

**VILLAGE OF PEMBERVILLE
COUNCIL MEETING
March 3, 2026**

Mayor Bailey opened March 3, 2026, Council meeting at 7:00pm with a prayer and the pledge of allegiance.

Roll Call: Present at the scheduled meeting of the Council were Wozniak, Bohland, Boyer, Kirkbride, Rahe, Rollins. Others present were Chief Vaughn, Eric Campbell, Denny Henline, Marcia Cousino, Kim Long, Rob Boyer, Sarah Enright, Mr & Mrs. Molina, and the Fiscal Officer.

Minutes: Wozniak moved, and Bohland seconded to approve the minutes of the February 17, 2026, meeting. Motion passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report: Kirkbride moved, and Rollins seconded to approve the bills in the amount of \$5,697.35. Motion passed unanimously. (attached)
Rahe requested that Chief Vaughn remind the Council about the purpose of the NORIS system. Chief Vaughn explained that NORIS is utilized by the department to run investigative leads, such as checking license plates and other related information.

RESOLUTION 800: A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR OF THE VILLAGE OF PEMBERVILLE TO APPLY FOR, ACCEPT, AND ENTER INTO A COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE DOWNTOWN BUSINESS ALLEY WATERLINE REPLACEMENT BETWEEN CEDAR STREET AND PINE STREET, BETWEEN THE VILLAGE OF PEMBERVILLE AND THE OHIO WATER DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. 1ST READING (attached)

ORDINANCE 1707: ORDINANCE TO MAKE PERMANENT APPROPRIATIONS FOR CURRENT EXPENSES AND OTHER EXPENDITURES OF THE VILLAGE OF PEMBERVILLE, STATE OF OHIO, DURING THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2026. 1ST READING (attached)

ORDINANCE 1708: AN ORDINANCE APPROVING, ADOPTING AND ENACTING AMERICAN LEGAL PUBLISHING'S OHIO BASIC CODE, 2026 EDITION, AS THE CODE OR ORDINANCE FOR THE MUNICIPALITY OF PEMBERVILLE, OHIO. 1ST READING. (attached)

Police Activity Report: Report provided.

Chief addressed Council over concerns raised by residents regarding the use of engine brakes by semi-trucks traveling through the village. Chief informed the Council that a law exists prohibiting semi-trucks from utilizing their engine brakes within municipal boundaries, as this practice can cause excessive noise and disrupt the community.

Chief proposed reaching out to the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) to request the installation of "No Engine Braking" signs. These signs would help enforce the law and remind truck drivers to refrain from using engine brakes while passing through town.

Kirkbride moved and Boyer seconded to authorize Chief to proceed with discussions with ODOT regarding the placement of the signs. The motion was passed unanimously.

Mayor:

Mayor informed Council that she had shared a community email from Eastwood Superintendent Brian Hughes. She emphasized the portion of the email that addressed the overall condition of the elementary building and the anticipated costs required to restore the building for re-entry. According to the superintendent, the estimated cost begins at approximately \$850,000. The largest projected expenses include roof replacement of approximately \$325,000, drainage improvements approximately \$150,000, and plumbing approximately \$113,000. This figure does not account for the potential of additional repairs to plumbing hidden within the walls, which may become apparent once the water service is restored.

Mayor also reported that she spoke directly with Mr. Hughes to better understand the school district's position on whether they will proceed with repairs or consider abandoning the building. At present, the school district remains in the discussion phase, and no final decision has been reached regarding the future of the elementary school. The Council was advised that updates would be provided as further information becomes available. (email attached)

The Mayor provided an update to Council regarding the Mass Notification system managed by the Wood County Emergency Management Agency. She informed Council that the agency has transitioned from the CodeRed system to Everbridge for emergency notifications. The conversion to Everbridge is now complete.

The Mayor explained that Everbridge offers enhanced functionality compared to the previous system. Specifically, Everbridge utilizes the location of an individual's cellular phone, enabling notifications to be sent based on the user's current geographic area. This means that regardless of where a person is located, they will receive emergency alerts pertinent to the area they are in at that moment.

Council Reports:

Wozniak:

Planning Commission: Wozniak stated the committee will meet on March 18th and will be discussing a list of issues that Campbell will provide for the committee to begin working through.

