The Blue Mountains Public Library Marks 30 Years of Stories, Culture, and Community

The Blue Mountains Public Library (BMPL) is celebrating its 30th anniversary, honouring three decades of community connection through arts, heritage, and lifelong learning.

To mark this milestone, the BMPL will host a series of events throughout the fall and winter, exploring themes at the heart of GLAM (Gallery, Library, Archive, Museum) institutions: democracy, intellectual freedom, Truth and Reconciliation, digital literacy, books, and our shared history.



Highlights of the celebrations include the launch of a limited-edition colouring book created by local artist Beverley Smith, Chair of BMPL's Arts and Culture Council, and the artist behind the beloved Story Tower murals at the L.E. Shore Memorial Library & Gallery. The festivities will culminate in a December soirée featuring special guest Ken Haigh, the very first CEO of L.E. Shore. The BMPL's full event schedule will be announced by the end of August. All events will be free and open to the public.

A Community Legacy Since 1995

BMPL's main branch, the L.E. Shore Memorial Library in Thornbury, officially opened on Saturday, December 2, 1995, at 2:00 p.m. following a historic community effort, led by former Collingwood Township Councillor and Library Board member Peter Moureau. The Shore Foundation contributed \$1.5 million, and residents raised an additional \$400,000 to furnish the new library with books, equipment, and furniture, much of which is still in use today.

The grand opening was a festive community event. Local caterers provided refreshments, Georgian Triangle Apples Limited donated cider, and Jessica's Book Nook hosted a "Christmas Book Raffle." Just over a year later, the building received the Ontario Library Building Award at the 1997 Ontario Library Super Conference, affirming its place as a cultural gem in the province.

About the Library


The library was named in honour of Leonard Eldon Shore, a local-born architect and WWII veteran who helped design schools and hospitals throughout the region. After his passing, the Shore Foundation was created to fund a legacy project in his name—one that would

enrich the lives of future generations in the Blue Mountains.

Today, BMPL is much more than a library. It is the community's GLAM institution, incorporating the Craigleith Heritage Depot, museum, art gallery, and archives. Together, these services support creativity, literacy, learning, and cultural preservation across the municipality.

Modernizing for the Future

BMPL's current priorities are focused on addressing space needs and modernizing its facilities and services to better serve a growing and changing population. From reimagining spaces to ensuring accessibility and digital equity, BMPL is actively planning for the next 30 years of public service. Peel Street North Reconstruction

MTE Consultants has completed the detailed design and tendering for the Peel Street North Reconstruction Project. This will include the full reconstruction of Peel Street North from Highway 26 to Georgian Bay, and Bay Street West from Peel Street to the Little Beaver River. The project has been tendered and the construction contract has been awarded to Walker Construction Limited. Work is expected to be completed before the end of November. Temporary Lane Restrictions

Temporary lane restrictions will be in place on Bay Street East, from the dead end at the Beaver River to the Elgin Street North intersection, and at the intersection of Bay Street East and Grey Street North in Thornbury beginning in August. The work is expected to take approximately 4 weeks. This is to allow a contractor to complete the installation of new hydro poles and lines in the Phase 1 area of the Bay Street East Reconstruction Project.

The Blue Mountains Adopts Up-dated Building Fees By-law

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to inform residents, builders and developers that Council has formally adopted an amendment to By-law 2014-18, Being a By-law under the **Building Code Act Respecting Permits and Related Matters.** The updated By-law was adopted at the July 14, 2025, Council Meeting, with all changes set to take effect on September 1, 2025.

At the same meeting, Council deferred a decision on the proposed changes to By-law 2022-14, Being a By-law for fees related to **Planning Matters** and Engineering Services, directing staff to prepare a subsequent follow-up report that incorporates incremental increases as well as future projections for the next two years. This report is expected to be presented at the September 16, 2025, Committee of the Whole meeting.

Both By-law updates are part of a comprehensive review of Planning and Development Services fees. In 2024, the Town retained Watson & Associates Economists Ltd. to conduct a detailed analysis development-related with the goal of supporting full cost recovery while maintaining competitive rates compared to similar municipalities. A Public Meeting was held on March 11, 2025, to present the proposed changes and gather input from members of the community and Council. Following the meeting, Watson prepared a comprehensive report outlining the legislative context for the changes, the cost recovery model and recommended fee schedules.

The proposed revised are designed to improve the sustainability of the Town's development services, ensure financial responsibility in the delivery of services, enhance predictability in fee structure and support ongoing investment in the community.

Rock Union Church

The 127th Anniversary Service of Rock Union Church was held on Sunday afternoon, July 13th, 2025. Following the words of welcome by Trustee Kim Chagnon, Steve Glogowski, a member of the church's Local Planning Committee, offered the following words of reflection:

As we begin this service, let us look around at the building we're sitting in. The sign outside says built in 1898, but a log church in this location even predates that. Let's think about the small group of families who built this, the hardships they faced and isolation they felt.

They were a diverse group in their religious affiliation: Quaker, Methodist, and Presbyterian, with family names including McKinlay, James, Johnson, and Buchanan. They knew that in order to survive, they had to depend on each other for their strength when their load was too heavy, for their nurturing when they were sick, and for others' support when it was needed. In other words, they needed a community around them, partly out of necessity, but largely because of the human need for fellowship and love.

