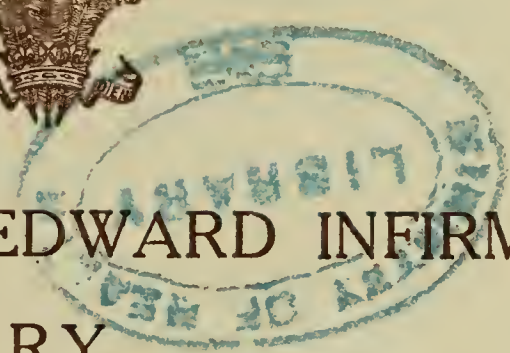

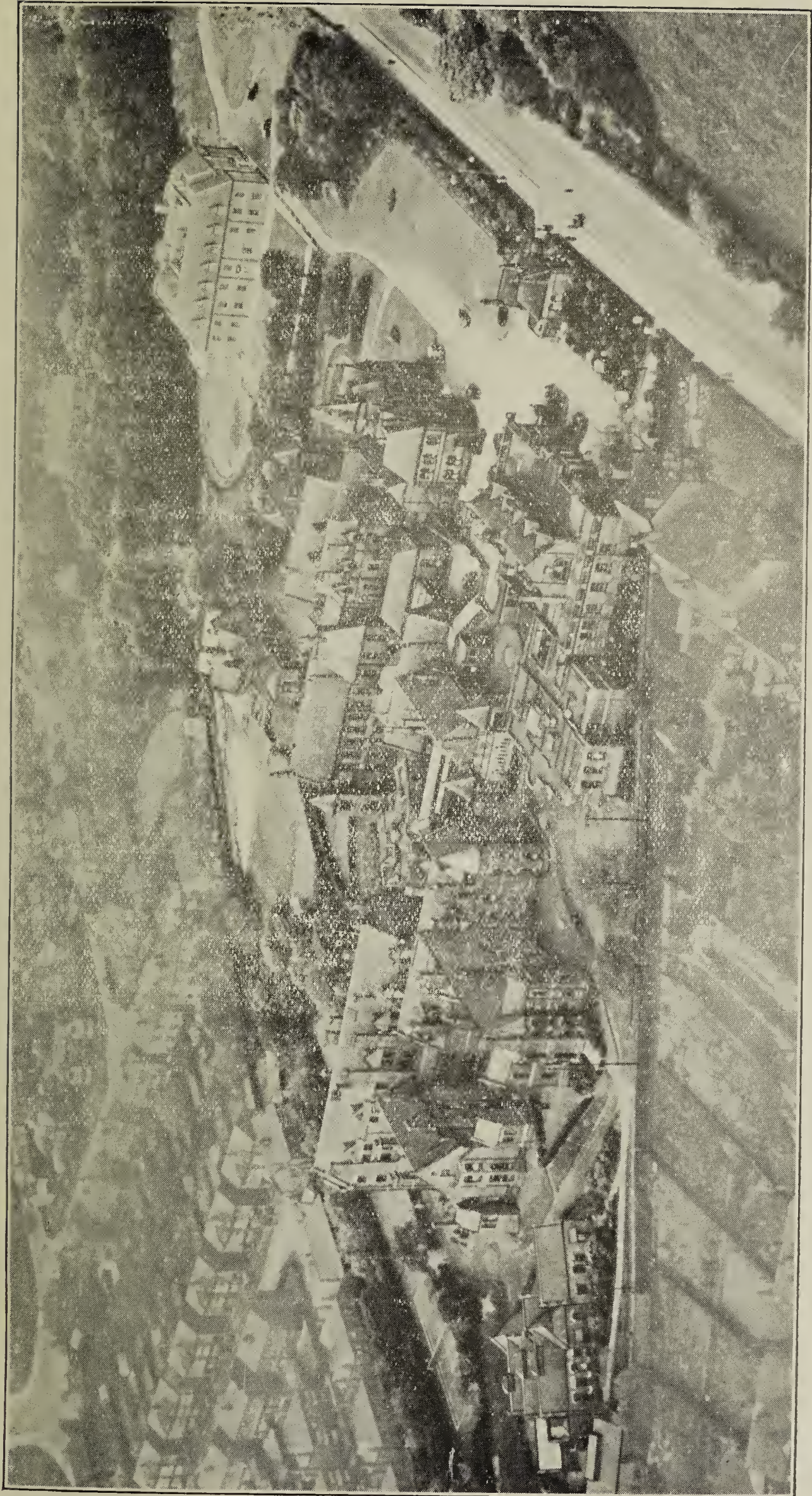

74TH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

The Board of Management have pleasure in submitting the SEVENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT of the Infirmary, together with a Statement of the Income and Expenditure for the twelve months ending 31st March, 1947.

The number of patients who received treatment and advice was 29,274, compared with 28,484 last year. The Waiting List at the close of the year was 1,036, compared with 795 last year.

In addition, 612 patients were treated in the Christopher Private Patients' Home, where 489 operations were performed. The demands made upon the services of the Home (which is entirely self-supporting) have been fully maintained, and at times there has been a waiting list for admission.

The Board are extremely grateful for the splendid support the Infirmary continues to receive from all sections of the community, as will be seen from the details given in the Report.

The passing of the National Health Service Act on 6th November, 1946, was an event of outstanding importance. When the Act comes into operation, great changes will occur in hospital administration and control. April 1st, 1948, has been mentioned as the "Appointed Day." This Infirmary, which has rendered such splendid service as a voluntary hospital for the past seventy-four years, will undoubtedly have a highly important part to play in the future hospital services of Wigan and District. The Board therefore appeal with every confidence for a continuance of the loyal support the Infirmary has always received, to enable them to maintain the services at the highest standard of efficiency until such time as it is taken over by the State.

The Board are pleased to report that many substantial amendments to the original Bill have been secured, which vitally affect both the existing bodies of voluntary hospitals and their supporters. For example, Local Hospital Management Committees are to control and manage their particular hospital or group, and are to have corporate legal entity—the right to sue and the liability to be sued. They will further have freedom after the National Health Service starts to receive gifts and