On August 5, the Provincial government announced \$89 million in funding to support Ontario seniors through Community Paramedicine for Long-Term Care (CPLTC). The program, operating across Ontario including in Grey County, sees specially trained community paramedics making regular visits to enrolled patients in the comfort of their own homes. Working closely with each patient's primary care practitioner, community paramedics can help monitor patients, assess and treat symptoms, and if necessary, escalate care. Grey County has been providing this program for several years. The program also accepts patients who are without primary care.

"The Ontario government is improving long-term care to ensure Ontarians get the quality of care and quality of life they need and deserve," said Natalia Kusendova-Bashta, Minister of Long-Term Care. "By making this program permanent and delivering care to seniors in the comfort of their homes, CPLTC will continue to protect Ontario's long-term care system, reducing avoidable hospital visits, supporting caregivers and improving seniors' quality of life."

Grey County initially received funding for the program in 2021 for three years. A two-year extension was given to 2024. The permanent funding announcement for the program is being praised by Grey County Council.

"Community Paramedicine for Long-Term Care has been a tremendous asset for Grey County residents for several years and the benefits of the program are numerous and invaluable," said Grey County Warden Andrea Matrosovs during a recent Grey County Council meeting. "Not only does the program help keep more seniors in their homes for longer – which is where they want to be – it improves their overall quality of life and helps take some pressure off of our busy hospital emergency departments."

In addition to the announcement of permanent funding, Grey County was pleased to learn that its Community Paramedicine for Long-Term Care funding allocation will be increasing by an additional \$500,000. With this additional support, Grey County's CPLTC program will be 100% funded by the province through the Ministry of Long-Term Care. The program will not impact the County tax levy.

The Community Paramedicine for Long-Term Care (CPLTC) program was launched in 2020. Grey County was one of the first participating municipalities.

"Grey County Council is absolutely thrilled to learn that this vital program has been made permanent. We're thankful the Ontario government sees value in these services and we're grateful for the significant and impactful investment," said Warden Matrosovs.

Bruce-Grey-Owen Sound MPP Paul Vickers is also pleased to see the program continue.

"In recent years, community paramedicine has become a hallmark of our local healthcare system," said Bruce-Grey-Owen Sound MPP Paul Vickers. "Helping patients where they are most comfortable has been a breakthrough in local healthcare. I am pleased to see that CPLTC programs like the one in County of Grey will get to build on their progress in this space and continue helping patients in our community in the years ahead."

Grey County has been at the forefront of community paramedicine in Ontario since 2014 and has participated in several programs and trials which have helped enhance community care and grow the paramedic profession in the province. In addition to the CPLTC program, Grey County receives additional funding from the Ministry of Health to deliver community paramedicine programs in support of community members with chronic health conditions like COPD, congestive heart failure, diabetes, palliative conditions, and mental health and addictions. Community paramedicine programs offer services such as home visitation, community clinics and public outreach. Grey County paramedics are also involved in the Supportive Outreach Program.

Grey County Committee of the Whole August 14th

- Council received a report on Official Plan Amendment 22 and the proposed redesignation of land to support a special events venue in Grey Highlands. Planning staff outlined the proposal, public engagement on the application, and their rationale for their recommendation to support the amendment. Council discussed the application and the public comments and voted against the amendment.
- Council received a staff report which explored considerations for having paid parking for county-owned parking lots along the CP Rail Trail. Council supported the staff recommendation not to proceed with a paid parking system.
- Council reconfirmed support for a 40-unit seniors' housing project in Owen Sound being built by Lutheran Social Services. Grey County had committed \$1.6 million in funding to the project in 2023 from the Affordable Housing Fund. Of the 40 units, 30 will be accessible.
- Grey County will participate in a pilot program through the Canadian Alliance to End Homelessness to help individuals with a history of chronic homelessness maintain their housing. The pilot will fund two staff positions at Grey County that will focus on supporting individuals when they move into housing.
- Council awarded a contract for architectural services for the design of the new EarlyON Child and Family Centre in Hanover.
- Council accepted the minutes of the July 17 Joint Municipal Accessibility Advisory Committee. At the meeting the committee discussed the Grey County Accessible Customer Service Policy, an Owen Sound playground, the main intersection in Flesherton, the Town of The Blue Mountains Multi-Year Accessibility Plan and more. continued over

