Public Health Urging People To Take Precautions As Air Quality Health Index Reaches 'Very High Risk'

Grey Bruce Public Health is advising residents and visitors to take steps to safeguard their health as the area continues to deal with a heat event, along with very poor air quality, caused by wildfire smoke pushed into the area from northwestern Ontario.

Environment & Climate Change Canada has issued two warnings for Grey-Bruce, and a large swath of Ontario. An Orange-level warning is in place due to the air quality, meaning it is likely to cause significant disruption or health impacts. A Yellow-level heat warning has also been issued as the humidity is expected to make temperatures feel above 30 C.

Everyone's health, regardless of age or health status, is at risk during periods of very poor air quality and during heavy smoke conditions. The extreme heat can also impact anyone's health.

The Grey-Bruce area (observed at the Tiverton station) is expected to have an air quality risk level of 10+ – the highest possible level – for the remainder of the day Wednesday. It is expected to drop to 9 or high-risk Thursday.

Grey Bruce Public Health recommends the following:

For the general population: Reduce or reschedule strenuous activities outdoors, especially if experiencing symptoms, such as coughing and throat irritation.

- For the At-Risk population (people with heart or breathing problems): Avoid strenuous activities outdoors. Children and the elderly should also avoid outdoor physical exertion.
- Please continue to monitor air quality alerts and forecasts issued by the provincial Air Quality Health Index (AQHI) and monitor any symptoms that may have been caused by exposure to low air quality.
- People more likely to be impacted by wildfire smoke include those aged 65 and older, pregnant people, infants and young children, and people with an existing illness or chronic health condition.
- The poor air quality can cause people to experience mild symptoms, such as eye, nose and throat irritation, headaches or a mild cough. More serious, but less common symptoms, include wheezing, chest pains or severe cough. Anyone experiencing a medical emergency should seek immediate medical assistance.
- During periods of extreme heat and poor air quality, people should prioritize keeping cool.

GBPH advises:

- If you must spend time outdoors, limit the time as much as possible.
- When indoors, keep windows and doors closed as much as possible. Protect indoor air from wildfire smoke.
- Using recirculation settings on HVAC systems.
- Using a clean, good-quality air filter in ventilation systems.
- Using an air purifier with a HEPA filter.
- If needed, visiting community centres, libraries, and shopping malls, which often have cleaner filtered air.
- Air quality conditions may improve Friday morning.

Grey County Council Committee of the Whole

Council discussed the minutes and recommendations of the May 26 meeting of the Urban Roads and Road Exchange Task Force. Council voted to move forward with the road transfers project with an effective legal transfer date of June 1, 2027. Staff were directed to prepare a by-law to support the transfers and to begin developing agreements with member municipalities. The approved proposal will see all County-owned roads in urban areas transferred to the local municipalities. In addition, the County and local municipalities will exchange responsibility for sections of some rural roads to better align with modern traffic behaviour.

Council accepted the minutes of the June 18 meeting of the Grey County Joint Accessibility Advisory Committee.

Council received an information report about the upcoming changes to regional conservation authorities. The Province is merging Ontario's existing 36 conservation authorities into seven regional conservation authorities. Staff highlighted expected impacts from these changes which includes a shift in the way conservation authorities are funded. Currently conservation authorities are funded by local municipalities. Regional conservation authorities will be funded by the upper-tier municipality. Grey County is projecting a 2028 expense of \$2.8 million to absorb the cost of the shift.

Council voted to renew a lease agreement that supports the Rural Ontario Medical Program's placement of medical students in the Owen Sound area. Grey County supports lawn maintenance on the property.

Grey County will issue an RFP for emergency management consulting services for a portion of the fourth quarter of 2026 and all of 2027. The recommendation follows a review of the County's current operating structure. The consultant would serve as the primary emergency management coordinator while long-term options are explored and prepared for Council's consideration.

The Blue Mountain Legacy Fund is a registered charitable public foundation with an endowed fund held with Community Foundation Grey Bruce. Donations are invested with the earnings going towards community projects.

Bridge and Culvert Rehabilitation Update

The Town's Bridge and Culvert Rehabilitation program is a multi-year effort to repair deficiencies and extend the lifespan of a number of Town-owned structures. The scope of work will vary between sites but generally includes structural rehabilitation, surface repairs and guiderail replacement or rehabilitation.

