

Proposed Locations for New Welcome Signs

1. Highway 26 – West Entrance

This location is considered the highest priority along with the Highway 26 – East Entrance as it sits on a provincial highway that receives high traffic. This location is at the intersection of Highway 26 and The Blue Mountains Meaford Townline.



2. Highway 26 – East Entrance

This location receives a high amount of traffic coming from Collingwood on the provincial highway. There are currently provincial signs listing “Welcome to Grey County”, “Town of The Blue Mountains Population 7,500” and “Craigleith”, but no Town signage welcoming the public to the Town of The Blue Mountains. It is proposed that this location would be based in the same location as the Town of The Blue Mountains population sign in accordance with MTO guidelines. This location is on the north side of Highway 26 between Timmons Street and Long Point Road.

3. Grey Road 2 – South Entrance

This sign is located at the southern entrance of The Blue Mountains on Grey Road 2. The current sign is beginning to show signs of deterioration and uses old Town branding.

4. Grey Road 19/Mountain Road – East Entrance

There is currently a “The Blue Mountains, A Proud Part of Grey County” sign at this location. This is a high traffic corridor into The Blue Mountains from Collingwood. While this sign is a priority based on location, there are plans to convert the intersection at Grey Road 19 and Grey Road 21 into a roundabout. It is recommended that the installation of the Gateway sign takes place following the construction to ensure the sign does not have to be moved or reinstalled. The proposed location would be on the north side of Grey Road 19 between Grey Road 21 and Crosswinds Boulevard.



Notice of Community Engagement Session - Thornbury-Clarksburg Union Cemetery Green Burial Area

The Town of The Blue Mountains is holding a Community Engagement Session to introduce a project which will see the creation of a Green Burial Area at the Thornbury-Clarksburg Union Cemetery, as identified through The Town’s Cemetery Master Plan. Council approved the Cemetery Master Plan in November 2023. Council gave direction at the time to prioritize the Green Burial Area in the workplan.

This project will include a concept design update and detailed design to support implementation of the new cemetery section aligned with the Arc Concept identified in the Cemetery Master Plan. Development of the Green Burial Area is proposed to include gathering spaces, sustainable planting buffers and communal memorial features.

All those interested in the project are invited to attend the Community Engagement Session. The event will include a presentation and Q&A session. The meetings will be recorded and posted to the project page for anyone unable to attend in person.

Ontario Supporting 2025 Ice Storm Recovery in The Blue Mountains

Funding will help recover emergency response and clean up costs

Today, Brian Saunderson, Member of Provincial Parliament for the riding of Simcoe-Grey announced that to protect Ontario and keep communities safe, the government is providing up to \$48,000 for ice storm assistance in the The Blue Mountains. The funding is part of Ontario’s \$90 million Municipal Ice Storm Assistance program, and will help cover clean-up and emergency response costs due to a severe winter weather event on March 28, 2025.

“Communities across the region were significantly impacted by the ice storm in March 2025,” said Brian Saunderson, MPP for Simcoe-Grey. “This important provincial funding will help address the substantial costs associated with the storm response and the extensive clean-up that followed. I want to thank municipal staff, along with hydro crews, first responders, and volunteers, whose dedication helped The Blue Mountains through a very challenging time.”

The March 28, 2025 storm resulted in widespread damage, leaving

nearly 400,000 homes and businesses without power across central and eastern Ontario. In parts of the Town of the Blue Mountains, the storm caused extensive tree damage, downed hydro lines and prolonged power outages.

“Our government will always protect Ontario, especially in times of need,” said Rob Flack, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. “The relief being announced today will safeguard local jobs and help the Town of the Blue Mountains rebuild – stronger than ever.”

In June 2025, the Ontario government launched the Municipal Ice Storm Assistance program and Business Ice Storm Assistance program to help communities impacted by the storm.

“We are grateful to the Province of Ontario for this support through the Municipal Ice Storm Assistance Program. This funding will help offset the costs our community faced in responding to and recovering from the 2025 ice storm. On behalf of Council, our residents and our businesses, I want to thank MPP Saunderson and the Province for their commitment to supporting communities like The Blue Mountains in times of need, and I want to thank all of our staff and first responders who went above and beyond in responding to this storm last March.”

