Town of The Blue Mountains Council Passes By-law to Adopt Official Plan Amendment

The Town of The Blue Mountains is pleased to announce that during the Council Meeting on June 23, 2025, Council voted to enact Bylaw 2025-35, being a By-law to adopt a new Official Plan Amendment.

This milestone comes after several years of collaboration between Town staff, Council, and project consultants, who worked closely with members of the community in workshops, drop-in sessions, and open houses to shape policies that address key topics regarding development in the community. Most recently, Town staff have spent several months revising the final draft of the Official Plan document to adequately address concerns such as Affordable Housing, Height, Density, Parkland Dedication, the Georgian Trail and Tree Protection.

"The final version of this plan marks an exciting step towards shaping the next generation of development in the Town," said Shawn Postma, Manager of Community Planning. "Through thoughtful collaboration and public input, we have introduced meaningful improvements, particularly in areas like housing and environmental protection, while laying the groundwork for future updates. While there is still more work ahead, I am proud of our progress and grateful to everyone who contributed to this process."

Next Steps

With the enactment of By-law 2025-35, the Town Clerk may now submit the Official Plan Amendment to the County of Grey for final review and approval. This process is expected to take approximately 4 months. Once approved by the County, the Official Plan will serve as a critical document to guide all future land-use decisions in the Town, including residential, commercial and other forms of development.

Update Regarding peopleCare Long-Term Care Home

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to provide the public with an update regarding the partnership with peopleCare Communities to build a new long-term care (LTC) home in the Craigleith area on a section of the former Tee's Please property.

The press release issued by the Town on May 14, 2025, indicated that a report with details of the purchase and sale agreement would be presented at an open session of Council in June 2025. The Town would like to assure the public that the project is on track, but that additional time is required for site analysis to be completed before the report and agreement details are presented.

The importance of increasing access to LTC in the Town is a longstanding community priority that Council remains committed to. Details regarding the report will be posted on the Town website and project webpage.

As a reminder, after the land sale is finalized, peopleCare will submit a planning application and undertake the planning process, which includes amendments to the Official Plan and Zoning Bylaw, and opportunities for public engagement through open house meetings and a formal public meeting. Once these public processes are concluded, the home will be subject to Site Plan Control before a building permit is issued.

Grey, Bruce and Dufferin Transit Project Secures Up To \$9.5 Million In Funding

Residents, businesses and visitors across Grey, Bruce and Dufferin counties can look forward to rural transit enhancements over the next five years. The three counties, in partnership with Saugeen Mobility and Regional Transit (SMART), will receive up to \$9.5 million from the province through the Ontario Transit Investment Funding (OTIF) to develop a unified regional transit network.

"Access to affordable and reliable transportation is essential to the economic, social and environmental health of rural communities," says Grey County Warden Andrea Matrosovs, on behalf of the partnership. "We're excited the province sees value in rural transit in our region and grateful for the significant investment that will help build a sustainable transit network across Grey, Bruce and Dufferin counties." No additional services will be added until a full study and costing has been completed and a vendor is selected. This is expected to happen no earlier than 2026.

Grey County Recognizes a Year of Operating Short-Term Emergency Shelter

Grey County is proudly celebrating more than a year of directly operating the short-term emergency housing at 713 9th Avenue East in Owen Sound. In the first 12 months of operation, the service has supported over 375 households during periods of housing crisis. This represents 480 unique individuals, including families and more than 50 children under the age of 16.

Grey County has been working with local operators to offer motelstyle emergency housing for several years. This type of housing provides a higher level of privacy and security than a conventional congregate shelter setting, making it a more compassionate option for individuals and families in crisis. By purchasing the former Diamond Motor Inn in Owen Sound, Grey County can deliver motel spaces at about half the previous cost, freeing up more funding to expand response during peak winter periods.

"Savings from the motel program have created critically needed capacity to expand our winter response," said Randy Scherzer, Grey County Chief Administrative Officer. "By funding overflow spaces and supporting Safe N Sound's out of the cold program, Grey County was able to offer up to 60 emergency housing spaces per night during the peak winter season."

The short-term emergency housing program is supported by a range of wraparound services on-site, helping individuals move beyond crisis toward stability. Over the past 12 months, these supports helped 176 households transition from Grey County's real-time homelessness list into longer-term permanent housing.


"Everyone deserves a safe place to call home," said Grey County Warden Andrea Matrosovs. "We know that providing stable, dignified housing is a critical first step for people experiencing homelessness. This site and the team behind it are making a tangible difference for individuals and families across our community who are facing some of their most difficult days."

The short-term emergency housing will continue to play a central role in Grey County's housing and homelessness response strategy, providing residents in need with support, compassionate care, and a path to permanent housing.

Ontario Investing \$2 Million to Protect Workers & Support Pearson Airport Expansion

The Ontario government is investing \$2 million through the Skills Development Fund (SDF) Training Stream to support the Pearson Works training project at Toronto Pearson International Airport. This investment will help recruit, train and upskill 450 workers for in-demand jobs in hospitality, ramp and baggage handling, safety and security, general labour and customer service, with direct connections to employers to support clear pathways to employment.

"Our government's \$2.5 billion investment in skills development is helping Ontario workers, including the hard-working employees at Toronto Pearson, stand up to the impact of tariffs and economic uncertainty," said Premier Doug Ford. "Our government is helping these workers get the training they need to succeed and support the airport's ongoing expansion."

There are more than 400 employers across the airport that need workers to remain competitive in the face of ongoing economic uncertainty. The need for workers at the airport is already increasing due to the growing demands of day-to-day airport operations and the airport's ambitious expansion plans.

Since its launch in 2021, Ontario's SDF has helped connect more than half a million jobseekers with better training for better jobs with bigger paycheques. As announced in the 2025 Budget: A Plan to Protect Ontario, the Ontario government is investing nearly \$1 billion more in funding over the next three years through the SDF to support major industries and sectors while training the workers needed to build and strengthen Ontario's economy. This investment brings Ontario's total SDF investment to \$2.5 billion.

Quick Facts

- The investment brings Ontario's total investment in Peel region training projects through the Skills Development Fund to almost \$37 million, which includes almost \$16 million from Round 5 funding.
- So far, the Skills Development Fund Training Stream has supported over 1,000 training projects across the province and aimed to help over 700,000 people.
- People interested in participating in Pearson Works can register for an information session where they can learn about the program and how to enroll.
- The Skills Development Fund Training Stream is supported through labour market transfer agreements between the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario.


