Marni Moreau Enters Mayoral Race Focused on Unity

Marni Moreau officially announced her candidacy for Mayor of the Town of The Blue Mountains today, launching a campaign built on unity and integrity.

After growing up in Clarksburg, Moreau gained 25 years of business leadership experience in Toronto. Since moving back over 10 years ago to the Town of The Blue Mountains, she has a strong record of local involvement. Marni is the daughter of former councillor Peter Moreau, who helped lead major community initiatives including the Beaver Valley Community Centre, L.E. Shore Library and Moreau Park. 2026 Digital Resident Parking Permits and Friends and Family Parking Permits Now Available

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to remind residents that 2026 digital parking permits are now available. Parking permits must be registered annually, and residents are required to re-register their vehicle for the 2026 calendar year. Registration can be completed online through the Town's website or in person at Town Hall during regular business hours. Proof of residency and vehicle ownership is required at the time of registration.

With a valid digital parking permit, residents may park for free at all municipally owned paid parking locations, including beaches, parks and trails. Please note that Town parking permits do not apply to privately owned paid parking lots.

New for 2026, the Town is excited to offer Friends and Family Parking Permits, allowing residents to register visiting guests for temporary digital parking permits. To purchase a Friends and Family Parking Permit, residents must create a household account through the Town's online parking permit portal. A household account enables residents to register multiple household vehicles under a single account and easily manage temporary permits for visiting guests throughout the year.

Each household is permitted up to 14 calendar days annually for Friends and Family Parking Permits, at a rate of \$5 plus HST, per day. At the time of purchase, residents must provide the visitor's licence plate number and the dates the permit will be used. Once registered, guest vehicles may enjoy the same benefits of a resident parking permit and park for free at any Town-owned paid parking location.

Residents who have already registered for a 2026 Resident Parking Permit are not required to re-register until 2027, as their permit remains valid. However, residents who have already registered for a 2026 parking permit and wish to purchase Friends and Family Parking Permits will be required to create a household account through the Town's website.

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In Memoriam



FLORENCE 'BERNA' SCHULTZ
Saturday, May 2, 2026

Feisty and stubborn to the end, Berna watched the Blue Jays win, then closed her beautiful brown eyes for the last time. At 92, Mum was steadfast in her desire to leave her cozy wee house – feet first. And so, she did.

Where to begin summarizing a life that had so many extra innings. Born in Peace River, Alberta and named after a character in a Robert Service novel, Berna and the Ward family eventually headed east where they settled in a pretty white farmhouse across from what is now, Georgian Peaks Ski Club. On a recent drive, Mum recalled herding cattle across Highway 26 as a little girl. Her words for the thoughtless housing development that plowed down her family home, should not be repeated here – but let's just say, the woman could drop an F-bomb. The fact that the black sheep of the Ward clan outlived them all, is just f-ing marvelous.

Growing up in a strict Baptist household clipped Berna's wings, so off she flew to Toronto where she worked in a bank and eventually met, Paul Schultz. Together with Paul Martin and Cindy in tow, they thrived in Toronto, Chicago, and New York – where Mum fully embraced her role as a full-time housewife. As children, arriving home from school to a living room filled with duplicate bridge players and blue cigarette smoke was the norm. Mum loved bridge and the friendships that came with the game. From the gourmet cooking club to playing

the piano, sewing, knitting, making warm Rice Krispie treats sprinkled with the ash from her Kent cigarette (rimmed with Revlon's Apple Polish lipstick) and whipping up whiskey sours for Paul Sr.'s arrival on the train from Manhattan – Mum's world revolved around her husband and her family. Until it didn't. When Dad went his way – Mum went hers, coming full circle to a chalet at Georgian Peaks. This is where things got weird and Berna truly blossomed.

Outliving her ex-husband by several decades gave Berna immense karmic pleasure – yet by his leaving, he did her an immense favour. Refusing alimony or child support, Berna pulled up her leather pants and got to work – totally reinventing herself – kicking domesticity to the curb while opening a wildly successful, high-end clothing store in Thornbury. At Berna's, women who normally couldn't splurge on stylish new clothes were welcome to shop and pay off their bills over time. Berna had a ledger filled with names, dates, and payments – and no one ever let her down. Berna's IODE luncheon fashion shows were legendary, with a cast of characters dancing around like the lunatics she loved. Berna founded the Olde Fashioned Christmas in Thornbury and was active in the BIA – drumming up community spirit and mischief – however and whenever possible.

