2024 was a year of momentum, clarity, and growth at TRACKS. With our new program model—divided into School Programs, Youth Programs, and Camp Programs—fully in place for a full year, we've seen just how much more capacity and impact this structure brings. It's helped us deepen our relationships, strengthen our delivery, and expand what's possible across all areas of our work.

This year, our School Programs continued to flourish. We ran a growing number of hands-on, land-based workshops with students and educators, sharing Indigenous and Western knowledge systems in creative, engaging ways. While we offered fewer digital literacy workshops this year, we doubled down on in-person engagement and were proud to meet increased demand from schools across the region.

In our Youth Programs, we were thrilled to run our for-credit Oshkwazin Trailblazer program for a second year. With more youth participating than ever before, the Trailblazer program continues to be a transformative opportunity—blending employment, leadership development, and credit-earning education in a way that's truly unique to TRACKS. Summer 2024 was one of our most exciting seasons to date. With a larger and more skilled camp staff team, we were able to offer more Camp Programs than ever before—from on-campus programming to First Nations-based camps and custom summer events. This growth not only allowed us to reach more youth, but to do so with even greater care, creativity, and consistency.

Behind every workshop, camp, and initiative is a team of passionate and dedicated people. To our staff, volunteers, Steering Team, Advisory Circle, and placement students—thank you for your brilliance and heart. And to our funders, sponsors, and donors—thank you for your continued trust and investment in this work. Your support makes TRACKS possible. We're proud to share this year's report with you. It's a snapshot of what can happen when strong relationships, shared knowledge, and youth leadership come together.

ABOUT TRACKS

TRACKS is an experiential program hosted by Trent University within the Indigenous Environmental Studies and Sciences Program (IESS), and operates in collaboration with founding partner organization Kawartha World Issues Centre (KWIC) and the First Peoples House of Learning (FPHL).







PURPOSE STATEMENT

TRACKS facilitates dynamic, land-based youth programming that braids multiple scientific approaches by centering Indigenous ways of knowing and being.

PROGRAM INTENTIONS

- To offer youth opportunities to actively engage with a multitude of worldviews to further understand and develop their personal skills, gifts, and tools.
- To contribute to hands-on InSTEAM (Indigenous Science Technology Engineering Art and Math) learning opportunities from the elementary to post-secondary level.
- To facilitate spaces where intergenerational knowledge can be shared and mentoring relationships can be nurtured.
- To provide spaces where youth can be empowered to build relationships, learn together, and grow as leaders while honouring their diverse identities and backgrounds.
- To encourage youth to deepen reciprocal relationships within their environments and embody understandings of their responsibilities to the land.
- To collaborate with Indigenous Peoples, school boards and community organizations to strengthen relationships and activate culturally responsive learning opportunities.
- To foster meaningful employment and volunteer experiences for young people interested in land-centric and InSTEAM work







SCHOOL PROGRAMS

2024 was an incredible year for our School Programs. Our Instructors travelled throughout the Peterborough region to deliver workshops to Indigenous and non-Indigenous students. From Kindergarten all the way to University level, we taught them about STEM, Indigenous Knowledge, and braiding these two knowledge systems together. We used coding, Anishinaabemowin, and the land to create fun, experiential programming!

Thanks to funding from Actua via the Government of Canada's Cancode program, we were able to offer Indigenous science & digital skills-based workshops barrier-free (i.e. at absolutely NO COST) to schools and groups in the Peterborough area. Miigwech to Actua and the Government of Canada for this impactful funding!

Manoomin Coding Connections and the Hawk & Hare Unplugged Coding Game have quickly become favourites with teachers in the Peterborough area, who also recognize the importance of acknowledging the intersections between these two broad ways of knowing. These workshops are full of fun and experiential learning, allowing students to come away from the workshops with new knowledge and greater confidence in their digital skills.

SCHOOL PROGRAMS

TRACKS partnered with the Trent School of Education to bring coding training to their teacher-candidates. TRACKS staff helped demystify coding and demonstrated how coding can be taught outdoors and unplugged!


We also worked with the TEACH Outside the Box program, a unique opportunity for teacher candidates and community educators to participate in a series of interactive workshops centred around social justice. TRACKS shared their knowledge of Indigenous ways of teaching and knowing and hosted a community placement student.

This year, TRACKS spoke at the Council of Outdoor Educators of Ontario (COEO) Conference at Camp Kawartha. We had the opportunity to speak to outdoor educators from all across Ontario about the importance of incorporating multiple knowledge systems into teaching practices. Through experiential activities, educators learned how knowledge systems can be braided together and how to centre Indigenous ways of knowing.

IICHLIGHTS OF 2024 CAMP PROGRAMS

In 2024, TRACKS Camp Programs ran two P.A. Day camps, a March Break Camp and two 5-day long summer camps for 6-to-12 year old kids! During our camps, we explained how Indigenous Knowledge and Western science can work together. For example, we ran our Ode'imin (strawberry) workshop, where we shared Ode'imin teachings and did a strawberry DNA extraction experiment. Another activity we did was our Mishiikenh (turtle) workshop, where we shared Mishiikenh teachings, observed different turtle shells, learned about their ecosystems and did turtle crafts with recyclable materials.

GAMP PROGRAMS

As we do every year, TRACKS hosted camps in First Nation communities near Peterborough. This year we visited Alderville First Nation, Hiawatha First Nation and Curve Lake First Nation. In these camps we ran different activities where campers learned about coding and Anishinaabemowin, about the relationships between different beings in an ecosystem, about the Three Sisters, among other themes.

YOUTH PROGRAMS

In 2024, TRACKS ran a handful of exciting and immersive Youth Programs including a Beading Workshop at the Indigenous Women's Symposium, our River Race game at both the Peterborough Children's Water Festival and the Haliburton-Muskoka-Kawartha Children's Water Festival, our Toppling Towers game in the Lessons of The Land event organized by the New Canadian Centre and a Cultural Connections event in collaboration with KPRDSB, Curve Lake First Nation and Hiawatha First Nation. We were also present at the Urban Indigenous Health Fair where we connected with Indigenous Youth around Nogojiwanong.

As part of the Youth Circle for Mother Earth, TRACKS, Ontario Nature, Plenty Canada and Walpole Island First Nation planned and hosted a 3-day YCME Youth Summit event for a group of young environmental leaders. TRACKS facilitated a Cultural Humility workshop at the event.













YOUTH PROGRAMS


During the summer of 2024, our Youth Programs team grew with the addition of 9 Indigenous high school Trailblazers! Our Trailblazer Summer Employment program provides part-time summer employment for Indigenous youth during July and August. During their time as a Trailblazer, they receive teachings and mentorship from TRACKS staff, local Indigenous Elders, and Knowledge Holders.

By the end of the summer, the youth took some of the knowledge they learned, and with support from TRACKS staff, they paired up to prepare one of four Trailblazer Land Camps for other Indigenous youth in their community. All land camps are based around a Traditional Knowledge topic with teachings shared by an invited Elder or Knowledge Holders, as well as a craft or hands-on activity. In 2024, the topics were:
