Community Improvement Plan

The Fall 2025 intake period for applications to the Town's Community Improvement Plans is open from September 15, 2025, until October 17, 2025.

The Town has two Community Improvement Plans:

In 2021, the Town of The Blue Mountains developed two Community Improvement Plans to serve as a long-term strategy to revitalize the community, improve the quality of life of the community's residents, better utilize under-developed properties and promote private investment in land and buildings.

The Town Wide Revitalization Community Improvement Plan encourages private property improvement and revitalization. The Housing Within Reach Community Improvement Plan facilitates the development of attainable housing.

Interested applicants are encouraged to arrange a preapplication consultation with Town Staff to discuss and confirm application requirements. Following the consultation, applicants must submit a completed application form, including supporting documentation for evaluation. Strategic Initiatives (519) 599-3131 ext. 269

Application Process

- Applicants are required to contact the CIP Administrator to arrange and participate in a pre-application consultation meeting with Town staff, in order to discuss and confirm application requirements, program eligibility, the proposed scope of work, project timing, supporting documentation requirements, etc.
- After the consultation, the applicant will be required to submit a completed application, which will include all of the application forms, in addition to any supporting documentation, as required by the Town.
- Once all the required forms and supporting materials are received, the Plan Administrator will undertake a preliminary screening of the proposal and application.
- Based on the application and proposal, the results of the preliminary screening, Town staff may perform an initial site visit and inspection of the building/property, as necessary.
- If the application clearly does not meet the program requirements, the application will not be accepted.
- If the application meets the program requirements, the application will be accepted. Acceptance does financial incentive approval, guarantee that it will be reviewed by Council or a delegated approval authority for final financial approval. www.thebluemountains.ca/CIP

In Memoriam

ALLAN LLOYD 'AL' LAKE March 2, 1932 – September 12, 2025

On Friday, Sept. 12, 2025, Allan Lloyd Lake passed away peacefully at Southbridge Care Home, Owen Sound surrounded by his family. Born and raised in Clarksburg, he is survived by his wife of 66 years, Saundra (nee MacDonald), his children AJ Lake (Sue) and Linda Burnett (Graham) and granddaughters Sarah Grant (Alex), Andrea Boyle (Jesse) and Christine Burnett. He also was fortunate enough



to meet his great grandchildren Leo and Oliver Boyle and Anna and Henry Grant. Al was a very devoted family man.

He was born as the fourth child to Lloyd and Alice Lake. He always looked up to his older siblings Lil, Jack and May, as he was several years younger. Then, on his 6th birthday came his favourite childhood birthday gift: his baby sister, Sheila. The five Lake kids and their families remained close throughout their lives with frequent parties, games of rummoli and maybe a few too many shots of rum. All siblings predeceased Allan but he is survived by brother-in-law Ray Eagles, of Meaford.

He is also survived by sister-in-law Shirley Lawrence, Toronto and brother-in-law John MacDonald (Joan), Thornbury. He was predeceased by sister-in-law Marilyn Taber of Toronto. He also is the much-loved uncle and great uncle to many nieces and nephews.

Allan's childhood was spent in a Tom Sawyer fashion in and around the Village of Clarksburg where he and his friends occasionally got into shenanigans along the Beaver River and in the apple orchards of the Valley. On occasion he would find himself in a bit of hot water with a parent or land owner but some quick bike pedaling home or ducking into nearby fields saved him from much consequence.

He was a hard worker from an early age, delivering The Telegram newspaper on his bicycle around Clarksburg, even in winter. Later, as a teen, he began working at his dad's business Lake's Garage and Machine Shop where he swept floors and cleaned for 5 cents/hr on Saturdays. Tiring of school, he began to work full time at the business with his Dad and brother Jack in his late teens.

He graduated a few years later from Ryerson Institute of Technology with his Automotive Technician Diploma and a brand new 1951 Ford Sedan with whitewall tires, spot light, the works. Al referred to this vehicle as a "honey of a car" and with these wheels, Al was able to travel from Balmy Beach to the Kee to Bala to attend all the Big Band Dances- usually with a gang in tow including a gal on his arm.

But it was in 1955 that he met his true honey: Saundra MacDonald. Their romance, which has thrived for 70 years, overcame all obstacles a marriage could have from parental disapproval in the early years (he was 6 yrs older and she was just a high schooler) to financial hardship and illness. But through it all, their love, friendship and mutual respect endured.

