I chose to be present this week by taking Huw to the theater to see, on back-to-back-to-back nights, the digitally remastered, extended cut, 4k versions of The Lord of the Rings trilogy.

Our JART Committee members recommended that in July (a month when we do not have a Generosity Sunday) we focus on the plight of Palestinian Refugees in Gaza. The organization we support for their humanitarian aid is to Palestine refugees registered with UNRWA across its five fields of operation. It is committed to advancing the human development of Palestine refugees through the achievement of the following five strategic outcomes.

Strategic Outcome 1: Refugees' rights under international law are protected and promoted

Strategic Outcome 2: Refugees' health is protected and the disease burden is reduced

Strategic Outcome 3: School-aged children complete quality, equitable and inclusive basic education

Strategic Outcome 4: Refugee capabilities strengthened for increased livelihood opportunities

Strategic Outcome 5: Refugees are able to meet their basic human needs of food, shelter and environmental health

Strategic Outcomes reflect the Agency's commitment to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals.

UNRWA is confronted with an increased demand for services resulting from a growth in the number of registered Palestine refugees, the extent of their vulnerability and their deepening poverty. UNRWA is funded almost entirely by voluntary contributions and financial support has been outpaced by the growth in needs. We hope you will give generously during July for the important work on UNRWA.
