

**TBM's Tiny Forest** By Richard Griffith, for the Climate Action Now Network, and Meghan Loney, for the Youth Climate Action Fund and BVO

If you have recently been near the intersection of Beaver and Alice Streets, you may have noticed a rather unusual-looking garden not far from the baseball diamond's outfield fence. This is our Tiny Forest. We planted it in October, 2024. There are many different species here, including oaks, maples and pines.

A Tiny Forest is a small, densely-planted area of fast-growing *native* trees that helps cool urban spaces, attracts a wide variety of birds, butterflies and insects, and brings the experience of a vibrant ecosystem closer to home. This forest was planted using the Miyawaki method, which encourages rapid growth and biodiversity by mimicking natural forest conditions.

#### WHY URBAN FORESTS MATTER

Cooling: A mature tree can cool the air as effectively as perhaps ten air conditioners running continuously.

Water retention: Trees absorb and store water through a process called transpiration, which helps reduce runoff and flooding.

*Air quality:* Trees absorb carbon dioxide and release oxygen through photosynthesis, helping to improve air quality.

#### **GROWING TOGETHER**

Not all these trees will survive long-term. As the forest matures, some of the trees will inevitably be thinned out, which is something that happens in every forest. While a few trees may eventually outgrow this space, all will contribute to a thriving, resilient ecosystem that supports insects, birds and other wildlife. This Tiny Forest is both a living classroom and a legacy, offering inspiration, learning and connection for years to come.

You may be wondering what the big logs are for. These logs encourage the growth of fungal hyphae, which break down chemical elements and makes them available to the trees for growth.

This Tiny Forest was made possible by community volunteers and the collaborative efforts of Beaver Valley Outreach, the Youth Climate Action Fund, the Carbon Action Now Network and the Town of The Blue Mountains.

#### **Home Opportunities MOU** *Staff Report*

Council agreed to support the execution of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Home Opportunities Non-Profit Corporation to facilitate attainable housing on municipal lands.

The primary objective of the MOU presented to Council on August 25th, is to establish a mutual commitment to advancing a prospective attainable housing project and to gauge community interest. As a legally non-binding agreement, it does not supersede any future planning and development approvals that may be required.

Home Opportunities has a strong track record of facilitating attainable housing projects in Guelph, Brampton, and Toronto. They employ a unique model where profits are directed towards a co-operative to support purchasers with their down payments, and development costs are reduced through simplified designs and federal/provincial partnerships.

The MOU, presented to Council through this report, is intended to catalyze a prospective attainable housing project in the Town of The Blue Mountains. Upon execution, both parties will further analyze development models and available lands, with a shared commitment to efficiency and recognizing community needs. It's important to note that this MOU signifies the beginning of a partnership, and any project will be subject to additional agreements and public engagement.

In preparing the MOU, staff provided Home Opportunities with an inventory of vacant municipal lands that could accommodate the desired scope of work: 6-10 acres with the potential for 150-250 units at 25 units per acre. While the Town has limited large-scale development lands with unrestricted land-use designations, Home Opportunities' non-profit status and alignment with the Town's Housing Needs Assessment may offer flexibility. Both the Tees Please property and 125 Peel Street are potential options.

The MOU also outlines potential municipal support avenues. However, any specific support will be confirmed only upon the execution of relevant agreements related to land purchase or development.

Next steps, following Council's approval of the MOU, will involve staff and Home Opportunities refining the project scope based on preliminary land analysis. Once development costs and potential external funding options are clearer, a concept will be developed, which will then be subject to both the Town's internal review process and public consultation.

He was predeceased by his siblings Barbara Osburn, James Cox, Irene Hendry, and Katherine Ann Rawn. He will be lovingly remembered by his nieces and nephews, many who are in the Collingwood area.

At the age of 18 Ron left Collingwood to sail on the Great Lakes, an adventure lasting for more than a decade. He worked as a boatsman and ultimately a wheelsman for the Canada Steamship Lines. In 1967 he joined the Collingwood Shipyards as a welder, remaining there until its closure in 1986. His previous sailing experience meant that he was one of the few workers at the yard who was able to pilot the completed ships on test sails. He later worked at Teledyne Industries in Thornbury as a painter, ultimately retiring in 1997.

