Top 10 Grantmaking Charities and Trusts in the UK

Whilst it appears to be human nature to leave work until the last minute you should be wary of the grant deadlines set by funders. According to the European Foundation Centre, the UK has approximately 8,800 public benefit foundations whose total expenditure is £2.1 billion. The following is a list of the top ten UK charities and trusts providing grants to [NGOs](#) in the UK and internationally. The following [entries](#) are ranked based on the size of the [Foundation's](#) total annual grantmaking:

1. [Big Lottery Fund](#): The Fund is responsible for allocating charitable funds raised by the National Lottery, amounting to nearly £600 million each year towards programmes in [health](#), [education](#), and [environment](#). Big Lottery Fund's International Communities programme has a [budget](#) of up to £80 million available to UK charities working with disadvantaged communities overseas.
2. [The Wellcome Trust](#): was established in 1936 as an independent charity [funding research](#) to improve human and animal [health](#). It has an endowment of around £14.5 billion. Now in its 77th year, the aim of the Trust is to “achieve extraordinary improvements in health by supporting the brightest minds”, and in addition to funding biomedical research it supports the public understanding of science
3. [The Sainsbury Family Charitable Trusts](#): Established by three generations of Sainsbury family members, the 18 grant-making trusts of the Sainsbury Family Charitable Trusts collectively provide over £114 million in grants annually. While all 18 trusts are administered through a single office, each trust has its own board of trustees and clearly defined areas of interests. The top Sainsbury Family Charitable Trusts by total annual grantmaking are: the Gatsby Charitable Foundation, Monument Trust, and Linbury Trust.
4. [The Wolfson Foundation](#): founded in 1935, the Foundation has awarded over £750 million in grants, supporting over 10,000 projects. The Foundation makes grants through both open and closed programs, primarily for capital infrastructure to support excellence in the fields of science & medicine, health, art & humanities and education. The majority of Wolfson Foundation grants are made to [organisations](#) in the UK.

5. The [Garfield Weston Foundation](#) was established in 1958 by Willard Garfield Weston, a Canadian businessman who moved to the [UK](#) with his family in 1932. as established in 1958 by Willard Garfield Weston, a Canadian businessman [who](#) moved to the [UK](#) with his family in 1932. The Foundation is reported to have an endowment of at least \$6.5 billion. he Foundation aims to be responsive to where need is greatest, supporting a wide range of charitable activity rather than having specific priorities for funding. The Foundation currently only [support](#) organisations and projects based in the [United Kingdom](#).
6. [Comic Relief](#): this charity was created in 1985 and has since raised over £900 million to fight poverty and social injustice in the UK and the world's poorest countries. Comic Relief's International Grants programme focuses on seven goals, with most of its funding going to sub-Saharan [Africa](#): improved health for [women](#) and [children](#); access to education; social inclusion of women and girls; improved quality of life for slum dwellers; opportunities for children and [youth](#) at risk; improved quality of life for people affected by [HIV](#); and income improvement through trade, enterprise and [employment](#).
7. [Vodafone Foundation](#): the Foundation invests in the communities where the company operates through 28 local foundations and social investment programmes. The vision of the Foundation is to use their innovative mobile technology in mobilising social change and improving people's lives. Vodafone Foundation is committed to projects in disaster relief and preparation.
8. [Tearfund](#): an Evangelical Christian grantmaking organization committed to poverty relief; overseas development; and overcoming climate change, HIV, injustice, disasters, and conflict. The Fund works in the UK, Africa, [Latin America](#) & the [Caribbean](#), and [Asia](#), providing grants of up to £22 million
9. [Sigrid Rausing Trust](#): a [UK grant](#) making [foundation](#), founded in 1995 by Sigrid Rausing to [support human rights](#) globally. Since then, the Trust has given away approximately £191.9 million to human [rights](#) organisations all over the world.
The 2013 Trust budget is £22.5 million.
10. [Arcadia Fund](#): formerly the Lisbet Rausing Charitable Fund, this grantmaking fund has awarded over \$243 million in grants since its establishment in 2001. The primary vision of the Fund is to protect endangered nature and culture, including near extinct languages, rare historical archives and museum quality artifacts, and endangered species and ecosystems.

