



Weather Alerts

Our weather alerts are now colour-coded to reflect the level of risk. Every Warning, Advisory, and Watch will include a specific colour when issued.

The alert colours transition from yellow to orange and finally to red as the potential risk increases.

What the colours mean

The same weather can have different impacts, depending on timing, location, and population. That's why each weather alert has a colour, to tell you the level of impact possible in your area, so you can prepare appropriately. Here are examples of the different impacts of yellow, orange, and red wind warnings.

In a Yellow Warning - Wind, you may see:

- some short term utility outages
- larger tree branches broken
- risk of injury from flying or falling debris
- hazardous weather may cause damage, disruption, or health impacts

Impacts are moderate, localized and/or short-term
Yellow alerts are the most common

In an Orange Warning - Wind, you may see:

- widespread utility outages
- some roof damage
- small to medium trees snapped
- increased risk of injury from flying or falling debris
- severe weather is likely to cause significant damage, disruption, or health impacts

Impacts are major, widespread and/or may last a few days
Orange alerts are uncommon

In a Red Warning - Wind, you may see:

- long duration, widespread utility outages
- structural damage to homes and buildings
- significant damage to trees including orchards and parks
- high likelihood of injury due to flying or falling debris
- very dangerous and possibly life-threatening weather will cause extreme damage and disruption

Impacts are extensive, widespread, and prolonged
Red alerts are rare



Town of The Blue Mountains Council Approves 2026-2027 Corporate Strategic Plan

The Town of The Blue Mountains is pleased to announce that the 2026-2027 Corporate Strategic Plan was formally approved by Council on February 9, 2026, marking a significant milestone in Our Path Forward.

The approved Plan renews the Town's strategic direction and reinforces Council's commitment to key priorities over the next two years. The plan establishes the Town's vision, mission and values and is organized around four strategic priority areas: Accountable and Transparent Government, Community for Everyone, Resilient Growth, and Strong and Diverse Economy. Each priority is supported by objectives that will be carried out through departmental work plans and supported through the annual budget process. The Corporate Strategic Plan is intended to serve as the Town's "north star," guiding how decisions are made, how projects are planned and how resources are allocated across departments. It complements and strengthens the Town's existing master plans and strategies, helping ensure that day-to-day work, major initiatives and long-term planning are aligned under a shared corporate framework. As the Town moves forward, decisions, projects and initiatives are expected to clearly advance the goals and objectives established in the plan.

The new Corporate Strategic Plan also realigns the Town's strategic planning cycle with each term of Council. Approved as a two-year plan, implementation will happen throughout 2026 and 2027, with a review planned for 2027 to gain input from the next term of Council. This review will provide an opportunity for each term of Council to confirm priorities and make adjustments as needed, while maintaining consistent, long-term direction for the Town. While specific actions and projects may evolve over time, the plan will continue to guide the Town towards a shared vision aligned with the community's long-term goals.

To support transparency and accountability, the Town's leadership team has committed to regular progress reporting. Quarterly updates will be provided to Council to track implementation, along with an annual highlight report to share progress with the community.

Council's approval of the Corporate Strategic Plan marks the culmination of approximately a year and a half of meaningful collaboration and engagement with staff, Council, residents, community organizations and rights-holders. Work began in mid-2024 with the establishment of a task force to help define the scope and guide the direction of the project. In early 2025, Council approved the project work plan, allowing staff to move forward with the Request for Proposals process and ultimately select StrategyCorp to lead the initiative.

The Our Path Forward project was formally launched in May 2025 and included extensive engagement through a public survey, open house, staff and Council interviews, in-person community events, public information sessions and Council workshops. From early consultation and research to refinement and validation, public input gathered throughout the process played a key role in shaping a community-driven plan that reflects local priorities and a shared vision for the future of The Blue Mountains.

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Waste Collection

Operations staff have provided additional reminders regarding collection:

- Weekly bag limit: the first garbage bag is free, the second bag requires one tag, and the third bag requires two tags. Each tag costs \$5.00.

- All garbage, organics and recycling must be on the curbside by 7:00 a.m. on your collection day.
- The cardboard is to be flattened, cut into 18" x 24" pieces and placed next to your recycle boxes.
- Ensure the Full/Empty tab is tethered to your stationary waste box and fully visible to the collection crew.

February 12 Meeting Highlights Committee of the Whole

Council received a delegation from the Ontario Headwaters Institute (OHI) regarding the need for a county-wide stormwater management plan. OHI is a registered charity that promotes healthy and resilient watersheds.

