabler, his brother John Howard Gabler, and his extraordinary 'Aunt Tootie' Delores Janette Hagelstein. 

The line stands still, the quiet drowns the crackles of angry envy, a new March begins.



Grey County Pursuing Land In Feversham for New Paramedic Base



Grey County is working to acquire land in Feversham from the Municipality of Grey

Highlands for a new paramedic services base. A base is needed in the area to enhance response times and meet the increased and projected demand for paramedic services. Feversham was identified as an expansion location in the 2023 Paramedic Services Comprehensive Service Review.

"When an accident or medical emergency happens, Grey County residents and visitors should be confident help will arrive quickly," said Grey County Warden Andrea Matrosovs. "Grey County is investing in our paramedic services not just to meet the needs of our community today, but for years to come."

Grey County is working with the Municipality of Grey Highlands on a land transfer of municipal property beside a salt dome in Feversham. Grey County previously owned the salt dome and transferred it to Grey Highlands as surplus land in 2021, prior to service review. There is no purchase cost expected. Some site studies are required to determine if the proposed lands are appropriate for the base as currently designed.

The total cost for the new base is estimated at \$1.6 million. The project was included in the 2025 budget and construction is expected to begin this year pending the site studies and tender process. The building would include two ambulance bays, an office, wellness room, storage, and staff space.

The Paramedic Services Comprehensive Deployment Review provided projects for the years 2023-2033. The data projected a 68% increase in call volumes over the 10-year period.

The Feversham base is one of four additional bases in Grey County's capital and operational plans. Grey County is committed to improving rural response times through the addition of bases. New builds are being considered for Ayton in 2026, Thornbury in 2027, and Cobble Beach in 2028. The design of the base in Feversham will be used again for future locations.

In addition to the new bases, Grey County is currently redeveloping the paramedic base in Durham. The new building is located near the hospital and adjacent to the site of the future West Grey Police building. Grey County is also increasing staffing in high volume areas including Owen Sound and Hanover.

Grey County staff are also investigating the relocation of the paramedic base in Dundalk. The current facility is shared with the Dundalk Fire Department. Based on growth in the Dundalk area, the Fire Department will require more space to support future operations.

Things to do in and for your garden in March 2025

WOW! What a winter! Feet & Feet of snow! No January or February thaw. But, it's not all bad. When it finally melts, there will be lots of much needed moisture deep in the soil.

- After the 15th you can start tuberous begonia & caladium corms in pots, or in a tray of peat moss. Keep it moist, but not soggy.
- Plant brassicas, like kale, turnip and radish seeds plus hardy annual seeds indoors for late May planting outdoors.
- Start tomatoes, lettuce and other fast-growing vegetables from seed in late March to early April.
- Make a list of spring garden chores in the order they should be done, if you haven't already done so.
- Order summer flowering bulbs & plants. Try www.botanus.com.
- Order or buy flower & vegetable seeds NOW for summer planting to get the best selection!
- Check, repair and sharpen your gardening tools on a snowy day.
- Apply combination dormant oil spray to fruit trees & pest-prone shrubs when above-freezing weather permits.
- Bring Spring indoors. Start forcing branches of spring-flowering shrubs like Forsythia, if you can get through the snow to get at them.
- If you can find them, buy Narcissus bulbs and grow them in gravel with water for spring flowers indoors.
- Prune summer-flowering shrubs and vines late in the month.
- When the snow is finally gone from your garden beds (maybe in April) and they are still damp, but before new plant leaves emerge, buy and apply triple-19 agricultural fertilizer liberally, but only to your garden beds. It's available now at the Midwest Co-Op on Hwy 10 south of Markdale.
- Plan to plant a few native shrubs that have berries for the birds, plus pollinator perennials for the bees and butterflies.
- When the snow finally goes, loosen up and dig-in any packed winter Mulch, and press perennials that have heaved, back into place.

Think about your garden and make a list of the perennials you could dig, divide and donate to the St. George's Annual Plant Sale in Clarksburg, Saturday May 24 2025. Donate 15 or more plants and get a tax receipt for the value your plants sell for.

The Grey Bruce Elder Abuse Prevention Network

The Grey Bruce Elder Abuse Prevention Network (GBEAPN) and Community Connection in Collingwood have collaborated to create an elder abuse response system in Grey and Bruce Counties.

The GBEAPN is a group of organizations dedicated to increasing the community's capacity to respond to elder abuse. Elder abuse can include but is not limited to neglect and physical, financial, sexual, emotional, and psychological mistreatment of older adults.

Community Connection is the service provider for 211 in Grey-Bruce and surrounding areas. 211 is staffed 24/7 with navigators who help callers find the services they need.

The GBEAPN has created a pathway for 211 navigators to follow. The navigators will connect people with services in the pathway to address elder abuse situations. The organizations in the pathway have committed to responding to elder abuse concerns.

This pathway has been created to address the findings of an environmental scan of elder abuse resources in Grey-Bruce completed by the GBEAPN during the past two years. The GBEAPN discovered that seniors in Grey-Bruce do not know whom to call about elder abuse.

The GBEAPN has worked with Community Connection to create one point of access for elder abuse support by calling 211. This allows seniors, and those concerned about the well-being of seniors, to know who to call for help when they need information and community supports to address abusive situations.

Elder abuse is an important issue in Grey and Bruce Counties. Seniors are the fastest growing group in Grey-Bruce. Between 2016 and 2021, the number of people aged 65 and older in Grey-Bruce grew by 19%.

Recent national research found that 10% of seniors in Canada experience abuse every year. That equates to approximately 4500 seniors in Grey and Bruce Counties going through abuse each year. The number of seniors experiencing abuse in Grey-Bruce could be higher because elder abuse is often not reported.

Elder abuse affects health. It can lead to hospitalization, and even premature death. Calling 211 and finding supports for seniors experiencing abuse could save someone's life.
