ABOUT TRACKS

TRACKS is an experiential program hosted by Trent University within the Indigenous Environmental Studies and Sciences Program (IESS), and operates in collaboration with founding partner organization Kawartha World Issues Centre (KWIC) and the First Peoples House of Learning (FPHL).







PURPOSE STATEMENT

TRACKS facilitates dynamic, land-based youth programming that braids multiple scientific approaches by centering Indigenous ways of knowing and being.

PROGRAM INTENTIONS

- To offer youth opportunities to actively engage with a multitude of worldviews to further understand and develop their personal skills, gifts, and tools.
- To contribute to hands-on InSTEAM (Indigenous Science Technology Engineering Art and Math) learning opportunities from the elementary to post-secondary level.
- To facilitate spaces where intergenerational knowledge can be shared and mentoring relationships can be nurtured.
- To provide spaces where youth can be empowered to build relationships, learn together, and grow as leaders while honouring their diverse identities and backgrounds.
- To encourage youth to deepen reciprocal relationships within their environments and embody understandings of their responsibilities to the land.
- To collaborate with Indigenous Peoples, school boards and community organizations to strengthen relationships and activate culturally responsive learning opportunities.
- To foster meaningful employment and volunteer experiences for young people interested in land-centric and InSTEAM work





HUMICHTS OF 2023 SCHOOL PROGRAMS

TRACKS School Programs runs a wide variety of educational programs throughout the year for Indigenous and non-Indigenous youth from Kindergarten to Grade 12. Activities include classroom workshops about coding, Anishinaabemowin, and Indigenous and Western science. All programming is fun, hands-on, and experiential!

In the fall of 2023, we hit the ground running with 2 new amazing coding programs: *Manoomin Coding Connections* and the *Hawk & Hare Unplugged Coding Game*. It was so rewarding to help develop students' coding skills and increase their knowledge of western and Indigenous science! A special chi-miigwech to Geneva Walker for her work in developing these workshops!

We were able to offer these Indigenous science & digital skills-based workshops barrier-free (i.e. at absolutely NO COST) to schools and groups in the Peterborough area thanks to funding from Actua via the Government of Canada's Cancode program. Miigwech to Actua and the Government of Canada for this impactful funding!



HAWK & HARE UNPLUGGED COUNG GAME

Hawk & Hare is always full of laughs and surprises as students learn valuable coding skills while having fun outside! Students don't just learn to code - they also practice teamwork and leadership skills while learning about predator-prey dynamics in local ecosystems. During this unplugged coding activity, students work in teams to collect food and safely return home. They have to adapt to a series of obstacles that Waaboz and Mshikekek (hares and hawks) encounter in real life and listen to their teammate's coding commands!

MANOOMIN CODING CONNECTIONS



During Manoomin Coding Connections, students use code and Anishinaabemowin to build a map for a small ozobot robot to follow. As the ozobot robot travels through the map, students encounter different beings and learn about the relationships these beings have with Manoomin (wild rice). It's exciting to watch students use creative problem solving and learn about the interconnectedness of all living things during this workshop.



HIGHLIGHTS OF 2023 CAMP PROGRAMS

In 2023, TRACKS Camp Programs were busy throughout the summer season! We collaborated with the Camp Kawartha Environment Centre to host two 5-day long summer camps from our shared tipi space at their location. We also hosted camps in Curve Lake and Alderville First Nations. As usual, all of our camp programs were targeted to youth ages 6-12 and braided multiple worldviews and scientific principles through fun activities!

Throughout our Camp Programs this summer we incorporated teachings about Nibi (water) and Shkode (fire). Our Camp Programs team decided to focus on these themes because not only were the campers able to hear from Knowledge Holders about these important teachings, but they were also able to try their hand at things such as fire starting, fire keeping, and play fun games about water beings like River Race & Turtle Hurdles!



WHAT DID CAMPERS & PARENTS HAVE TO SAY?

"I liked TRACKS camp because it taught me so much about Indigenous culture and science. I learned how to say animal names in Anishinaabemowin language. I also liked how you taught me so much about respecting nature and the living beings around us. I loved dissecting owl pellets because it taught me so much about the animal's body and how it works. I loved how you taught us how the puff ball mushrooms are edible. We also played so many fun games that were both awesome and educational."

"My children thoroughly enjoyed this enriching, outdoor camp. They returned home each night with excitement as they shared their experiences disecting owl pellets, hiking and exploring the forest, meeting new friends, connecting with nature and the physical environment and learning about Indigenous culture through the teachings of an Elder."









YOUTH PROGRAMS

There are many ways that TRACKS is involved in community education outside of our School Programs and Camp Programs. Starting in 2023, these offerings are encapsulated under our Youth Programs which include our Oshkwazin Indigenous Leadership programs.

In 2023, we ran a handful of exciting and immersive Youth Programs including a Building our Bundles event and a Cultural Connections event in collaboration with KPRDSB, Curve Lake First Nation and Hiawatha First Nation. In 2023, TRACKS also continued a strong partnership with the Youth Circle for Mother Earth (YCME) through Ontario Nature! Our youth Programs team helped to host a 3-day YCME Youth Summit which was held at Camp Wahanowin in Rama First Nation. At the summit, TRACKS facilitated Orange Shirt Beading workshops for participants and got to soak in the beautiful scenery across all 3-days of the summit!








YOUTH PROGRAMS

During the summer of 2023, our Youth Programs team grew with the addition of 5 Indigenous high school Trailblazers! Our Trailblazer Summer Employment program provides part-time summer employment for Indigenous youth during July and August. During their time as a Trailblazer, youth receive teachings and mentorship from TRACKS staff, local Indigenous Elders, and Knowledge Holders.

By the end of the summer, the youth took some of the knowledge they learned, and with support from TRACKS staff, they paired up to prepare one of four Trailblazer Land Camps for other Indigenous youth in their community. All land camps are based around a Traditional Knowledge topic with teachings shared by an invited Elder or Knowledge Holders, as well as a craft or hands-on activity. In 2023, we hosted land camps with teachings on making & birthing shakers, water ecosystems, beading & berries, and tracking!









TRAILBLAZER LAND CAMPS & ACTUA

For the first time in 2023, the Summer Trailblazers were also eligible for a high school course credit (GPP30) through the Ontario Ministry of Education via our network membership with Actua. With this incredible opportunity, our Trailblazers got to take an important step towards their futures as leaders in their communities!
