It's been a transformative year here at TRACKS filled with learning, connection, and community. This year, we've run new school workshops, hosted a March Break Camp during sunny 15°C weather, gone voyageur canoeing with our summer Trailblazers, and strengthened our community connections to grow our summer camp programming. We have been continually awestruck by the passion, curiosity, and excitement of our participants and community. Chi miigwech to everyone who made our 2025 year an unforgettable one!

It was one of our busiest School Program seasons ever! We continued to offer experiential and land-based workshops that weave Indigenous knowledge and western science to schools throughout the Peterborough region. We also developed and ran new workshops that focused on the relationships and responsibilities that we share as modern technology and AI become bigger parts of our lives.

We ran P.A. Day camps, a full March Break Camp, and summer camps both on Trent's campus and in community. Our campers connected with the land, braided Indigenous Knowledges and western science, and learned from our Instructors and one another. Whether it was fire/ishkode teachings, roasting marshmallows, coding robots, or playing water games, campers came away with full hearts and new understandings of the world around them.

Our Oshkwazin Trailblazer youth program was another big success this past summer. The Trailblazers built their bundles, grew in their gifts, and learned how to be incredible environmental leaders in their community. Miigwech to Actua for supporting the Trailblazers through their accreditation.

Through all our programs, it's amazing to see youth learn, but it was also a privilege to see our staff act as such amazing role models and future leaders for the campers. Chi miigwech/thank you to all our staff, placement students, and volunteers for their hard work this year! We'd like to extend our gratitude as well to our Steering Team and Advisory Committee for their guidance and dedication in 2025. ABOUT TRACKS






TRACKS is an experiential program that braids multiple knowledges by centring Indigenous ways of knowing and being. We are based on Michi Saagiig Anishnaabeg territory, hosted by Trent University within the Indigenous Environmental Studies and Sciences Program (IESS)

PURPOSE STATEMENT

TRACKS facilitates dynamic, land-based youth programming that braids multiple scientific approaches by centering Indigenous ways of knowing and being.

PROGRAM INTENTIONS

-  To offer youth opportunities to actively engage with a multitude of worldviews to further understand and develop their personal skills, gifts, and tools.
-  To contribute to hands-on InSTEAM (Indigenous Science Technology Engineering Art and Math) learning opportunities from the elementary to post-secondary level.
-  To facilitate spaces where intergenerational knowledge can be shared and mentoring relationships can be nurtured.
-  To provide spaces where youth can be empowered to build relationships, learn together, and grow as leaders while honouring their diverse identities and backgrounds.
-  To encourage youth to deepen reciprocal relationships with their environments and embody understandings of their responsibilities to the land.
-  To collaborate with Indigenous Peoples, school boards and community organizations to strengthen relationships and activate culturally responsive learning opportunities.
-  To foster meaningful employment and volunteer experiences for young people interested in land-centric and InSTEAM work.

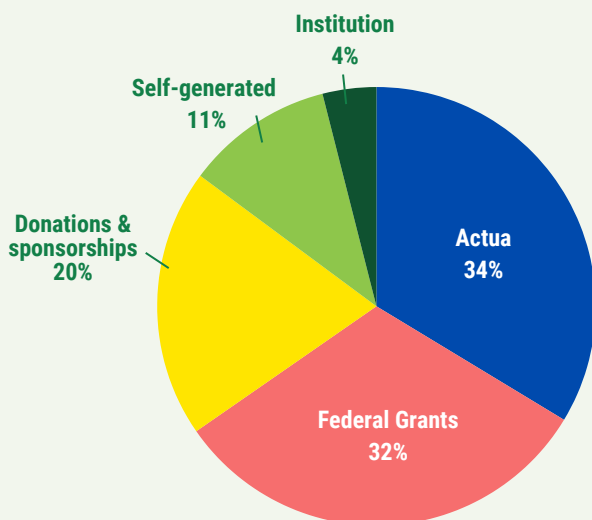

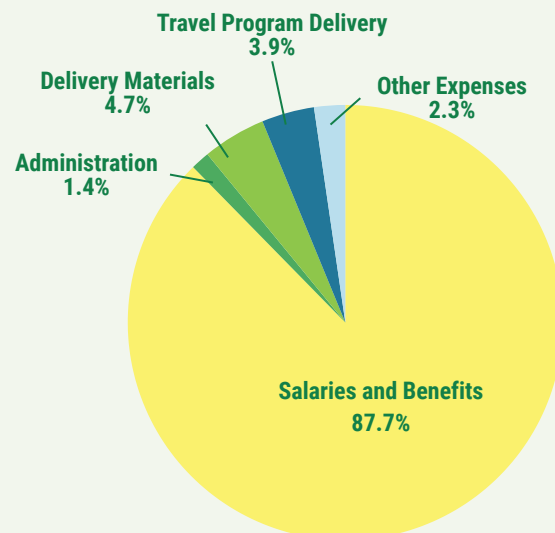

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025 SCHOOL PROGRAMS

It was a year of innovation for School Programs. Our Instructors travelled throughout the Peterborough region to deliver workshops to Indigenous and non-Indigenous students in schools, libraries and with community groups. We led old favourites like Toppling Towers and Manoomin Coding Connections. We also ran a new 3-workshop series funded by **TELUS, TELUS Friendly Future Foundation** and **TD FEF** that teaches Anishinaabemowin, relationships with forest beings, and coding.

