Grey Sauble Conservation Authority (GSCA) is excited to announce the completion of major accessibility upgrades at Inglis Falls Conservation Area, one of the region's most popular natural destinations.

Guided by community input and recommendations outlined in the Inglis Falls Management Plan, this project focused on addressing key accessibility barriers to help ensure the conservation area is welcoming and inclusive for all visitors. Public feedback gathered through a 2024 accessibility survey also played an important role in shaping the final design.

The project included renovating the existing washroom facilities to add two gender-inclusive, accessible washrooms, both equipped with automatic doors and baby changing stations.

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise the public that poison ivy weed spraying will be conducted on the Georgian Trail during the week of June 16, 2025. The herbicide spot-treatment will be conducted by Eagles Weed Control along the sides of the trail where poison ivy is present.

Signs will be installed at each end of the areas being sprayed. Residents are asked to stay in the middle of the trail during weed spraying to avoid contact with the herbicide.

2025 Gravel Road Maintenance Starting This Week

Financial Update on the new **Craigleith Fire Station No. 2**

Council received Staff Report CFS.25.036, on June 10th with a request to approve an increase of \$3,338,073 to the project budget to reflect final tendered construction costs, allowing the project to proceed without delay.

The tender for the construction of the new Fire Station in Craigleith closed on June 3rd with submissions from four (4) pregualified contractors. The lowest compliant bid is \$13,768,249.

The Town currently has a remaining budget of \$12,500,000 which is insufficient to cover the full scope of the project and its related components. To complete the work, an additional \$3,338,073 is required, bringing the total project budget to \$15,838,073.

This request for additional funding does not account for the anticipated \$1,500,000 grant from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM), nor the potential \$10,000,000 interest-free loan that may also be available.

The Town is well-positioned to receive the grant, which would reduce the net project cost to \$14,338,073 and result in a budget shortfall of \$1,838,073. However, while there is a strong possibility of receiving this funding, it is important to recognize that grant approval is not quaranteed.



Prime Minister Carney announces Canada's G7 priorities ahead of the Leaders' Summit

Fifty years ago, in the face of upheaval and geopolitical tensions, a small group of advanced economies formed what is now the G7 - a forum for co-operation, stability, and shared prosperity.

In 2025, as global challenges intensify, the G7 must meet this moment with purpose and with force.

Prime Minister, Mark Carney, announced the priorities that will guide Canada's 2025 G7 Leaders' Summit, to be held in Kananaskis, Alberta, from June 15 to 17, 2025.

Anchored in building stronger economies, Canada will seek agreements and co-ordinated action on three core missions:

- Protecting our communities and the world strengthening peace and security, countering foreign interference and transnational crime, and improving joint responses to wildfires.
- Building energy security and accelerating the digital transition - fortifying critical mineral supply chains and using artificial intelligence and quantum to unleash economic growth.
- Securing the partnerships of the future catalyzing enormous private investment to build stronger infrastructure, create higherpaying jobs, and open dynamic markets where businesses can compete and succeed.
- Other discussions will include a just and lasting peace for Ukraine and other areas of conflict around the world, and a forwardlooking agenda that engages partners beyond the G7, recognizing that our long-term security and prosperity will depend on building coalitions with reliable partners and common values.

Quick Facts

This is the seventh time that Canada has held the Presidency of the G7.

This year's Leaders' Summit in Kananaskis, Alberta, will take place on the traditional territory of the Blackfoot Confederacy Nations of the Kainai, Piikani, and Siksika, and the Stoney Nakoda Nations comprised of the Bearspaw, Chiniki, and Goodstoney First Nations, and the Tsuut'ina First Nation.

We also acknowledge the Otipemisiwak Métis People and Government who reside on this territory and all people who make their homes in the Treaty 7 region of Southern Alberta.

Local Members of Provincial Parliament Excited to Announce Transit Funding for Bruce, Dufferin, and Grey Counties

GREY – The Members of Provincial Parliament representing Bruce, Dufferin, and Grey counties are excited to share that the three counties will be receiving a \$9.495-million investment from the Province of Ontario through the Ontario Transit Investment Fund for an integrated regional transportation service. The Hon. Sylvia Jones (MPP for Dufferin—Caledon and Ontario's Deputy Premier and Minister of Health), Brian Saunderson (MPP for Simcoe-Grey), the Hon. Lisa Thompson (MPP for Huron—Bruce and Ontario's Minister of Rural Affairs) and Paul Vickers (MPP for Bruce—Grey—Owen Sound) made the announcement on Friday.

