June 30th Weather Event Update

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to provide an update regarding the recent weather event that occurred on Monday, June 30, 2025.

Beginning around 4:00 p.m., the Town and surrounding areas experienced an extreme rainfall event, with Town Rain gauges measuring 85-125mm of rain recorded within a three-hour period. This event had a storm frequency greater than a 1 in 500-year event, according to the Grey Sauble Conservation Authority. The level of precipitation led to runoff levels in local waterways that exceeded typical spring levels, which is uncommon for this time of the year.

Due to the rapid intensity and volume of the rainfall, the Town's stormwater management and drainage systems were overwhelmed. While all municipal wastewater treatment plants remained operational, the stormwater infrastructure was unable to manage the high levels of runoff. Overland flow led to localized flooding and submerged maintenance holes, which caused additional water to enter the wastewater system.

As a result, two wastewater bypass and overflow events occurred. One occurred at the Mill Street Pumping Station and the other at a maintenance hole near the western end of Cottage Avenue, with overflows discharged into the Beaver River. The overflow at the Mill Street Pumping Station ended on July 1 at 1:55 a.m., while the surcharge at Cottage Avenue ended on June 30 at 9:35 p.m. The Town's drinking water was not impacted. Samples were collected during the event and hand-delivered by Town staff to SGS Canada on July 1, 2025, for testing.

Flooding and submerged roads occurred throughout several areas of the municipality, including a stretch of Highway 26 between Mill Street and McAuley Street. Upcoming improvements on Elgin Street are expected to help relieve some of the pressure on this area of the system. Planned work related to the Bay Street East Reconstruction project, which includes updates to the Mill Street Sewage Pumping Station and the installation of a secondary force main through Bay Street, will also increase the Town's ability to manage future heavy rainfall events. In addition to these projects, the Town is actively working on a comprehensive Drainage Master Plan to provide a long-term strategy for managing stormwater in both existing and future growth areas. The plan will identify drainage deficiencies, address flood risks, enhance public safety and improve maintenance over the long term.

The intense rainfall also caused a culvert failure along Duncan Street, leading to the washout of a section of roadway. As a result, Duncan Street West is currently closed between Victoria Street South



and 90 Duncan Street West until repair works are completed by the Roads Division. This work is scheduled to begin the week of July 7, and motorists and pedestrians are advised to use caution, follow posted detours and be mindful of crews working in the area.

During and following the rainfall, Town Staff, including Wastewater, Roads, the Fire Department and Community Services actively responded to mitigate damage and maintain public safety. The Wastewater division coordinated with three local contractors to assist with emergency pumping at key locations across Town. In addition, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) were on-site monitoring road conditions.

While this storm created challenges in both volume and intensity, the Town is committed to strengthening critical infrastructure and continuing to improve the resilience of stormwater systems to adequately handle more frequent extreme weather.

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise the public of an upcoming Online Public Information Centre (PIC) hosted by the Ontario Ministry of Transportation (MTO) regarding a Detail Design and Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) Study for intersection improvements on Highway 26 within the Town of The Blue Mountains.

The study will include, but is not limited to:

- Installation of traffic signals at the intersection of Highway 26 and Grey Road 2;
- Replacement of Structural Culvert 473;
- Illumination at the Highway 26 and Grey Road 113/10th Line intersection; and
- Georgian Trail Realignment at Highway 26 and Grey Road 2.

The purpose of the PIC is to present the study process, outline the existing conditions, the preferred alternative, and receive input on the proposed improvements within the study area. Please note that there is no formal virtual meeting. **Members of the public are encouraged to review the PIC materials available on the project website, and submit their comments during the 30-day comment period, which runs from July 3, 2025 to August 1, 2025.**

Town of The Blue Mountains Reminds Residents that Watering Restrictions are in Effect

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to remind residents that Water Use Restrictions remain in



effect throughout the summer until September 1, 2025.

Town Staff have observed several instances of irrigation systems operating outside the permitted watering hours. As a result, the Town will actively monitor for compliance and enforce the applicable penalties under the Water Use By-law. Property owners found in violation of the Water Use Restrictions may be subject to fines.

