Hope Haven Therapeutic Riding Centre, a non-profit dedicated to providing life-changing, equine assisted services for individuals with disabilities, is launching its next major community milestone: **The "Hay Now!" Campaign.**

The initiative is a high-energy community challenge to completely stock the barn pantry for the year ahead. The goal is a true collective effort: combining individual, bite-sized contributions to secure 3,500 bales worth of hay before the community gathers at the farm for a celebratory Housewarming Picnic on July 25.

### **The Power of the Harvest & Uncompromising Horse Welfare**

In the agricultural world, summer is the critical window to "make hay while the sun shines." By purchasing a full year of hay directly from local farmers right now during the peak harvest season, Hope Haven locks in the highest quality nutrition at the best possible pricing.

For Hope Haven, this isn't just smart budgeting, it is an extension of their fierce commitment to horse welfare.

"Our horses are full partners in growth, transformation, and learning," says Robyn Allen, Executive Director of Hope Haven. "We are hyper-vigilant about their welfare because the life-changing work we do depends entirely on their well-being. Before a child builds self-esteem in the saddle, or an athlete trains for their Special Olympics competition, a horse has to be meticulously cared for and nourished. We are inviting our community to join forces and help us lock in that best-in-class care during the summer harvest."

### **One Bale at a Time: The Community Collective**

To make the campaign simple and tangible, Hope Haven has broken down an operational necessity into a micro-donation model where every single person can play a part. While Hope Haven routinely secures this critical seasonal harvest of hay, grain, and supplements to ensure uninterrupted care, the community is invited to collectively underwrite this asset, turning a necessary operational cost into a shared victory.

The Ask: \$10 = 1 Bale of Hay

The Goal: 3,500 bales collectively funded before mid-summer.

The Tagline: Fueling the horses who fuel transformation.

A Summer Celebration: July 25 Housewarming Picnic

The "Hay Now!" campaign will culminate on Saturday, July 25, when Hope Haven throws open its gates for a Community Housewarming Picnic on its 142 scenic acres next to the Beaver Valley.

The public event will celebrate Hope Haven's permanent forever home, secured earlier this year through a historic \$3.9 million donation from The Gill Family Charitable Trust, and honor the community collective that stepped up to fill the pantry.

"When someone buys a bale for \$10, they aren't just buying hay," adds Allen. "They are fueling the next breakthrough, the next smile, and the next moment of deep transformation on this farm. It gives our entire network the chance to look at our thriving herd and say, 'We fuel this together.'"

## **June 11 Meeting Highlights Grey County Committee of the Whole**

Council discussed a notice of motion by Councillor Greig about future needs of emergency services in northern Grey County and financially responsible delivery of service. The motion was to direct staff to have conversations with Georgian Bluffs, Meaford and Owen Sound, noting that the Owen Sound Fire Department and Inter Township Fire Department both have rehabilitation needs, and Grey County Paramedic Services consider response times in deployment reviews. Council did not support the motion at this time, with some members expressing it being too soon to begin discussions but encouraging the conversations to happen naturally.

Council received an update from the Nuclear Innovation Institute. President and CEO Jessica Linthorne shared highlights from the past year, including the Innovation Day, Clean Energy Frontier conference, and Built to Lead youth trades outreach.

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Council received a review of the Going Green in Grey Climate Action Plan. Going Green in Grey represents a twenty-eight-year strategic approach to climate and environmental issues. Council voted and directed staff to include the full implementation costs of the plan for Council's consideration during 2027 budget discussions. These costs would include expanding the team of one levy-funded position to two, plus an additional contract role. Focus will be placed on corporate actions and measuring the impact of climate investments.

Council received an update on public engagement around the nuisance beaver and coyote and wolf by-laws. Council voted to make updates to the by-laws and increase compensation rates to align with neighbouring Bruce County. Draft by-laws will be brought forward to a future meeting.

Staff presented an update on the status of the hybrid planning services model being explored between Grey County and member municipalities. Currently planning services are offered at both the upper tier and lower tier level. The project is exploring if efficiencies could be found through a centralized or hybrid-service model. The staff report highlights how a hybrid model could function and be financed fairly without creating additional burden for municipalities that do not participate. Grey County will send a letter to all member municipalities asking for a decision about participating in a hybrid-planning model. A future report will be prepared to share the findings.

Council received the minutes of the May 27 Planning and Economic Development Advisory Committee meeting. The meeting included an economic development tourism and culture strategic progress report and verbal updates about YIMBY (Yes in my backyard) week and ongoing plans and strategies.

Council discussed the Canada-Ontario Development Charges Reduction program. The program offers potential funding to municipalities that reduce and maintain reductions to their development charges (taxes charged to new construction to offset the growth-related capital costs on municipal services). The intention of the program is to encourage the development of more housing in Ontario. Council debated the potential financial risks of reducing development charges if as much or more funding is not received back through the program. Council voted to direct staff to move forward with applying to the program. The program was announced on June 1 and detailed applications are due on June 19.