After Berna's, Mum moved to Toronto to work for Delta Hotels, before taking off to Whistler to work and play alongside her pal, Shirley. After a stint in Whistler, she headed to Nova Scotia and settled into proud Nanny mode, helping Cindy juggle Jack and work. Never one to sit still, Mum then moved to Tobermory, living on a renovated fishing boat, complete with leopard print cushions. A heart attack and a wildly stressful ambulance ride convinced Mum that living closer to a hospital was probably a good idea. Berry Street in Meaford became her new happy place, and despite COPD, heart issues, coal black lungs, and two simultaneously installed new

hips, Berna volunteered at the hospital for over ten years, finally giving up her "wee job" (and boyfriends) in her 80s.

It takes a village to raise a headstrong senior, and Mum's little Berry Street home was a beehive of caring neighbours, friends, family, caregivers she believed were "annoying friends of Cindy's", and a jolly yard guy who also brought her smokes. We kept a plumber on speed dial, and Doug Boyd can relax now knowing Mum's real and imaginary broken pipes are just fine. Everything is just fine.

Mum always told us not to be sad when she died because her life was long and happy. We imagine the former "Miss Beaver Valley" flaunting her cleavage while dancing up in heaven – because this woman loved flirting, music, and dancing – especially to old Jazz tunes, Engelbert Humperdink, and Tom Jones. Berna is now happily reunited with her dog, Lulu and her "cronies", Heavy Evvie, Sandy, Shirley, and her forever partner in crime, Lynn Belden. Buckle up, there's a new angel in town.

We'll wrap this up by thanking the support crew who helped keep Mum vibrant, and at home. We can't say enough about Tammy and all the girls from Right at Home who graciously made Mum's life clean and comfortable while dodging her often snarky refusal to accept help. Thank you, Bruce, Mike, and Dave – neighbours who pitched in and kept an eye out – and to Aphrodite, who treated Mum like precious family and kept Mum's tummy filled with delicious, home-cooked meals. Thank you to Skot for flirting with Mum while doing her hair. Simone, Darrin, Jimmy, Chrissie and Mark, Barb, Janny, Doris, Dave Whalen, Jan. The gang at Ted's, Thornbury Pharmasave. And, a special thank you to Leonard – whose love, laughter, handyman skills, and kindness filled the space left empty by Lynn. Mum's gratitude list is as long as her lovely life, and if we've left anyone out, "Get over it!" as she'd say.

After a long winter, Berna was looking forward to getting back out on her sunny porch, Cindy's Mother's Day visit, Grand Slam

tennis season, finally getting Jack's Jeep out of storage, her roses, and Paul Martin's faithfully routine visits. Mum didn't want any fuss when her party was over, and she'll be planted between her parents in Clarksburg, just across the cemetery from Stephen Keast, with whom she shared so many laughs. Of course, we will gather to raise a glass of her favourite, sickeningly sweet wine, but just not right now.

While not totally unexpected, Berna's last cup of tea leaves a hole in the hearts of many, but especially Paul, Cindy, Jack, Jack's gal, Michelle, Jimmy, and Cindy's dog, Tony – who took delight in humping Mum's arm.

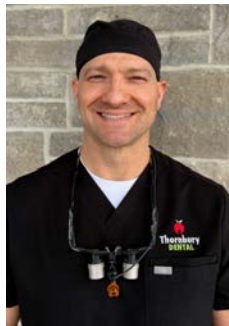
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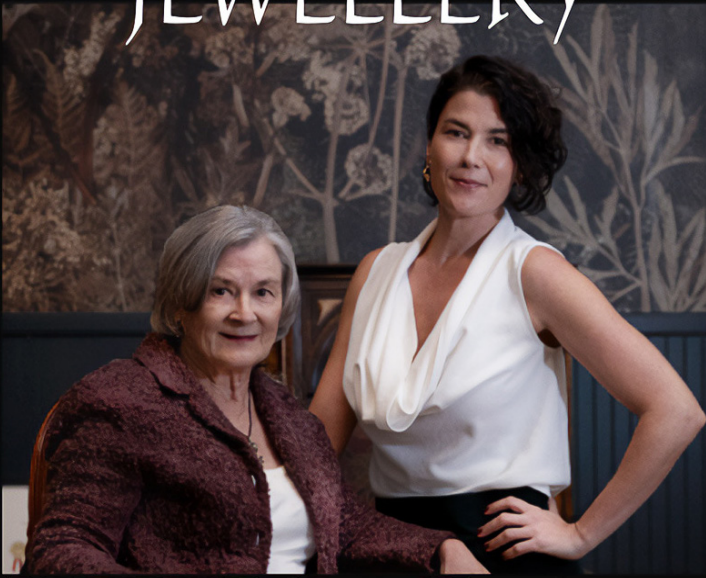
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Ontario Doubling Funding to Help Smaller Communities Build Safe and Reliable Transit

\$30-million investment through 2026 provincial budget will expand transit services, connecting more people to jobs and supporting economic growth.