legacies and to apply them for the purpose for which they are given. It will be remembered that one of the main objects of the Infirmary Petition aimed to secure a greater measure of local control. The Board note with approval that Wigan and District is to be included in the Manchester Region in connection with the regional planning and hospital services to be provided under the Act.

The post-war period is presenting many difficulties. The continued shortage of nurses and midwives throughout the country is generally known, and the poor response for resident domestic staff despite the revision of wages and conditions of service, is aggravating the situation. The unreliable attendance of some of the daily non-resident domestic workers has at times seriously interfered with the routine work. The Ministry of Labour is helping by organising a scheme for the employment in hospitals of Displaced Persons, and have supplied us with ten Estonians as resident domestic helpers. They are proving to be most satisfactory.

The Infirmary Blood Transfusion Service continues with its vitally important work. **Many more blood donors are very urgently needed** to replace those who have been called away and to meet the increased demands.

Volunteers should kindly communicate with Dr. J. L. Dales, at the Department of Pathology of the Infirmary, when the necessary arrangements for enrolment will be made. The Board would like to see a much larger rota and earnestly renew their appeal for more volunteers.

The Maintenance Account Income shows a decrease of £695 19s. 10d., compared with the preceding year, and the Maintenance Account Expenditure has increased by £13,931 14s. 11d. This large increase is due to the substantial increases in salaries and wages awarded by the various bodies set up to consider wages and conditions of service; to the continued increase in the cost of Hospital commodities generally, and to the purchase of special equipment.

Cost of Occupied Bed.

The average cost per bed occupied daily during the year (after allowing for out-patients) was £315 3s. 0d., compared with £266 10s. 2½d. during the preceding year; an increase of £48 12s. 9½d. per bed.

The Christopher Private Patients' Home, £511 2s. 11¾d.

Out-Patient Department.

