## Notice of Intention to Designate A Property under the Ontario Heritage Act, *staff report*

**Property Description:** Located on the southeast corner of the intersection of the 10th Line and High Bluff Lane, north of and adjacent to the Georgian Trail, a 0.42 acre municipally owned property

**Statement of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest:** the property is considered for designation under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. O.18 as amended, as representing a site of cultural heritage and interest within the Town. A 152-year-old sugar maple (*Acer saccharum*) located on the above-described property possesses significant cultural heritage value under Ontario Regulation 9/06 due to its historical, aesthetic, and contextual significance

**Historical:** The tree, estimated to be 152 years old, is a rare and enduring example of the natural heritage of the region, predating significant settlement and development in the area. It represents a living link to the pre-settlement landscape and the ecological history of the region, reflecting the prominence of sugar maples in Ontario's early agricultural and maple syrup production traditions.

**Aesthetic:** The sugar maple exhibits exceptional visual qualities, with its expansive canopy, vibrant seasonal foliage, and robust form, making it a striking and iconic feature in the landscape. Its aesthetic appeal enhances the scenic quality of the Georgian Trail, a significant recreational corridor.

**Contextual:** The tree serves as a prominent landmark along the Georgian Trail, a key recreational trail connecting communities and attracting visitors for its natural beauty. Its highly visible location from the public road right-of-way establishes it as a defining element of the local landscape, contributing to the area's sense of place and community identity.

**Description of Heritage Attributes:** The following attributes embody the cultural heritage value of the sugar maple:

- Its age, approximately 152 years, as determined by measurement, visual assessment and historical photography.
- Its physical form, including its height, trunk diameter, and expansive canopy demonstrate its maturity and health.
- Its vibrant seasonal foliage, showcasing brilliant red, orange, and yellow hues characteristic of the species.
- Its specific location adjacent to the Georgian Trail and near the public road right-of-way, ensuring high visibility and accessibility.
- Its ecological role as a native species, supporting local biodiversity and reflecting the region's natural heritage.



## Staff Report ADM.26.029, entitled "peopleCare Long-Term Care Agreement"

The purpose of this staff report is to recommend the execution of an agreement of purchase of sale (APS) between the Town and peopleCare community that would involve approximately 3 acres of land located on the northerly section of the Town-owned lands currently being developed for a new Fire Hall. The intent in acquiring these lands is to construct a 3-storey, 192 bed long-term care facility on the lands. Importantly, this agreement is conditional upon the Town facilitating necessary planning and development approvals with the exact boundaries to be confirmed following these approvals being in place.

While peopleCare will be responsible for the studies related to the necessary planning applications, the Town will serve to bring these applications forward in an effort to prioritize their review and in recognition of the community benefit associated with the LTC facility. Based on the proposed use, a Zoning By-law Amendment will be required and if approved, site plan approval would be the next step prior to the issuance of building permits.

At a minimum, there will be a public meeting scheduled regarding the necessary planning applications for the LTC facility. This will offer the opportunity for members of the public to ask questions on the approvals being sought and provide comment with the expectation that all questions will receive a response in a follow-up recommendation staff report. Consideration will also be extended to additional opportunities to engage the public as the site is designed given at the time of zoning, projects are generally conceptual.

Previous planning and development approvals in the area have effectively mapped and identified areas of natural significance and protection. Upon execution of the APS, further analysis will occur with regards to environmental impacts associated with the LTC and recommended mitigation measures.

Based on the current concept, the subject lands are close to 3 acres in size meaning that at \$400,000 per acre, the Town is projected to accrue \$1.2 million in revenue from the land sale that is intended on being dedicated to support affordable/attainable housing projects through the Town's Community Improvement Plan program. In 2025, the entirety of the 9.24-acre parcel was assessed at \$650,000 per acre as vacant and unimproved. However, given the majority of land is now encumbered with the construction of a new fire hall limiting proposed uses, the current price is deemed to represent fair value particularly given the public benefit associated with a long-term care facility.

