James received the award from Mayor Matrosovs and Council at the June 22 Council Meeting. "James Hindle is a true institution in Clarksburg and beyond, and his dedication to this community over the years has left a lasting impact on residents and visitors alike," said Mayor Andrea Matrosovs. "James is not only a trusted local business owner, but a generous resident who is always ready to lend a helping hand. His kindness, knowledge and commitment to others make him an incredibly deserving recipient of this year's Ontario Senior of the Year Award."

### Celebrating a Legacy: John Bittorf Retires After 40 Years with Grey Sauble Conservation

John began his career with GSCA as a tree planter and later joined GSCA as a Water Resources Technician. Through years of dedication, expertise, and leadership, he progressed to the role of Water Resources Coordinator, helping shape and strengthen the organization along the way.

During his career, John played a pivotal role in rebuilding and expanding GSCA's water monitoring network and flood forecasting system. His work has been instrumental in enhancing the organization's ability to monitor watershed conditions, provide flood forecasting services, and support the municipalities and communities GSCA serves.

John was known for his resourcefulness and ability to develop innovative solutions, often with limited resources. His steady, thoughtful approach helped build the systems, partnerships, and relationships that continue to support GSCA's work today. While never one to seek the spotlight, John generously shared his knowledge with conservation authority staff across the province, partners, community groups, and the public, helping to foster a greater understanding of watershed management and conservation issues. He was also a strong supporter of environmental education initiatives for children across the watershed that inspired countless young people to develop an appreciation for the environment and encouraged the next generation of environmental stewards.

GSCA is naming the Benthic Identification Laboratory, in John's honour.

Established in 1957, the recognition is named in honor of Paul Harris, who founded Rotary in Chicago in 1905. The program was created to show appreciation and encourage substantial financial support for the Foundation's charitable and educational programs, which promote world peace and understanding.

## Seniors Matters Today

**The Cost of Long Term Care** -- Ontario's Ministry of Long-Term Care has advised residents and their families of an adjustment to co-payment rates for long-term care (LTC) homes across Ontario. Co-payment refers to the amount that the resident pays; the rest of the cost for each resident is paid by the provincial government.

Effective July 1, 2026, an inflationary increase of 2.1% will be applied to co-payment rates for both basic and preferred accommodation.

The daily co-payment rate for basic accommodation will increase:

To \$70.00 per day (\$2,129.17 per month)

This reflects an increase of \$1.44 per day.

Residents in semi-private or private accommodation pay a premium in addition to the basic rate. These premiums will also increase by 2.1%, effective July 1, 2026.

Residents who are eligible for reduced co-payment rates must reapply for the 2026-2027 cycle, beginning July 1, 2026, to be considered for this support or to continue receiving it.

It is not too late to renew your **Canadian Dental Care Plan (CDCP)** coverage. It has to be renewed every year. If you did not renew your dental coverage, you will be able to apply for new coverage for the benefit year 2026-27. There will be an interruption in your coverage. If you have never applied, you can apply-27. Both the late renewals and the new applications need to have eligibility confirmed. You can apply through your My Service Canada Account, or through Canada.ca/dentist, by phone at 1-833-537-4342, or at a Service Canada office

The Seniors Network Blue Mountains has confirmed the date for the **Seniors Fair 2026** at the Beaver Valley Community Centre on September 16th. You can expect to be able to meet with about 50 exhibitors, each of them being involved in offering services and opportunities for seniors. Officer Helena Beck from our OPP detachment will be sharing her expert knowledge about Avoiding Scams and Fraud.

**Wondering about your property assessment for tax purposes?** MPAC, the province's Municipal Property Assessment Corporation, reports that the fixed evaluation date for 2026, remains January 1, 2016. Which was the end of the last assessment cycle. Your 2016 Notice reflects the assessed value and classification of your property as of January 1, 2016 and this will be used as the basis for calculating your 2026 property taxes. When there is a change in a property (such as new construction or major renovation), MPAC updates the assessment and mails a Notice. The 2026 assessment is what the property would have sold for on January 1, 2016 – in its current state and condition, including any major changes since then.

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## Wool is the new Mulch!