The Ontario government is doubling its support for the Ontario Transit Investment Fund (OTIF) through the 2026 provincial budget, increasing it from \$5 million to \$10 million annually over the next three years. The \$30 million investment will help rural and underserved communities build safe and reliable transit services, protecting Ontario's economy and connecting more people to jobs and opportunity across the province.

"Our government is making historic investments to expand public transit and improve access to essential services like health care for people in rural and underserved communities," said Prabmeet Sarkaria, Minister of Transportation. "This investment will ensure that Ontarians, no matter where they live, have access to reliable transportation options for years to come."

The OTIF supports the start-up and expansion of transit projects like new bus services, on-demand rideshare services and door-to-door transportation. The program is helping municipalities, Indigenous communities and non-profit organizations deliver reliable transportation services across the province, particularly in rural communities.

"Our plan to protect Ontario includes the most ambitious provincial capital plan in Canadian history to make Ontario the most competitive, resilient and self-reliant economy in the G7," said Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance. "Doubling the Ontario Transit Investment Fund will help pave the way for long-term economic growth in rural and underserved communities, connecting more people to jobs and housing."

Eligible applicants can apply on an ongoing basis for time-limited funding of up to five years to support transit projects that address transportation gaps in unserved or underserved communities across Ontario.

Quick Facts

- When OTIF launched in 2024, it included up to \$5 million in annual funding. The province has now increased funding up to \$10 million annually over the next three years.
- Municipalities, Indigenous communities and non-profit organizations can apply for OTIF funding online. Applicants are encouraged to form project teams to deliver coordinated, integrated and sustainable transit services for their communities.
- Ontario also provides funding to municipalities for transit and municipal roads through the Gas Tax program and the Connecting Links program.
- The Indigenous Transportation Initiatives Fund (ITIF) provides funding for community-driven transportation related projects for Indigenous peoples in urban, rural and reserve settings across Ontario.
- The 2026 Budget furthers the Ontario government's plan to attract jobs and investment, lower costs for workers and businesses, keep life affordable for families and individuals and make targeted investments in key public services that support the province's long-term prosperity.

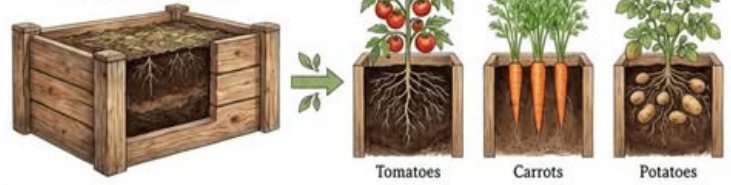

Town Recognizes Emergency Preparedness Week May 4–8, 2026

The Blue Mountains Fire Department is recognizing Emergency Preparedness Week, taking place May 4 to 8, 2026, and reminding residents of the importance of being prepared for emergencies. This year's theme, Prepared Together, encourages people to be better prepared to protect themselves and their households as the seasons change. Taking a few simple steps today can significantly reduce risks tomorrow.

How Residents can be #PreparedTogether for the changing seasons:

1. Have a 72-hour kit ready for you and your family, including pets.
2. Adjust seasonal items in your kit, such as rain gear and dry bags for the spring, and extra water and sunscreen for the summer.
3. Stay informed by downloading the WeatherCAN app or monitoring weather.ga.ca for up-to-date alerts.
4. Plan for power outages by considering essential needs, such as refrigerated medication or medical equipment, and ensuring backup options are in place.
5. Test household smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms. In Ontario, smoke and CO alarms are required by law on every level of your home and near each sleeping area.
6. Throughout Emergency Preparedness Week, members of the public are invited to visit Town Hall, where an Emergency Preparedness display will be set up in the atrium. The display will feature a sample 72-hour emergency kit along with resources and information to help residents better understand how to prepare their households.

Province Introducing Legislation to Protect and Strengthen Ontario's Agri-Food Sector

On April 22nd, the Ontario government introduced the Protecting Ontario's Food Independence Act, 2026. The proposed changes, if passed, will deliver on the government's plan to protect Ontario by strengthening domestic food production and further protecting farmers and the quality of Ontario's food system. Alongside these changes, the province is also taking next steps to update its Grow Ontario Strategy to build a more competitive, resilient and self-reliant agri-food sector in the face of U.S. tariffs and economic uncertainty.

