What's at Stake in Ontario's Ring of Fire?

We are delighted that Virginia Heffernan will be our speaker on October 16.

The Ring of Fire is a 5,000-square-kilometre crescent of ancient volcanic rock rich in nickel, copper, and other metals considered critical to the global transition to renewable energy.

The metal deposits lie hidden beneath the swamps of the James Bay Lowlands of northern Canada, the second-largest temperate wetland in the world. The area is home to several thousand Indigenous people in communities accessible only by plane or winter road. The deposits, too, are stranded by a lack of infrastructure. Canada and the province of Ontario have pledged billions of dollars towards a critical minerals strategy, including building an all-weather road to the Ring of Fire. Will the sense of urgency created by Trump's aggressive stance towards Canada fast-track development?

Virginia Heffernan is a former exploration geoscientist and author of Ring of Fire: High Stakes Mining in a Lowlands Wilderness (ECW Press).



She has an MSc from the University of Toronto's School of the Environment and an MFA in creative non-fiction from the University of King's College. Her articles have appeared in publications such as Explore, The Globe and Mail, The Literary Review of Canada, and Maclean's.

The following points were added by Ray Henrickson

- The size of clubs varies across the district with the largest being in Collingwood with 650 members. Several clubs have a membership of 200 – 250 members but all of these are mixed clubs. The membership of men only clubs is significantly less.
- Men's only clubs are no longer permitted to be created. All new clubs must have mixed membership.
- Several clubs have membership waiting lists. Some charge \$25/year to be on the waiting list. Some charge separate initiation fee.
- Larger clubs pay their speakers \$300 350 plus some reimburse travel expenses.
- Some clubs limit the terms for treasurers and other positions.
- Some larger clubs no longer accept cash or cheques. All payments must be made by e-transfer of credit card.

7.0 GUEST SPEAKER

Our speaker today, introduced by Grant, was Lt. Col (Ret'd) Shelagh Stevens whose detailed biography was outlined in the President's September newsletter distributed September 13th. Her 'Zoom' presentation coincided with the 80th anniversaries of the ending of WWII in the European & Pacific theatres of war.



Col. Stevens divided her presentation (also available shortly on our Club website) into Peacekeeping (old & new) and the key issues and challenges surrounding the Canadian Defence Department and Coast Guard.

She outlined the beginning of concerted peacekeeping after WWI (League of Nations) which was subsequently replaced by the establishment of the UN in 1945. The Suez crisis was the first international peacekeeping force. At that time and for 50 years, Canada was a known and accepted leader in peacekeeping.

She described the changing nature of peacekeeping from purely military to a blend of military and civil, particularly where local warlords influence





"Not men only. Not women only. Modern peacekeeping needs a mix of qualified men and women involved in every aspect of the peace process.

events and tend to destabilize further warring governments. Interaction with civilian populations of different beliefs and ideologies has affected the nature of eligible peacekeepers in Canada's Forces. Modern peacekeeping requires a mix of men and women, where once it was considered a male-

dominated occupation.

Col. Stevens then pivoted to describe the major issues affecting Canada's Defence Department. These included: pay & recruitment; the changing influence of the USA vs. Europe in military policies and advanced weapon procurement systems.



that we may need to buy different types of armament from different countries to refine our capabilities that were often single-sourced (e.g. F-35 and the Swedish Saab Gripen aircraft). Given the changing nature of politics in the US, our procurement capabilities need to change urgently to the extent



Grant thanked Col. Stevens for her service to Canada and for the presentation, all slides of which will be available additionally on our Club website shortly.

7.0 Adjournment

A motion to adjourn the general meeting was made by Mike Tweedie and seconded by Andy Vavasour. The motion was approved by the Probus members present; Roy Oldfield adjourned the meeting at 12:00 Noon.
