12. Alfred Waterhouse Chapels

A discussion took place:

Thanks was given to Peter Fleetwood for highlighting the stage of the Chapels in his buildings at risk feature in January. This was again highlighted by Sean Jinks in his presentation in Feb.

This opened up many concerns on different social media platforms.

A main concern is about the funding that was allocated by Wigan Council to make the buildings watertight in March 2019. The work was never started and through Freedom of Information it has been discovered that the unspent funding is now 'under review.'

Where does the Society go with this?

As a meeting has been arranged between Wigan Buildings and the Heritage Champion, Councillor T Halliwell on 29th March, it was decided to continue with the discussion at the next meeting.

13. Member Research updates - open

1. Member John Richardson has sent in a query about Sam Woods MP for Ince in Makerfield during the 19th century. His query was about the constituency of Makerfield in general and its relationship with Wigan, and when things changed.

A discussion took place: Local Gov Act in the 1970s assimilated the Urban District Councils into Wigan Metropolitan Borough Council, things became more localised and boundary

changes were made to the constituency. Ince was at one time in the past a manor, Makerfield was made up of several different manors.