BBC Children In Need Main Grants Programme

Grants for not-for-profit organisations that are working with disadvantaged children and young people aged up to 18 years and living in the UK.

Every year the BBC dedicates one evening of appeal programming to showcase events aimed at raising money for charities working with young people in the UK. BBC Children in Need's focus is firmly on children and young people experiencing disadvantage. They fund organisations working to combat this disadvantage and to make a real difference to children and young people's lives.

The Trust distributes the funds raised each year as grants to organisations that work with disadvantaged children and young people, under the age of 18, living in the UK.

Grants of over £10,000 per year are available to support projects for up to three years. The average grant is likely to be around £30,000 per year. Applications cannot be made for more than £40,000 per year. It is highly unlikely that grants exceeding £100,000 in total for three years will be awarded.

Who Can Apply?

Registered not-for-profit organisations who work with disadvantaged children and young people of 18 years and under living in the UK, the Isle of Man or the Channel Islands are eligible to apply.

The following organisations can apply:

- Community interest companies (CIC)
- Companies limited by guarantee (CLG) including social enterprises
- Housing associations
- Industrial and provident community benefit society
- Registered charities
- Religious institution
- Special schools (These are provisions for children with learning difficulties or disabilities which cannot be met within a mainstream setting.)

Applicants must be able to state why they are best placed to make a difference to the lives of disadvantaged children and young people, including:

- Their well-established links with young people.
- The skills and expertise they have for the work they are requesting funding for.
- Their track record delivering the work they are requesting funding for. This is especially important for applicants for the Main Grants Programme.
- How they work alongside other organisations in their local community.

To be eligible, applicants must

- Have a governing body, such as a Board of Trustees, with at least three members.
- Be able to provide a set of their most recent signed accounts in their organisation's name.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding is available to organisations that are supporting children and young people of 18 years and under who are experiencing disadvantage through:

- Illness, distress, abuse or neglect.
- Any kind of disability.
- Behavioural or psychological difficulties.
- Living in poverty or situations of deprivation.

The funding is for projects that make differences in children's lives that help prevent or overcome the effects of the disadvantages they face. Projects achieve these differences by either working directly with children or seeking to improve their social and physical environments.

Applicants must have a clear plan for the activities and the differences these activities make for children and young people. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the funder has temporarily broadened the types of applications it is accepting. Currently funding is being offered that can be used more flexibly than usual.

Applications are encouraged for:

- Project delivery (including staffing and salary costs)
- Creative solutions to deliver much needed services
- Organisational costs to support stability and adaptation. (Including the day-to-day running costs of an organisation as opposed to specific project costs)

All applications will have to show how this funding will make a difference to children and young people's lives during this crisis. Applications are not limited to one specific project and a request can be made for organisational running costs. The funder is committed to supporting voluntary groups with these types of grants.

How to Apply

The online application form can be found on the BBC Children in Need website. Applicants should refer to the A-Z Guidance document before making an application. Once the deadline has passed, the application form will be deactivated until the next round opens.

The Main Grants 2021 programme has reopened for applications and will close at 11.30am on 23 August 2021 for decisions in late January 2022.

Black and Minoritised Community Charities and Groups to Benefit from New £50m Partnership

The National Lottery Community Fund and The Ubele Initiative, on behalf of The Phoenix Way Partners, have jointly announced a new £50 million partnership aimed to boost funding and support to Black and Minoritised Community charities and grassroots groups over the next five years.

'The Phoenix Way' will create a series of national and regional panels, made of leaders and decision-makers from Black and Minoritised Community-led charities and grassroots groups from across England.

The Phoenix Way National Steering Group will work with The National Lottery Community Fund to identify national and regional priorities and award funding to Black and Minoritised community-led charities and grassroots groups that are best placed to support their communities to thrive.

The new initiative will help to facilitate engagement with Black and Minoritised community-led charities and grassroots groups to enable them to access funding and support that have previously failed to reach them and have been difficult for them to access.