As Saun has frequently said, they were dealt spades, found hearts and ended up with the only diamonds that matter: each other. They were married in July 1959 and soon were parents to AJ and Linda. Their little family complete, Al and Saun set to work to build their lives together. Soon, their dream home was built on Hillcrest Drive where they lived, worked and raised their family for 60 years.

Al continued his career at Lakes Garage during this time, becoming a partner in 1961 with his brother Jack until 1980. In 1984, AJ joined the business which by then was incorporated and they built Lakes Garage into a well-respected regional car dealership and garage. By the time the shop closed in 2001, they were not only the longest family operated VW dealership in Canada but had won numerous sales and customer service awards including the Top Performing Dealership in all of North America by the VW Corp.

Al prioritized spending time with his family. He loved his siblings and welcomed each new member by marriage or birth into the family as his own. He taught AJ and Linda to downhill and water

ski and they spent many family afternoons sleigh riding the hills of Clarksburg or having their family game nights. Learning to drive standard transmission under Dad's watchful eye became its own epic story to be retold with a smile. Gradually, as AJ and Linda found partners, Al embraced Sue and Graham into the fold, always making them feel equally special and loved.

Sarah, Andrea and Christine were his next generation of "Dollys" and each has many special memories of his gentle love and teasing. As his family grew again with the marriage of his granddaughters, Jesse and Alex also felt his warmth. In the past 5 years, as a greatgrandpa, each baby was fully welcomed into his open arms and heart. His family always knew they were loved.


In addition to his family time, Allan was a volunteer on the Clarksburg Fire Dept, promoted to Deputy Chief before retiring. He also served his community on the Clarksburg Business Association and the Chamber of Commerce. He was also active on the ski slopes, including annual trips to Tremblant/St Jovite, as well as water skiing and badminton. He and Saundra travelled the world, his personal highlight being their time on the island of Moorea, South Pacific.

He was also an avid reader, particularly history of WWII which he remembers as a formative part of his childhood. Frequent entertainers, Al and Saun were known for their generous and relaxed hosting of family and friends. And while Al loved his home in Clarksburg, his truly happy place was on the shores of Georgian Bay at the original Lora Bay waterfront cottage built by his parents in the 1950s. Al and Saun bought the cottage from his parents in 1972. This love for the cottage and boating continues to this day with his children, their spouses, grandchildren and now, his great grandchildren.

Up until his recent illness, it wasn't unusual to see Al working in his yard, trimming his granddaughters' favourite "monkey shrub", having a smoke and later in the afternoon, enjoying a rum or a rye with Saun while soaking up the last rays of a beautiful day on their front patio.

The family wish to thank Dr. Recoskie and April, the staff at both the Meaford and Owen Sound branches of the Brightshores Health System and the Southbridge Care Home, Owen Sound for their outstanding care and compassion during the past few months. Cremation has taken place.

A Celebration of Allan's Life will be held at the Marsh Street Centre in Clarksburg on Friday, October 3, 2025. A private graveside service will be conducted at Thornbury-Clarksburg Union Cemetery. 

DR. DONALD FREDERICK 'DON' PRIOR

It is with great sadness that we announce the sudden passing of Dr. Donald Frederick 'Don' Prior on September 24, 2025, at the age of 82, at the Meaford Hospital, Ontario, after an acute febrile illness.

Don was the beloved husband of 27 years to Leslie Prior and the proud father of Kimberley, Natalie (Scott), and Stephanie (Jamie). He will be



Born in Edmonton to Stanley and Mildred Prior, Don's family later moved to Toronto, first living in midtown and then in Scarborough, where he attended high school and met his first wife Anne, the mother of his three daughters. Don graduated from the University of Toronto Medical School in 1967 and went on to a distinguished career as an orthopedic surgeon at William Osler Health System (formerly Peel Memorial Hospital) for over four decades, specializing in knees and hips.

He served multiple terms as Chief of Surgery and also managed a sports medicine practice for many years, including the opportunity to play a meaningful role in supporting Canada's Paralympic athletes during the mid 1980s, reflecting his commitment not only as an orthopedic surgeon but also as a dedicated advocate for athletes with disabilities. He was admired for his precision, skill, and dedication to excellence and the highest standards of care.

Outside of medicine, Don had an insatiable curiosity and a love of adventure. Whether sailing, skiing, hiking, or cycling, he inspired in his children a lasting appreciation for the outdoors, creating family memories on holidays in Quebec and Colorado, as well as across Ontario. With Leslie, he shared passions for cross-country skiing, cycling, jazz music, gardening, and travel. Together they visited many exciting places around the world - from the Arctic to New Zealand, often with friends and family.