Council approved a report directing staff to update the Council Compensation By-Law. Council approved minor changes to align the by-law with policy changes since the last review in 2010. The changes do not impact the current process for council salaries (compensated based on a 2023 market review and set at the 50th percentile). Adjustments focused primarily on meeting per diems, reimbursements and allowances, alternates and appointments. Report

Council supported updates to the Fees and Services By-law. This by-law sets rates for county services that require payments such as certain administrative fees, room rentals, paramedic special event services, and much more.

2026 provincial funding amounts for Early Learning and Child Care were received after the passing of the 2026 Grey County budget. Based on the numbers, staff expect a year-end shortfall. Council approved a recommendation to use reserve funding to offset any 2026 funding shortfall. Report

Council discussed the need for reconstruction of a section of Grey Road 17B known as Nicol's Gully. Staff presented council with several reconstruction options which included different designs and associated costs for widening the road and enhancing pedestrian travel and active transportation pathways. Cost estimates ranged from \$837,000 to \$5.9 million. After discussing all the options and required investments, council voted to move forward with reconstructing the road to match the current design at an estimated cost of \$837,000.

Council accepted the minutes of the January 28 Joint Municipal Services Committee meeting. At the meeting the committee received an investigation report on the potential for a regional library system. The committee received the report for information and did not recommend any further exploration at this time. The committee also discussed and supported a shared approach to training and development of municipal staff.

Council received the minutes of the February 5 Urban Road and Road Exchange Task Force. At this meeting the committee recommended a motion to Council to transfer urban sections of Grey County roads to the local municipality in exchange for 10 years of annual funding as an adjustment period. Council discussed the transfers and voted to defer the motion until the March 26 meeting.

County Council is working collaboratively with Bruce County and the province to move forward with appointments to a renewed Board of Health. Council passed a motion to rescind current appointments to the board and to begin an application process based on the new skills-based matrix.

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Update from the Special Advisors regarding work with the Board of Health for the Grey Bruce Health Unit

February 13, 2026 - This week, the Province of Ontario and the Counties of Grey and Bruce took an important step to strengthen public health governance by advancing a renewed Board of Health for the Grey Bruce Public Health Unit.

Together, the Counties and the Province of Ontario are moving into a renewal phase, concluding the terms of the existing Board members and beginning to consider new appointments informed by the jointly developed skills-based matrix.

The skills matrix identifies 16 unique skills that should be represented on the Board. Each partner will propose members who possess one or more of these skills, enabling the Board to provide good governance, strong oversight and effective community relationships.

We join all governance partners in expressing our appreciation to the previous Board members for their service to their communities.

We continue to be encouraged by the strong collaboration and commitment of Grey and Bruce Counties, along with the Province of Ontario, as we work together for the communities of Grey and Bruce.

Bay Street East Reconstruction

February 13, 2026 - Utility pole relocations begin between Elgin and Grey Street.

Installation of the new sanitary sewer will continue between Mill Street and McAuley Street following Family Day. Arnott will also be continuing to stockpile gravel in Bayview Park, and will have lane restrictions in effect around 93 and 95 Bay Street as they install a new check valve.

EPCOR will also begin the process of relocating utility poles between Elgin Street and Grey Street. This will include staging, laying out and drilling the new poles. Barriers will be placed to guard the new pole locations and vehicles will have to yield to oncoming traffic in these areas. The road will be signed for Local Traffic Only.

New Craigleith Fire Hall Construction

The LAURIN Group continues to work through the winter weather on the new Craigleith Fire Hall. The current schedule calls for foundation work to continue until mid February. This includes excavating, placing formwork and pouring foundation walls, piers and footings. LAURIN is also progressing with the installation of the water and sanitary services for the building.