Grey Sauble Conservation Responds to Province's Proposed Consolidation of Conservation Authorities

On March 10, 2026, the Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks announced that it intends to consolidate Ontario's 36 conservation authorities into 9 regional conservation authorities. Under this proposal, Grey Sauble Conservation Authority (GSCA) would be merged with Saugeen Valley, Maitland Valley, Ausable Bayfield, Nottawasaga Valley, and Lake Simcoe Region conservation authorities to form the Lake Huron Regional Conservation Authority, extending from Lake Simcoe to approximately Port Franks.

The Province has stated that the proposed consolidation is intended to address concerns related to consistency, administrative duplication, outdated data systems, and limited transparency across conservation authorities. GSCA maintains that these concerns are being overstated and relate primarily to elements of the planning and development review process and do not reflect the full range of services delivered by conservation authorities, including watershed management, natural hazard mitigation, source water protection, land stewardship, and community programs.

"The Minister has stated that they're listening to the concerns that were raised through the ERO process", said Tim Lanthier, CAO of Grey Sauble Conservation Authority. "If this is true, we're not convinced that the proposed changes address these concerns. Our previous concerns about the loss of the local rural voice, rural priorities and rural representation remain largely unaddressed, as do concerns regarding transition timelines. A cursory review of the submissions available on the ERO website suggest that the majority of comments were opposed to the proposed consolidation, suggesting that the Province use other tools instead."

Under the proposal, governance would remain municipal using a representation by population model but shift from lower tier municipal representation to upper tier and single tier representation. For GSCA and Saugeen Valley Conservation Authority combined, this would mean representation through Grey County and Bruce County, moving from 26 elected officials representing the individual lower tier municipalities to likely one representative from each County. This also means that the high growth areas around Lake Simcoe would carry the bulk of the representation. The Province has also proposed the creation of Local Watershed Councils, although details regarding their role and authority have not yet been provided.

"Local knowledge and accountability are essential to effective watershed management," said Scott Greig, Chair of the Grey Sauble Conservation Authority Board of Directors. "As this proposal moves forward, it will be important to ensure that local voices continue to play a meaningful role in protecting our watersheds and communities."

The Province's plan would reduce Ontario's conservation authorities from 36 to 9 by early 2027. A transition steering committee consisting of conservation authority CAOs and one board member from each authority, led by a new Project Executive, would oversee the process, supported by the newly created Ontario Provincial Conservation Agency and \$3 million in annual provincial funding. Conservation authority funding from the Province was cut by approximately \$3.5 million in 2019.

Throughout the proposed transition period, GSCA will continue to deliver its programs and services without interruption and will work constructively with the Province, Conservation Ontario, partner conservation authorities, and municipal partners as more information becomes available. Provincial amendments to the Conservation Authorities Act are expected to be introduced in the coming weeks, and GSCA will keep municipalities and the public informed as the process develops.

Grey County Committee of the Whole Meeting, March 12

Council discussed a notice of motion from Councillor McQueen about **municipal insurance**. Council directed staff to prepare a report exploring potential cost savings and efficiencies of shared and joint RFP processes. A report will be prepared for a future Joint Municipal Services Committee meeting.

Dillon Consulting presented an update on the **Regional Transit Study** and public engagement efforts. Grey, Bruce, Dufferin and Wellington counties, together with SMART Transit, are undertaking this study to determine the feasibility of a regional transit network. More than 3,700 survey responses were received during phase one of engagement and work is ongoing to analyze data and identify transit solutions for the councils to consider. The presentation highlighted conceptual inter-community corridors and on-demand service considerations, transit priorities, governance models and measures for success. A second round of public engagement will begin later this month and another report will be presented to Council in the spring.

Council awarded the tender for the construction of the **transportation "Patrol D" depot** in Ceylon for a cost of \$7.5 million to Domm Construction Ltd. The depot will be the hub for operations in southeastern Grey County which is currently being served out of a rented facility in Flesherton. The project came in above budget and council asked staff to discuss potential cost saving measures with the contractor prior to construction.

Council received the annual **paramedic services response** time report. Paramedics met or exceeded all response time targets, except for CTAS-1 and CTAS-2 categories which fell short by less than 2% of the targets. Response time targets are set by urgency of the call, with sudden cardiac arrest calls being most urgent and requiring the shortest response time. The report also showed a 9% increase in calls compared to 2024. New bases are planned for Feversham (2026) Ayton (2027), Thornbury (2027) and Cobble Beach (2028) to enhance response times as call volumes grow.