Thanks to funding from **Actua** via the Government of Canada's Cancode program, we were able to offer several Indigenous science & digital skills-based workshops for free. With their help we also developed two new workshops:

- **AI and Us:** explore how humans, as part of the natural world, affect the environment in negative and positive ways when we use AI.
- **Feasting Frenzy:** students learn how Indigenous food systems are connected to the land, water, weather, and animal life and how modern tools like AI can both support and harm community decision-making.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025 SCHOOL PROGRAMS

TRACKS partnered with the Trent School of Education to teach prospective teachers how to bring Indigenous Knowledge to the classroom, as well as the environmental and social impacts of Artificial Intelligence.

We worked again with the TEACH Outside the Box program, a unique opportunity for teacher candidates and community educators to participate in a series of interactive workshops centred around social justice. TRACKS shared their knowledge of Indigenous ways of teaching and knowing and hosted community placement students.



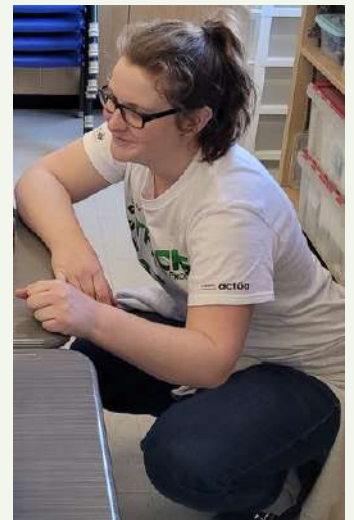

In October, TRACKS participated in a Land-Based Learning Conference hosted by Durham District School Board and Beedahbin Peltier. The goal was to support teachers who wish to further their journey in incorporating Indigenous Land Based Learning into their practice, while being mindful of cultural appropriation and recognizing the western institution in which they work.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025 CAMP PROGRAMS

In 2025, TRACKS ran a March Break camp, two 5-day summer camps, and 4 P.A. Day Camps for 6-to-12 year old children in Peterborough. Two of these P.A. Day Camps were done in collaboration with community partners: **Boodweh Centre for Indigenous Knowledges and Languages** joined us for our April P.A. Day Camp and **Diverse Nature Collective** for our Black youth in STEM P.A. Day.

During our camps, we explained how Indigenous Knowledge and western science can work together with hands on activities and games such as the 3 Sisters, soil, Water Teachings, Shkode and Ode'min.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025 CAMP PROGRAMS

As we do every year, TRACKS hosted camps in First Nation communities near Peterborough. This year we visited Alderville First Nation, Hiawatha First Nation, and Curve Lake First Nation. In these camps we ran activities where campers learned about coding and Anishinaabemowin, the relationships between different beings in the forest, the Three Sisters, and other themes.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025 YOUTH PROGRAMS

During the summer of 2025, our Youth Programs team grew with the addition of 8 Indigenous high school Trailblazers! Our Trailblazer Summer Employment program provides part-time summer employment for Indigenous youth during July and August. They also receive teachings and mentorship from TRACKS staff, local Indigenous Elders, and Knowledge Holders. This year, Trailblazers participated in a 4-day land-based Medicine Camp, with teachings from Edna Manitowabi and Beedahbin Peltier.

By the end of the summer, the youth took some of the knowledge they learned, and with support from TRACKS staff, they paired up to prepare land camps for other Indigenous youth in their community. All land camps are based around a Traditional Knowledge topic with teachings shared by an invited Elder or Knowledge Holders, as well as a craft or hands-on activity. In 2025, the topics were:

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025 YOUTH PROGRAMS

In 2025, TRACKS ran exciting and immersive Youth Programs including an Anishinaabemowin & coding activity at the Purple Woods Maple Syrup Festival, the Peterborough Regional Science Fair and the Indigenous Peoples Day Celebration at the Ontario Science Center. We also ran our River Race workshop at the Peterborough Children's Water Festival, Durham Water Festival, and during the Lessons from The Land event organized by the New Canadians Centre. We also connected with Indigenous Youth at the Urban Indigenous Health Fair.



HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025

TIPI CANVAS REPLACEMENT

With support from the **Community Foundation of Greater Peterborough**, our tipi canvas was replaced in June by Sewn Home. TRACKS and Camp Kawartha teams were involved during the process and learned more about how to care for our tipi.

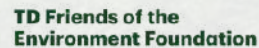
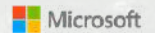
