24/25 Highlights



Dyadic parent-child therapy services expanded into Solano County. We served 33 children and families living across Solano County.

We hosted 9 Attachment Vitamins classes on site at our Richmond location, the Greater Richmond Interfaith Program, and across the county at First5 centers.





Our mental health consultation teams provided 34 teacher trainings and parent workshops at local preschools. One teacher shared, "I learned that there are many opportunities as we teach young children to support and nurture their developmental abilities and guide them through emotional challenges with different approaches that allow the child to know they can express their emotions and feelings."

Workshop Spotlight


Autism Support Groups

A new group was developed by clinicians, Faryn, Aaron, Cecilia, & Sophie after identifying a community need. They established a weekly group where caregivers were able to share challenges, questions, and successes while learning about Autism, neurodiversity, and community resources.




With the expansion of Transitional Kindergarten, we offered the summer social skills group to offer 2 groups; 1 for families with children entering Transitional Kindergarten and the other for those entering Kindergarten. A team of 8 clinicians ensured it ran smoothly each week. One parent shared, "These activities helped my child on his first day of school where he was able to engage in a positive way with new school friends".


CCBH: grows modestly from \$3.8 M to \$4.01 M