Many sheep farmers in Grey County who raise sheep for meat end up with a valuable resource that we at CANN (Climate Action Network Now) are just discovering. Once or twice a year, sheep need to be sheared and that wool can go from the sheep's back straight onto your garden. It will suppress weeds and help your garden retain moisture. Nesting birds also love it.

Farmer Grace is shearing her sheep soon so will have wool to sell. It's \$5 per bag. Please bring your own paper grocery bag or kitchen waste bag to fill.

The drive to Grace's farm is through gorgeous rolling hills with breath-taking views. While you're there you can pick up a dozen eggs, frozen chicken, lamb or beef boxes. She even has 500 gr bags of frozen sea buckthorn berries that she harvests which are a real Ontario superfood.

Inside the farm arena Icelandic foods such as Vinetarta, Pönnukökur, Rullúpýlsa, and Hangiköt were available as well as displays of Icelandic fleeces, wool and finished woolen products. To add a certain ambience Lindy Vopnfjörð a musician from the Icelandic community provided the live entertainment.

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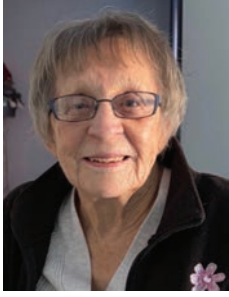

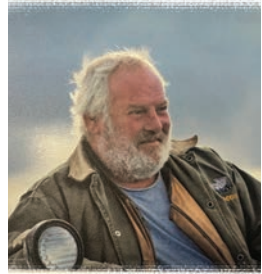
Jean was a dedicated and hardworking woman. She was a 10th-line Ladies Association member and successfully operated two farms around Redwing for several years on her own.

# Why is July 1st a Holiday?

It is a celebration of the country's confederation. In easy terms, it's the day Canada became a country.

July 1 is the anniversary of the Constitution Act of 1867 which united three separate colonies into a single, self-governing dominion within the British Empire. Dominion Day was renamed Canada Day in 1982. (I remember that day as I was teaching and the entire school cheered).

The original Dominion of Canada included Ontario, Nova Scotia, Quebec and New Brunswick. Canada's ten provinces joined the confederation in seven distinct waves from the nation's birth in 1867 to 1949. Manitoba joined in 1870, British Columbia in 1871, Prince Edward Island in 1873, Alberta and Saskatchewan in 1905, Newfoundland in 1949 together with Labrador.

The actual celebrations were organized by the federal government between 1958 – 1982. They took place on Parliament Hill in Ottawa.

My family chose Canada to settle in after they survived World War II. Canada was encouraging and welcomed displaced immigrants because they were not allowed to go back to their native country.

The first of the family moved to Toronto in 1953 and eventually the entire family, grandparents, two of my uncles and their family and two of my aunts and my own parents with children came here and lived in Toronto until their passing. All the children with the exception of 2 girl cousins and one male cousin are still alive. All the aunts and uncles have passed.

After 1983 in addition to the festivities on Parliament Hill, a new format of celebrations and local activities began to take place. Fireworks have been a part of the holiday since its earliest days, with the first Dominion Day on July 1, 1868, featuring evening fireworks at Rideau Hall in Ottawa. The modern synchronized, nationwide fireworks tradition officially expanded in 1981 when the government began hosting them simultaneously across 15 major Canadian cities.

The Queen and Prince Philip came here to participate in 1967, 1972 and 2010 Canada Day celebrations on Parliament Hill.

History is not taught in schools as it used to be which is a shame. Nowadays the phone and computers have replaced learning since it's so easy to look something up and get an immediate reply.

Personally I love reading history especially my own as it relates to what my family has experienced. I feel a sense of pride when I think of the hardships and dangers they went through but survived and all of them on my mother's side came to Canada. The parents struggled but the children are reaping the rewards of that struggle and those still alive are doing well.

Thank you to all who came out, who painted, who supported and to the ACC and the staff here who kept everything moving.