Operational details of The Phoenix Way programme will be designed and developed over the summer – with the aim of awarding funding, from Autumn 2021. Commenting on the new initiative, The Ubele Initiative Founder and CEO, Yvonne Field said:

“This £50 million investment in The Phoenix Way allows partners to connect directly with those with lived experience of racism and racial disparities and work together to offer innovative and creative funding opportunities in response to identified challenges.

“The Phoenix Way will also facilitate the deepening of a unique collaborative approach, which emerged during COVID-19, and to work together to transform systems of funding, decision-making, and support to Black and Minoritised communities and organisations over the next five years.

“We will develop national and regional priorities, and decision-making will primarily take place at the regional level in response to these priorities.”

Santander Foundation – Financial and Digital Empowerment Fund

Grants are available to UK charitable organisations for projects to improve people's digital confidence, knowledge and skills to enable them to make more informed decisions about money and have access to financial services.

Santander Foundation is providing and administering this fund to help people become digitally and financially empowered. The purpose of the fund is to support charitable organisations that are working with people in society who are experiencing disadvantage - whether through age, education, income, disability or unemployment - to equip them with improved digital and financial literacy skills.

In 2021 the fund has a total value of £1.8 million. The programme will provide 12 grants of up to a total of £150,000 per organisation. Grants are for a period of three years. Successful applicants may request differing amounts in each of the three years, with a minimum of £25,000 in any one year. Santander Foundation aims to fund no more than 40% of an organisation's income in any one year.

Who Can Apply?

Applications will be accepted from charitable and social enterprise organisations with an annual income above £75k. Priority will be given to small and medium-sized organisations with an income of less than £2m. Applicants must:

- Be based in the UK and working within one of the nations or regions.
- Be a UK registered charity or Community Interest Company.
- Have at least three unconnected Trustees, Directors or Management Committee members.
- Have a bank account in the organisation's name with at least two unconnected signatories.
- Have been operating for at least 18 months and have at least one set of annual accounts.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding is intended for initiatives that improve people's digital skills and financial literacy.

National Heritage Memorial Fund – COVID-19 Response Fund

Grants are available to community and public sector organisations in the UK for projects to protect nationally important heritage assets that are at risk due to the impact of coronavirus (COVID-19). The COVID-19 Response Fund is a £40 million fund being distributed by the National Heritage Memorial Fund (NHMF). The purpose of the fund is to help safeguard and save the UK's most important heritage assets which are in jeopardy due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The fund comprises two lots of £20 million:

- NHMF – Funding available to applicants from across the UK.
- Cultural Assets Fund – Funding to safeguard nationally important heritage assets within England.

The fund has a total value of £40 million. There are no minimum or maximum levels of grant. However, NHMF operates as a fund of last resort - applicants must show that they have explored, or are exploring, all other possible sources of funding, including their own resources.

Who can Apply?

Applications will be accepted from charities, non-profit organisations and public sector organisations with responsibility for an asset of outstanding importance to the UK's national heritage which is at risk due to the impact of coronavirus (COVID-19).

Eligible Expenditure

Funding is intended to support any heritage asset which is of outstanding importance to the national heritage and at risk due to the impact of COVID-19, including: works of fine and decorative art; museum collections; archives; manuscripts; items of industrial, transport and maritime heritage; historic buildings and land. Eligible costs and activities include:

- Acquisition/ purchase costs, including associated professional fees.
- Transport costs, including handling, packing, costs for large items/ historic vehicles.
- Interim storage costs and investment in new permanent storage capacity.
- Urgent conservation work necessary due to COVID-19 impact and investment to resolve maintenance backlog/ deficit, collection care costs.
- Condition surveys, cataloguing, management and conservation planning.
- Professional fees, including legal and other fees to support asset transfer.
- Ownership transition costs – fixed term support to enable rehoming of heritage asset.
- Organisational development costs to support asset transfer, skills development/ capacity building; business review and business planning support.

