



New Craigleith Fire Hall Construction

Fire Hall #2 located at 796338 Grey Road 19 in Craigleith was originally built in 1989. The building is beginning to show its age, and the Town's 2022 Fire Master Plan identified that the station was due for replacement.



Town Staff have identified a parcel of town-owned land south of 796511 Grey Road 19 that would be a suitable location for a new fire hall. This facility would be built to meet the needs of the expanding population and growth in tourism activity in this area.

The existing Fire Hall is planned to be retrofitted as a satellite operations centre for the Town's Parks and Trails, and Roads and Drainage Divisions. Staff are also looking to incorporate touch-down workspaces for all Town staff to use in the Craigleith area.

The project budget of \$11.9 million will be funded by the Community Services Asset Replacement Reserve Fund, Roads Equipment Asset Replacement Reserve Fund, Fire Asset Replacement Reserve Fund and Fire Development Charges.

Why Now?

The Fire Department has outgrown their existing space in Craigleith, and requires a larger facility to meet the needs of the growing year-round and seasonal activity in the service area.

Land clearing to begin week of March 3

Contractors are scheduled to mobilize to the new Craigleith Fire Hall site the week of March 3 to complete brush cutting and clearing. MacPherson Builders will be completing some additional clearing on an adjacent site at the same time in anticipation of future development. A draft tree restoration and landscaping plan for the Fire Hall site has been completed.

As part of the construction plan, the Town will restore extensive naturalized areas across the site, enhancing privacy and preserving the natural heritage. This initiative, combined with previously designated protected lands, will help safeguard local ecosystems and ensure their long-term sustainability.

The Town is in the process of pre-qualifying contractors for construction of the new Fire Hall, and expects to award the final construction tender before the end of April 2025.

Watershed Conditions Statement - Flood Outlook

The recent weather has helped reduce the snowpack over the past two weeks, but the amount of snow and water content still varies across our watersheds. The remaining snow holds between 50 mm (2") and 125 mm (5") of water. With the expected warmer weather this weekend, the existing snowpack will be significantly reduced through the weekend. In addition, approximately 10 to 15 mm of rain is forecast to fall on Saturday night through Sunday before temperatures drop again on Sunday night. As the snow begins to melt, soils become saturated under the snow and additional snow melt will quickly run off into ditches, streams and rivers. Flows will increase and may exceed average/normal spring runoff levels through the weekend and into early next week. Seasonal flooding of low-lying areas will continue.

Grey Sauble Staff have noted very little ice cover within major watercourses throughout our watersheds, thanks to the recent warm temperatures over the past two weeks. Therefore, the risk of ice jamming appears to be low at this time. We will continue to monitor and advise of any changes.

Grey Sauble Conservation Authority would like to remind everyone that during spring runoff events, potential conditions exist that could pose a risk to personal safety. High flows, unsafe banks, melting ice or other factors could be dangerous for recreational users such as anglers, canoeists, hikers, children, pets, etc.

Grey Sauble staff will continue to monitor the weather and the flows and provide additional updates as needed. Grey Bruce Public Health Encouraging Residents To Test Their Well Water This Spring

With milder temperatures and rain in the forecast – which are expected to increase snow melts and spring runoff locally – Grey Bruce Public Health is reminding residents on private water systems to test their drinking water this spring.

“Spring is an ideal time for households in Grey-Bruce that draw drinking water from wells or other private systems to have a sample of their water tested for bacterial indicators of contamination,” says GBPH Senior Public Health Manager Andrew Barton.

“While Public Health advises residents to test their well water at least three times a year, the best times to test are when the chances of contamination are greatest, such as in early spring, after heavy rains, the spring thaw, or flooding conditions.”

Public Health Ontario operates a complimentary well water testing program. Local residents on private systems can take advantage of this program by picking up a sample collection kit and dropping off a water sample at one of the 14 drop-off and pick-up locations throughout Grey-Bruce.

Samples dropped off at the Owen Sound and Walkerton locations are transported each weekday to a PHO laboratory for testing.

Couriers contracted by Public Health also pick up samples at locations along a Bruce County route on Wednesdays and a Grey County route on Fridays. A PHO courier then takes the samples to a PHO lab.

A map of the sample drop-off locations, along with information on when to collect samples and drop them off, is available on GBPH’s Private Drinking Water webpage.

Water samples must be tested by PHO within 48 hours of collecting the sample. Therefore, residents must collect and drop off their samples as close as possible to the scheduled courier pick-up time.

Public Health Ontario’s private drinking water testing program analyzes samples for the presence of bacterial indicators of contamination, specifically E. coli and total coliforms, which can make people sick and can even be fatal. Residents receive test results directly from PHO.

If a test comes back with an adverse result, residents can call Grey Bruce Public Health for assistance.

PHO’s water testing program is not for people on municipal water systems.