Ron was an avid hockey fan. He played locally for Collingwood in the early 1960's and often supported the local teams at the Collingwood Arena. He was a long-time season ticket holder for the Owen Sound Platers and Attack teams, loyally following them every year with the highlight being their championship year of 2011. His extensive collection of memorabilia decorated the walls of his home. He loved to spend time fishing, mostly on Georgian Bay in his prized Wilker boat which still remains in the family. He made many friendships during his days sailing on the Great Lakes that endured a lifetime and led to fishing trips to one of his favorite destinations, Lake Manitou on Manitoulin Island.

He was an enthusiastic player of many card games and a challenging opponent for all. Many family occasions lead to a lively game of euchre or cribbage. Even as he aged, he continued to be a difficult adversary in these games. Family was always a priority in his life. As a quiet, steady force in our family, he was valued for his opinions and guidance. His sense of humour and quick wit will be greatly missed. He will be remembered for his kindness and generosity to all.

Although he dealt with mobility limitations over the last 30 years, he never allowed his pain or discomfort to erode the enjoyment that life had to offer. He was always able to rise above any health challenges to find and spread joy. He was a hero to his family.



He was a fountain of information and very difficult to beat in trivia and family debates!

Brian believed in giving back to his community, and served as the Collingwood Rotary Club President & Treasurer; Race Director & Commodore of the Collingwood Yacht Club; Treasurer & President of the British Car Club; Treasurer of the Blue Mountain Arts & Culture Group; co-organized Jazzmania and Music in the Park events in Thornbury; tech volunteer for Georgian Triangle Life Long Learning; Secretary Treasurer of the Watts Skiff Club; and First Aid Aid instructor for the Canadian Ski Patrol.

For ten years he dedicated himself to organizing and running the Collingwood Sailing School, helping it grow into a program which taught over a hundred students annually, and for which he was inducted into the Collingwood Sports Hall of Fame in 2012.

#### Tim Oliver Makes History Crossing the Legendary Kaiwi Channel

Local Thornbury resident, Tim Oliver, is continuing the pursuit of his passion this year, Stand Up Paddle Board (SUP) racing. He recently competed in the Hawaii M2O paddling race, from the island of Molokai to the island of Oahu, across 52 km of open Pacific Ocean. The Kaiwi Channel where the race takes place is notorious for strong winds, large swells and strong currents. The M2O race is considered to be the toughest paddle board race in the world.

Tim completed the 52-km course in a time of 5 hours, 50 minutes, which gained him first place among all SUP categories (board length, male and female, all ages). His time was also 6th fastest overall for all competitors (male and female, all ages, prone and SUP, solo and relay team).

Tim's training is ongoing as he has another unique international race coming up September 10-14 in the Netherlands. The ultra long distance race is called the "11 Cities Tour SUP Race", and traverses some of the historic waterways of Friesland, Holland, passing through 11 iconic Dutch towns over a distance of approximately 220 km. These same canals and waterways were home to long-distance Winter speed-skating events held in the region over many decades.

Good luck to Tim as he continues to represent the Blue Mountains, Ontario and Canada in the sport of SUP racing.

#### Ben Young Captures his Fifth Career Canadian Superbike Crown

In a thrilling and unpredictable finale, held August 13th, at Canadian Tire Motorsport Park, Ben Young, Thornbury, Dolder's Van Home Team clinched Honda his fifth GP Bikes Superbike Championship. This historic win



secures his place among the greats of Canadian motorcycle racing.

Riding the 2025 Honda CBR1000RR-R SP, Young overcame a season filled with challenges to emerge victorious in the 2025 Bridgestone CSBK National Superbike Championship, becoming the first Honda rider to win the title since Jodi Christie in 2014. The win also earned Honda, Team of the Year honours.

His triumph makes him only the third rider in CSBK history to win five Superbike titles, joining Jordan Szoke (14) and Steve Crevier (6).

Ben joined Honda Canada's CSBK team this year and his win solidifys his dominance in the sport and his successful transition to Honda machinery. He will be defending his title on a Honda for the 2026 CSBK season.

Born in Scotland, Ben moved to the Blue Mountains at the age of 14 with parents Lynn and Scott and older sister Robyn.

### An update on Canada's retirement income programs highlights many key mid-year changes. These include:

Canada Pension Plan (CPP) and Old Age Security (OAS)—July 2025. The federal government has confirmed mid-year increases in monthly payments for eligible seniors,

Those already receiving these benefits or people turning 65 soon, may benefit from knowing July 2025 CPP and OAS payment changes, including eligibility requirements, updated amounts, and the official deposit schedule.

