



## Flood Watch – Beaver River, Clarksburg

Due to the extreme cold temperatures over the past week, with cold temperatures expected to continue through the coming weekend, combined with the fact that the Beaver River still has not fully frozen over throughout the system, frazil ice continues to be generated within the upper reaches of the river.



**CLARKSBURG** – Update: Tuesday, February 3 at 9:30 a.m. - Water levels in the Beaver River through Clarksburg have stabilized, and the Flood Watch issued by the Grey Sauble Conservation Authority has expired. Residents are advised to remain aware of changing conditions as water levels remain higher than normal. An excavator will be held on standby and can be called upon on short notice if required to continuing clearing the river.



## Craigleith Main Lift Station, Mill Street Sewage Pumping Station and Bay Street East Reconstruction Project - \$53.56 million

The Town is responsible for providing municipal sanitary sewer services (wastewater) and water services to connected properties. Revenue for these projects come from users.

The 2021 Town Budget included funding for a capital project intended to make upgrades to the Craigleith Main Sewage Lift Station.

### May 3, 2022 - Approval to bundle project engineering

Staff Report CSOPS.22.041. The report asked that Town Council approve the cancellation of the "Craigleith Main Sewage Lift Station Upgrades" project that was included in the 2021 Town Budget, and approve the creation of a new project titled "Mill Street Sewage Lift Station and Craigleith Main Sewage Lift Station Upgrades."

The Town's Asset Management Plan indicates that the underground infrastructure on Bay Street in this location is in poor to very poor condition and is approaching the end of its useful life. The existing sanitary sewer and watermain are both made of asbestos cement, and both experience significant leakage issues. The installation of the secondary forcemain will involve road excavation that is likely to result in many more leaks as the ground shifts and settles. Considering that Bay Street from Mill Street to Grey Street will need to be significantly disturbed for the installation of the forcemain, this provides a great opportunity to reconstruct the entire road. This will ensure that the watermain, sewers and stormwater systems are adequate for the next 50-75 years. Addressing leaking watermain and sewers reduces the burden on both the water and wastewater systems, freeing up needed capacity and allowing more connections to current infrastructure.

### April 14, 2023 - Approval to increase project budget

Staff Report CSOPS.23.019. The report requested Council approval to increase the engineering services budget for the Craigleith Sewage Lift Station, Mill Street Sewage Pumping Station and Mill Street Forcemain projects.

### August 15, 2023 - Approval to increase project scope and budget

Staff Report CSOPS.23.044. The report requested Council approval for the following items:

- Addition of engineering for the full reconstruction of Bay Street from Mill Street to Grey Street to a full urban cross section.
- Increase the engineering services budgets for the Craigleith Sewage

## Sanitary Forcemain Failure - Bay and McAuley Street

The Town of The Blue Mountains is advising the public of a sanitary forcemain failure that occurred on Monday, February 2, 2026, resulting in wastewater being released to land at the corner of Bay Street and McAuley Street.

The affected forcemain conveys wastewater from the Mill Street Pumping Station to the Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant. At approximately 6:30 a.m., contractors observed wastewater surfacing near the intersection of Bay Street and McAuley Street. In response, Town staff immediately stopped pumping operations and initiated repair and remediation of the affected area.

The sewage spill has been reported to the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks and the Grey Bruce Public Health Unit. Town staff are continuing to follow direction provided by these agencies. The impacted area has been secured, and staff are actively coordinating response and environmental remediation efforts.

To safely complete repairs and the required clean-up, the intersection of Bay Street and McAuley Street will be fully closed to traffic. Detours and appropriate traffic control measures will be implemented.

Further updates will be provided as more information becomes available.

Lift Station, Mill Street Sewage Pumping Station, Mill Street Forcemain and Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant (TWWTP) Outfall.

- Initiate negotiations with WT Infrastructure to complete the engineering for the full reconstruction of Bay Street from Mill Street to Grey Street, and with IBI Arcadis to complete the engineering for the TWWTP Outfall.