## Grey Bruce Public Health Reminding People To Enjoy Wildlife From A Distance

Although some wild animals may seem cute and friendly, Grey Bruce Public Health is reminding residents and visitors that the safest way to enjoy wildlife is from a distance.

"Touching, feeding, petting, picking up, or caring for a wild animal can pose health risks," says GBPH Program Manager Gillian Jordan.

"Interactions with wild animals can result in painful injuries, which may require emergency medical treatment, and the transmission of diseases, including rabies."

In Ontario, raccoons, foxes, skunks and bats are the most common carriers of rabies.

Rabies is a rare, but serious virus in Canada. Rabies can spread to people through direct contact with the saliva of an infected animal. This can happen when an infected animal bites or scratches someone or when the animal's saliva comes into contact with a person's eyes, nose, mouth, or an open wound.

People can reduce their risk of contracting rabies by:

- Not interacting with wildlife or trapping or relocating wild animals;
- Leaving baby animals undisturbed;
- Teaching children to stay away from wild or stray animals;
- Keeping pets away from wild animals and not allowing them to roam unsupervised; and
- Wildlife-proofing their home and yard.

"While human rabies cases in Ontario are rare, Public Health must assess every bite or scratch from a wild animal that breaks the skin to determine whether rabies treatment is needed," says Jordan. "This includes dog-bite incidents."

As more people spend time outdoors during the summer months, GBPH typically sees an increase in negative human-animal interactions and dog-bite incidents.

The most important thing to do following a dog-bite incident is to exchange contact information.

"This allows Public Health to quickly follow up with those involved and confirm the dog's rabies vaccination status. If the dog's health status cannot be verified, the exposed person may require post-exposure rabies treatment, which involves a series of vaccinations over two weeks," Jordan adds.

To prevent dog bites, GBPH advises the following:

- Always ask a dog's owner if it is OK to approach their pet, even if it's on a leash.
- Do not approach an unfamiliar dog.
- Do not touch a dog that's eating, sleeping, or chewing a toy.
- Be mindful that sick or injured pets may bite out of fear or confusion.
- Steer clear of dogs that are loose or unattended or growling or barking.
- Stay quiet and still if an unknown dog approaches you.
- Recognize dog body language that could indicate a dog may become aggressive.

### Providing long awaited stability

Canada Post and the Canadian Union of Postal Workers (CUPW) have signed new collective agreements, bringing the bargaining process to a close. The new collective agreements for the Urban and RSMC bargaining units remain in place until January 31, 2029.

As part of the ratification process, CUPW-represented employees recently voted to accept the tentative agreements reached by the parties. The results provided by CUPW showed 89.4% of Urban votes and 86.6% of RSMC votes were in favour of the agreements.

The agreements recognize that Canada Post needs to change. Having these new agreements in place is critical as we move ahead with a multi-year transformation to return to financial sustainability, better meet the modern needs of the country, and provide certainty for you and your customers for the next three peak seasons.

### Our transformation continues

Last week we announced that Canada Post is expanding community mailbox conversions to additional communities in 2027. We will be reaching out to 37 communities as we prepare to convert 485,000 addresses to community mailboxes in 2027. You can find a list of the postal codes scheduled for conversion to date on Canada Post's transformation website.

Nearly three quarters of Canadian addresses already receive mail and parcels through some form of secure, centralized delivery such as community mailboxes, apartment lobby boxes and post office boxes.

Converting additional addresses to community mailboxes will increase security by putting nearly all mail and parcels delivered by Canada Post under lock and key. This will help manage growing concerns about package theft, providing additional peace of mind for both businesses and customers.

More than 80% of parcels delivered by Canada Post fit into a community mailbox's individual compartment or a dedicated parcel compartment. Parcels that don't fit or that require a signature are delivered to the door or held for pickup at a nearby post office.