Starting July 29, 2025, both CPP and OAS payments increased for most recipients. These adjustments are part of the government's regular inflation-indexing policy, ensuring benefits keep pace with the rising cost of living.

For some Canadians, this mid-year increase may be combined with additional programs such as the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS).

The **Canada Pension Plan (CPP)** provides monthly retirement income to individuals who contributed during their working years. CPP amounts vary depending on your contributions and the age at which you begin taking the pension.

Retirement pension (age 65)

Maximum Monthly CPP \$1364.60

Post-retirement benefit Up to \$40.25 extra

Disability benefit (under 65) \$1,613.54 Survivor Benefit (under 65) \$739.31 Survivor Benefit (65+) \$837.34

These are maximum amounts. The actual amount depends on how much and for how long you contributed.

**Old Age Security (OAS)** is a monthly benefit available to most Canadians aged 65 or older, regardless of employment history. Maximum monthly benefits (as of July 2025)

Age 65-74 \$727.61 Age 75 and over \$799.61

The OAS benefit increases quarterly based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI). The July 2025 adjustment reflects inflation data from the first half of the year.

Seniors who receive OAS and have low income may also qualify for the GIS, Guaranteed Income Supplement. As of July 2025, the maximum GIS for single seniors is rising to \$1,086.88 monthly, which brings the combined OAS + GIS to nearly \$1,815 per month. This benefit is assessed yearly.

If you're registered for direct deposit, the funds will appear in your account on that day. If you receive a cheque, it may take a few additional business days to arrive by mail.

#### **Eligibility for CPP and OAS in 2025**

CPP Eligibility--You must be at least 60 years old. You must have made valid contributions to the CPP. You can apply even if you are still working.

OAS Eligibility -- You must be 65 years of age or older, Be a Canadian citizen or legal resident, Have lived in Canada for at least 10 years after age 18, For full benefits, residency of 40+ years in Canada is typically required

#### **About the Leg Up Luau**

The event was a great success and it even gave Robert the opportunity to perform with his band, Cabin Fever at the Marsh Street Centre. Preston Owen of Clear Choice named the event the "Leg Up Luau".

Since 2017, Robert, along with the generous sponsorship of Thornbury Clear Choice, has taken on the challenge of paying it forward by making the Leg Up Luau an annual event raising money for other families and charitable organizations in our community.

To date, the Leg Up Luau has raised well over \$40,000. benefitting families dealing with Mobility issues, Autism and Cancer. ### The Master Gardener's Corner

Things to do in your garden each month taken from the Ontario Master Gardener Calendar by John Hethrington, Past President, Master Gardeners of Ontario. #### September 2025:

- WOW! What a summer, so hot and dry!! Water, water, water whenever you can!
- Trim back perennials like Daylilies and Iris. My mother always cut the iris fans up one side and down the other for a perfect V. But she was a picky gardener. Divide them now as needed.
- Make sure it's a cool, cloudy day to divide and replant anything, or to pot up plants for your neighbours, or for fall plant sales or plant exchanges.
- Fall is the ideal time to divide and plant Iris, Daylilies, Peonies and many other perennials. Share extra plants with neighbours. To see my YouTube video on dividing and potting up plants, click on -https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=KmTTyGNoRB4 but don't laugh at the old man groaning, as he divides up and pots his perennials.
- Buy and plant spring-flowering bulbs NOW. Your efforts will be handsomely rewarded next spring. Check out the website www. bulbsrus.com for good deals. Dig the hole a little deeper than the specified depth & add some water to the bottom of the hole, then some soil, mix in a little bonemeal fertilizer or special bulb food. Sprinkle in a little topsoil, set the bulbs in place and back fill the hole. Water well after planting, to start root growth.
- Take a critical look at your garden. Then fill in any gaps that may have developed with new perennials, shrubs and/or evergreens.
   They will get a huge head-start over plants planted next spring.
- Bring in house plants when the evenings start to cool down. First, give them a thorough spray with insecticidal soap so that there are no unwanted hitchhikers coming into your home.
- Pray for cool nights and hope for fall rains. It's the ideal time for lawn repair. Dig out weeds, add clean, weed-free topsoil and reseed. Keep the area moist.
- Fertilize lawns with root-building Fall Fertilizer. Buy the one with a low first number (Nitrogen) and high second and third numbers (Phosphorus & Potash). Don't use the lawn fertilizer you have left over from the spring, with a high first number (Nitrogen). Save it for early next spring.
- With the heat and lack of rain this summer, deep down it is bone dry. Check the moisture levels 14 to 16 inches deep. If the bottom of the hole is dry, water your gardens weekly and deeply until frost. Buy a soaker and put it on the end of your hose. Then place it in the middle of your relatively flat garden beds and let the water slowly seep in.
- Look for the annual Grey County Master Gardener's fall plant sale, for a wide variety of top flight perennials, Saturday September 14<sup>th</sup> from 9am until noon. Again, this year, it's in Meaford, at the Rotary Pavilion at the Harbour. Choose from unique perennials and lots of native and pollinator plants at reasonable prices. Come early for best selection!