**July 15, 2024 - Direction to proceed with preliminary design of one-way street**

Staff Report CSOPS.24.031.

**October 29, 2024 - Approval to execute HEWSF agreement**

Staff Report CSOPS.24.078 The Town of The Blue Mountains has been successful in receiving \$25,397,523.99 from the Ontario Ministry of Infrastructure for this project.

**February 4, 2025 - Direction to proceed to final design, tender and construction**

Staff Report OPS.25.004. The report sought Council direction to proceed to final design, tender

and construction based on the previously approved road cross sections.

**November 3, 2025 -**

**Construction Notice issued**

The Town has issued the Construction Notice for the Bay Street East Reconstruction Project. Arnott Construction will be on site to begin preliminary work.

**December 15, 2025 - Approval of additional construction budget and implementation of control measures**

Staff Report OPS.25.049. The report requested a construction budget increase of \$19 million to support the remaining untendered work within the Craileith Main Lift Station, Mill Street Sewage Pumping Station and Bay Street East Reconstruction project. Based on early estimates, the original approved budget for the three aspects of the project was \$34.79 million. As the design and scope evolved, the Town's engineering consultant provided a revised estimate of \$53.56 million.

Construction contracts for the expansion of the Craileith Main Lift Station and the reconstruction of Bay Street and Grey Street have already been awarded. The remaining untendered work primarily

includes the expansion and upgrading of the Mill Street Sewage Pumping Station.

**From Staff Report Feb 2, 2026**

Generally, overages pertaining to capital projects are not unusual and in many instances the scale can be difficult to foresee given economic conditions, contractor availability, scope modifications etc. Additionally, major infrastructure such as pumping stations and water/sanitary distribution pipes are critical services that the municipality is required to build, operate and maintain which constrains decision-making when a project is over-budget.

Including this increase earlier in the capital budget would not have changed the tax rate, as the tax rate is driven by the annual operating budget and debt servicing requirements, not by the total value of a capital project in any single year. Capital projects are funded and financed over many years, so a higher project cost affects long-term financial planning rather than the immediate tax levy.

As this work is completed, it may result in the need to pause, defer, or reprioritize other capital projects to ensure the Town remains within sustainable financial limits.

throughout the municipality were last plowed. The data is gathered through GPS systems installed in the Town's snow plows, and is intended to support residents with trip planning during winter months.

The Town is responsible for winter maintenance on Town-owned roads. Certain roads including Highway 26, some boundary roads and some smaller local roads are not maintained by the Town. The status of these third-party plowed roads is not displayed on this map. Seasonal roads also do not receive winter maintenance. He is survived by his son, Shawn Ardiel; his grandchildren Alexandra Ardiel, Payten, Adysen and Brynn Gilder-Ardiel; his sister and brother-in-law, Ruth and Doug McWhirter; his sister, Lorna Menzies; and his nieces and nephews: Terry and Sharon McWhirter, Debra Schaffrath, Tom and Susan Meingast, and Curtis and Todd Davidson. Len was predeceased by his parents, Gordon and Ida Ardiel; his sister and brother-in-law, Margret and Udo Meingast; and his brother-in-law, Chuck Menzies.

Everyone remembers Len as a "Good Guy"—known as a lifetime salesman, an amazing storyteller with a mischievous streak for exaggeration, and someone with a unique talent for remembering everyone's name. He loved golf and curling and was an avid Blue Jays fan. For many years, Len could be seen mowing lawns or snow-blowing driveways around his neighborhood on his beloved John Deere tractor. There are no current plans for a funeral, and a small private memorial will be held at a future date.

Beloved to Gillian, precious Dad to Galen, (Mary) Taliesin (Coire) and Risa (Nic) and adorable Grandad to Liamna, Frank enjoyed a wild 1950s childhood, wandering the ravines, hitchhiking across Canada and seeing Elvis Presley live at the Maple Leaf Gardens in 1957. While attending U of T in the 1960s he founded the magazine Random whose writers included Michael Ignatief and Bob Rae. Working as a writer and playwright in the 1970s, Frank also led the pack as house-husband supreme, twice turning down the offer of Playwright-in-Residence at the National Theatre in Ottawa to care for his growing family while his wife attended medical school.