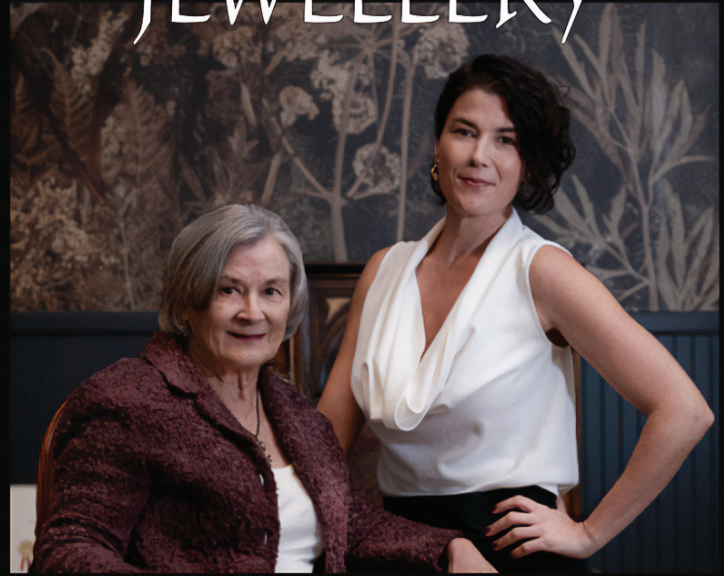

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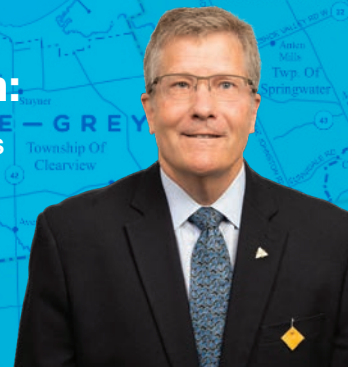

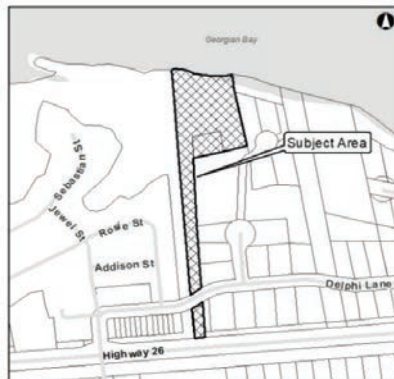
What is being proposed?

This proposal involves rezoning two properties located north and south of Delphi Lane.

The property north of Delphi Lane is currently zoned Development (D) and Hazard (H). It is proposed to be rezoned to Open Space (OS) and Residential One (R1-1-X) Exception Zone to facilitate the construction of a replacement dwelling, as well as an addition to the existing dwelling.

The property south of Delphi Lane is currently zoned Hazard (H) and is proposed to be rezoned to Residential One (R1-1) Zone to allow for the future construction of a dwelling.

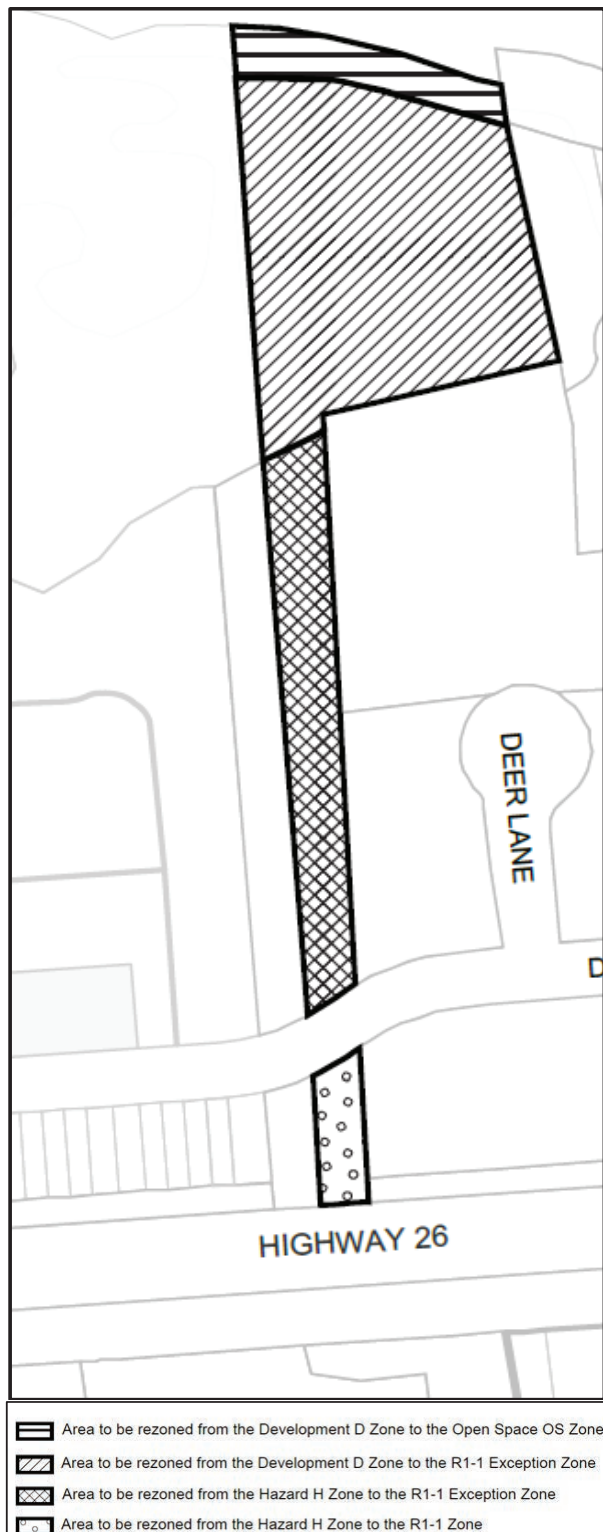
Who Can File an Appeal?