The cost per out-patient during the year was 11s. 7¼d. compared with 9s. 6d. during the preceding year; an increase of 2s. 1¼d. per out-patient.

Annual Subscriptions.

Annual Subscriptions totalled £2,085 2s. 6d. (last year £2,114 2s. 1d.). This includes £221 11s. 0d. being the amount of tax recovered last year under Covenanted Subscriptions.

A particular appeal is made to annual subscribers to continue their subscriptions for the current year. The Infirmary will not be taken over by the State until 1st April, 1948, at the earliest, and until then we urgently require all possible support.

Hospital Sunday.

The total of the Collections made in Churches, Chapels and Schools was £939 7s. 2d., a decrease of £130 12s. 10d., compared with the previous year. This is undoubtedly due to the exceptionally severe weather experienced during this period. The splendid co-operation of the Clergy and Ministers of the various Churches is highly appreciated.

Contributory Scheme.

The amount received from the Contributory Scheme was £32,642 18s. 2d., an increase of £828 13s. 9d. compared with the previous year. The approximate number of contributors at the close of the year was 65,000.

Under the reciprocal arrangements with other Hospitals for the treatment of contributors under the Scheme payments amounting to £5,876 16s. 6d. have been received in respect of their contributors treated here, and corresponding payments amounting to £4,157 0s. 8d. have been made for the treatment of our contributors. Including these payments the total amount received was £38,519 14s. 8d., compared with £38,120 17s. 8d. the previous year.

The Board are desirous of expressing their warmest thanks to all contributors and collectors, and other voluntary workers who have materially assisted in making this excellent result possible. They are also grateful to the many employers for their kind co-operation and support.

Patients' Contributions.

The contributions made to the Inquiry Officer towards the cost of maintenance and treatment amounted to £1,674 11s. 11d. (In-patients, £1452 17s. 7d. ; Out-patients, £221 14s. 4d.), compared with £1082 13s. 0d. last year. The Board are most grateful for these contributions, and appeal to those patients (not in the Contributory Scheme) where circumstances permit to help in this way.

The proceeds realised the sum of £372 16s. 9d. The Board are most grateful for this response, which this year included the Outside Districts, and extend their warmest thanks to His Worship the Mayor of Wigan (Councillor F. W. Roberts, J.P.), and to all who assisted him under such deplorable weather conditions. Mr. H. S. Taylor kindly acted as Honorary Organising Secretary, and Mr. E. D. Smith as Honorary Treasurer.

Ladies' Linen League.

The Ladies' Linen League has supplied 585 articles during the year for the use of the patients, and the sum of £190 18s. 3d. has been expended on linen, etc.

The Board desire heartily to congratulate the members on another excellent year's work, and would again assure them how much their splendid services are appreciated. The Linen League affords an excellent opportunity to ladies who desire to render practical service to the Infirmary, and new members will be heartily welcomed.

Pathological and Bacteriological Department.

A detailed report for the year (excluding all outside work) will be found on page 46. The Laboratory work continues to increase, particularly the outside work. It is pleasing to observe that more Local Authorities are making use of the facilities available.

The Board have again been pleased to renew their arrangements with the Lancashire Insurance Committee and the Barrow Insurance Committee, to supply Stock and Autogenous Vaccines to the order of the Insurance Practitioners at an agreed scale of charges, and to report upon any material sent for examination.

Dr. G. A. Cary Lynch (Pathologist and Bacteriologist) left during the year to take up a similar appointment at the Torbay Hospital, Torquay. He was succeeded by Dr. J. L. Dales.

Tinfoil and "Silver" Paper.

The collection of Tinfoil and "Silver" Paper has greatly declined for obvious reasons, but the large quantity of 13 tons 18 cwts. 75 lbs. has been received since the inauguration of the scheme. As a result the Infirmary has benefited to the extent of £341 6s. 5d.

Extensions and Improvements.