For his second act, in the mid-1980s, Frank moved into a converted schoolhouse on top of Blue Mountain with Gillian and proceeded to lead a life of joyful discipline around his many interests: writing, meditation, wood carving, memory work, hiking, tai chi, partner dancing, learning piano, wood stacking, and dishes. He did his set of Tai Chi almost every morning for over 40 years, hiked the entirety of the Bruce Trail from Niagara to Tobermory three times in his 70s, and memorized enough poetry to recite a poem a day for an entire year. In his words, he was a man with "extreme discipline for purposeless activities".

As a dad, and companion, we hit the jackpot; loving, steadfast, trusting, hilarious, inspiring. We never had to grasp for his love, he shared it in so many different ways. Tea and chats were gold standard. Intellectually curious, and delightfully eccentric, his company will be forever missed but his memory will never cease to inspire.

## The Supportive Outreach Services (SOS) program is



expanding its ability to care for the community with the addition of a new, highly modified Sprinter van. This mobile clinic is designed to provide a safe, comfortable, and welcoming space where trust can be built, and care can be delivered with dignity.

The SOS van allows outreach teams to offer services in downtown areas, rural locations, and remote encampments. It has been thoughtfully designed to create a warm and private environment that supports mental health counselling, harm reduction education, drug checking, addiction medicine, and primary care.

The van is divided into three separate rooms. There is a private counselling space, a primary care examination room, and a washroom. The van has lighting, secure storage cabinets, and internet access to support communication with partners and health care providers. A solar-powered electrical system allows the van to operate for several hours without external power, helping ensure reliable service in a wide range of locations.

The purchase and conversion of the Sprinter van were funded through a grant from Health Canada.

SOS provides care for individuals experiencing homelessness, mental health challenges, substance use issues, or difficulty accessing traditional health and social services. Operating seven days a week, the team delivers medical care, mental health support, harm reduction services, and help connecting to housing and other supports. By building trust and removing barriers to care, SOS helps prevent emergencies and connects people to ongoing support.

SOS runs regular clinics across the county that are free to access with a mobile team available throughout the week. The program receives support and is fully funded by Health Canada and Ontario Health.

Services include:

- Medical care and mental health counselling
- Harm reduction education and supplies, including naloxone kits
- Drug checking services
- Addiction medicine and primary care
- Basic needs support such as food, clothing, and hygiene products
- Assistance with housing and service navigation
- Case management and follow-up support

The mobile team includes paramedics, a nurse practitioner, mental health counsellors, peer support workers, and social navigators.

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## 2026 Digital Resident Parking Permits & Friends and Family Parking Permits Now Available

Parking permits must be registered annually, and residents are required to re-register their vehicle for the 2026 calendar year. Registration can be completed online through the Town's website or in person at Town Hall during regular business hours. Proof of residency and vehicle ownership is required at the time of registration.

With a valid digital parking permit, residents may park for free at all municipally owned paid parking locations, including beaches, parks and trails. Please note that Town parking permits do not apply to privately owned paid parking lots.

New for 2026, the Town is offering Friends and Family Parking Permits, allowing residents to register visiting guests for temporary digital parking permits. Each household is permitted up to 14 calendar days annually for Friends and Family Parking Permits, at a rate of \$5 plus HST, per day.

To purchase a Friends and Family Parking Permit, residents must create a household account through the Town's online parking permit portal.

A household account enables residents to register multiple household vehicles under a single account and easily manage temporary permits for visiting guests throughout the year.

At the time of purchase, residents must provide the visitor's licence plate number and the dates the permit will be used. Once registered, guest vehicles may enjoy the same benefits of a resident parking permit and park at any Town-owned paid parking location.

However, residents who have already registered for a 2026 parking permit and wish to purchase Friends and Family Parking Permits will be required to create a household account through the Town's website.

