Soccer player gets bond over assault

WANGARATTA City soccer player Mario Antonello was last week found quilty of unlawful assault against 16-year-old Albury player Tanner

Magistrate Stella Stuthridge placed the 32-yearold on a good behaviour bond and ordered him to pay Melbourne's Royal Children's Hospital \$750 following a hearing into an on-field incident in July last year.

No conviction was recorded

Antonello claimed that Tanner had been abusing him during a reserves' match when the assault took place.

Antonello had stepped on his opponent's foot but claimed he had no intention of injuring Tanner.

The court also heard that Antonello had shouldered Tanner in the back.

Ms Stuthridge dismissed charges against Antonello of recklessly or intentionally causing serious injury.