The Board are pleased to be able to report that Sunnyside Annexe, Knowsley Road, Southport, will be available for complete use in the near future, assuming it is possible to obtain the necessary staff. The Preliminary Training School for Nurses has already been established there, and the first pupils entered on April 1st, 1947. The remainder of the premises are to be

used for patients suitable for transfer from the Infirmary, and for convalescent cases. There will ultimately be accommodation for approximately 120 patients and staff. The cost of maintaining this extensive Annexe will be at least £10,000 per annum, and the Board appeal for increased financial support to meet this additional expenditure.

The extension to the Children's Ward, consisting of an Isolation Unit of 6 cots, has been completed and put into use. This is an extremely valuable addition to our resources.

Further apparatus has been provided for the X-Ray and Physio-Therapy Departments, also additional equipment for the Laboratory. The installation of Refrigerators to serve all the Wards has been completed.

Mr. E. T. Vaughan, Head Gardener for twenty years, also passed away during the year. He faithfully served the Infirmary and only retired two years ago.

Wigan Corporation Maternity and Child Welfare Committee.

Mr. Jas. Starr was again appointed to represent the Infirmary Board on this Committee.

Medical Staff.

A number of changes have occurred during the year. Certain temporary war-time appointments have been reviewed, and the following permanent appointments have been approved: Mr. F. C. Dwyer, Surgeon-in-charge, Orthopædic Department; Mr. E. H. Strach, Orthopædic Registrar; Miss M. H. Mayeur, Gynæcological Surgeon; Dr. D. J. Mitchell, Radiologist.

Dr. T. N. Fisher resigned his appointment as Pædiatrician (Children's Specialist), and Dr. Margaret Egan was appointed to succeed him.

Dr. G. J. C. Brittain was appointed as a Specialist Anæsthetist. This is a newly created appointment, and has proved to be extremely valuable.

Dr. Ronald Ellis was called up for military service in January, 1947, and will be absent for eighteen months. Dr. W. S. Sutton is acting as a Visiting Physician during his absence. It was considered, in view of the increased demands made upon the medical services, to obtain a second Visiting Physician, and Dr. H. Phillip Goldman was appointed to this position.

GIFTS TO HOSPITALS.

Explanatory Memorandum as to the Effect of Gifts to Hospitals after the passing of the National Health Service Act, 1946.

[Prepared by Chancery Counsel at the request of the British Hospitals Association].

1. The British Hospitals Association has reason to believe that many intending donors have recently revoked legacies or refrained from making gifts to Hospitals, because

either (a) they assumed that the Hospitals would no longer need their support,

or (b) they feared that any money given by them would, on "the appointed day" when the National Health Service came into force, be diverted from the particular Hospital or purpose which they wished to endow.

As regards *(a)*, the Association has already explained in a Review of the Hospital Service under the Act how important it is, if the vitality and humanity of the Hospital Service in this country is to be maintained, that the Hospitals should continue to receive financial support from all charitably disposed persons.

As regards *(b)*, The National Health Service Bill in its original form certainly gave grounds for this fear. The Bill was, however, amended in important respects as the result of the debates in the House of Lords, and the Association is anxious that the effect of these amendments should be fully appreciated. In particular it is desired that legal practitioners should, whenever they feel that they can properly do so, draw the attention of charitably minded clients to the true position under the Act as explained below. The purpose of this Memorandum is to explain briefly how intending donors may still make gifts to Hospitals with the assurance that their benefactions will be applied in accordance with their intentions and for the benefit of the particular Hospitals or locality in which they are interested.

Gifts Made Before the Appointed Day.

2. Whilst it is true that moneys given to the non-teaching Hospitals prior to the passing of the Act on 6th November, 1946, will, on the appointed day, be put into a national pool and redistributed, it is important to note that this does not apply to gifts made between 6th November, 1946 and the appointed day, provided that such gifts are made upon trusts which (in accordance with Section 7 of the Act) provide—

either (a) "for the administration of the property [i.e., gifts] as a capital fund separate from the general funds of the Hospital."