How to Apply

The first step is to submit an Expression of Interest. Eligible applicants will then be invited to submit a full application. Applications must be submitted using the online grants portal available at the NHMF website: <https://www.nhmf.org.uk/funding/covid-19-response-fund>

ROOKHOW has been awarded £10,000 from the Quaker Mental Health Fund UK over two years to support residentials and therapeutic work with people with mental health problems. Our first round of applications has funded: Lighthouse Community Mental Health Hub, Well Minds, Vision of Adventure, The Well Communities, Mind over Mountains, Kent Estuary Youth and Home2Work (Cleator Moor).

The fund would pay for day use of Rookhow's meeting space and woodland (including yurt) or a residential in the 16 bed bunkbarn (2 nights minimum). You can apply for 100% funding or a contribution. We would obviously like the grant to be spread widely, so if you can cover part of your stay, the fund will go further. As weekends are busy, we'd especially welcome applications for mid-week bookings. We will accept applications from previous applicants.

Cumbrian Organisations encouraged to apply for Tesco Community Grants

Applications from Cumbrian organisations are being strongly encouraged by Groundwork, who are administering the fund.

There are currently two priorities for Tesco Community Grants:

- Children and family activities
- Food poverty

No projects in South Cumbria have applied for food poverty priority and only few in North Cumbria (Carlisle).

Tesco Community Grants

Grants are available to non-profit making, constituted groups and organisations for local good causes that focus on supporting children and families in the UK. The Tesco Community Grants programme supports local good causes across the UK. Since it launched in 2016, the programme has supported more than 36,000 community groups with more than £85 million in grants. The scheme aims to make a positive difference to Tesco communities.

Funding in 2021 is aimed at projects that focus on supporting children and families within the UK. This could be for example a local school needing food for a children's breakfast club, a voluntary organisation working with families to run holiday clubs, a charity supporting young people with specialist advice to manage mental health, a brownie or scout group needing new tents or a youth sports club needing new equipment, a family advice centre wanting to recruit more volunteers, or a local 'friends of a park' group wanting to develop a new toddler area. Tesco's funding has supported thousands of local community projects across the UK, helping to fight holiday hunger, tackle mental health, support young people, host community events and much more.

Three projects in 575 local communities are voted on by customers in Tesco stores throughout the UK, with projects changing every three months. Customers are given a blue token when they buy their shopping that they can use to make their choice using the voting units in most stores.

Three levels of grants are awarded with projects receiving:

- First place (the most votes in its area) - a grant of up to £1,500.
- Second place - a grant of up to £1,000.
- Third place - a grant of up to £500.

Who Can Apply?

Not-for-profit organisations in the UK can apply if they are constituted and have a governing document. This includes:

- Voluntary and community organisations.
- Registered charities.
- Community Interest Companies with guarantees that are less than two years old.
- Friends of groups.
- Social enterprise
- Industrial Provident Society.
- Schools.
- Health bodies such as a Clinical Commissioning Groups, NHS Hospital Trust, Foundation Trust.
- Parish, Town, or Community Councils.
- Local Authorities.
- Hospices
- Day care centres
- Housing associations.

New extra requirements have been introduced for 2021. All applicants must now provide identification to support their application. As part of the updated grant administration process, applicants are now being asked for ID verification checks if their organisation is NOT a registered charity or a registered company, OR if they are NOT a public sector organisation.

Proof of name and proof of address is now required from the main contact of the application. The second contact in the application MUST be a bank account signatory for the organisation account, or for the organisation that is being used if using an Accountable Body.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding to support local good causes that focus on supporting children and families. Examples include:

- Breakfast clubs.
- Holiday clubs.
- Food banks.
- Equipment or non-statutory services for nurseries or schools e.g. forest schools, library books
- Equipment for Brownie, Guide or Scout Groups e.g. camping equipment, badges
- Environmental improvements
- Play areas
- Counselling and support services
- Activities to support mental health
- Activities or equipment to reduce social isolation
- Equipment/kit for sports teams
- Services or equipment to support health issues such as cancer or dementia
- Equipment for village/ community halls

The funding is for projects that are ready to be delivered, but it will not cover retrospective costs (already committed or spent such as design fees, planning permissions costs or community consultation).