Any of the following may appeal the decision to the OLT: the owner, the applicant, a specified person* or public body*, who before the by-law was passed, made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to The Blue Mountains Council. No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Land Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

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Notice of Intention to Designate A Property under the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. O.18

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Town of The Blue Mountains intends to designate the property municipally known as Roll Number 4242000015008450000, High Bluff Lane, Plan 16M14, Block 27, under Part IV, Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. O.18 as a property of cultural heritage value or interest for the purpose of designating a Heritage Tree located on that property.

Property Description: Located on the southeast corner of the intersection of the 10th Line and High Bluff Lane, north of and adjacent to the Georgian Trail, a 0.42 acre municipally owned property, known as Roll Number 4242000015008450000, High Bluff Lane, Plan 16M14, Block 27, Town of The Blue Mountains. Statement of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest: the property is considered for designation under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. O.18 as amended, as representing a site of cultural heritage and interest within the Town.

A 152-year-old sugar maple (*Acer saccharum*) located on the above-described property possesses significant cultural heritage value under Ontario Regulation 9/06 due to its historical, aesthetic, and contextual significance

Historical: The tree, estimated to be 152 years old, is a rare and enduring example of the natural heritage of the region, predating significant settlement and development in the area. It represents a living link to the pre-settlement landscape and the ecological history of the region, reflecting the prominence of sugar maples in Ontario's early agricultural and maple syrup production traditions.

Aesthetic: The sugar maple exhibits exceptional visual qualities, with its expansive canopy, vibrant seasonal foliage, and robust form, making it a striking and iconic feature in the landscape. Its aesthetic appeal enhances the scenic quality of the Georgian Trail, a significant recreational corridor.

Contextual: The tree serves as a prominent landmark along the Georgian Trail, a key recreational trail connecting communities and attracting visitors for its natural beauty. Its highly visible location from the public road right-of-way establishes it as a defining element of the local landscape, contributing to the area's sense of place and community identity.

Description of Heritage Attributes: The following attributes embody the cultural heritage value of the sugar maple:

- Its age, approximately 152 years, as determined by measurement, visual assessment and historical photography.
- Its physical form, including its height, trunk diameter, and expansive canopy demonstrate its maturity and health.
- Its vibrant seasonal foliage, showcasing brilliant red, orange, and yellow hues characteristic of the species.
- Its specific location adjacent to the Georgian Trail and near the public road right-of-way, ensuring high visibility and accessibility.
- Its ecological role as a native species, supporting local biodiversity and reflecting the region's natural heritage.

Notice of Objection: Any person may object to the proposed designation by serving a Notice of Objection to the Town Clerk within 30 days of the publication of this notice. The notice must set out the reason(s) for the objection and must be served by mail or delivered to:

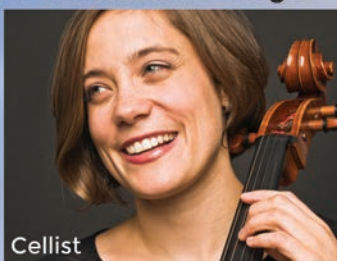

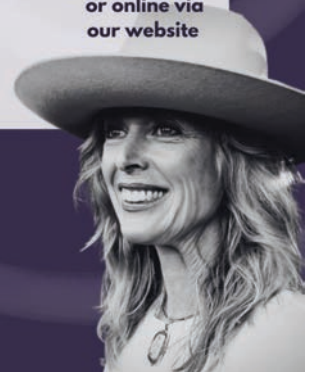