This involves that the donor should direct that the money given by him should be treated and set apart as a capital fund, so that only the *income* is applied for the purposes of the Hospital. The income, however, in this case may be made available for the general purposes of the Hospital and need not be earmarked for any specific purpose. It should be noted, however, that after the appointed day the whole fund (both capital and income) will be applicable in the hands of the Hospital Management Committee for purposes other than general main-

tenance connected with their group of Hospitals including the Hospital indicated by the donor.

A donor can also indicate that as from the appointed day his gift shall be applicable by the Hospital Management Committee for any purpose (other than the general maintenance of the Hospital) at its discretion, provided that the usage is in favour of the particular Hospital indicated by the donor.

By complying with the above-mentioned condition, a donor can give much-needed assistance to a Hospital as regards maintenance during the interim period, and at the same time ensure that, after the cost of maintenance has been taken over by the State, the fund as a whole will be available for capital purposes connected with the Hospital or locality in which he is interested.

or (b) “for the application of the property for some specific object distinct from the general purposes of the Hospital and involving expenditure of a capital nature.”

To bring his gift within the scope of these words, the donor must earmark the money for some special purpose connected with the Hospital, and that purpose must be one involving expenditure of a capital nature, e.g., in erecting or equipping premises for use as a research laboratory, or in naming a bed in the Hospital in memory of a deceased relative or friend. The donor, however, need not specify the special purpose himself but may leave that to the discretion of the Hospital Management Committee (see Note at the end of paragraph 5 below). In these cases, however, the entire sum or property given to the Hospital may be expended, even before the appointed day.

3. If any gift made between 6th November, 1946, and the appointed day is made in accordance with the conditions mentioned in paragraph 2 above, then on the appointed day the money so given will not go into the national pool, but will vest in the Management Committee of the particular Hospital for which it was given (or of the group of Hospitals with which the particular Hospital is associated), and that Committee will be in a position to apply the money (both capital and income) locally in accordance with the wishes of the donor.

4. Particular attention is drawn to Section 7 (7) of the Act, which provides that every Hospital Management Committee shall secure, so far as is reasonably practicable, that the objects of any endowment transferred to them on the appointed day and the observance of any conditions attaching thereto (including conditions intended to preserve the memory of any person or class of persons) are not prejudiced. Where, therefore, the particular Hospital benefited by a donor forms one of a group of Hospitals, the Management Committee will be bound as far as practicable to apply the money for the particular Hospital specified by the donor, and can only apply it for other Hospitals in the group if the mode of application directed by the donor is or becomes impracticable. It is considered that this sub-section goes a long way to ensure that money given by donors in accordance with the conditions specified in paragraph 2 of this Memorandum will, in fact, be applied in conformity with their wishes.

5. In these circumstances, donors who wish to ensure that their benefactions will be applied in accordance with their wishes, even after the Service has come into operation, are advised to make use of the forms of gift set out below.

Suggested Forms for Gift to a Hospital.

1.—For Use BEFORE the Appointed Day.

- ¶(1) *Form of gift where the donor wishes to benefit a particular Hospital but without earmarking the money for any special purpose.*

(a) In a Will :

“ I give and bequeath to the Treasurer of the Royal Albert Edward Infirmary and Dispensary for Wigan and District registered, the sum of £..... free of duty for the purposes of that Hospital And I direct that the said sum shall be administered by the Governing Body or Management Committee of the Hospital as a capital fund separate from the general funds of the Hospital And as from the appointed day under the National Health Service Act shall be applicable by the Hospital Management Committee for any purpose other than the general maintenance of the Hospital at the Committee’s discretion ” [or shall be applied for such special purposes as are indicated by the donor].

(b) Gift made during the lifetime of the donor. The gift should be accompanied by a written direction by the donor to the following effect :—

“ I direct that the said sum of £..... shall be applied by the Governing Body or Management Committee of the Hospital as a capital fund to be administered separately from the general funds of the Hospital.”