## 2026 Curbside Yard Waste Collection

The Town collects leaf and yard waste at the curbside during the spring and fall seasons each year. Outside of these dates, leaf and yard waste may be dropped off at the Town's Landfill and Recycling Depot anytime during regular operating hours (subject to fees).

**Spring Collection** ; April 20-May 28

**Fall Collection** ; October 12-November 19

### Leaf and Yard Waste Collection Guidelines

Yard Waste is collected on your regular curbside collection day and must be curbside no earlier than 7:00 p.m. the day prior, and no later than 7:00 a.m. on collection day (subject to fines)

Yard Waste collected curbside is limited to 10 compostable bags or containers weekly.

Oversized yard waste is not collected curbside but can be delivered to the Landfill and Recycling Depot (subject to applicable fees)

## The 2025 Blue Mountains Fire Department Annual Report

Highlights include:

- An increase of 19% emergency calls for service, and a total fire loss of \$1,166,500 between nine (9) fire events.
- Chief Fire Prevention Officer position was realigned to Division Chief to reflect day-today responsibilities. The Town welcomed Division Chief Allan Schriver in Q2 of 2025.
- Grant funding application from the province for cancer prevention saw the purchase and installation of a bunker gear extractor and dryer at Fire Hall 1 Thornbury.
- Fire prevention staff continue to work with building owners to ensure fire prevention compliance is achieved with inspection orders. Prevention staff also seeing success with our alarm for life program by visiting residential homes. By scheduling a visit to audit smoke and carbon monoxide alarms ensuring compliance with fire code while ensuring our residents are safe.
- Paid Per Call firefighters PPC's recruitment for 2025 was successful with six (6) firefighters to help bolster the number at both fire hall locations. Seven (7) firefighters resigned from the department for work relocation or personal reasons.
- The replacement aerial apparatus was delivered in Q2 equipped and in service by Q3.
- Training continues to meet the legislated certification requirements for 2026.
- The Emergency Management program requirements for 2025 has submitted compliance documents through Emergency Management Ontario, as required by the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act. The annual exercise with Blue Mountain Resort Blue Mountain Village Assoc. OPP and Grey County EMS saw Town Staff work together to mitigate the exercise with lessons learned.
- The Town has seen significant weather events, ice storms in March and heavy rainfall causing localized flooding in June.



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# MAT Evaluation Results and Funding Recommendations

The Municipal Accommodation Tax (MAT) funds are limited to what is collected each year. (a mandatory 4% fee applied to short-term stays (under 30 days) at hotels, motels, and short-term rentals in many Ontario municipalities. It funds local tourism and infrastructure, added to the room rate before HST) are limited to what is collected each year.

Total collection for 2025 was \$2.9 Million, with the Town's share being just over \$1.4 Million. Through report, \$1,250,367, \$770,000 was allocated from the Town's share to support the following Town-initiated and led projects:

- Destination Strategy Implementation (\$150,000)
- Transit Service (\$175,000)
- Comprehensive Parking Strategy (\$50,000)
- Gateway Sign Project (\$210,000)
- Parks and Open Space Master Plan & Leisure Activity Plan Update (\$125,000)
- Economic Development Action Plan (\$60,000)

After subtracting these projects from the \$1.4 Million, approximately \$630,000 remains available to support the external MAT applications presented in this report. The following six projects recommended for funding as part of this report total \$482,650. Approximately \$147,350 would remain available for use by Council.

- Application 1: Destination Marketing Organization - Tourism Branding: \$25,000
- Application 2: Thornbury Business Improvement Area - Downtown Beautification, Infrastructure and Placemaking: \$100,000
- Application 3: Blue Mountain Village Association – Winter Lights: \$169,300
- Application 4: Clarksburg Village Association – Public Washrooms and Beautification: \$140,000
- Application 5: Blue Mountains Chamber of Commerce – Refill and Recharge Project: \$40,000
- Application 6: TBM Tree Tail – Town of The Blue Mountains Tree Trail: \$8,350

Evaluations were conducted by the Senior Management Team through consensus scoring on Wednesday, March 25, 2026. The applications received reflected a wide range of meaningful community priorities and demonstrated the strong interest of local organizations in advancing initiatives that benefit the Town and community as a whole. While not all submissions aligned closely with the specific requirements of the Municipal Accommodation Tax framework, several may be well-positioned for consideration through other funding sources, partnership opportunities or broader strategic initiatives that are better suited to their objectives and intended outcomes.