How To Apply

This is a rolling programme and applications can be made at any time. Groups can also reapply at any time. The application process is as follows. Groups should:

- Read the guidance notes and FAQ document before starting the application process.
- Find their local store. This can be done by entering their project's postcode into the store locator on the Tesco website: <https://tescocommunitygrants.org.uk/>. This information is required for the application form.
- Complete the eligibility checker.

Eligible organisations can apply online for a grant, applications are assessed and shortlisted. Every three months successful shortlisted applications are put into a customer vote in Tesco stores across the UK. Contact Groundwork Tesco Programme Team for further information. Cumbria Community Foundation

Cumbria Community Foundation (CCF) manages over 100 different grant making funds. They distribute funding for Trusts and Foundations, as well as helping the public sector and central government distribute funding to VCFSEs across Cumbria.

CCF's current grant making priorities as identified in the [Cumbria Revealed](#) report are:

- **Improving the lives of disadvantaged children and families.**
- Improving the life skills, education, employability and enterprise of disadvantaged people.
- Supporting vulnerable older people.
- Improving the health and well-being of the people of Cumbria.
- Strengthening and supporting fragile communities.
- Enabling people to access arts, sports, culture, heritage and the environment.

Friends of the Lake District Landscape Grants

Financial support for projects and events that celebrate, care for or enhance the landscape, environment and cultural heritage of Cumbria.

Funding is available for constituted community groups, charities, not for profit organisations and schools. They can fund small scale projects and works that will conserve and enhance the landscape as well as events and activities that connect people with it and their enjoyment of it.

Grants of up to £1,000 are available for landscape enhancements.

Larger awards of up to £2,000 will be considered but you will need to contact them prior to application. Grant awards of up to £500 are available for events.

25% match funding is required – cash or volunteer time. Applications can be submitted at any time. Projects must demonstrate a clear and positive benefit to the landscape of Cumbria.

National Lottery and DCMS – Local Connections Fund

Grants are available for small local voluntary, community and social enterprise organisations working to reduce loneliness and isolation by bringing people and communities together.

The Department for Digital, Culture, Media & Sport (DCMS) and The National Lottery Community Fund are investing £2 million each in the new Local Connections Fund for England. There will be two funding rounds in 2021 with £2 million available for each round. The National Lottery Community Fund is providing £2 million for the second round (summer 2021). The total budget is £4 million which will be divided into £2 million per round. The budget will be split between regions according to population. Grants of between £300 and £2,500 are available.

Objectives of Fund

The fund aims to help charities and community groups in England that are working to reduce loneliness by helping them build connections across their communities. The focus for the second round is changing to reflect the easing of COVID-19 restrictions across the country. The funding is aimed at bringing people together in safe and secure ways, making people aware of what services are available to reduce loneliness and to build lasting connections. The National Lottery Community Fund wants to hear directly from organisations about who in their community needs additional assistance.

Who Can Apply?

Applications will be accepted from constituted voluntary, community and social enterprise organisation that serves communities within England.

To be eligible, applicants must have an annual income of £50,000 or less and be one of the following:

- A voluntary or community organisation
- A registered charity
- A not-for-profit company or Community Interest Company
- A faith group as long as the funding is not for religious activities.
- A constituted group or club
- A parish council
- A community benefit society

Any community groups and charities that received a Local Connections Fund grant during the first round of funding will not be eligible for funding during the second round of applications.

Eligible Expenditure

The funding is to be used to:

- Build relationships in and across communities to help reduce loneliness and build connections between people and communities.
- Bring together organisations who are working on social connections to celebrate their work, share learning and best practice, and form/bring together peer networks.

This is to help make:

- People and communities feel more connected.
- Individuals feel supported and less lonely or isolated.
- People more aware of services available that help them to connect with others and get involved.