Stage 1 Water Use Restrictions include:

- Properties with odd-numbered addresses can water on oddnumbered calendar days between 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. and between 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.
- Properties with even-numbered addresses can water on evennumbered calendar days between 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. and between 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.

These restrictions apply to the outdoor use of water, including lawn watering and garden irrigation. Residents with automated irrigation systems should ensure that they are programmed to operate only during the permitted days and times. Watering with a watering can or washing a vehicle using a hand-held hose with a shut-off valve is permitted at any time.

Water Use Restrictions are in place annually from June 1 to September 1 and are necessary to ensure that water capacity remains sufficient to meet peak demand during busy weekends or in the event of an emergency.

Twelve Projects Selected For Round Two of Youth Climate Action Fund

Twelve youth-led climate action projects have been selected to receive funding through the Town of Blue Mountain's Youth Climate Action Fund (YCAF).

Following a successful Round 1 YCAF program, Round 2 offered microgrants between \$1,500 and \$7,000 CAD to fund youth-led climate initiatives, with funded activities taking place this year in The Blue Mountains and other locations across the traditional Territory of the Saugeen Ojibway Nation.

"Youth are demonstrating their interest, energy and ability to take meaningful action on climate change, and we appreciate the organizations that have stepped up to support youth and help make their projects a reality," said The Blue Mountains Mayor and Grey County Warden Andrea Matrosovs. "The Town has been proud to provide this opportunity to enable youth leadership and climate action across our region."

The following projects were selected to receive YCAF funding:

- Living Snow Fence students will plant a natural tree buffer to improve winter road safety where the need and a willing rural landowner are identified
- Wiarton Bike Bus students will run bike to school events and build knowledge of bike safety and repair
- **Community Gardens & Urban Farming** students will co-design and plant new gardens, including Indigenous methods, at St. Mary's High School in Owen Sound
- Water & Woods: Reviving Nature Through Cleanup & Reforestation – youth and volunteers will restore a section of the Nottawasaga River in The Blue Mountains
- **Earthkeepers** older students will explore a model of developing and delivering climate change education for younger students
- **EcoFlow** youth will provide education on sustainable period product options and will provide free options in various public places
- **Get Our Festivals Clean** youth will enhance the sustainability of Banditfest, a youth-led music festival, and will involve attendees in climate awareness activities
- **Backyard Bird House project** students will learn about, design, build and distribute bird houses to enhance habitat and biodiversity
- **Butterfly Garden and Insect Hotels** students will learn about, design, build and distribute insect hotels and will provide pollinator-friendly plants to student families
- **Endangered Species Mural** students will create a mural to build awareness of endangered Ontario species for the Bluewater Outdoor Education Centre
- **Pollinator Engagement and Education** youth will create public art and installations to build awareness of pollinators and pollinator habitat in The Blue Mountains

Community Gardens Food Security Service and Education – youth will co-design a new community area at the CMHA garden and deliver educational content

Author hopes reading "local" will appeal to readers He refused to stray too far from home.

Thornbury author Sean Patrick Dolan's new thriller The Prophet of Frogs Hollow features scenes on the Bruce Trail, Scenic Caves Road, Penny's Motel, and The Dam Pub. He's hoping to take local readers into a world in which a fictitious cult establishes itself at the base of Frogs Hollow Side Road while a couple from Ravenna attempts to rescue two of their friends from the nefarious group.

"The novel is unapologetically local and it's unapologetically Canadian," Dolan says. When pressed on why he didn't set his novel elsewhere, he emphasized the universality of his story and the opportunity to reflect the beauty of the Georgian Triangle in a fictional setting. "Why not take advantage of the wonder of our area while telling a story that is both dramatic and interesting?" Dolan asks.

The Prophet of Frogs Hollow explores how cults emerge, how people are recruited, and why it is so hard for someone to leave a cult once they're indoctrinated. Readers will come to appreciate the complexities of cult dynamics and the magnetic pull of these groups. The storyline involves plenty of drama, character development, and shocking scenes that see the cult

lead its followers into danger. All this while the protagonists do everything in their power to save their friends.

In the end, Dolan hopes that people will take their SHOP LOCAL habits and apply it to a READ LOCAL perspective. And The Prophet of Frogs Hollow could be just the ticket to satisfying this approach to reading.