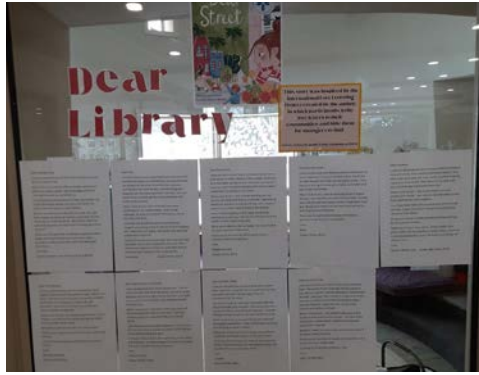

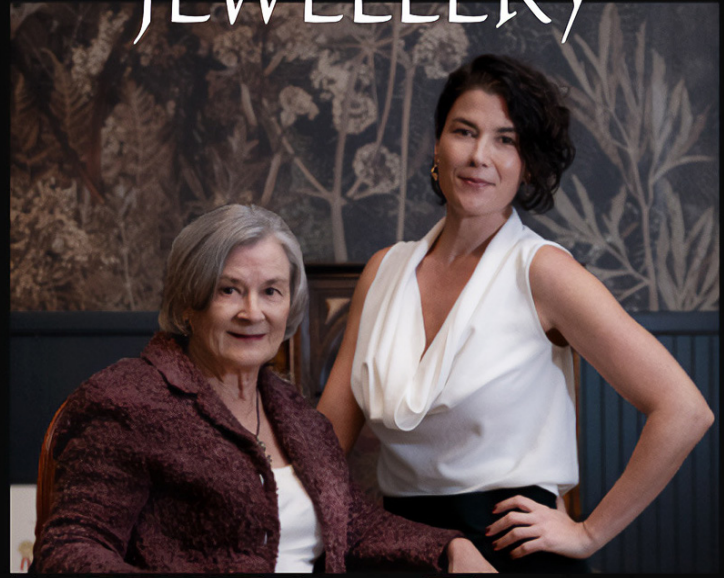

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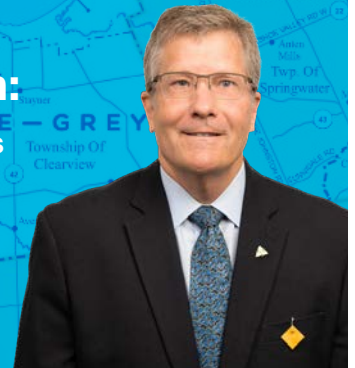

## Support the Protection of the Beaver River Trail!

With a simple zoning change – from unopened road allowance to Open Space, we can protect this section of the Beaver River Trail in perpetuity! There is a public meeting coming up on February 10<sup>th</sup> – please show your support!

**A bit of background.** In the 1800s, surveyors mapped out a visionary plan for our community's roads. Since then, our town has evolved from a bustling lumber and farming hub into a highly desirable four-season destination, surrounded by beautiful countryside and active farms. Where roads have not been built, some undeveloped road allowances remain.

Inevitably, with this growth, we have lost much of our tree canopy and natural areas. Recent public surveys highlight our community's strong commitment to conserving and enhancing these natural assets. And our Town's leaders have reflected these values in numerous policies and plans.

The Beaver River Trail is one of our most valued natural areas. Stretching from the northern terminus at Thornbury Harbour to the southern terminus at the Clendenan Dam Conservation Area, the trail provides a vital connection between Thornbury and Clarksburg.