Rahe:

150/250 Celebration: No report

Safety Committee: Rahe reported that the Safety Committee recently convened to begin discussions concerning the Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area (DORA) and the requirements associated with its implementation. During the meeting, committee members worked on creating a proposed map outlining the boundaries for the designated DORA area. (attached)

Rahe further explained that she had met with two establishments holding liquor licenses, both of which expressed support for the DORA initiative. She also spoke with several other businesses, who similarly indicated their favor toward the proposal. To ensure broader input, a meeting has been scheduled for March 11th at 8:30 AM, where all local businesses will have the opportunity to share their perspectives and concerns regarding DORA.

Additional topics discussed included the elements of the DORA application process and the rules and regulations that must be adopted. The committee will review considerations such as the specific days and times DORA would be in effect, requirements for special cups, the boundaries of the designated area, and the protocol for businesses to display either "DORA Friendly" signs or "No DORA Establishment" signs, indicating their participation or non-participation in the DORA program.

Kirkbride:

Finance Committee: Kirkbride stated that Finance Committee met and discussed the 2026 Permanent Appropriations with the committee providing questions for clarification and understanding.

Tree Committee: Kirkbride reported that the March meeting had been cancelled and the next meeting is in April.

Pemberville Union Cemetery: Kirkbride stated that the committee meets on a quarterly basis and the next meeting is scheduled for March 17th at 5:45pm.

Boyer:

Streets, Sidewalks, Land & Buildings: Boyer reported that she sent an email containing bullet points related to the committee's ongoing matters. She noted that there was no new business to address at this time; the meeting focused solely on reviewing open business items. The next meeting will take place on March 12th at 7:00 PM.

BPA:

Boyer informed Council that BPA discussed several concerns related to the sewer plant. There is a recognized need to prioritize repairs and upgrades at the sewer plant to address these issues. Additionally, the importance of improving communication was emphasized.

BPA had its first reading to proceed with the acceptance of solar energy solutions.

Three proposals were submitted to BPA for installing a fence around the new water tower.

The Board is currently awaiting the hiring of a Solicitor before pursuing easements necessary for their projects.

Bohland:

Park & Recreation: Bohland reported the committee met on February 23rd. There was discussion regarding the water superintendent's workload during the opening of the pool and the help needed.

Other topics of discussion were the baseball field that needs restored from the water tower construction and the soccer field.

Eric Campbell: No report.

Rollins:

Records Retention: Rollins stated that no meeting has been scheduled but the committee will begin reviewing the Public Records Policy.

Personnel Committee: Rollins moved and Kirkbride seconded to go into executive session to consider the appointment of a Solicitor. Motion passed unanimously.

Entered executive session at 7:31pm.

Council resumed the regular council meeting at 8:00pm.

The Mayor announced the procedure for selecting the new Village solicitor, explaining that each council member would cast their vote for either Attorney James Barney or Attorney Kent Murphree during the roll call. The Fiscal Officer then conducted the roll call vote: Wozniak voted for Barney, while Bohland, Boyer, Kirkbride, Rahe, and Rollins voted for Murphree. With a total of five votes for Murphree and one for Barney, Attorney Kent Murphree was chosen to be offered the position of Village Solicitor.

Council specified the terms of the contract: they would like to establish a one-year agreement with a 90-day probationary period. After the first year, the contract would transition to a month-to-month basis. Additionally, the council requested a clause in the contract that allows either party to terminate services by providing a 90-day notice. The Mayor stated that she would contact Mr. Murphree the following day regarding the appointment.

Eastwood Families and Community,

As many of you are aware, the Pemberville Elementary building experienced significant flooding in January. Since that time, our maintenance team has worked diligently to gather information and fully assess the condition of the building. At Monday's Board of Education meeting, we shared an update on where things currently stand.