Growing up alongside his twin brother Ron, they had a close bond, being similar yet different in many ways. Don took a deep interest in school, studying Latin, German, the sciences, and math. He particularly enjoyed shop class, which he chose as an extra course during free periods. In high school, he served as a prefect and played the trumpet in the band.

Don was also an avid golfer and curler, a member of clubs in Halton/Peel and Caledon. He golfed even further afield, and played right up until the week before his passing. He loved both the challenge and the community the sport provided.

Don had a playful side and a love of craft and new technology, from the latest sound systems, ski equipment, car, gadget, you name it. He could be seen lugging the family's bulky BetaMax camcorder to capture milestones, ski trips in Colorado, graduations, and university frosh-week drop-offs. In his woodworking shop, he built projects both big and small, including a cherished rocking horse for his daughters. He was known as a wine expert, with a passion for fine food and restaurants, and forged lasting connections with those who served him. His holiday tourtiere, complete with decorated pastry, became a family tradition.

He loved spending time with his grandchildren, sharing his knowledge and hearing about their discoveries. He was an active member of his community, and in later years participated in amateur theatre, choir, and Tai Chi.

Don will be remembered as a man who pursued excellence, embraced adventure, and loved his family and community deeply.

A celebration of Don's life will be held in November.

Grey County Committee of the Whole Sept. 25

Grey County will include \$130,000 in the 2026 budget to complete studies and assessments to help prepare two parcels of countyowned land for future development, including the possibility of future affordable housing builds. One parcel of land is in Durham and one parcel of land is in Markdale.

Council received a staff report providing an update on the Court Security Contribution Agreement with the City of Owen Sound as directed by Council last year. The agreement aims to help cover the gap between the City's court security and prisoner transport costs and the funding it receives from the Province. The County's contribution to the court security costs was estimated to be \$250,000 in the 2025 Budget but the actual court security costs resulted in a shortfall of approximately \$120,000 which will be covered from reserves. Grey County operates the Provincial Offences Court out of the Administration Building in Owen Sound. Earlier this year the Ministry of the Solicitor General directed all courts to increase security levels. Council directed staff to write letters to the Ministry of the Attorney General and Ministry of the Solicitor General advocating for additional provincial funding to cover these new security directives.

Grey County currently has 62 long-term care beds approved for redevelopment at Grey Gables in Markdale. The Province has asked long-term care operators with approved new bed allocations to indicate if they plan to move ahead with construction plans. Council discussed the importance of long-term care services and highlighted the significant investments underway to redevelop Rockwood Terrace in Durham into a 128-bed home. Council had a lengthy discussion noting the need for more beds, the expected impact on the levy, debt limits, the complexity of redevelopment and more. Council directed staff to inform the Ministry of Long-Term Care that Grey County is interested in maintaining the 62-bed allocation and will decide on construction once the Rockwood Terrace project is completed in 2027.

Council received a staff report to consider implementing a development charges holiday for industrial development. Development charges are a tax on new development that helps to offset the increased cost of delivering municipal services and building infrastructure with growth. The intention of a development charges holiday is to spur the development of industrial lands which could in turn result in employment growth. After discussing the report, Council voted not to move forward with an industrial development charges holiday at this time.

Grey County and partners Bruce County, Dufferin County and Saugeen Mobility Transit have secured \$9.5 million in funding through the Ontario Transit Investment Fund (OTIF) to develop a regional transit network. The first phase of the project is the completion of a study that will design and cost a unified regional transit network building on previous transit planning efforts, leveraging past insights, and recommendations. The study will give staff, Council and the partners the information necessary to make informed decisions about the future potential of a unified regional transit network. The study itself is expected to take approximately six months, followed by presentations to each Council and board for consideration in the spring of 2026. The OTIF funding agreement requires contributions from all partners. Council authorized staff to sign a transfer payment agreement and to include \$145,000 in the 2026 budget for Council's consideration.

We were introduced to the theatre and Shakespeare and poetry, history, French, Latin and chemistry, art, gym and even taught the classics of ballroom dancing. Being an all girls school, we partnered with another girl in order to dance. But that was fine.

We wore uniforms with plastic collars and plastic cuffs. Most cuffs were scribbled inside with "notes" and phone numbers, names etc.