- ¶(2) *Form of gift for a special purpose of a capital nature.*

(a) In a Will :

“ I give and bequeath to the Treasurer of the Royal Albert Edward Infirmary and Dispensary for Wigan and the District registered, the sum of £..... free of duty. And I direct that the said sum shall be applied by the Governing Body or Management Committee of the Hospital for the following specific purpose, namely [set out the special purpose, e.g., “ in naming a bed in the Hospital in memory of ”].

(b) Gift made during the lifetime of the donor. The gift should be accompanied by a written direction by the donor to the following effect :—

“ I direct that the said sum of £..... shall be applied by the Governing Body or Management Committee of the Hospital for such specific object of a capital nature connected with the Hospital (but distinct from its general purposes) as the Governing Body or Management Committee of the Hospital shall determine.”

NOTE.—It is not essential that the special capital purpose should be specified by the donor. It is sufficient and usually preferable to leave the precise capital purpose for which the money shall be used to the discretion and good sense of the Committee, because it is often difficult, and particularly so in these days of transition, to envisage the precise objects for which the money will be most urgently required.

6. The above forms of gift assume that the property given consists of money. It should be noted, however, that the new Management Committees will have power to hold land. In the case of gifts of land made before the appointed day it will normally be desirable to devise or grant it to the Governing Body of the Hospital or to trustees upon trust for sale and upon trust to hold the proceeds of sale and the income of the land until sale for some special purpose involving expenditure of a capital nature.

7. Donors will appreciate that the above forms of gift will not be appropriate in the case of small subscriptions or contributions. Small subscriptions or contributions, however, are used up rapidly in meeting current expenses, and until the appointed day the voluntary Hospitals will still be dependent to a large extent on such subscriptions. Indeed, until the appointed day, one of the most urgent needs of the voluntary Hospitals will be money for maintenance, and it is hoped therefore that subscribers will continue their subscriptions until the cost of maintenance of the voluntary Hospitals is taken over by the State. It is also recommended, for this reason, that donors who wish to make a substantial gift to a Hospital before the appointed day and who have no particular capital purpose in mind should adopt the forms of gift set out in paragraph 5 (1) above, since, as already explained, under this form of gift the *income* of the fund will be available for maintenance until the appointed day.

Gifts Made AFTER the Appointed Day.

8. After the appointed day it will be unnecessary to make gifts to Hospitals for general maintenance, but gifts for capital purposes will still be needed (e.g., for research, comforts and assistance for patients, and amenities for the staff), and intending donors are reminded that the new Management Committees will be corporate bodies and will have full power to receive gifts and legacies of money or property upon trust for purposes relating to hospital services or to the functions of the Committee with respect to research. Moreover, Part II of the Mortmain and Charitable Uses Acts 1888 and 1891 (which impose restrictions on gifts of land to charitable uses) do not apply to gifts to a Hospital Management Committee. Hospital Management Committees will be in the same position as ordinary trustees with respect to property given to them after the appointed day, and will be bound to apply such property strictly in accordance with the trusts declared by the donors. It will not be necessary for donors, after the appointed day, to adopt the special forms of gift set out in paragraph 5 above. It is emphasised, however, that after the appointed day gifts should be expressed to be, not for the *general* purposes of a Hospital, but for some purpose of a special nature connected with the Hospital and selected either by the donor himself or by the Management Committee. Such gifts could conveniently be made in the following form:—

Suggested Form for Gift to a Hospital.

II.—For Use AFTER the Appointed Day.

(a) *In a Will :*

“ I give and bequeath to the Management Committee of the Royal Albert Edward Infirmary and Dispensary for Wigan and the District registered, the sum of £..... free of duty upon trust to apply the capital and income of the said sum for such purposes of a capital nature connected with the said Hospital as the Committee shall in their discretion determine.”

(b) *Gift made during the lifetime of the donor.*

The gift should be made to the Management Committee of the Hospital upon trust to apply the fund or property for the specific capital purpose which the donor may have in mind, or upon trust in the following form:—

“ In trust to apply the capital and income of the said sum. (or property) for such purposes of a capital nature connected with the said Hospital as the Committee shall in their discretion determine.”

