Soil Awareness Project

This year, in keeping with the Fall Fair theme of Beaver Valley Roots, **CANN-TBM** turned its focus to something we all depend on but often overlook: soil—the very ground beneath our feet and the source of our food.

Soil is a living system made up of mineral and rock particles, air, water, decomposing organic matter, and an entire ecosystem of organisms, from earthworms to microscopic bacteria and fungi. To show case our rich Beaver Valley Soil and Roots we have a display of cotton garments donated by Stanfields of Canada that have been buried by students in our rich soil all summer. Come and have a look!

We also have soil demonstrations and kids activities. Our friend Jake from CanGrow will be joining us with hands on experiments to enhance our understanding of how soil works. We will have demonstrations on cloth treated with microbes, how to retain water in soil for growing plants, dry plant roots reacting with fungi and more

Demonstrations are scheduled for 6 pm on Friday Sept 6th and 12:30pm and 2:30pm on Saturday Sept 7th at the Fall Fair.

show up, and we take action. Because no one should carry this grief alone. Every story shared, every voice raised and every step we take brings us closer to a future free from overdose.

SIGNS OF DEPENDENCE AND ADDICTION

Opioid dependence and addiction can be tough. And anyone who uses any opioid can become dependent or addicted. Being dependent or addicted means that your body is used to having opioids in its system and needs them to work properly. Stopping or reducing the amount you use can be hard, leading to cravings and withdrawal symptoms.

But if you do want to stop or reduce the amount you use, there is help available.

Just using opioids doesn't mean that you're dependent or addicted. Plenty of people use opioids and don't develop a dependency or addiction to them. But it's easy to become dependent or addicted, and it can happen gradually without you even realising.

Here are some signs of opioid dependence or addiction to watch out for:

- Needing to take more to get the same effect
- Increasing the amount you use or using for longer than you planned to
- Spending increased time and effort getting opioids
- Experiencing withdrawal if you stop taking opioids or reduce your dose
- Reducing the amount of time you spend on other activities like work, sport or family
- Continuing to use even though it's causing you problems. If you think you might be dependent on, or addicted to, opioids, ask yourself the following questions:
- Am I taking more than I used to?
- Does my mood get worse if I don't take opioids?
- Do I get anxious about the idea of not taking opioids?
- Do I need opioids to function in daily life?
- Am I using different methods to take opioids (ie snorting, injecting)? If you answer yes to any of these questions, youmay to speak to a drug worker, a social worker or your doctor. If you're not comfortable speaking to someone in person, you can use a telephone/online counselling service. Service providers should be able to recommend a doctor or health service you can speak to.

You may also want to talk to a close friend or loved one. You can even ask someone to go along with you to the doctor as a support person if you feel uncomfortable going by yourself.

Funding Opportunity: Local Food Infrastructure Fund -**Small Scale Projects - Until September 19th**

The Local Food Infrastructure Fund supports community-led projects that improve access to local nutritious food, particularly in communities facing barriers to food security.

The Small Scale Projects stream offers grants between \$25,000 and \$100,000 to help fund the purchase and installation of infrastructure or equipment that supports local food and distribution within a single community.

Current intake is open until September 19th, 2025, or until funding is fully committed.

Projects must include a food production component.

Food production elements-related eligible costs may include, but are not limited to:

- Garden boxes/beds/tools
- Greenhouses
- Irrigation systems, wells, composting systems
- Seeds, soil, fruit trees, compost (initial year only)
- Tractors and other heavy farm equipment
- Vertical and/or hydroponic gardens

Priority is given to initiatives that serve underrepresented or underserved communities.

The sponsoring body or qualified donnee agrees to accept the grant on behalf of the non-profit and be jointly accountable with the applicant for the use of the grant with signed legal documentation.

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





What is being proposed?

The Town has received a request to consider "Stopping up and Closing" a portion of the Railway Street unopened road allowance located in the area shown on the map below. The purpose of the application is to consider the transfer of some or all of the portion of Railway Street to the landowner to the east. The lands would be used for a driveway(s) to provide direct access and frontage to the open and maintained portions of Railway Street / Barclay Boulevard.

This request is connected to the former zoning by-law amendment application for Blue Birch. The Ontario Land Tribunal's settlement decision on that application contemplated providing access to the lands from Railway Street.

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Notice – Town of The Blue Mountains Council Passes By-law to Adopt Official Plan Amendment, Next Steps for Official Plan Review

Date of this Notice: June 25, 2025

The Town of The Blue Mountains is pleased to announce that during the Council Meeting on June 23, 2025, Council voted to enact By-law 2025-35, being a By-law to adopt a new Official Plan Amendment.

This milestone comes after several years of collaboration between Town staff, Council, and project consultants, who worked closely with members of the community in workshops, drop-in sessions, and open houses to shape policies that address key topics regarding development in the community. Most recently, Town staff have spent several months revising the final draft of the Official Plan document to adequately address concerns such as Affordable Housing, Height, Density, Parkland Dedication, the Georgian Trail and Tree Protection.

"The final version of this plan marks an exciting step towards shaping the next generation of development in the Town," said Shawn Postma, Manager of Community Planning. "Through thoughtful collaboration and public input, we have introduced meaningful improvements, particularly in areas like housing and environmental protection, while laying the groundwork for future updates. While there is still more work ahead, I am proud of our progress and grateful to everyone who contributed to this process."

Next Steps

With the enactment of By-law 2025-35, the Town Clerk may now submit the Official Plan Amendment to the County of Grey for final review and approval. This process is expected to take approximately 4 months. Once approved by the County, the Official Plan will serve as a critical document to guide all future land-use decisions in the Town, including residential, commercial and other forms of development. Transitions to Permanent Housing Pilot Project Funding

The Canadian Alliance to End Homelessness (CAEH) is a national movement focused on ending homelessness in Canada by supporting and mobilizing communities to implement proven solutions and advocate for policy changes. CAEH through an expression of interest process sought ideas for projects aimed at reducing homelessness by increasing move-ins to housing or decrease inflow to the homelessness system.


Grey County proposed Transitions to Permanent Housing Pilot through the expression of interest to address a gap in local services. Currently, individuals from the Grey County By Name List (BNL) are housed without sufficient ongoing case management. This project aims to fill that gap by expanding housing supports, reducing evictions among newly housed chronically homeless individuals, and decreasing returns to homelessness. The project is expected to start October 1st, 2025 and conclude September 30, 2026.

The Project goal is to lower the rate of return to homelessness by more than 50% after securing a housing opportunity directly from the BNL. In 2024, Grey Counties BNL had 99 Households experiencing chronic homelessness move into Housing, with a rate of return to homelessness of 30% during the same period.

This initiative proposes two full-time temporary Housing First Case Coordinators to support households transitioning from the By-Name List (BNL) into housing. Currently, this support is lacking, with emergency outreach staff handling follow-ups without dedicated time or resources.

Each Case Coordinator would support 12 households at a time, offering intensive, 6-month support including; regular in-person check-ins; Crisis management and tenant education; Referrals to community services (income support, food, healthcare, employment); Help setting up housing (furnishings, utilities, etc.); Ongoing landlord communication to maintain tenancies and encourage landlords to engage with the system in the future to increase the supply of rental opportunities

Households would also receive a rental supplement and a \$250 engagement incentive for the first 6 months to ease their transition and encourage participation in the pilot project. The pilot project would support 48 households over its duration and aims to highlight the critical role of sustained Housing First support in ensuring long-term housing stability. Total funding under this agreement is \$362,420 www.grey.ca