Round 2 will focus on:

- Activities that physically bring people together in a safe and secure way.
- Remote activities (when this is the best or only way for people to build connections) - for example, remote activities may benefit people who are geographically isolated, people with illnesses or disabilities, or those who are not quite ready to meet people in face-to-face settings.
- Helping individuals to get out of the 'lockdown mentality' and meet people in their communities again for activities which will be a positive experience for people.
- Helping organisations who work to reduce loneliness restart their activities - for example, getting volunteers or service users to clean and refresh their meeting spaces or grounds, or refreshing materials, and ensuring equipment is ready to be used.

The funding can be used for staff salaries, volunteer expenses, management costs, monitoring and evaluation, overheads, general project costs, small items of equipment, like a laptop.

Projects for Round 2 must be completed, and the grant spent by 30 November 2021.

Banister Charitable Trust

Grants are available to charitable organisations that are working to promote the conservation, protection and improvement of the physical and natural environment in the UK.

The Banister Charitable Trust is a registered charity. The funding is for work that meets the charity's objects which are to:

- Promote the conservation, protection and improvement of the physical and natural environment.
- Further such other purpose or purposes which are exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales in such manner as the Trustees may in their absolute discretion think fit.

Around £1.3 million was awarded in grants last year. Funding is at the discretion of the Trustees. Grants tend to be in the £5,000 to £50,000 range, with a few lower or higher grants awarded.

Who Can Apply?

Applications will be considered from UK registered charities whose core purposes meet the Trust's objectives which are the promotion, conservation, protection and improvement of the physical and natural environment in the UK.

Eligible Expenditure

The funding is intended to be used for charitable projects that promote the conservation, protection and improvement of the physical and natural environment in the UK.

In the past, this has included:

- The purchase of land
- Improving access to a nature reserve
- Creating a lakeside path
- Orchard projects
- Protecting and recovering threatened plant species
- Habitat restoration.
- Conservation, research and education
- Education centre gardens and wildlife areas.
- Bird boxes for churches and village halls.
- Volunteering projects.

The DWF Charitable Foundation

One-off grants are available to registered charities in the UK for projects that address issues of homelessness, employability, education and health and wellbeing.

The DWF Charitable Foundation, a registered charity was founded by the legal business DWF LLP with the vision to encourage all of its people to work together as a catalyst for change.

The DWF Foundation will provide funds, resources and support to help communities achieve their full potential. The Foundation's work focuses on the issues of homelessness, health and wellbeing, employability and education. Funding is usually at the discretion of the Foundation. However, as a result of demand for funding, the maximum grant is £5,000.

The Foundation has been set up to help with initiatives that develop and improve local communities by:

- Tackling a specific community issue.
- Helping voluntary and community groups become more effective and efficient.
- Encouraging the involvement in the community of those too often excluded.
- **Enabling young people to develop skills for the benefit of the community.**

Who Can Apply?

The Edward Gostling Foundation

Grants are available to support people of all ages living on low incomes who have a physical and/or mental disability or long-term illness.

The Edward Gostling Foundation (formerly the ACT Foundation) provides grants to UK charities with the aim of enhancing the quality of life for people in need, specifically those on low income who have a physical or mental disability or those with long-term illness.

Two funding streams are now available:

- **Fast Track Grants** of less than £5,000 available to charities with an annual income of less than £3million.
- **Capital Grants** more than £5,000 available to charities with annual income <£5million.

Who Can Apply?

UK registered charities that have been registered for at least three years. Charities requesting over £10,000 may be visited as part of the Foundation's due diligence. While there is no restriction as to the size of the charitable organisation that can apply, priority will be given to small to medium size charities who are making a significant impact in their community and who may lack the time and resources to be able to focus on their fundraising.

Applications must address at least one of the four themes of the Foundation:

- **Health and wellbeing:** to maintain, improve and advance the health and welfare of people living with disabilities and/ or long-term illnesses.
- **Independent living at home:** to support people who wish to remain living in their own home for as long as is practically possible.
- **Respite:** either for the person living with a disability (or long-term illnesses) or the carer to access sports and leisure activities or simply enjoy fun, friendship and the opportunity to socialise and share with others who may be in a similar situation.
- **Transition:** provide fundamental life skills and infrastructure to allow people to reach their full potential in all areas of life and to become a valued member of their local community.