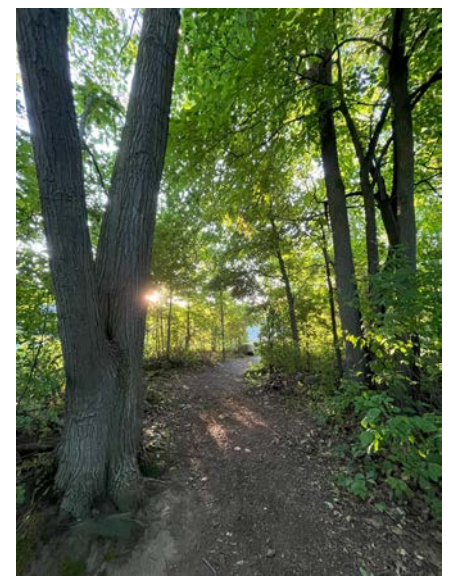
**What does this have to do with road allowances?** An important portion of this trail, located south of Highway 26 at Grey Street (near the sewage lagoons) to Arthur Taylor Lane, runs parallel to the Beaver River along the heavily wooded **Russell Street road allowance**. This beautiful, natural linear trail is home to important woodland and native plant habitats and serves as a crucial stopover and feeding area for over 160 bird species, especially during spring and fall migrations.

Now, at the request of the community-led Beaver River Trail Working Group—supported by nearly 1,000 trail users—the Town is hosting a public meeting to consider the group's request to permanently close this unopened road allowance and two access points at Alice and Arthur Streets. This action would ensure the trail's long-term conservation and continued public use.

Let's Protect What We Have: The Working Group is requesting a simple rezoning: from potential use as a public road to a commitment for public open space. Should development occur in the area, existing access roads are sufficient to support growth.

## Beaver River Trail Designation

Open letter to the Members of Town Council,

I am writing regarding the recommendation to designate the Beaver River Trail, which runs adjacent to my 74-acre agricultural property, as a park.

While I support the continued public use of the trail for walking and cycling, I have concerns about designating this land as a park at this time. It is relatively easy to rezone land as a park, but experience shows it can be very difficult to change such a designation in the future, even when circumstances and community needs evolve.

The adjacent 74 acres is presently zoned agricultural and is subject to the sprays, crops and possible sounds and odours common for intensive farming practices. Given its location, the 74 acres will likely be rezoned in the future for housing and community use as the TBM expands.

These future needs may require a more flexible approach to land use planning than a permanent park designation would allow.

For these reasons, I believe it is best to leave the trail designated as the Beaver River Trail for now, rather than rezoning it as a park, until such time as it can be thoughtfully incorporated into the future land-use flexibility and long-range growth management plans in a coordinated and comprehensive manner.

**Aesthetic:** The sugar maple exhibits exceptional visual qualities, with its expansive canopy, vibrant seasonal foliage, and robust form, making it a striking and iconic feature in the landscape. Its aesthetic appeal enhances the scenic quality of the Georgian Trail, a significant recreational corridor.

**Contextual:** The tree serves as a prominent landmark along the Georgian Trail, a key recreational trail connecting communities and attracting visitors for its natural beauty. Its highly visible location from the public road right-of-way establishes it as a defining element of the local landscape, contributing to the area's sense of place and community identity.

Description of Heritage Attributes: The following attributes embody the cultural heritage value of the sugar maple:

- Its age, approximately 152 years, as determined by measurement, visual assessment and historical photography.
- Its physical form, including its height, trunk diameter, and expansive canopy demonstrate its maturity and health.
- Its vibrant seasonal foliage, showcasing brilliant red, orange, and yellow hues characteristic of the species.

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## Who Else Knows the Plan

Mary recently watched a close friend lose their partner—the one person who knew everything about their financial life. They did have an advisor, but only for investments. When their partner passed, they were left trying to piece together accounts, documents, and contacts they'd never seen before. They didn't know where anything was, who to call, or even what questions to ask. The stress of simply trying to locate assets was overwhelming. Hearing them describe that experience stayed with Mary.

It made her wonder what would happen if something happened to her partner, John—the one who manages every detail in their household.

John has always been a committed DIY investor. He tracks markets, manages their accounts, and keeps their financial world running smoothly. But now in his early 70s, the constant upkeep has started to feel more draining than rewarding. He wants more time for life, not spreadsheets.

When we met, the goal wasn't to replace what John had built—it was to make sure Mary wouldn't be left trying to untangle it alone. Together, we simplified their accounts, organized their tax strategy, clarified their estate plan, and created a roadmap Mary could follow with confidence. For the first time, she felt she could step in if needed without fear or confusion.