Arnott Construction has been awarded the construction tender for the 2026 workplan which includes a total of seven bridges and culverts. Three of the bridges identified for rehabilitation in 2026 will require full closures while the work is being completed, while the remaining sites will only require single-lane restrictions. Work will be staggered so that only one structure is being rehabilitated at a time. The bridges which require temporary closures include:

Redwing Bridge, 10th Line (Bridge 6)

Anticipated Construction Period: September 15 to October 7

The 10th Line Redwing Bridge is a concrete rigid frame/arch bridge. Rehabilitation works are expected to include improvements to the guiderails, installation of warning signage and repairs to concrete. Recommended detour is via 10th Line, Sideroad 9, TBM Euphrasia Townline and Grey Road 119.

6th Line Bridge, north of 12th Sideroad (Bridge 8)

Anticipated Construction Period: July 15 to August 6

The 6th Line Bridge is a concrete rigid frame bridge. Rehabilitation works are expected to include installation of guardrail, clearing of stream bed and repairs to concrete. Recommended detour is via 12th Sideroad, Grey Road 2 and Grey Road 119.

11th Line Bridge, north of Sideroad 33 (Bridge 19)

Anticipated Construction Period: July 16 to August 7

The 11th Line Bridge is a solid slab concrete bridge constructed in 1930. Rehabilitation works are expected to include installation of guardrail, repair and regrading of approach surface and repairs to concrete deck soffit, wing wall and abutments. Recommended detour is via Sideroad 33, 10th Line and Highway 26.



Other Bridges and Culverts

Rehabilitation works are expected to be completed on four additional structures in 2026. These structures will remain open to traffic with alternating single-lane restrictions.

1. 10th Line Culvert

Construction Period: June 1-12 (completed)

The 10th Line Culvert is an elliptical multi-plate corrugated steel pipe. Rehabilitation works included the installation of a proper guide rail on both approaches and across the structure.

2. Slabtown Bridge

Construction Period: June 8-24 (completed)

The Slabtown Bridge is a concrete deck on a prefabricated steel truss bridge. Rehabilitation works are expected to include modifications to the approach guide rail to improve safety.

3. 12th Sideroad Bridge

Anticipated Construction Period: August 17-28

The 12th Sideroad Bridge rehabilitation works are expected to include concrete repairs and installation of a new guide rail.

4. Victoria Corners Bridge

Anticipated Construction Period: August 31 to September 14

The Victoria Corners Bridge is a concrete rigid frame bridge. Rehabilitation works are expected to include repairs to the approaches, installation of signage and improvements to the guide rails.

Georgian Bay Cycle For Hope Fundraiser for Local Cancer Support



The Georgian Bay Cycle for Hope, a one-day fundraiser in support of the Georgian Bay Cancer Support Centre (GBCSC), has a big goal this year to help it provide much-needed, free cancer support services locally. The 2026 event, which takes place on **Saturday, August 15** in Penetanguishene and Collingwood, is aiming to raise over \$210,000.

"We are incredibly excited to be hosting our annual Georgian Bay Cycle for Hope in two locations again this year. Riders at both event sites will come together to raise funds that directly support the programs and services offered at both of our locations," says GBCSC Executive Director Dylan Lalande. "These funds will ensure individuals and families impacted by cancer continue to receive support close to home."

Now in its 15th year, the Cycle For Hope has raised close to \$900,000 to help support people living with cancer, their families, and caregivers in North Simcoe, South Georgian Bay, and surrounding communities. The event features amazing, picturesque cycle routes along or near Georgian Bay. This marks the second year a full Cycle event is taking place on the west side of the Bay in the Collingwood area.

Riders in 2026 have a choice of five routes ranging from 9 km to 100 km from the Collingwood event site (between Central Avenue and the YMCA at 250 Hume Street). The routes fan out from Collingwood to surrounding communities including Stayner, Thornbury, Meaford, and other parts of Blue Mountain. Some of this year's routes include off-road, unpaved trails through several scenic areas.

As always, there's something for everyone. The 9 km Family Route is perfect those who want a fun outing while helping a cause and a chance to enjoy an ice cream along the way.