The Town's Use of MAT Funds is also governed by the "Town Use of Municipal Accommodation Tax" Corporate Policy (POL.24.07), which establishes funding principles to guide the use of the Municipal Portion of funds collected through the Town of The Blue Mountains Municipal Accommodation Tax program.

Notwithstanding the above and the outcome of the evaluation results presented through this report, it's important to highlight that pursuant to Ontario Regulation 435/17: TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATION TAX, Council reserves the right to use the Town's Portion of Municipal Accommodation Tax funds at its sole discretion. In plain language, this means that Council has the authority to use the Town's share of MAT funds in any manner that they collectively deem appropriate and as directed by certified resolution.



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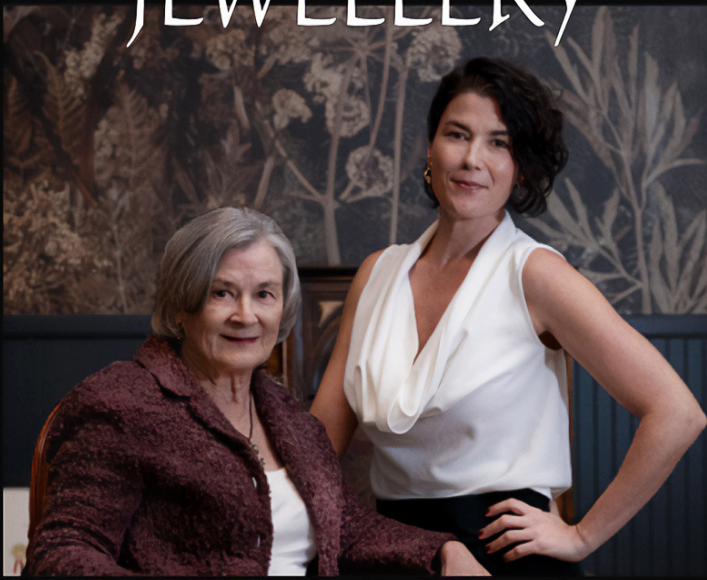
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Aerial Image Of The Rockwood Terrace Construction Site In March, 2026

## Rockwood Terrace Redevelopment Passes Halfway Mark

Grey County's Rockwood Terrace redevelopment project has passed the 50 per cent completion mark, bringing expanded long-term care services closer to reality in southern Grey. The new home will replace the existing Rockwood Terrace in Durham with a purpose-built, 128-bed home, an expansion from the current 100 beds.

Designed from the ground up with resident experience in mind, the new home reflects Grey County's resident-centred focus and Colour It Your Way philosophy, creating comfortable, welcoming, and home-like spaces for residents.

Once complete, Rockwood Terrace will provide 24-hour nursing care, regular and on-call physician support, assistance with personal care and bathing, nutritious meals, housekeeping services, and a wide range of recreation and social programming to support healthy living.

Construction of the new building began in the summer of 2024. Work continues to progress steadily under challenging conditions, including two winters with exceptional snowfall. The project remains on budget and on schedule to open in the spring of 2027.

"This milestone is significant. Not just because of the scale of this project, but because of what it means for the future of publicly run long-term care in southern Grey County," said Grey County Warden Andrea Matrosovs. "Reaching the halfway point brings us closer to opening a modern, resident-focused home that will serve our communities for decades. This investment demonstrates Grey County's strong commitment to long-term care services that support dignity, comfort, and quality of life."

To mark the 50 per cent milestone, Grey County has released a project update video featuring on-site footage and insights from the project team. The video is available on the project webpage, which also includes news, background information, and regular updates. The webpage also features a live construction camera view, refreshed every 15 minutes. In preparation for the move into the new home next spring, Grey County is developing an operational readiness plan to ensure a smooth transition moving current residents and welcoming 28 new members to the Rockwood Terrace community. The plan will also help Grey County prepare for occupancy inspections before the move, new staff recruitment, and other factors.