OTIF helps municipalities, Indigenous communities and not-for-profit organizations start up or expand transit services in unserved or underserved parts of the province, particularly in rural communities. The budget for OTIF is \$5 million a year starting in 2025-26. Successful applicants receive funding of up to 50 per cent of project costs for up to five years for projects that encourage integrated, coordinated and sustainable transit services.

This local project, led by the County of Grey, will be funded over the course of the next five years. This year, funding will continue Route 2 of the Grey Transit Route between Orangeville and Dundalk, while supporting necessary studies to help build an integrated local transportation system between the project partners. Funding in subsequent years will help support the capital and startup costs associated with this project. Project partners include the counties of Bruce, Dufferin, and Grey, as well as Saugeen Mobility and Regional Transit (SMART). Funding will be allocated to the project partners as follows: \$145,000 in 2025-26; \$2,500,000 in each of 2026-27, 2027-28, and 2028-29; and, \$1,850,000 in 2029-30.

"Under the leadership of Premier Ford, our government is ensuring all Ontarians, including those in rural communities, have access to reliable transportation to get them where they need to go, when they need to get there," said Prabmeet Sarkaria, Minister of Transportation. "As part of our plan to protect Ontario, we're investing in local transit services that connect people with good-paying jobs, housing and other opportunities."

"Whether it's small businesses attracting customers and employees, students getting to school, or families visiting loved ones, our government's investment in regional transit is helping rural communities remain vibrant and healthy places to live, work and do business," said Thompson, Ontario's Minister of Rural Affairs.

"Our government is investing to ensure communities in Dufferin County and beyond have more options when it comes to safe, reliable transit," said Minister Jones. "This funding will connect people to jobs, services, and more, supporting a stronger, more accessible Ontario."

"From the time I started serving as MPP for Bruce—Grey—Owen Sound, I have heard just how important local transportation is," said Vickers, the first term MPP for Bruce—Grey—Owen Sound. "I am very grateful to the government for making this \$9.495-million investment in a coordinated transportation solution to connect residents to their communities and new opportunities."

"This investment is great news for communities across Grey, Bruce, and Dufferin Counties," said Saunderson. "By unifying our existing transit services into a single regional network, we're helping people get where they need to go more easily—whether it's to work, school, medical appointments or community events."

More details regarding this project will be released by the project partners as they become available.

Notice of Watering Restrictions

June 1, 2025 - September 1, 2025

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to remind residents that Watering Restrictions are implemented annually from June 1 to September 1.

Stage 1 Water Use Restriction

- Residents may water between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.
- Properties with odd numbered addresses can water on odd numbered calendar days
- Properties with even numbered addresses can water on even numbered calendar days

Lawn Watering and Tips to Conserve Water

Water only when necessary and according to the Town's Water Use Restriction guidelines.

A brown lawn doesn't always indicate a dead lawn. Brown lawns can recover their green colour after rainfall or cooler weather.

- Avoid frequent watering. Watering too often can cause your turf to develop shallow roots
- Promote a healthy lawn by aerating and mowing no shorter than 7.5cm
- If most of the lawn looks green, only water the dry spots
- When reseeding or planting, consider drought-resistant grasses, which are often more resistant to insects and disease
- Use a rain barrel
- Program irrigation systems to water deeply but infrequently and within Water Use Restriction guidelines
- Leave grass clippings on your lawn after mowing
- Check for leaks in your garden hose

What is being proposed?

The proposed Property Standards by-law will repeal and replace the current 2002-18 By-law to better address property standard and maintenance issues across the entire municipality.

Key changes include:

- · Expansion to cover all areas of the municipality
- Inclusion of natural gardens, naturalized properties and Town-owned lands
- Enhanced buffering requirements for Commercial and Industrial Zoned properties
- More detailed standards for the maintenance of grading and drainage systems
- Introduction of standards for Heritage properties

Additionally, the current infraction process under the Provincial Offenses Act (POA) will transition to the Town's Administrative Monetary Penalty System (AMPs).

When will a decision be made?

After reviewing Staff Report CS.25.016 and comments from the public, Staff will bring its recommendations to a future Committee of the Whole Meeting.




