Flood Watch – Beaver River, Clarksburg and Lower Valley Road

Due to the extreme cold temperatures over the past week, with cold temperatures expected to continue through the coming weekend, combined with the fact that the Beaver River still has not fully frozen over throughout the system, frazil ice continues to be generated within the upper reaches of the river. Municipalities are challenged with the potential for localized flooding in two separate areas as noted:

CLARKSBURG – TOWN OF THE BLUE MOUNTAINS

Over the last week, frazil ice has collected in the Beaver River within Clarksburg which has caused water levels to rise. While water levels have decreased slightly, they still remain high at this time. With windchill temperatures forecast to remain near or below -18C into the weekend, with only small warmer periods during the day, the potential exists for frazil ice to continue being produced upstream of Clarksburg until the Beaver River freezes over.

At this time, the frazil ice sheet has extended upstream of Marsh Street and there is concern that flows will be further restricted causing water levels to rise over the next few days. This area will continue to be monitored by Town and GSCA Staff. Town of the Blue Mountains crews and contractors are utilizing a long-reach excavator to remove frazil ice from the river to promote flow, despite limited access to the river. The frazil ice removal is expected to continue throughout the daytime hours.

LOWER VALLEY ROAD – MUNICIPALITY OF GREY HIGHLANDS

The frazil ice-related flooding along Lower Valley Road, just south of Graham's Hill/Campbell's Hill roads, has now cleared. Water levels have receded on the Beaver River, and Lower Valley Road has reopened to traffic. GSCA and municipal staff will continue to monitor conditions in the area.

Flood Watches are issued when flooding is possible along local watercourses. Landowners within these areas should monitor their situation and be prepared in case of flooding.

Grey Sauble Conservation Authority reminds everyone that flooding can lead to unsafe conditions along rivers and streams. Fast-moving water, slippery or unstable banks, and melting ice can present significant safety risks. Please stay alert and avoid watercourses when flows are high.

GSCA staff will continue to monitor the weather and the flows and provide additional updates as needed.

Town of The Blue Mountains Hosting Design Open House for Moreau Park Revitalization

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to invite the members of the community to an in-person Design Open House regarding the Moreau Park Revitalization project. Staff from Colliers Project Leaders and SHIFT Landscape Architecture will be in attendance with the preliminary design layouts for the park.

The Design Open House will be held at the **Beaver Valley Community Centre on Thursday, February 19, 2026, from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.** All members of the public are invited to drop in at any time to view the preliminary designs, provide feedback and ask questions about the project. Town staff will also be sharing the preliminary designs online on Thursday, February 12. A comment form will accompany the designs to gather feedback from members of the public who are not able to attend the Open House in person. The feedback received on the designs will be compiled in a report to Council where staff will seek further direction on the final elements to be included in the detailed design.

About the Moreau Park Revitalization

The Thornbury-Clarksburg Rotary Club approached Town Council in September of 2022 with the concept of revitalizing Moreau Park in Thornbury under the theme, "Kindness at Play." The elements proposed by the Rotary Club included a new skate park for all ages and abilities, a year-round paved walking path, a sensory garden and an accessible playground. A public survey was conducted in 2023 to gather feedback from the community on their priorities for the features of the park.

Town of The Blue Mountains Publishes New Snow Plowing Progress Map

The Town of The Blue Mountains is proud to release a new interactive Snow Plowing Progress map on the Town's Open Data Hub. The map has been developed internally by staff and allows the public to see when roads throughout the municipality were last plowed. The data is gathered through GPS systems installed in the Town's snow plows, and is intended to support residents with trip planning during winter months.



The Town is responsible for winter maintenance on Town-owned roads. Certain roads including Highway 26, some boundary roads and some smaller local roads are not maintained by the Town. The status of these third-party plowed roads is not displayed on this map. Seasonal roads also do not receive winter maintenance. The Town works to keep roads and sidewalks safe throughout winter in accordance with the Town's Minimum Maintenance Standards. Weather, traffic and road conditions influence when work happens. While crews aim to clear snow quickly, roads may remain snow-covered for a period of time after significant storms. 2026 Digital Resident Parking Permits and Friends and Family Parking Permits Now Available

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to remind residents that 2026 digital parking permits are now available. Parking permits must be registered annually, and residents are required to re-register their vehicle for the 2026 calendar year. Registration can be completed online through the Town's website or in person at Town Hall during regular business hours. Proof of residency and vehicle ownership is required at the time of registration.

With a valid digital parking permit, residents may park for free at all municipally owned paid parking locations, including beaches, parks and trails. Please note that Town parking permits do not apply to privately owned paid parking lots.

New for 2026, the Town is excited to offer Friends and Family Parking Permits, allowing residents to register visiting guests for temporary digital parking permits. To purchase a Friends and Family Parking Permit, residents must create a household account through the Town's online parking permit portal. A household account enables residents to register multiple household vehicles under a single account and easily manage temporary permits for visiting guests throughout the year.

Each household is permitted up to 14 calendar days annually for Friends and Family Parking Permits, at a rate of \$5 plus HST, per day. At the time of purchase, residents must provide the visitor's licence plate number and the dates the permit will be used. Once registered, guest vehicles may enjoy the same benefits of a resident parking permit and park for free at any Town-owned paid parking location.

Residents who have already registered for a 2026 Resident Parking Permit are not required to re-register until 2027, as their permit remains valid. However, residents who have already registered for a 2026 parking permit and wish to purchase Friends and Family Parking Permits will be required to create a household account through the Town's website.

Municipalities Under Pressure One Year Later:

An Update on the Human and Financial Cost of Ontario's Homelessness Crisis

Grey County Highlights Local Response To Growing Homelessness Challenge

Grey County is highlighting new data from the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) and the Ontario Municipal Social Services Association (OMSSA) on homelessness in Ontario and the local efforts underway to address the challenge.

The full AMO report, Municipalities Under Pressure One Year Later: An Update on the Human and Financial Cost of Ontario's Homelessness Crisis, is available at amo.on.ca

Nearly 85,000 Ontarians experienced homelessness in 2025, up eight per cent from 2024 and 50 per cent since 2021.

In Grey County over the last year, 143 households moved into housing opportunities, 68 returned from housing into homelessness, and 151 individuals were newly identified as homeless, including 30 youth. With this movement, the By-Name List showed 155 active households at the end of 2025, a slight decrease from the previous year. Though rural homelessness across the province grew by more than 30 per cent last year, Grey County has remained relatively stable.

Grey County has been working collaboratively with partners including the Canadian Mental Health Association Grey Bruce, Brightshores Health System, United Way of Bruce Grey, OSHARe, Grey Bruce Public Health, Safe 'N Sound and others to provide coordinated support and housing solutions.

"Our community partners are doing incredible work to support people experiencing homelessness," said Grey County Warden Andrea Matrosovs. "We've made real progress locally, but addressing the root causes will require collaboration between all levels of government."

The Supportive Outreach Services (SOS) program in Grey County has provided over 12,000 services to community members who are unhoused or insecurely housed since launching in 2021. SOS was recently featured at the national State of Canada's Cities Summit in Ottawa as a model for collaborative community care.

Grey County also directly operates short-term emergency housing, which has supported over 375 households and helped 176 households transition to permanent housing in the past year. However, demand for affordable housing continues to grow. The County's affordable housing waitlist has grown from 2,230 in 2024 to 2,545 in 2025 - a 12 per cent increase compared to four per cent the previous year.

Without significant intervention, AMO projects that homelessness in Ontario could double by 2035. The association is recommending long-term investments in affordable housing, mental health and addictions services, and income supports, along with better coordination between all levels of government to maximize impact.