### Doubling down on business services

In the first half of the year, we had several IT outages that interrupted your business operations. 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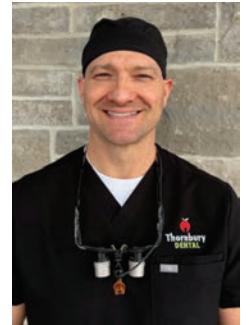
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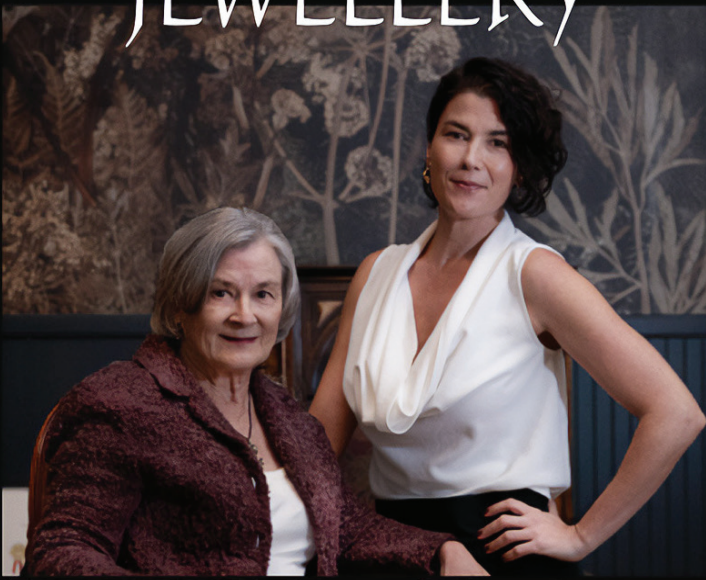
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## Ontario Connecting up to 4,699 More People to Primary Care in Simcoe-Grey

Brian Saunderson, MPP for Simcoe-Grey announced that the Ontario government is taking the next steps to deliver its Primary Care Action Plan, which is on track to connect everyone in the province to a family doctor or primary care provider by 2029.

The Ontario government is investing more than \$1.5 million this year to connect up to 4,699 people to primary care in Simcoe-Grey.

Through the 2026 Budget, the province is increasing overall funding for the plan to a total of \$3.4 billion between 2025 and 2029.

“Through our Primary Care Action Plan, we are connecting more people to care and have already exceeded our 2025-26 attachment target,” said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health.

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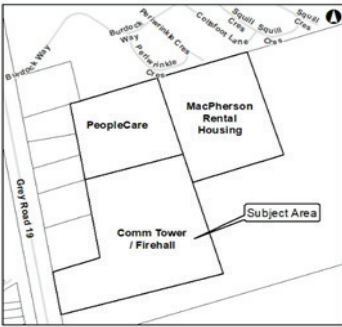

### What is being proposed?

The Town of The Blue Mountains is proposing a new 24.38m (80ft) 2.13m x 2.13m triangular lattice style tower. The tower will be free-standing to provide point-to-point connectivity for two-way base station radio connections for Fire Department communications and will also provide connectivity to the Craigleith Wastewater Treatment Plant, Happy Valley Reservoir, and former Fire Hall #2. Enhanced metering infrastructure related to remote water meter readings is also proposed.

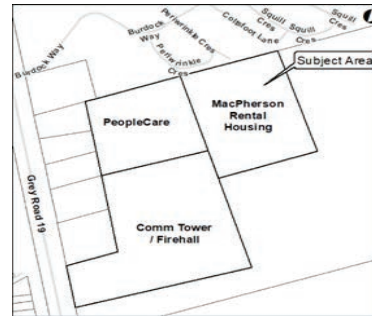
The establishment of new telecommunication facilities is under the exclusive jurisdiction of the Federal Government. Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED) Canada is the approval authority for telecommunication towers and requires all proponents of new facilities to consult local planning authorities to ensure local protocols and surroundings are considered during the mandated site selection process. The Town of The Blue Mountains Protocol for Establishing Telecommunication Facilities requires public consultation for all new telecommunication facilities.

### What is being proposed?

MacPherson Builders (Blue Mountains) Limited has submitted an application for zoning by-law amendment on lands owned by MacPherson and located directly adjacent to Town-owned lands of Fire Hall 2 and the proposed peopleCare LTC project. This application considers a proposal to permit a purpose-built rental housing development consisting of 112 residential rental units.

The purpose and effect of this By-law Amendment is to rezone a portion of the Subject Lands from the Development 'D' Zone to the Residential 'R2-X' Zone, along with site-specific variances to reduce the minimum parking requirement per residential unit from 2.25 and 1.25 parking spaces per unit plus 0.25 visitor spaces per unit to 2.0 and 1.0 parking spaces per unit plus no visitor parking.

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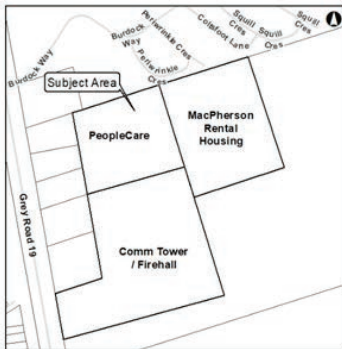

#### What is being proposed?

PeopleCare LTC has submitted an application for zoning by-law amendment for a portion of the Town-owned lands on the east side of Grey Road 19, adjacent to the new fire hall (under construction), to permit the development of a new three-story, 192-bed long-term care home. The proposal includes a building of approximately 10,520 m<sup>2</sup> in size with resident, visitor and staff access from a new public road connection extending from the Home Farm subdivision. The site also includes outdoor amenity spaces, on-site parking, loading, walkways, landscaping, and servicing infrastructure.