Eligible Expenditure

The funding is for projects that make a transformational change and have a high level of impact on individuals, their families and communities. Some examples of funded activities include:

- Information providing, guidance, advice, training and moral and emotional support to individuals and their families and carers.
- Centres that provide clinical services including therapies and medical provision (e.g. physiotherapy, oxygen therapy, pilates etc. access to counselling and early intervention services).
- Independent hospices and care homes.
- Safe and independent access around the home.
- Equipment to aid getting in and out of chairs, beds and bathrooms easily and independently.
- Communication and access to the external community.
- People to go outside, use community facilities and generally enjoy and feel part of family life.
- Respite costs e.g. sports or leisure activities, short breaks.
- Education, training, coaching and development to promote independent living and/or support to help people into paid work, vocational services or volunteering.
- Affordable housing and/or supported living in the local community.
- Day services supporting people with general life skills e.g. computing, cooking, arts and crafts.

VocTech Challenge Grant Fund

Grants are available for projects that use digital technology to address barriers and build bridges to create a step-change in adult vocational learning in the UK.

The Ufi Charitable Trust was set up to address what it sees as a chronic skills deficit in the UK, coupled with high unemployment and a large number of people who remain digitally excluded. The Challenge Grant Fund is focused on adults impacted by the digital divide and furthest away from learning so they can gain the confidence they need to get the skills they need for work.

This call is for projects that address the VocTech Challenge: "How can VocTech address barriers and build bridges to create a step-change in learner confidence and motivation, leading to better outcomes for the learner, for the employer and for society as a whole?"

The initiative seeks to support projects that use digital technology to address barriers and build bridges to create a step-change in adult vocational learning in the UK.

The fund offers applicants an initial £10,000 grant for the Define phase, followed by:

- Ufi VocTech Activate - grants of between £15,000 and £50,000 to test early stage ideas.
- Ufi VocTech Impact - grants of up to £150,000 for VocTech solutions which can deliver benefit to a large number of learners.

Who Can Apply?

Applications will be accepted from:

- Entrepreneurs, teams or organisations that want to apply their talent and technology to address UK vocational learning issues.
- Start-ups, early-stage ventures or teams working within an existing large organisation and looking to develop a radically new approach.

Organisations must be registered, including registered charities, community interest companies, social enterprises, not-for-profits, private companies, community associations, FE colleges and public bodies.

Eligible projects must have an impact on learners disproportionately affected by the digital divide and further exposed by the COVID-19 pandemic and be able to evidence their choice of user group on that basis. To do this, projects must have already done some initial discovery thinking to build relationships with a group or groups of learners that can be evidenced to be experiencing digital disadvantage and have clear issues of lack of confidence at some point in the journey into work.

Projects must use digital vocational technology do one or more of the following:

- Support learners who are not engaged in any vocational learning to take steps to develop their skills by overcoming confidence and motivational barriers.
- Build learner confidence and motivation to access and make progress in their vocational learning.
- Build learner confidence and skills to become more independent learners and support a culture of lifelong learning.
- Target known user barriers to learning, offering new pathways and bridges into learning.

Eligible Expenditure

Eligible projects are those that fall under the two parts of which the programme is comprised:

- Part A - a funded and supported design thinking element, the 'Define Stage Gateway'.
- Part B - funding for delivery of a VocTech Activate or a VocTech Impact project.

Access to Part B is only available to projects who engage fully in the design thinking element and have a clear, user centred plan at the end of that phase that is ready for immediate development.

The funding is available to try out new ideas to improve teaching and learning in schools and help the best ideas grow to scale. The funding aims to address the following priorities:

- Ready for School: improving the school readiness of children during the reception year, with a priority focus on language and communication skills (age 4-5)
- Bridging the Gap: supporting vulnerable children who may not meet Age Related Expectations at primary school to make better academic progress during Key Stage 3 (age 9-14)
- Flying High: supporting high attaining students to build on their achievements at primary school and stay on a high attaining trajectory during the first few years at secondary school (age 9-14).
- The funding is being made available through the educational charity Shine and funding decisions are made four times a year typically in March, June, September and December.