- Council approved the minutes of the July 23 Budget and Finance Committee. At the meeting the committee received an update on 2025 capital projects, the corporate financial update to April 2025, and discussed transfers to the health care reserve for 2026. At the meeting the committee also received an overview of capital budgets for the Community Services and Economic Development, Tourism and Culture departments.
- Council approved the minutes of the July 29 Joint Municipal Services Committee. This was the first meeting for the new committee. At the meeting, Chairs were elected and the Terms of Reference for the committee was reviewed. The committee received a report highlighting where County and local municipalities are already routinely working together. The committee also discussed the Waste Management Community of Best Practice and had an open brainstorming discussion to identify other potential services to examine as a committee. www.grey.ca

What is being proposed?

The Town has received a request to consider "Stopping up and Closing" a portion of the Railway Street unopened road allowance located in the area shown on the map below. The purpose of the application is to consider the transfer of some or all of the portion of Railway Street to the landowner to the east. The lands would be used for a driveway(s) to provide direct access and frontage to the open and maintained portions of Railway Street / Barclay Boulevard.

This request is connected to the former zoning by-law amendment application for Blue Birch. The Ontario Land Tribunal's settlement decision on that application contemplated providing access to the lands from Railway Street.

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Notice – Town of The Blue Mountains Council Passes By-law to Adopt Official Plan Amendment, Next Steps for Official Plan Review

Date of this Notice: June 25, 2025

The Town of The Blue Mountains is pleased to announce that during the Council Meeting on June 23, 2025, Council voted to enact By-law 2025-35, being a By-law to adopt a new Official Plan Amendment.

This milestone comes after several years of collaboration between Town staff, Council, and project consultants, who worked closely with members of the community in workshops, drop-in sessions, and open houses to shape policies that address key topics regarding development in the community. Most recently, Town staff have spent several months revising the final draft of the Official Plan document to adequately address concerns such as Affordable Housing, Height, Density, Parkland Dedication, the Georgian Trail and Tree Protection.

"The final version of this plan marks an exciting step towards shaping the next generation of development in the Town," said Shawn Postma, Manager of Community Planning. "Through thoughtful collaboration and public input, we have introduced meaningful improvements, particularly in areas like housing and environmental protection, while laying the groundwork for future updates. While there is still more work ahead, I am proud of our progress and grateful to everyone who contributed to this process."

Next Steps

With the enactment of By-law 2025-35, the Town Clerk may now submit the Official Plan Amendment to the County of Grey for final review and approval. This process is expected to take approximately 4 months. Once approved by the County, the Official Plan will serve as a critical document to guide all future land-use decisions in the Town, including residential, commercial and other forms of development. Ontario Investing in Mobile Crisis Response Teams to Better Protect Communities

Funding will help police in Collingwood and The Blue Mountains support people experiencing a mental health crisis

On August 21st, Brian Saunderson, Member of Provincial Parliament for Simcoe-Grey announced that as part of its plan to protect Ontario and keep communities safe, the Ontario government is enhancing public safety by investing \$240,000 over two years to support the mobile crisis response team led by the Collingwood and the Blue Mountains OPP and the Collingwood General & Marine Hospital. The funding will enable police to work with trained crisis workers to provide the specialized support often needed when interacting with people who are experiencing a mental health-related crisis.

"This is excellent news for the residents of South Georgian Bay and is recognition of the great work of our local Mobile Crisis Response Team which has been at the forefront of this important initiative for many years," said MPP Saunderson. "The Mobile Crisis Response Team works cooperatively with other partner organizations to ensure that those in distress are connected with the critical services they need as quickly as possible."

TODAY IN HISTORY





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
