The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise the public that removal of existing playground equipment, and installation of new playground equipment at Bayview Park is scheduled to begin in the last week of May 2025.

The new playground equipment will be accompanied by a new rubberized play surface to increase accessibility for wheelchair users and individuals with decreased mobility. The total project budget is \$350,000, with approximately \$140,000 of the budget allocated for the rubberized play surface. The design of the new playground equipment was completed with the assistance of a community volunteer group on accessibility. The volunteers also took the initial concept designs and play elements to the 2024 Kids Day at Lions Park for further community feedback.

"This is a great step forward for Bayview Park and accessibility in our community parks," said Ryan Gibbons, Director of Community Services. "I'd like to thank the dedicated volunteers and the whole community for their feedback and commitment to accessibility."

New Road Safety Campaign Targets Cannabis-Impaired Driving

A new community safety campaign launched on the May long weekend to raise awareness about the dangers of cannabisimpaired driving. Led by the Regional Road Safety Committee and the Grey Bruce Community Safety and Well-Being Planning



Crime Prevention Action Table, the campaign aims to prevent injuries and fatalities by promoting safe driving habits, particularly among young drivers, while increasing awareness of Ontario's driving laws.

The campaign launches this weekend on social media and through education at local police-conducted R.I.D.E. Programs, cannabis dispensaries and various organizations across the region.

The need for education and awareness

Data shows cannabis impaired driving is a serious risk on Ontario's roads:

- Cannabis is the second leading substance linked to fatal motor vehicle collisions (24%), according to the Canadian Substance Use Cost and Harms Report.
- Among fatally injured drivers who tested positive for drugs, 54.7% had cannabis in their system, with drivers aged 20-34 most at risk, according to the Traffic Injury Research Foundation (2023).
- Students are particularly vulnerable: 6% of licensed students admitted to driving after using cannabis, and 9% reported being passengers with drug-impaired drivers, according to a 2023 Ontario Student Drug Use and Health Survey.
- A public survey to gather public opinion research on drug-impaired driving showed that 30% of respondents said they had travelled in a vehicle when they knew the driver was high.

Campaign components

These statistics highlight the urgent need for targeted education. In response, the campaign will deliver information through multiple channels:

- Social media and digital ads, targeting individuals on Spotify and Snapchat
- Print materials at organizations across the region
- Education at community events and music festivals
- Community panel discussions with experts to answer cannabis and driving related questions
- This initiative is made possible through funding from the Community Foundation Grey Bruce Fall 2024 Grant and United Way of Bruce Grey's Safe Communities Fund.

Community Safety and Well Being Planning helps organizations improve the things that keep us healthy, happy, and safe. Together, we use research to create solutions focused on education, health care, food, housing, income, crime, and belonging.

It is important that we create a welcoming community where problems are solved before they happen and where different professionals and community members come together to help people now and in the future.

The ongoing work of CSWBP is supported by an advisory committee representing over 74 partners from across Bruce and Grey who are working together to address crime prevention by investing in social development, prevention, and risk interventions. This upstream preventative model focuses on creating protective factors that make individuals less vulnerable to crime and victimization.



Notice of Watering Restrictions

June 1, 2025 - September 1, 2025

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to remind residents that Watering Restrictions are implemented annually from June 1 to September 1.

Stage 1 Water Use Restriction

- Residents may water between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.
- Properties with odd numbered addresses can water on odd numbered calendar days
- Properties with even numbered addresses can water on even numbered calendar days

Lawn Watering and Tips to Conserve Water

Water only when necessary and according to the Town's Water Use Restriction guidelines.

A brown lawn doesn't always indicate a dead lawn. Brown lawns can recover their green colour after rainfall or cooler weather.

- Avoid frequent watering. Watering too often can cause your turf to develop shallow roots
- Promote a healthy lawn by aerating and mowing no shorter than 7.5cm
- If most of the lawn looks green, only water the dry spots
- When reseeding or planting, consider drought-resistant grasses, which are often more resistant to insects and disease
- Use a rain barrel
- Program irrigation systems to water deeply but infrequently and within Water Use Restriction guidelines
- Leave grass clippings on your lawn after mowing
- Check for leaks in your garden hose

Landfill Scale Emergency Purchase - staff report

On April 3rd a lightning strike impacted multiple systems at the Town's Disposal Site, causing a multi-day power outage and equipment damage. In addition to the Site's vehicle scale, the landfill compactor, leachate pre-treatment system and a surface water pumping system required parts and breaker replacements. The on-Site hydro pole was also impacted, and the breaker was replaced by a Hydro One crew.

The scale was rendered non-functional for weeks prior to being provided with a loaner terminal from Mettler Toledo. This loaned equipment continues to be in operation until a replacement terminal can be purchased and installed.

The 2025 Approved Town Budget includes a project to twin the scales at the Disposal Site. This project was supported to upgrade the 22-year-old existing scale, install a second scale and make improvements to the existing scale house. The 2025 Budget approved only the engineering portion (\$28,000) of the project with the remainder (\$442,000) proposed for the 2026 Budget.

To restore full functionality and align with the upcoming capital project to twin the scales, proceeding with a permanent upgrade of the system to a digital platform is recommended.

Repairing and replacing the lightning-damaged terminal is an opportunity to complete the full upgrade of the electrical components from the existing analog system to a digital system.

Digital load cells and related components will provide guaranteed lightning protection, more accurate weighing and betterment to the existing scale to extend the useful life of the foundation and weigh bridge (deck). Analog components continue to be available, however they are typically only installed as replacement parts. Digital systems are more efficient and have more reliable and robust operation. More accurate weighing improves the potential for more revenue. Load cells are also the most common point of failure, installing higher quality digital load cells will reduce down-time and lost revenue.

Staff recommend financing the complete digital upgrade (\$43,956.40) this year to complete the planned improvements along with the replacement of the damage terminal. This investment will extend the life of the existing scale and will support the planned addition of a second scale in 2026. Installation could take place within the next month and would span approximately three days. We anticipate a possible one-day Site closure to facilitate the installation.

The approved 2025 capital budget includes an allocation of \$28,000 for engineering work on the Twin Scale project. The proposed 2026 budget further estimates \$442,000 for the project's construction component, making the total project cost for engineering and construction \$470,000. Currently, only \$28,000 has been approved by Council.

The capital work recommended in this report is included as part of the proposed construction for 2026, and its advancement is prompted by damage resulting from a lightning strike. By completing this work for the existing scale now, it is expected that the proposed construction costs for the Twin Scale project in 2026 will be reduced equivalently, as the work is merely being moved forward.

The costs will be funded by Solid Waste Development Charges and the Solid Waste Asset Replacement Reserve Fund. As of December 31, 2024, the balances in these reserve funds were \$303,245.82 and \$560,843.14, respectively.

Should Council decide to replace the existing terminal like for like the cost would be funded from the Solid Waste Asset Replacement Reserve Fund. This option would not reduce the proposed Twin-Scale project construction costs estimated in 2026 should Council decide to proceed with that project as part of the 2026 Budget process.

On May 20th COW meeting Council approved the supply and installation of scale electronics by Mettler Toledo for \$38,956.40 plus a contingency of \$5,000 for an upset limit of \$43,956.40 plus HST, to replace damaged equipment and upgrade other components in-line with proposed capital equipment improvements.