Build Canada Homes (BCH) is a new federal agency that will help build and finance affordable housing at scale. Staff presented an information report with details on the program, types of investment, eligibility and how proposals will be assessed. Staff also proposed Grey County be the lead organization in organizing and applying for funding for multiple projects in collaboration with local community housing partners.

Staff provided a summary of the minutes of the March 6 **Agricultural Advisory Committee** meeting. The committee heard a delegation from the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Agribusiness, discussed the impacts of renewable energy on farmland, and received a report on the forest management by-law and nuisance beaver and coyote by-law updates.

Grey County Reports 2025 Paramedic Response Times

Grey County paramedics continued to meet or exceed response targets for the majority of calls in 2025. The annual response time report was presented to Grey County Council on March 12 and showed consistent results compared to 2024 numbers, despite a nearly 9% increase in total calls. Targets were met in all but two response categories.

Each year, Grey County sets target times for responding to emergency calls. These targets vary based on the severity of the call. Targets are reviewed every year and are reported to the Ministry of Health each spring. There are six categories of calls. Sudden cardiac arrest (SCA) calls are most urgent and have a response target of six minutes or less. The remaining five levels are based on the Canadian Triage and Acuity Scale (CTAS). This scale assesses the patient's immediate need from care. These range from CTAS 1 calls, which require resuscitation and are life threatening, such as cardiac arrests or major trauma, to CTAS 5 calls, which are less urgent conditions that could be referred to other areas of the healthcare system, such as a small wound requiring stitches or a dressing change. The target for a CTAS 1 call is eight minutes sixty percent of the time, 15 minutes for a CTAS 2 call 90 percent of the time, and up to 20 minutes for CTAS 3-5 90 percent of the time.

In 2025, Grey County exceeded targets for SCA calls and CTAS 3-5. CTAS 1 targets were achieved in 58.65% of calls (target 60%) and CTAS 2 targets were achieved in 88.78% of calls (target 90%).

Grey County paramedics cover an area of 4,500 square kilometres. The location of a call and the nearest paramedic station or available ambulance impact response times. A comprehensive review was completed in 2023 providing projections for where call volumes are expected to rise and where more resources should be deployed. This review will be updated in 2026 to confirm it still reflects the needs of the County. In the coming years, Grey County plans to construct four additional bases in Feversham (2026), Ayton (2027), Thornbury (2027) and Cobble Beach (2028).



Following the concert, the night will continue with a lively after-party performance by Easy Tiger, delivering a groove-driven set of danceable favourites to close out the celebration.






What is being proposed?

What is being proposed?

The Town of The Blue Mountains has initiated a review to update and replace its existing Parkland Dedication By-law 2003-31.

The Town's current Parkland Dedication By-law was approved in 2003. Since then, legislative changes have been made to the Planning Act, and this update is needed to ensure the Town's By-law reflects these changes.

The proposed By-law will incorporate new provincial requirements and provide clearer direction on how parkland dedication is calculated for different types of development and land uses. Additional updates include proposed exemptions for certain development types, such as on-farm diversified uses, reduced requirements for affordable housing, and a simplified flat-rate approach for residential severances.

The proposed Parkland Dedication By-law applies to all lands within the Town of The Blue Mountains. A key map has not been included in this notice as the proposed amendment applies to the entire municipality.

What is being proposed?

A new Backyard Hens By-law is proposed to allow and regulate the keeping of chicken (hens and pullets), excluding roosters, on residentially zoned properties (R1, R2, R3) in the Town's urban settlement areas, as well as residentially zoned properties in the rural area and hamlets where agricultural uses are currently not permitted. The proposed Backyard Hens By-law does not in any way change or affect the keeping of chickens in zones where agricultural uses are already permitted, including Agriculture (A), Special Agriculture (SA), and Rural (RU) zones.

Many communities have adopted by-laws that permit owners to keep a limited number of backyard hens on residential properties. The proposed Backyard Hens By-law is a response to public interest in doing so as part of a movement toward sustainable living, greater self-sufficiency, and healthy eating.

The Backyard Hens By-law would allow the keeping of hens with rules to mitigate potential risks such as noise, smell, or the potential spread of avian-borne illnesses while ensuring animal wellbeing, and would apply Administrative Monetary Penalties (AMPs) for non-compliance.