NOTE.—Since this Memorandum was issued the “ appointed day ” for the taking over of the Hospitals by the State has been fixed for July 5th, 1948.

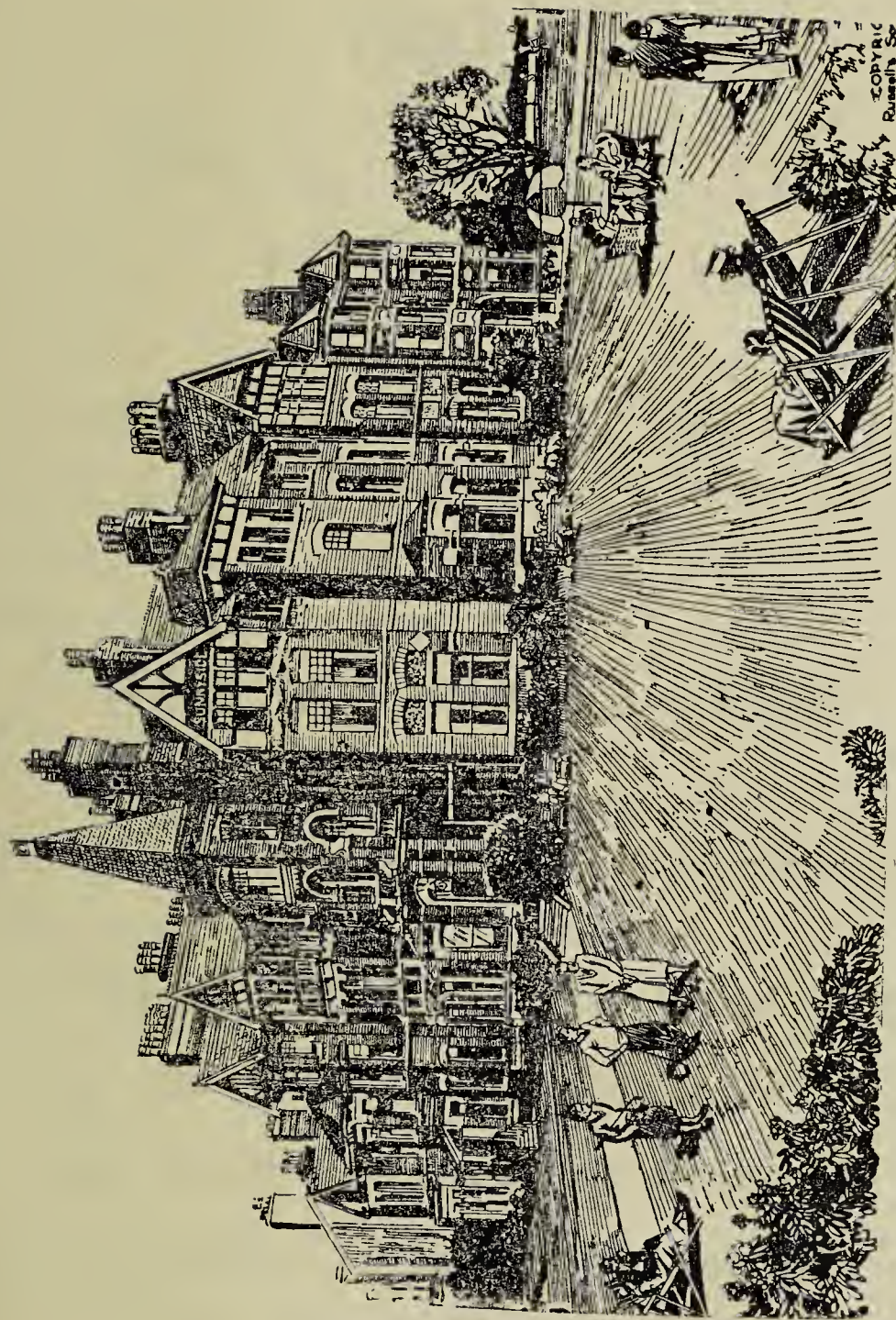
