# Canada's Military Role since the Second World War

We are pleased to welcome Lieutenant-Colonel (retired) Shelagh Stevens, as our speaker on September 18.

Eighty years ago in September, the Second World War (in the Pacific) ended. Today we will learn about the history of Canada's longstanding UN deployments over the almost 80 years of peacekeeping since then. Shelagh will also provide her unofficial perspective on Canada's military today and building for the future.

In 1987 Shelagh served her first peacekeeping mission in Egypt (1.5 years) with the Multinational Force and Observers, followed in 1989 by her first UN peacekeeping tour in Namibia (UNTAG) (one year), another in Croatia (UNPROFOR) (seven months) and was then seconded in 1995 for three years to UN headquarters in New York where she served in what would now be the Department of Field Support.

On the basis of her extensive experience and expertise, Shelagh was also contracted by the US State Department to give UN instructor, staff officer and logistics courses and exercises from Mongolia to Tunisia, from Malaysia to Ukraine. Moreover, as she is bilingual, she also worked for the Organisation de la Francophonie (OIF) offering the courses and training in French in Mali, Sénégal, Burkina Faso, and Chad.

At the time Shelagh left the military, she had more peacekeeping experience than any other woman in the Canadian Armed Forces.

#### **6.0 SPEAKER**

Our Speaker today, introduced by Grant Swanson, was George Chisholm, President of the Oakville Historical Society and a direct descendent of one of our founding fathers (his great-great grand uncle, William) of Oakville. George is a lifetime resident of Oakville. He and his

wife live in the 1839 house in which he was raised. George's full biography may be found <u>here</u>.

Founded in 1953, The Oakville Historical Society is the official collector

of archives for the Town of and as a nonprofit, volunteer organization works to preserve the historical heritage of the well as promote it through its activities and programmes. The extensive collections include documents, pictures, newspapers, maps, albums,



and protect Town as various <u>Society's</u> original

letters,

diaries as well as a comprehensive historical and marine library.

Highlights from George's presentation included an account of how the Oakville area emerged geologically, following an ice dam collapse many centuries ago, and by whom it was discovered. He traced the occupation of current lands from 1669, through the American Revolutionary War, to incorporation in 1857 and up to the present day where we can boast a population of  $\sim$ 225,000.

A sawmill and a grist mill were built in Oakville in the 1820s and 1830s and



wooden

shipbuilding was also a major industry in Oakville until steel hulled ships came into being. The Oakville Basket Company factory was a major employer in town making baskets for the many fruit farmers in the area in Oakville's early days. Established in 1871, it finally closed in 1984.

Grant offered many thanks to our Guest from the Membership, none of whom, surprisingly, had been raised in Oakville.