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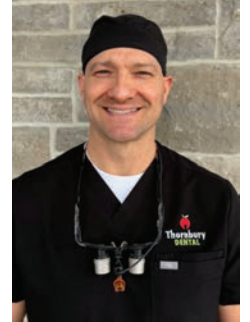

## Farewell To The Slabtown Dam *by Robert Burcher*

Well not quite yet, but soon. The floods of the winter and spring and a major ice jam at the dam have forced the river to find an easier route. From the photo you can see the huge erosion channel that has gone south of the dam. (The Slabtown bridge shows in the top right corner.) Only 8 feet of a dirt river bank stops the river from breaking through the bank and flowing down the new channel.

This may be the last summer to witness the dam with water flowing over it. The Town authorities know the issue, as does the Conservation Authority and the Federal Ministry of Fisheries. But none of them have any money to save what is now a historic tourist attraction. The only concern is that the Slabtown bridge may be in jeopardy from the river and the new channel that it will carve.

## Encouraging Pollinators on the Georgian Trail

As you walk, jog, or cycle along the Georgian Trail just west of Peaks Rd. you will come across a stretch of native wildflowers within the grassy edge recently planted by Pollinate The Blue Mountains (PTBM). A 30 meter stretch at the base of Georgian Peaks has been enhanced with patches of wildflowers that offer habitat, nectar and pollen to local insects. You will find a range of meadow plants including Oxeye Daisy, Swamp Milkweed, Black Eyed Susan, Smooth Leaf Aster, and Boneset planted in recurring patches. These wildflowers add habitat for different life stages of insects and enhance resources that trees alone can't offer.

This project is part of the Canopy Coalition tree and pollinator project, funded by TD Canada Trust, Friends of the Environment Fund. Canopy Coalition members include Pollinate the Blue Mountains (PTBM), Tree Trust TBM and CANN.

PTBM endeavors to offer demonstration plantings that restore and enhance local native plant species that are disappearing with pressure from development and clearing of natural habitat. There are a number of gardens and canoes in visible public spaces in TBM, but this one offers an example of naturalization by means of drifts of the same species, copying what happens in nature.

Enjoy them along with the native pollinator insect species that may be visiting!

## YOUR TFSA HAS A JOB.

That is what the TFSA was designed to make possible, and what most Canadians have not let it do.

Many people treat their TFSA like a savings account. It isn't — and in retirement, it is where the math really pays off. Withdrawals are tax-free and don't count as income, which means no bracket creep, no OAS clawback, and no tax bill waiting at the end. Every dollar you take out is still a full dollar. With an RRSP, the CRA is a silent partner in your account — every withdrawal is taxed as income, and a portion of your balance will never make it to you.

TFSA room does not disappear — it accumulates. A Canadian who has been eligible since 2009 and never contributed has \$109,000 in available room today.

The right setup depends on your timeline, your other assets, and your goals. Cash, GICs, and mutual funds all have their place — but whether they are the right fit inside your TFSA is a different question, and one worth asking. The gap between what a TFSA could be doing and what it is actually doing is often larger than people expect.

## Grey County Moving Forward With Plans To Transfer Roads With Local Municipalities

Grey County Council is moving forward with a plan to transfer roads between the County and local municipalities. At their meeting on June 25, Council approved a proposal which will see all County-owned roads in urban areas transferred to the local municipalities. In addition, the County and local municipalities will exchange responsibility for sections of some rural roads to better align with modern traffic behaviour. The adjustments will strengthen the local and county road networks, improve how roads are maintained and managed, and simplify road jurisdiction.

Staff will bring forward a by-law this summer for Council's consideration, with the transfer taking effect of June 1, 2027.

The road transfers will include 10 years of supporting funding for local municipalities totaling approximately \$42.8 million, which is a combination of transition funding, transferred development charge money and funding to offset other costs. This funding will help municipalities adjust to the additional costs of maintaining and servicing the additional roads, traffic signals, and other considerations.

The costs associated with road transfers will be included in the 2027 budget deliberations. County staff will immediately begin working with local municipal staff to ensure they have the information relating to the roads in their community, such as condition assessments, capital planning information and other records.

In February, Council received recommendations from the task force which included several roads to be transferred and a multi-year model for municipal transition funding. Council referred the initial proposal back to the task force to seek additional feedback from member municipalities, who had raised concerns relating to the funding formula, asset values, equity of transfers, and other considerations. A municipal workshop was held in May and an updated recommendation was provided to Council which included a higher level of funding for local municipalities.