At this point, we know the overall condition of the building presents serious concerns. The estimated cost to restore the building to a point of re-entry begins at approximately **\$850,000**. The largest projected expenses include:

- Roof replacement – approximately \$325,000
- Drainage improvements – approximately \$150,000
- Plumbing – approximately \$113,000

These figures do not include potential additional repairs to plumbing within the walls once water service is restored. As you can see by the cost estimates below, the costs escalate quickly.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR OF THE VILLAGE OF PEMBERVILLE TO APPLY FOR, ACCEPT, AND ENTER INTO A COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE DOWNTOWN BUSINESS ALLEY WATERLINE REPLACEMENT BETWEEN CEDAR STREET AND PINE STREET, BETWEEN THE VILLAGE OF PEMBERVILLE AND THE OHIO WATER DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Village of Pemberville (hereinafter referred to as the “LGA”) is constructing a waterline replacement to improve system efficiency, pressure and fire flow; and

WHEREAS, the LGA desires to obtain a loan from the Ohio Water Development Authority (hereinafter referred to as the “OWDA”) to finance costs of the construction of such facilities on the terms set forth in the Cooperative Agreement (defined below); and

WHEREAS, the OWDA has indicated its willingness to make a loan for that purpose and on those terms;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Village of Pemberville, Ohio:

SECTION 1. That the LGA hereby approves the construction of the aforesaid Water Distribution Improvements in cooperation with the OWDA under the provisions, terms and conditions set forth in the “Cooperative Agreement for State Construction Project” as set forth in Exhibit A (the “Cooperative Agreement”) and hereby authorizes the Chief Executive Officer and the Chief Fiscal Officer of the LGA to execute the Cooperative Agreement with the OWDA substantially in the form set forth in Exhibit A.

SECTION 2. That it is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this resolution/ordinance were passed in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION 3. That this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety of said Village of Pemberville for the reason that the immediate construction of the Water Distribution Improvements at the earliest possible time is necessary in order to protect the health of the inhabitants of the LGA by providing improved water service; wherefore, this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and immediately after its passage.

**AN ORDINANCE APPROVING, ADOPTING AND ENACTING AMERICAN
LEGAL PUBLISHING’S OHIO BASIC CODE, 2026 EDITION, AS THE CODE
OF ORDINANCES FOR THE MUNICIPALITY OF PEMBERVILLE, OHIO.**

WHEREAS, the present general and permanent ordinances of the municipality are inadequately arranged and classified and are insufficient in form and substance for the complete preservation of the public peace, health, safety and general welfare of the municipality and for the proper conduct of its affairs.

WHEREAS, American Legal Publishing Corporation publishes a Code of Ordinances suitable for adoption by municipalities in Ohio.

WHEREAS, it is necessary to provide for the usual daily operation of the municipality and for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety and general welfare of the municipality that this ordinance take effect at an early date.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE LEGISLATIVE
AUTHORITY OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF PEMBERVILLE, OHIO:**

SECTION 1: American Legal Publishing’s Ohio Basic Code, 2026 Edition, as reviewed and approved by the Legislative Authority, is hereby adopted and enacted. Any prior version of the Ohio Basic Code which may have been previously adopted by the municipality is hereby repealed as obsolete and is hereby replaced in its entirety by the Ohio Basic Code, 2026 Edition.

SECTION 2: One copy of American Legal Publishing’s Ohio Basic Code, 2026 Edition, certified as correct by the Mayor and Clerk of the Legislative Authority, as required by Ohio Revised Code § 731.23, shall be kept in its initial form on file in the office of the Clerk of the municipality and retained as a permanent ordinance record of the municipality. The Clerk of the municipality is authorized and directed to publish a summary of all new matters contained in the Code of Ordinances as required by Ohio Revised Code §731.23. Such summary is attached hereto and marked as “Exhibit A”.

SECTION 3: All ordinances and resolutions or parts thereof which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of the Ohio Basic Code, 2026 Edition, as adopted is Section 1 hereof, are hereby repealed as of the effective date of this ordinance, except as follows:

1. The enactment of the Ohio Basic Code, 2026 Edition, shall not be construed to affect a right or liability accrued or incurred under any legislative provision prior to the effective date of such enactment, or an action or proceeding for the enforcement of such right or liability. Such enactment shall not be construed to relieve any person from punishment for an act committed in violation of any such legislative provision, nor to affect an indictment or prosecution thereof. For such purposes, any such legislative provision shall continue in full force notwithstanding its repeal for the purpose of revision and codification.
2. The repeal provided above shall not affect:
 - (1) The grant or creation of a franchise, license, right, easement or privilege.
 - (2) The purchase, sale, lease, or transfer of property.
 - (3) The appropriation or expenditure of money or promise or guarantee of payment.
 - (4) The assumption of any contract or obligation.
 - (5) The issuance and delivery of any bonds, obligations, or other instruments of indebtedness.
 - (6) The levy or imposition of taxes, assessments, or charges.
 - (7) The establishment, naming, vacating or grade level of any street or public way.
 - (8) The dedication of property or plat approval.
 - (9) The annexation or detachment of territory.
 - (10) Any legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this ordinance.
 - (11) Any legislation specifically superseding the provisions of the Ohio Basic Code.

SECTION 4: Whenever reference is made in any documents, publications, or signs of the municipality, including but not limited to traffic tickets and traffic-control signs, to a section as it existed in a former edition of the Ohio Basic Code, the reference shall extend and apply to the section referred to as subsequently amended, revised, recodified, or renumbered.

SECTION 5: This ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of peace, health, safety, and general welfare of the people of this municipality and shall take effect at the earliest date provided by law.

OHIO BASIC CODE, 2026 EDITION – SUMMARY OF CONTENTS

Notice is hereby given that on the ____ day of _____, 2026, there was enacted by the Legislative Authority of the Municipality of _____, Ohio, an ordinance entitled “An Ordinance Approving, Adopting and Enacting American Legal Publishing’s Ohio Basic Code of Ordinance for the Municipality of _____, Ohio.”

A summary of the subjects, including all new matters contained in the Code of Ordinance, as adopted, are as follows. The majority of Basic Code provisions are based directly on state law.

ORDINANCE AMENDING THE 2026 WAGE ORDINANCE NUMBER 1699, SECTION 7, CONCERNING VILLAGE PART-TIME POLICE OFFICERS, AND SECTION 9 AND SECTION 10, CONCERNING VILLAGE FULL-TIME STREETS, LANDS, AND BUILDINGS SUPERINTENDENT, AND PART-TIME ASSOCIATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PEMBERVILLE, OHIO:

SECTION 1: That Section 7 of Ordinance Number 1699 of the Codified Ordinances of the Village of Pemberville is hereby amended by substitution as follows:

Part-time officers shall have such duties as prescribed by the Ohio Revised Code and be under the supervision of the Police Chief. Part-time officers shall start at \$17.00 per hour worked payable biweekly installments. After completion of one hundred eighty (180) days of service from the date of hire, part-time officers shall receive \$20.00 per hour worked. After one year from the date of hire shall receive \$23.00 per hour worked. After one year and six months from the date of hire shall receive \$26.00 per hour worked. Any part-time officers hired before January 2004 are paid \$26.00 per hour worked. Part-time Police Officers shall receive no fringe benefits, no vacation, no personal days, no sick leave, or anything else other than the hourly rate except were prescribed by State Law.

SECTION 2: That Section 9 of Ordinance Number 1699 of the Codified Ordinances of the Village of Pemberville is hereby amended by substitution as follows:

The Streets, Lands & Buildings Superintendent shall perform the construction, maintenance, reconstruction, cleaning and clearing of the public streets, lands and buildings within the corporation and such other similar duties that he may be assigned. Additional duties may be assigned as prescribed by operational needs of the Village. The compensation for the Streets, Lands, & Buildings Superintendent for the year 2026 shall be \$26.00 - \$30.00 per hour payable in bi-weekly installments.

SECTION 3: That Section 10 of Ordinance Number 1699 of the Codified Ordinances of the Village of Pemberville is hereby amended by substitution as follows:

The part-time Streets, Lands & building Associate shall perform duties as prescribed by the Streets, Lands & Building Superintendent. Additional duties may be assigned as prescribed by the operational needs of the Village. The Streets, Lands & Buildings Associate shall report to the Streets, Lands & Buildings Superintendent. The compensation for the part-time Streets, Lands & Buildings Associate for the year 2026 shall be \$18.00 - \$24.00 per hour payable in bi-weekly installments.

SECTION 4: This Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health, safety, and general welfare of the people of this municipality and shall take place effect at the earliest time permitted by law.