Cyclists interested in participating as an individual or part of a team can do so by going online to gbcycleforhope.ca. There is no minimum fundraising requirement, but participants are encouraged to collect pledges for their ride in support of the GBCSC. There are also opportunities for volunteers to get involved. 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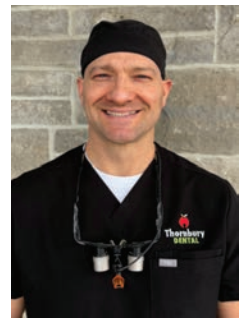
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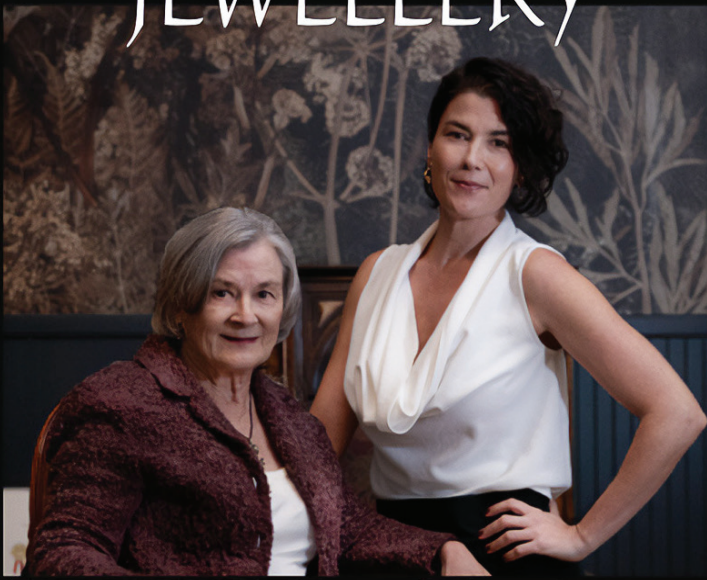


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Ontario Supporting Royal Canadian Legions in Simcoe-Grey

New liquor licence fee rebates will help legions dedicate more resources to veterans, community programs and local charitable initiatives.

The Ontario government is making it easier for Royal Canadian Legion branches in Simcoe-Grey to continue serving veterans and local communities by providing full liquor sales licence fee rebates to eligible branches applying for or renewing their liquor sales licences. The rebate program took effect on June 1, 2026, and applies retroactively to April 1, 2026.

"Ontario's legions have long been at the heart of communities across our province, serving veterans, supporting local charities and bringing people together," said Attorney General Doug Downey. "That's why our government is providing liquor sales licence fee rebates that will help legion branches dedicate more resources to the people and causes they serve across Ontario."

Legions play vital roles in supporting veterans and their families, while also advancing the tradition of remembrance, leading fundraising efforts and hosting community events that bring people together. Simcoe-Grey is home to the following branches:

"Our twelve local legions have long histories of serving veterans and strengthening our communities," said Brian Saunderson, MPP for Simcoe-Grey. "Our government is proud to support legions by reducing costs so they can continue investing in the people, programs and services that matter most to veterans and local families."

Across Ontario, 391 Royal Canadian Legion branches currently hold liquor sales licences and are eligible for the rebate program.

QUICK FACTS

- Ontario's legion branches support veterans, Canadian Armed Forces and RCMP families, charitable activities, Remembrance Day ceremonies, seniors' supports, youth education initiatives and community programs.
- Rebates will reduce costs for nearly 400 eligible legion branches by almost \$250,000 over five years.
- The rebate for a two-year licence term is \$1,055, while the rebate for a four-year term is \$1,355.
- Ontario branches of the Royal Canadian Legion do not need to submit a rebate application to the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario. Eligible fees will be returned automatically within two to four weeks after the licence or renewal is approved.

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The Upcoming Municipal Election

by the Commonsense Collective

If there is one number that should give Town of the Blue Mountains residents pause, it is this: fewer than 30 percent of eligible voters cast a ballot in the last municipal election.

That level of disengagement should concern anyone invested in the town's future. This is not a moment for residents to tune out.

Financial pressures, infrastructure demands, sustainable development, affordable housing and environmental stewardship are not abstract talking points here; they are the issues shaping how people live, work and play in this area.

Municipal politics may not carry the spectacle of federal or provincial campaigns, but it is often local council decisions that hit close to home. That is what makes the entrance of Commonsense Collective notable. The newly formed non-profit aims to educate, engage and mobilize voters across the Town of the Blue Mountains — an ambitious goal that responds to a clear gap in local democratic participation.

Commonsense Collective cites a 29.3% turnout in the 2022 municipal election, underscoring how few eligible voters took part in choosing the municipality's direction.

Whatever the reasons for this low turnout in 2022, the result is the same: decisions that affect everyday life are being shaped without the participation of much of the community.

The three directors of Commonsense Collective — John Leckie, Mike Pickering and former councillor Bill Abbotts — and a host of community-engaged supporters — aim to remove barriers to political engagement, provide clear and objective information on local issues, and encourage a stronger sense of civic responsibility.