For gym, we wore a lighter uniform sans the dreaded collars and cuffs but had to wear tights anyway (no bare legs). P.S. As soon as the school day was over, those plastic things were taken off and put into our handbags and not put back on until we neared the school.

Every so often we had "Civies Day" where we could dress in regular clothes. That's when you saw some of the character of the girls displayed. We were still not allowed to wear make up.

In the school was a Guidance Counsellor, a Nurse and the principal who was strict but had a heart of gold. Any problems we had, we were well looked after. We were fortunate to obtain first class education which provided us with a solid basis to choose a career we wanted.

Seeing my classmates at our reunions, proves to me how strong, resilient and successful we are. Some have left us but will be remembered until our big reunion with God.

Local SUP paddler Tim Oliver recently returned from the Netherlands, where he competed in the 11 City Tour Sup race in the rural Friesland region of Holland, northwest of Amsterdam. The race took place over 5 days and took the racers along canals, rivers and lake sections. The course passed through a total of 11 beautiful small towns in a giant ,200+ km loop, the same loop skated on by Dutch speed skaters over many years in the past in a famous annual race.

Each competitor was fitted with a tracking and timing device to record their times each day.

Out of a total of about 100 paddlers, Tim finished first overall, and more importantly, first among the top level male and female competitors. LAURIN Group Awarded Construction Contract for New Craigleith Fire Hall

Fire Hall #2 located at 796338 Grey Road 19 in Craigleith was originally built in 1989. The building began to show its age, and the Town's 2022 Fire Master Plan identified that the station was due for replacement. Town Staff identified a parcel of town-owned land south of 796511 Grey Road 19 that would be a suitable location for a new fire hall. This facility would be built to meet the needs of the expanding population and growth in tourism activity in this area. The existing Fire Hall is planned to be retrofitted as a satellite operations centre for the Town's Parks and Trails, and Roads and Drainage Divisions. Staff are also looking to incorporate touch-down workspaces for all Town staff to use in the Craigleith area.

The project budget will be funded by the Community Services Asset Replacement Reserve Fund, Roads Equipment Asset Replacement Reserve Fund, Fire Asset Replacement Reserve Fund and Fire Development Charges.

The LAURIN Group has been awarded the construction contract for the new Craigleith Fire Hall. The LAURIN Group specializes in institutional, commercial, industrial and multi-family residential projects, and has provided construction services throughout Ontario for companies including GO Transit, Hydro One and Canada Post. Contractors from LAURIN have arrived on site and begun preparation work.

The Town's new Fire Hall, has been designed to meet the Town's Net Zero Emission objectives through the use of low-carbon components and finishes.

Sustainability features of the new building include:

- Prioritization of construction materials that have lower levels of embodied carbon and higher levels of insulation performance
- Fully electrified HVAC systems to reduce reliance on fossil fuels
- Renewable energy generation through the installation of solar panels
- Water conservation and efficiency through fixtures and stormwater capture

The facility will also feature administration and crew quarters including offices, meeting room, training area, dormitory spaces and amenities, an apparatus bay with space for up to six fire trucks, as well as support spaces for firefighter gear and hose reels and an outdoor training area.

"We're extremely excited to see this project move forward," says Town of The Blue Mountains Fire Chief Stephen Conn. "This new facility will be constructed to the latest standards, ensuring that our firefighters are prepared with everything they need to service the local community for years to come."



Ontario Protecting the Great Lakes

Ontario is providing approximately \$7.3 million to local organizations across the province for projects that will help strengthen the health and resiliency of the Great Lakes and their connecting waters, which together make up an unparalleled natural resource that supports communities, tourism and agriculture. This



includes \$25,000.00 to support projects in Simcoe-Grey

"The Great Lakes hold 20 per cent of the world's fresh surface water — providing vital water resources to our communities and driving tourism and economic growth across the province," said Todd McCarthy, Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks. "Our government is proud to support organizations whose hard work and innovation will help preserve the Great Lakes for generations to come."

Local Great Lakes initiatives are funded by two provincial programs, the Great Lakes Program and the Great Lakes Local Action Fund. The project selected for funding in Simcoe-Grey is the Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority for the Lake Huron Student Conference Model Project.