# The Upcoming Municipal Election

by the Commonsense Collective

If there is one number that should give Town of the Blue Mountains residents pause, it is this: fewer than 30 percent of eligible voters cast a ballot in the last municipal election.

That level of disengagement should concern anyone invested in the town's future. This is not a moment for residents to tune out.

Financial pressures, infrastructure demands, sustainable development, affordable housing and environmental stewardship are not abstract talking points here; they are the issues shaping how people live, work and play in this area.

Municipal politics may not carry the spectacle of federal or provincial campaigns, but it is often local council decisions that hit close to home. That is what makes the entrance of Commonsense Collective notable. The newly formed non-profit aims to educate, engage and mobilize voters across the Town of the Blue Mountains — an ambitious goal that responds to a clear gap in local democratic participation.

Commonsense Collective cites a 29.3% turnout in the 2022 municipal election, underscoring how few eligible voters took part in choosing the municipality's direction.

Whatever the reasons for this low turnout in 2022, the result is the same: decisions that affect everyday life are being shaped without the participation of much of the community.

The three directors of Commonsense Collective — John Leckie, Mike Pickering and former councillor Bill Abbotts — and a host of community-engaged supporters — aim to remove barriers to political engagement, provide clear and objective information on local issues, and encourage a stronger sense of civic responsibility.

In an era when many people feel overwhelmed by noise, spin and polarization, there is a clear need for credible local information that helps residents understand not only who is running, but also what is at stake.

Information is available at [www.commonsensecollective.ca](http://www.commonsensecollective.ca). According to the organization, the site will provide non-partisan information on local issues, current candidates and ways for residents to become more involved.

If Commonsense Collective can encourage more residents to pay attention, ask better questions and vote, that would be a meaningful start. In a town undergoing significant change, local democracy cannot remain a spectator sport.

## Water Safety Tips while enjoying everything The Blue Mountains has to offer.

The Blue Mountains Fire Department would like to remind residence and visitors that our unique terrain creates specific open-water hazards, particularly along the Beaver River, and the shores of Georgian Bay. Because these waters can be unpredictably cold and fast-moving, the Blue Mountains Fire Department advise residents and visitors to practice the following safety measures:

### 1. Respect Currents and Changing Water Levels

- Check Water Levels: Monitor local flow rates before canoeing or kayaking on the Beaver River, especially after heavy summer rainfalls.
- Avoid High Flows: Stay out of the water if currents look muddy, fast, or debris-filled, as these conditions can hide dangerous underwater hazards.
- Paddle with Partners: Never navigate local river routes alone and always map out your entry and exit points before leaving the shore.
- The Winds: In the Blue Mountains the wind can change quickly, an “offshore” wind can blow an inflatable or paddleboard, Kayak or canoe, out onto Georgian Bay several thousand feet before you realize what’s happening. Rescue is expensive and usually involves the Coast Guard, OPP and Fire Dept.

### 2. Prepare for Cold-Water Hazards

- Dress for Water Temperatures: Recognize that Georgian Bay remains dangerously cold well into the summer, which can trigger sudden thermal shock.
- Wear Certified Life Jackets: Wear a Transport Canada-approved PFD securely before stepping into any watercraft, as cold water instantly reduces a person’s ability to react and safety don the PFD once in the water.



### 3. Navigate Rocky Shorelines Safely

- Wear Protective Footwear: Use sturdy water shoes to maintain traction on slippery river rocks and protect against sharp stones.
- Watch for Drop-offs: Stay cautious when wading along the beaches, where flat shorelines can drop off suddenly into deep, freezing currents.

### 4. Use the Free what3words App

- Download the what3words App: Download the app before heading out on the water. The app can help emergency services quickly find your location, whether you are on the water or on land. Simply open the app and tap the “Locate Me” icon to see your current three-word location at the top of the screen. If you need emergency assistance, provide those three words to the emergency call taker so responders can locate you faster and get help on the way.

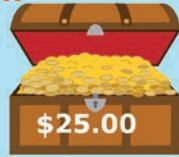