We have repainted, replanted and added new signs to three canoes this summer - Thornbury arena, Clarksburg

Another way we are raising awareness is by setting up displays and pop-up events. We

#### **Soil Awareness Project**

This year, in keeping with the Fall Fair theme of Beaver Valley Roots, CANN-TBM turned its focus to something we all depend on but often overlook: soil—the very ground beneath our feet and the



source of our food. Soil is a living system made up of mineral and rock particles, air, water, decomposing organic matter, and an entire ecosystem of organisms, from earthworms to microscopic bacteria and fungi.


To show case our rich Beaver Valley Soil and Roots we have a display of cotton garments donated by Stanfields of Canada that have been buried by students in our rich soil all summer. Come and have a look! We also have soil demonstrations and kids activities. Our friend Jake from CanGrow will be joining us with hands on experiments to enhance our understanding of how soil works. We will have demonstrations on cloth treated with microbes, how to retain water in soil for growing plants, dry plant roots reacting with fungi and more. **Demonstrations are scheduled for 6 pm on Friday**, Sept 5th and 12:30pm and 2:30pm on Saturday Sept 6th.

#### Did you know that composting kitchen waste can save on green house gas emissions?

Food waste in the land fill decomposes anaerobically (without oxygen) producing methane gas which is 30 times more potent than Carbon dioxide at trapping heat. Food waste that is composted at home or by your municipality (with oxygen) produces carbon dioxide. We could save 2.6 to 7% of green house gases if everybody composted their food waste. There is also a transportation saving by composting at home. The potentially usable minerals and nutrients from food waste that end up in landfills are wasted in a one way system. When food breaks down as compost into more simple chemical compounds they can be reused to grow other plants reducing the need for synthetic fertilisers made from petroleum (more savings).

Plants seguester carbon from the air into the soil. They use solar energy to create sugars, which they emit from their ROOTS, and microbes in the soil eat them and turn it into humus. Composting creates a microbe-rich soil that can grow bigger plants and take more CO2 from the air to put in the soil.

### From Lunch in Kimberley to Planning for Your 100th Birthday

Turns out, Kimberley isn't just a great spot for lunch — it's also the birthplace of the RRSP.

I discovered this over a grilled cheese with my toddler after paddling the Beaver River: Local politician Walter Harris, once Canada's Finance Minister, helped bring the Registered Retirement Savings Plan into existence in 1957 (Walter Edward Harris – Parliament of Canada biography). Hard to imagine a place as quiet as Kimberley shaping something so central to Canadian retirement. But, all that quiet must have left room for deep thought.

When RRSPs were first introduced in 1957, investment options were limited to cash, government and corporate bonds, and certain annuities (Government of Canada: Registered Retirement Savings Plan). RRSPs have come a long way since then, evolving with new features, investment options and flexibility to keep up with faster times. Today, RRSPs can be built around your unique goals and benefit from tools that did not exist in Walter Harris's day. Whether your goal is an adventurous retirement, supporting family, or leaving a legacy, your RRSP strategy can be as personal as your story.

But for all that innovation, longevity remains the big challenge—making smart planning more important than ever. A 65-year-old couple in average health has a 90% chance one of them lives to 85, and a 75% chance of reaching 90 (Society of Actuaries Longevity Illustrator). Here in The Blue Mountains, where 90-year-olds are still hiking and skiing, planning for a long, active life isn't just wise—it's essential.