This event brings together 100 high school students and their teachers for hands-on learning and stewardship activities. Tree Trust has provided expert, life-extending care for 12 of the Town's legacy trees so far. Other Tree Trust accomplishments include:

- Planted 100+ Trees along the Georgian trail at Christie Beach Road and Camperdown Road
- Planted over 100 trees at TBM Parks
- Planted hundreds of saplings along the G. Trail
- Launched and maintained a Local, Native Tree Nursery, which has been expanded in 2025

The 5th Year Anniversary Celebration was held to acknowledge and thank the volunteers, donors, local organizations, Town staff and members of Council who have made these accomplishments possible. This collaborative community effort is helping us grow and care for our all-important tree canopy.

The Celebration featured comments by Mayor Andrea Matrasovs, dressed in a period outfit reflective of 1875, the year when it is estimated that the legacy tree at 10th Line was a sapling. The Mayor reminded the crowd of the impressive span of history represented by this heritage tree.

John White presented a special plaque on behalf of the Government of Ontario recognizing the community efforts led by Tree Trust. Attendees also had an opportunity to visit and meet with experts at several Insight stations, including:

- Pruning Basics hosted by Garden Holistics
- All about Pollination hosted by Pollinate TBM
- 1875 in our Town hosted by The Blue Mountains Library
- The Native Tree Seed Collection Club hosted by Tree Trust TBM
- Tree Care Tips hosted by Arboreal Tree Care

As the Celebration came to an end a tree was planted – one of several "understory" trees that will contribute to an emerging small forest ecosystem centred around Tree Trust TBM's "first tree".

Ontario Building Critical Infrastructure

Brian Saunderson, Member of Provincial Parliament for Simcoe-Grey announced that the Ontario government is investing \$12,890,561 to help renew and rehabilitate critical infrastructure in the riding. The funding will be delivered through the 2026 Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund (OCIF) as part of the government's more than \$200 billion capital plan to protect Ontario by building key public infrastructure that will strengthen the economy and keep workers on the job in the face of tariffs and economic uncertainty.

The OCIF provides funding for local infrastructure projects in municipalities with populations under 100,000, rural and northern municipalities, as well as for Local Services Boards that own water or wastewater systems.

The 2026 OCIF allocations for Simcoe-Grey are as follows:

Township of Adjala-Tosorontio: \$537,274

Clearview Township: \$577,306 Town of Collingwood: \$1,052,428

Essa Township: \$630,539

Town of New Tecumseth: \$2,650,503 Town of The Blue Mountains: \$2,128,245 Town of Wasaga Beach: \$1,162,981 County of Simcoe: \$4,151,285

The size of grants is determined by:

- estimated Current Replacement Values (CRVs) for core infrastructure owned by municipalities, including roads, bridges, water and wastewater
- the municipality's economic conditions

The grant is designed to be responsive to local needs and economic conditions. In order to ensure that municipalities with greater requirements to replace core infrastructure and more challenging economic conditions receive proportionally larger grants, the amount of funding per \$100,000 of total core infrastructure is calculated using an "infrastructure index".

Municipalities with a higher infrastructure index will receive a proportionally larger grant per \$100,000 of core infrastructure.

"The Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund is a vital program that helps municipalities across Simcoe-Grey invest in the essential infrastructure our communities rely on every day," said MPP Brian Saunderson. "This funding supports Ontario's small and rural municipalities in making critical upgrades to roads, bridges, water and wastewater systems, ensuring they can meet the needs of residents today and in the years ahead."

In 2026, Ontario will allocate \$400 million in OCIF funding to help 423 small, rural and northern communities address critical infrastructure such as roads, bridges, water and wastewater systems. The minimum grant amount for municipalities will increase to \$125,000 from \$100,000. Funding allocations are based on a formula that accounts for the different needs and economic conditions of each community. Communities may accumulate funding for up to five years to address larger infrastructure projects.

"Small, rural and northern communities are essential to the growth and prosperity of Ontario," said Kinga Surma, Minister of Infrastructure. "That is why we're increasing the Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund's minimum grant amount to provide predictability and stability for these communities and ensure they have the resources they need to thrive. With our record investments across all infrastructure programs, we're driving an unprecedented wave of construction—highways, transit, hospitals, schools, and more—to make communities stronger, keep workers on the job, and drive economic growth for generations to come."

- Since 2018, the government provided \$2.8 billion through OCIF to support small, rural and northern municipalities.
- Additionally, the province is investing \$4 billion in the Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program (MHIP) for core infrastructure projects in growing and developing communities. This investment will help unlock even more homes in addition to the approximately 800,000 that have been unlocked with the previously announced pipeline of projects.