"Our agriculture sector is a cornerstone of Ontario's economy, employing more than 10 per cent of the province's workforce and helping put food on tables at home and around the world," said Trevor Jones, Minister of Agriculture, Food and Agribusiness. "In a time of global uncertainty, it's vital we give our farmers and businesses the tools they need to succeed. With these changes, we are continuing to build a more productive and self-reliant agriculture and food sector."

The ministry is currently reviewing its Grow Ontario Strategy focused on strengthening resilience and encouraging a buy-local approach. The government is engaging with farmers, agri-food businesses and other industry partners to help position the sector for long-term self-reliance and prosperity, supported by today's proposed legislative changes.

These updates will build on the success of the Grow Ontario Strategy launched in 2022, which has already helped achieve a 13 per cent average annual increase in exports, a 15 per cent rise in employment and a 20 per cent increase in farm sales, reinforcing Ontario's position as the largest food processor in Canada and a leading agri-food jurisdiction in North America.

If passed, the Protecting Ontario's Food Independence Act, 2026 and related measures would enable the following:

- Protect local ownership of provincial agriculture by creating restrictions on foreign acquisition of Ontario farmland. This policy is intended to prioritize Ontario farmers' access to Ontario farmland and limit access for harmful foreign interests, while allowing for reasonable exceptions that will be developed following consultations with impacted stakeholders. Similar policies are in place in Alberta, Manitoba, Quebec, Saskatchewan and Prince Edward Island.
- Expand agricultural production in northern Ontario by making it easier for

- Ontario farmers to lease or access arable land on the Clay Belt.
- Continue the work on modernizing the practice of veterinary medicine in Ontario.
- Implement a number of measures to modernize, streamline, and improve regulations for the agri-food sector and reduce red tape for industry partners.

- The agri-food sector employs one-in-nine Ontarians and generated \$52 billion in GDP in 2024.
- Ontario is the largest food processor in Canada and a top-four jurisdiction in North America.
- The 10-year Grow Ontario Strategy was launched in 2022 to strengthen the agri-food sector, support long-term economic growth, and ensure an efficient, reliable and responsive food supply for Ontarians.

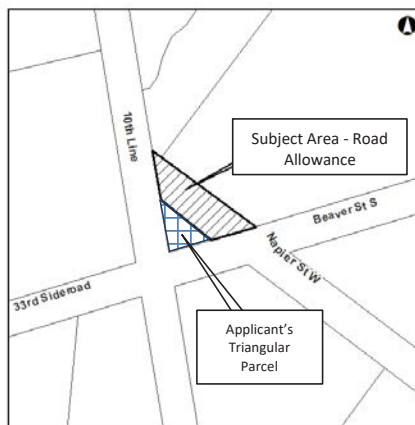

Statement of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest: the property is considered for designation under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. O.18 as amended, as representing a site of cultural heritage and interest within the Town. A 152-year-old sugar maple (*Acer saccharum*) located on the above-described property possesses significant cultural heritage value under Ontario Regulation 9/06 due to its historical, aesthetic, and contextual significance

Historical: The tree, estimated to be 152 years old, is a rare and enduring example of the natural heritage of the region, predating significant settlement and development in the area. It represents a living link to the pre-settlement landscape and the ecological history of the region, reflecting the prominence of sugar maples in Ontario's early agricultural and maple syrup production traditions.

Aesthetic: The sugar maple exhibits exceptional visual qualities, with its expansive canopy, vibrant seasonal foliage, and robust form, making it a striking and iconic feature in the landscape. Its aesthetic appeal enhances the scenic quality of the Georgian Trail, a significant recreational corridor.

Contextual: The tree serves as a prominent landmark along the Georgian Trail, a key recreational trail connecting communities and attracting visitors for its natural beauty. Its highly visible location from the public road right-of-way establishes it as a defining element of the local landscape, contributing to the area's sense of place and community identity.

Description of Heritage Attributes: The following attributes embody the cultural heritage value of the sugar maple:

- Its age, approximately 152 years, as determined by measurement, visual assessment and historical photography.
- Its physical form, including its height, trunk diameter, and expansive canopy demonstrate its maturity and health.
- Its vibrant seasonal foliage, showcasing brilliant red, orange, and yellow hues characteristic of the species.
- Its specific location adjacent to the Georgian Trail and near the public road right-of-way, ensuring high visibility and accessibility.
- Its ecological role as a native species, supporting local biodiversity and reflecting the region's natural heritage.