This building was built without the use of bulldozers or mechanical devices. Each stone was brought from the fields and laboriously lifted to the height necessary and mortared into place. They were creating a meeting place, a place where they could worship together despite their denominational differences, where, on Sunday afternoons at the Rock Union "Sabbath School", they could teach their children the biblical stories, parables, and lessons epitomizing their strongly held values. Did they know that over 127 years later, this building would still be standing and used by some of their great grandchildren? Maybe not, but as we worship, each in our own way, whether through prayer or silent contemplation, let us think of those qualities that are exemplified by this building which represents a monument to hard work, integrity, charity, and the love of one another. And let us hope, that with our help, its message will last another 100 years.

Music was enlivened by the strong voices of the guest quartet from the *Heritage Community Church* in Collingwood. This was the first time in living memory that hymns at Rock Union were sung unaccompanied by a piano or pump organ, yet the singing was strong and lively, leading to toe tapping, and hand clapping.

Sisters Carolynn and Sylvia Wilson of Collingwood were guest worship leaders and co-presenters. Carolynn acknowledged the importance of an anniversary as a time of remembering, celebrating, and offering thankfulness for those who brought us to this time and place. Sylvia placed a stone on the pulpit, then recounted the story of Joshua's leadership of the Israelites into the Promised Land, after the death of Moses. With stones of remembrance, the Israelites built a monument to commemorate their crossing over from their former life in slavery into the new in the Promised Land. This pile of twelve stones, gathered from the Jordan River, reminded Israel of what God had done for them—that God cared for them, God kept promises to them, and went before them in victory to conquer the land of their inheritance.

Carolynn and Sylvia are co-owners of the Sheffield Park Black History

and Cultural Museum, located just east of Clarksburg. They fulfil the vision and hope of their late uncle Howard Sheffield, by telling some of the story of early Black pioneers and settlers in Simcoe and Grey Counties. Like Joshua's stone monument, this Museum serves to keep this history alive for generations to come.

Harriet Lewis, also a member of the Local Planning Committee, offered words of Benediction.



Clarksburg, which abuts Thornbury is a gem in itself with the art galleries, wellness services, clothing shops, a print shop, a charming hardware store and a well used community centre.

As far as attracting tourist, Thornbury has no problem and many seek accommodations in the beautifully restored Penny's Motel where you can sit down with a plate of oysters or a slice of pizza.

We love to drive down to the water and walk along where the boats are moored looking for the eagle which many people come to see.

This is now our home probably forever as we age. That's another thing Thornbury has: a place to go to live out the final days.

My son brought his grandmother here so she could be cared for with us close by.

The Town of The Blue Mountains is pleased to announce that during the Council Meeting on June 23, 2025, Council voted to enact By-law 2025-35, being a By-law to adopt a new Official Plan Amendment.

This milestone comes after several years of collaboration between Town staff, Council, and project consultants, who worked closely with members of the community in workshops, drop-in sessions, and open houses to shape policies that address key topics regarding development in the community. Most recently, Town staff have spent several months revising the final draft of the Official Plan document to adequately address concerns such as Affordable Housing, Height, Density, Parkland Dedication, the Georgian Trail and Tree Protection.

"The final version of this plan marks an exciting step towards shaping the next generation of development in the Town," said Shawn Postma, Manager of Community Planning. "Through thoughtful collaboration and public input, we have introduced meaningful improvements, particularly in areas like housing and environmental protection, while laying the groundwork for future updates. While there is still more work ahead, I am proud of our progress and grateful to everyone who contributed to this process."

Next Steps

With the enactment of By-law 2025-35, the Town Clerk may now submit the Official Plan Amendment to the County of Grey for final review and approval. This process is expected to take approximately 4 months. Once approved by the County, the Official Plan will serve as a critical document to guide all future land-use decisions in the Town, including residential, commercial and other forms of development. 

The Master Gardener's Corner

Things to do in your garden each month taken from the Ontario Master Gardener Calendar by John Hethrington, Past President, Master Gardeners of Ontario. - Water well, and water deep in the early morning and/or the evening, if your municipal water restrictions allow.
- Top up your mulch. Make sure all bare ground is covered by at least 2 inches. It works to suppress weeds, keeps the soil cool and damp, and retains the rain.
- Sow vegetable seeds now (or again) for a fall harvest of spinach, radishes and some varieties of leaf lettuce.
- Tidy up plants and shrubs with a little judicious pruning, but early in the month.
- Stake tall perennials, like delphinium and New England asters against the wind.
- Cut your grass at least 2" high to combat drying out your lawn.
- Check out spring bulb catalogues on line. Order spring flowering bulbs now, before they're all gone.
- Finally, it's time to pull, or cut off the browned leaves of spring flowering bulbs. Trim back iris leaves. My picky mother would use her best kitchen scissors to cut up one side of each fan and then down the other side to make a perfect arrow.
- Fill in any gaps in your flower garden with fall-flowering perennial plants, like mums and asters.
- Start drying flowers and herbs.
 Pick your lavender now for drying for sachets.
- Start to dig up and divide daylilies when they have stopped blooming.
- Collect seeds that have matured, but not yet fallen from the pods, like poppies and lupins. Once the pods have dried, store seeds in air tight containers in a cool location, or sprinkle them around your garden for colour next year. Early Fall is a great time to sow grass seed and plant new perennials, trees and shrubs. They will get a big jump on planting them next Spring!



- Take a hard look at your garden.
 Take pictures too! Then decide where there are empty spaces for new plants to plant this fall. Identify any plants that have not performed well, (or you can't stand ay longer), and plan to replace them with a fall planting program of shrubs and perennials.
- Look for the annual Grey County Master Gardener's fall plant sale, Saturday September 13th, from 9am until noon. It's in Meaford again this year at the Meaford Rotary Harbour Pavilion. Choose from unique perennials and lots of native and pollinator plants at reasonable prices. Cash, Debit, Credit. Arrive early for best selection.