John now enjoys the relief of knowing Mary won't be left scrambling. And because I live right here in Thornbury, support is close by—someone they can meet with in person, not a voice in a call centre.

Many people reach this same crossroads—whether they've managed everything themselves for years or they work with an advisor who focuses only on investments. Life gets more complex, the “what if” questions get louder, and gaps that once felt small start to matter, especially when one person knows everything. If you've been thinking about how prepared your household would be, it may be worth taking the time to make sure everything fits together in a clear, workable plan.

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## VALENTINE'S *by Alice Otrysko*

Valentine's Day also called St. Valentine's, is celebrated each year on February 14. It is a celebration which originated as a Christian Feast Day in honour of Valentine who died as a martyr.

Later on through folk traditions it has become a significant, cultural and religious day focusing on love, romance and gift giving throughout the world.

Saint Valentine was a martyr who was imprisoned in Rome under the Roman Empire. He performed miracles including restoring sight to the blind daughter of his jailer.

Tradition holds that Valentine performed weddings for Christian soldiers who were forbidden to marry by the Roman emperor. His signature included “Your Valentine” which has been adopted since then when exchanging notes or cards with your loved one.

The Catholic Church recognized at least three different saints named Valentinus, all of whom were martyred.

One legend contends that Valntine was a priest who served during the 3<sup>rd</sup> century Rome. When the then Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men.

Valentine defied Claudius and continue to marry couples in secret and for that he was executed.

Others contend that Valentine was a bishop and he was beheaded by Claudius for refusing to renounce his faith.

Other legends and stories contend that Valentine might have been killed for attempting to help Christians escape the harsh Roman prisons and tortures. Apparently he had sent a love letter to a young girl who visited him in prison. The letter was signed “From your Valentine”, as usual.

Valentine's Day is celebrated in the middle of February to commemorate the anniversary of Valentine's death which probably occurred around A.D. 270.

Other stories claim the Christian church might have decided to place St. Valentine's feast day in the middle of February in an effort to make Christian the pagan holiday of Lupercalia, a fertility festival celebrated February 15.

During the Middle Ages a common belief across France and England held that February 14 was the beginning of birds' mating season which added to the fact that Valentine's Day should be an occasion for romance.

Cupid is often seen on Valentine cards. The Roman god Cupid was the Greek god of love, Eros. According to Greek legend, Eros was a handsome immortal who played with emotions of gods and men using golden arrows to incite love. It was not until the Hellenistic period that he began to be portrayed as the mischievous, chubby child often seen on Valentine cards.

According to Hallmark, more than 145 million Valentine Day cards are sent each year which is the second largest card sending holiday after Christmas.

Red roses, chocolates and cards are the traditional ways today of expressing your love and admiration for friends. Family and lovers.

As a teacher in Elementary Schools, we always celebrated Valentine's Day and the children were very excited to be exchanging cards. Mothers often brought candy and chocolates to school and the teacher received red or pink roses. Some schools cancelled that celebration claiming that any child who did not receive a card felt left out. Some schools discourage mothers bringing cakes and sweets concerned about the nutrition value of those sweets.

Valentine's Day should be a happy occasion. It brings joy in the winter season which at times seems to be dreary and cold.

I've always thought of Valentine's Day as a happy day and encourage everyone to honour it even with just a smile.

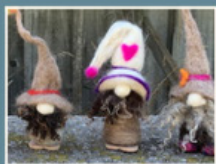

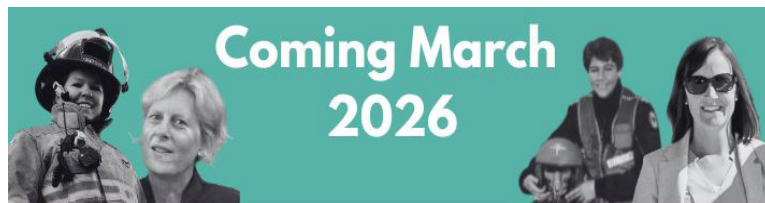