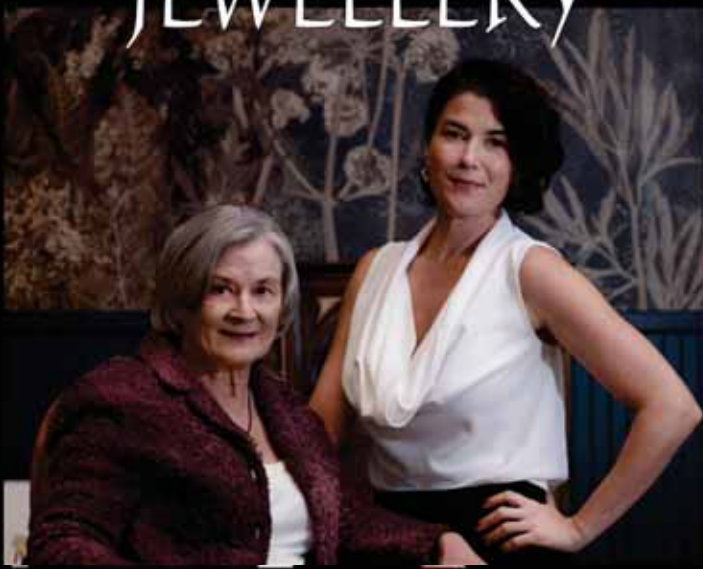

Temporary Partial Bypass at Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant

March 7, 2025

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to inform the public of a temporary partial bypass that occurred at the Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant on March 6, 2025. Between 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m., a failure in the Ultraviolet (UV) Disinfection equipment resulted in treated effluent bypassing the UV disinfection stage before being discharged to the Beaver River at the Bay Street East outfall.

The Town's Wastewater Operators have repaired the system and restored UV disinfection treatment. During the bypass event, effluent was still receiving secondary treatment which includes the removal of biodegradable organic matter and suspended solids. Wastewater Operators performed sampling of the bypassed effluent to ensure it was within normal quality limits under the Town's Environmental Compliance Approval. Grey Bruce Public Health and The Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks have been notified of the event. Staff have no concerns about any threats to public health or environmental impacts.

Grey County named to Smart 21 Intelligent Communities of 2025

For the third consecutive year and fourth time since 2017, Grey County has been named one of the world's Smart21 communities of the year by the Intelligent Communities Forum (ICF). The announcement came on March 6 at the Communities in Transition conference in Hamilton, Ontario.

"We're thrilled to once again be featured on a global stage for the work our communities are doing to leverage technology to make Grey County a great place to call home," said Grey County Warden Andrea Matrosovs. "It's exciting to be part of this process and to continue having the opportunity to learn from other communities around the globe."

The ICF's annual Intelligent Community of the Year competition recognizes communities that embrace technology to realize economic, social, and cultural growth. Intelligent Community nominees are evaluated on six indicators: broadband, knowledge workforce, innovation, digital equality, sustainability, and advocacy.

Grey County's submission to the ICF featured a combination of County-led projects and partner initiatives, including the Sydenham Campus and strategic partnerships with Georgian College. Sydenham Campus is an entrepreneurial and innovation hub supporting workforce and business development, which reached its final milestone with the unveiling of the makerspace and Henry Bernick Entrepreneurship Centre in 2024.

Awards Process

The process begins with communities filling out the Index Questionnaire, which asks multiple-choice, short answer and narrative questions. This may be completed and submitted at any time during the year. In the autumn of each year, ICF reviews questionnaires submitted or updated over the most recent three-year period. The analysis scores the quantitative data provided by communities against ICF's standards while an independent team of Analysts reviews answers to the narrative questions and scores them based on the Accelerator Strategy. Nominations close in early January each year.

Smart21 Communities

At the end of that analysis, ICF announces its Smart21 Communities of the Year®, which are semi-finalists for Intelligent Community of the Year. Prior to the announcement, ICF informs all eligible communities - those whose questionnaire data is three years old or less - that they are under consideration, and we offer an opportunity to either update their information or to be excluded from the current Awards cycle. The Smart21 are announced in February or March each year.

Top7 Communities

The Smart21 then complete a more extensive and largely narrative questionnaire detailing their opportunities, challenges, and results. ICF's analysts review and score the questionnaires. These scores are combined with the Smart21 scoring to narrow the 21 to the Top7 Intelligent Communities of the Year®. The Top7 receive media coverage both locally and internationally, and become the finalists for ICF's Intelligent Community of the Year award.

Intelligent Community of the Year®

Each of the Top7 Communities hosts a visit from an ICF co-founder to validate the data provided in their questionnaire and gain first-hand insight into the key factors in their success as well as areas needing further development. The co-founders write reports, which are reviewed by an international team of jurors. Their votes are combined with the scoring from the Smart21 and Top stages to select the Intelligent Community of the Year®, which is named on the closing day of the Global Summit in October of each year.

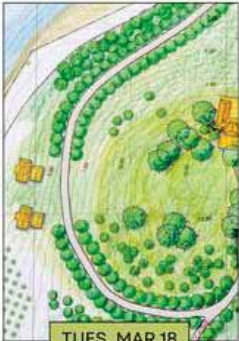

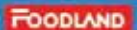

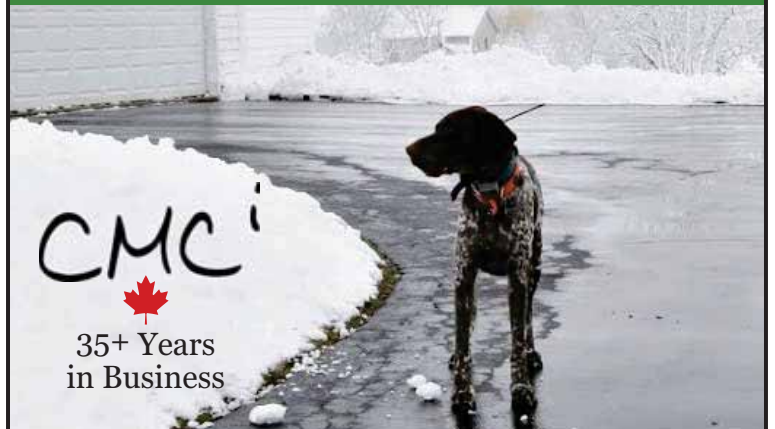