Grey County operates three long-term care homes. Lee Manor is a 150-bed home in Owen Sound, Grey Gables is a 66-bed home in Markdale, and the current Rockwood Terrace is a 100-bed home in Durham. Grey County's long-term care homes are accredited with exemplary standing through Accreditation Canada, reflecting a high standard of quality and safety.



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# WOWC Urges Province to Protect Local Governance in Bill 100

The Western Ontario Wardens' Caucus (WOWC) is advocating for a collaborative approach to municipal governance reform as the Province considers Bill 100, the Better Regional Governance Act, 2026. WOWC is raising concerns about proposed changes such as provincially appointed Wardens and expanded executive powers, noting they represent a significant shift away from locally determined governance.

"Municipal governments work best when they remain local, accountable, and responsive to the communities they serve," said WOWC Chair Marcus Ryan. "Counties are already delivering on housing, infrastructure, and economic growth. Governance changes must build on that success—not undermine it."

While the legislation directly impacts only one WOWC member, the Caucus noted it signals a broader provincial direction that could affect Counties across Western Ontario. WOWC emphasized that counties operate differently than regions and cities, relying on collaborative, two-tier systems that reflect rural realities and ensure balanced representation.

"Local leadership matters—especially in rural and County systems where collaboration across municipalities is critical," added Ryan. "A one-size-fits-all approach does not reflect how Counties operate or the realities of our communities."

The Caucus is advocating for the Province to ensure any future reforms:

- Maintain locally elected leadership
- Recognize differences between municipal structures
- Reflect rural and regional realities
- Be developed in partnership with municipalities

WOWC remains committed to working with the Province to advance shared priorities and support strong, effective municipal governance across Western Ontario.

*Bill 100 proposes changes to regional governance structures. Bill 100 proposes to permit the Minister, by Order, to appoint a head of council following the regular 2026 election and every subsequent election for the following upper-tier municipalities: Regional Municipality of Durham, Regional Municipality of Halton, District Municipality of Muskoka, Regional Municipality of Niagara, Regional Municipality of Peel, County of Simcoe, Regional Municipality of Waterloo, and Regional Municipality of York (the "Noted Municipalities"). Bill 100 also proposes to permit the Minister to remove a head of council appointed by the Minister or by the council and, appoint a new head of council.*

*Bill 100 also proposes to permit the Minister to make regulations which would prescribe powers and duties of an appointed head of council. No such regulations have yet been introduced. However, commentary provided by the Province in its release of Bill 100 notes that the appointed heads of council are to receive "strong chairs" powers which mirror the "strong mayors" powers which were initially introduced in 2022 through Bill 3, the Strong Mayors, Building Homes Act, 2022.*

*Bill 100, if passed, would permit the Minister to make regulations governing the votes of the members of an upper-tier municipality, including the allowance of "weighted" voting where a member may receive more than one vote. This provision appears to apply to all upper-tier municipalities, and not just the Noted Municipalities.*

*In addition, for example Bill 100 would change the composition of the County of Simcoe council to an appointed head of council and 16 other members, consisting of the head of council of each lower-tier municipality in the County of Simcoe. (from 32)*

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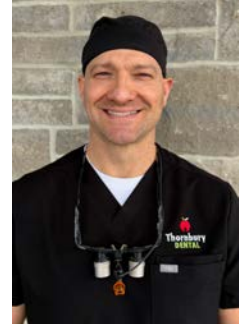
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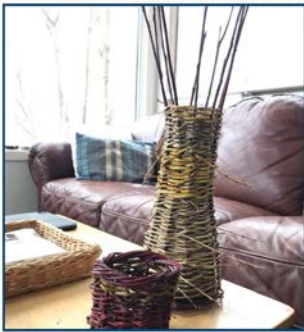

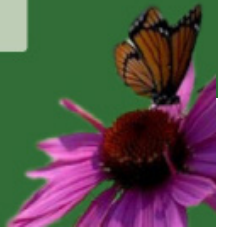