In an era when many people feel overwhelmed by noise, spin and polarization, there is a clear need for credible local information that helps residents understand not only who is running, but also what is at stake.

Information is available at www.commonsensecollective.ca. According to the organization, the site will provide non-partisan information on local issues, current candidates and ways for residents to become more involved.

If Commonsense Collective can encourage more residents to pay attention, ask better questions and vote, that would be a meaningful start. In a town undergoing significant change, local democracy cannot remain a spectator sport.

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Water Safety Tips while enjoying everything The Blue Mountains has to offer.

The Blue Mountains Fire Department would like to remind residence and visitors that our unique terrain creates specific open-water hazards, particularly along the Beaver River, and the shores of Georgian Bay. Because these waters can be unpredictably cold and fast-moving, the Blue Mountains Fire Department advise residents and visitors to practice the following safety measures:

1. Respect Currents and Changing Water Levels

- Check Water Levels: Monitor local flow rates before canoeing or kayaking on the Beaver River, especially after heavy summer rainfalls.
- Avoid High Flows: Stay out of the water if currents look muddy, fast, or debris-filled, as these conditions can hide dangerous underwater hazards.
- Paddle with Partners: Never navigate local river routes alone and always map out your entry and exit points before leaving the shore.
- The Winds: In the Blue Mountains the wind can change quickly, an “offshore” wind can blow an inflatable or paddleboard, Kayak or canoe, out onto Georgian Bay several thousand feet before you realize what’s happening. Rescue is expensive and usually involves the Coast Guard, OPP and Fire Dept.

2. Prepare for Cold-Water Hazards

- Dress for Water Temperatures: Recognize that Georgian Bay remains dangerously cold well into the summer, which can trigger sudden thermal shock.
- Wear Certified Life Jackets: Wear a Transport Canada-approved PFD securely before stepping into any watercraft, as cold water instantly reduces a person’s ability to react and safety don the PFD once in the water.



3. Navigate Rocky Shorelines Safely

- Wear Protective Footwear: Use sturdy water shoes to maintain traction on slippery river rocks and protect against sharp stones.
- Watch for Drop-offs: Stay cautious when wading along the beaches, where flat shorelines can drop off suddenly into deep, freezing currents.

4. Use the Free what3words App

- Download the what3words App: Download the app before heading out on the water. The app can help emergency services quickly find your location, whether you are on the water or on land. Simply open the app and tap the “Locate Me” icon to see your current three-word location at the top of the screen. If you need emergency assistance, provide those three words to the emergency call taker so responders can locate you faster and get help on the way.

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2026 Municipal and School Board Election Information

The Town of The Blue Mountains 2026 Municipal and School Board election is October 26, 2026. Eligible electors are encouraged to confirm they are on the Voters' List to ensure they can vote for Mayor, Deputy Mayor, Councillors, and School Board Trustees. Electors can check, update, add or remove their information from the Voters' List by visiting RegisterToVoteON.ca, a tool developed and maintained by Elections Ontario.

The final day to use RegisterToVoteON.ca is August 12, 2026. After this date, beginning September 1, individuals can still register or update their information in person at the Town of The Blue Mountains Town Hall at 32 Mill Street, Thornbury, with appropriate identification.

The Voting Period in The Blue Mountains will run from October 16 to 26, 2026. During the Voting Period, voters in the Town of The Blue Mountains will once again be able to cast their vote from the comfort of their home - or anywhere they can access the internet or telephone - 24 hours a day. During the Voting Period, Electors can also attend the Election Help Centre to:

- Ask questions about the election
- Register or update your voter information
- Receive voting assistance
- Vote independently

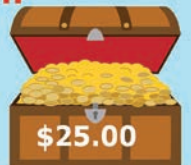

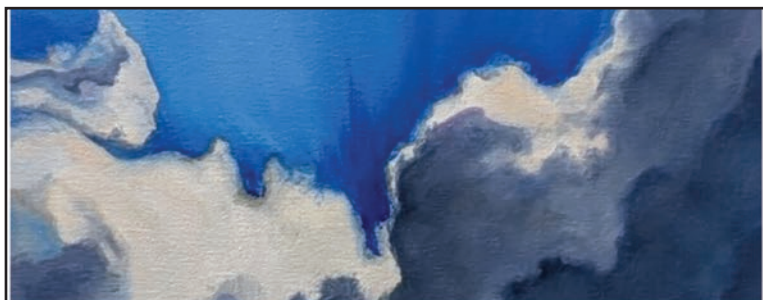
