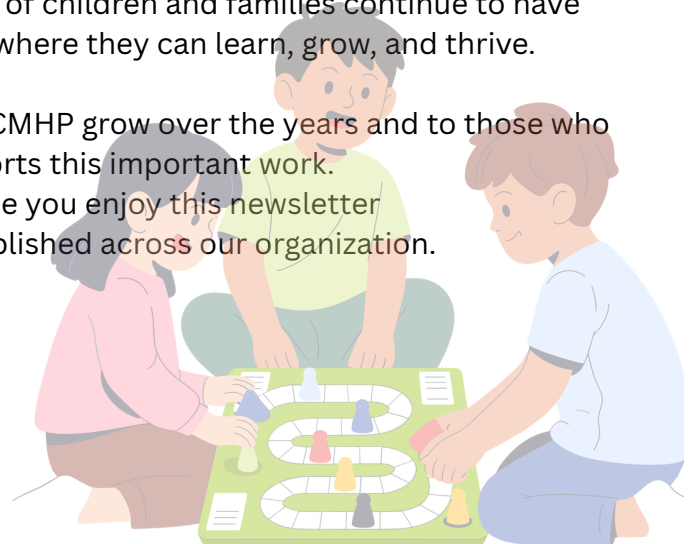

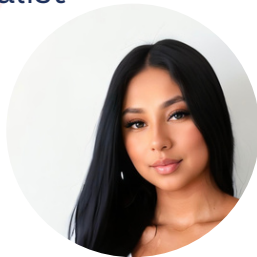

PROGRAM & ENGAGEMENT HIGHLIGHTS

Partnerships That Nurture Strong Starts



Throughout this spring and early summer, in collaboration with the San Pablo First5 and Monument First5 Centers, our Perinatal Circle of Care (PCOC) team has been providing perinatal education and Attachment Vitamins groups to families across Contra Costa County. This partnership is a testament to our shared dedication of supporting the health, development, and well-being of young children and their families. The groups are made possible by generous funding provided by the Environmental and Community Investment Agreement (ECIA), Contra Costa Health Community Defined Practice (CDP), and Contra Costa Health Measure X funding.

Building Connection and Support for Neurodivergent Families



On June 3rd a collective of clinicians across our Child & Family Therapy, Comprehensive Therapeutic Preschool, and Early Childhood Consultation programs completed the ***Brainbow Group, Grupo Brillantemente***. This group was formally known as the Support Group for Parents of Kiddos on the Autism Spectrum. The group was a support space for parents to voice questions, challenges, and celebrations of caring for neurodivergent kids. This cycle added a Spanish-speaking parent group as well as additional programming and structure for the children's group. 59 participants engaged in this 8-week offering. This group was made possible by generous funding from the Witkin Foundation and Contra Costa Health Measure X.

A New Chapter at 194 Broadway

This year, we expanded our Richmond campus to include 194 Broadway, providing additional space for our growing Early Childhood Consultation (ECC) team and creating room for future organizational growth. This expansion is more than additional office space—it is an investment in the professionals who support children, families, educators, and childcare providers every day. By creating dedicated work and collaboration areas, we are strengthening our capacity to deliver high-quality services and respond to the increasing needs of our community.



CLINICAL SPOTLIGHT



Suzanne Harkless, CFB Program Manager, **Emily Peck** and **Claudia Benitez**, CFB Clinical Supervisors, recently completed the **Reflective Facilitators in Training Program** at UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital Oakland. This training was an intensive learning community designed for professionals working with young children and families (ages 0-5).

Housed within the hospital's Early Intervention Services (EIS) and the Irving B. Harris program, the curriculum supports a culturally diverse cohort of service providers to increase their capacity for leadership and clinical practice. Suzanne, Emily, and Claudia engaged in monthly consultation seminars designed to promote their critical thinking, manage practice dilemmas, and learn how to effectively facilitate reflective supervision for their team.

By investing in reflective training for our staff, we empower staff to process complex emotions, mitigate burnout, and strengthen multidisciplinary teamwork which in turn significantly improves the quality of care delivered to the children and families we serve.



The **Perinatal Circle of Care (PCOC) team** will be welcoming two new Perinatal Mental Health Therapists in July, **Ja'Naie Sinclair** and **Tracy Frost**. Growing this team allows us to serve the growing demand for perinatal services in Contra Costa County, as well as expand this program into Solano County in the 26/27 fiscal year. This month, the PCOC team will also begin an 18-month Perinatal Child Parent Psychotherapy training. While the PCOC program has been utilizing the P-CPP framework since its inception in 2021, the Child Trauma Research Program at the University of California, San Francisco has invited our perinatal team to participate in their first P-CPP national cohort.

By having PCOC mental health clinicians trained and rostered in P-CPP fidelity, it strengthens our team's clinical practices, enhances the quality of services, and supports sustainable development by ensuring our perinatal program can deliver long-term, equitable results.

Protecting the Place Where Healing Happens

Building for the Future: Expanding Our Impact

Since, 2016, our Richmond headquarters has served as a hub for connection, support, learning, and healing. It is where staff collaborate, families receive services, community partners gather, and innovative programs take shape.

Today, that home requires a significant investment. We are preparing for a critical roof replacement project that will protect our facilities and ensure the long-term sustainability of our mission. While roofs are rarely the most visible part of a nonprofit's work, they are essential to preserving the safe, welcoming spaces where services are delivered every day.

In the coming months, we will launch our **Investing in Our Foundation Capital Campaign**, an effort to raise the funds necessary to complete this project and safeguard our facilities for the children and families who depend on them.

Liam's Story

At just 4 years old, "Liam" struggled with severe separation anxiety and aggressive behaviors that made daily routines, preschool attendance, and social interactions difficult for both him and his family.

After being referred to ECMHP's Child & Family Therapy Program, Liam and his parents began working with a clinician who used play-based therapy to understand his emotional needs and identify the triggers behind his behaviors. By providing dyadic play therapy and parent support, Liam's family learned strategies to support emotional regulation, strengthen attachment, and build predictable routines that helped him feel safe and secure.

Over time, Liam achieved significant milestones. He became more comfortable separating from his caregivers, reduced aggressive outbursts, developed age-appropriate coping skills, and began expressing his feelings with words rather than behavior. His confidence grew, and he was able to participate more successfully in preschool and connect with peers.

Today, Liam enters the classroom with greater independence and resilience, while his parents feel empowered to support his social-emotional development.

Liam's story is one of many made possible through the support of our generous donors, funding partners, volunteers, and community champions. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to everyone who invests in ECMHP's mission.

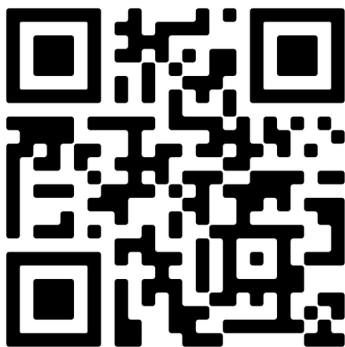
The impact we make is not measured solely by programs delivered, or numbers served, but by the lives strengthened, the resilience nurtured, and the hope created along the way.
