Glasgow Warriors

Over the past couple of years there have been a range of issues raised by the local community with regards to Scotstoun Stadium in particular when Glasgow Warriors are playing at home. The Warriors have been working hard to address these issues and encourage more fans to travel to games by public transport and various improvements have been made. They have also held regular meetings with the community and regularly distribute their newsletter to keep them informed of progress in addressing issues. However there

are still on going issues and resolving issues in some areas has created issues in other areas.

They recently spent training time levelling and laying turf on the new activity area at the Heart of Scotstoun Community Centre. A gesture which goes a long way to cementing our relationship with them.

Glasgow Eco Trust has been working with some of the local community councils and residents associations on this issue. A survey has recently been carried out and we expect that the results will be made public soon.

A Real Drag

City Council wrote to our residents in September to advise of changes planned to the way our refuse bins are collected. At a subsequent meeting in the Heart of Scotstoun a large group of residents along with



SCARA Committee members were informed that the reason for the change was the poor condition of the lanes within the area and the health and safety of their operatives. As a result from 25th September, 2019 they ceased to provide a pull-out service for bins left in the lanes. Residents will now be required to present (ie, drag) their bins to either the lane end at the avenue or to the front of their property for all recycling collections.

The aged and infirm who feel physically challenged will be assessed and if successful allowed to leave sacks at their garden gate. How the filled sacks get there was not explained but presumably they'll have to rely on the old 'common sense' again.



Pavement Parking

The Scottish Parliament has now passed the Bill which prohibits and potentially criminalises parking any motor car wheels on pavements, as is commonly practised in our Avenues. However, the Bill still has to receive Royal Assent which will be virtually automatic once any remaining technicalities have been ironed out. Even then, however, the new law will not be of any effect until ministerial regulations have been made and passed. As we have seen with the gasifier project, Scottish ministers can be a mite tardy when it comes to getting things done. 

Action in the Avenues!

I'm sure most residents noticed some filming on Earlbank Avenue recently. This was for a new BBC drama 'The Nest' staring Glasgow's own Martin Compston (Line of Duty) and Sophie Rundle (Peaky Blinders/Gentleman Jack).

Filming in tight avenues such as ours can bring about problems with traffic management and parking but initial concerns by some residents that they couldn't park outside their house during filming, were overcome as the film company worked to accommodate most problems local residents had.

The busy crew even took time out to pay a visit to the school and give a talk about the filming process which a lot of the children were very excited about.

This isn't the first time the avenues have been used by the BBC, last year saw the filing of 'The Victim' in Verona Avenue starring Kelly McDonald for which she won the best actress award for at the Scottish Baftas last week. David Tennent has also filmed on Lennox Avenue and of course part of the BBC classic Tutti Frutti starring Robbie Coltrane was shot in one of our Scotstoun homes.

Rugby Heroes

Scotstoun is home to many Glasgow Warriors players, three of whom headed off to Japan to play in the Rugby World Cup for their countries. Jonny Gray and Peter Horne played for Scotland with Jonny winning the Mastercard Player of the Match at the Scotland v Samoa match in Kobe.

Meanwhile, DTH van der Merwe was in Japan, with the Canadian team. This was due to be a really significant tournament for DTH, marking his 62nd and final

appearance for his country after thirteen years and four World Cups. However, Typhoon Hagibis struck, leaving a path of destruction across Japan as 74 people lost their lives and thousands of homes

were destroyed. The Canadian team, finding themselves with no game to play and an afternoon to spare rolled up their sleeves and lent their weight to the rescue effort.

"When we went to the centre of Kamaishi we found the town was flooded with mudslides coming down from the hills," explained van der Merwe. "The house I went to had an 80-year-old lady living by herself and her house was on stilts, but it was still flooded two feet deep inside.

As the human cost of the typhoon became apparent, DTH gained some perspective on the disappointing ending to his international career. "It was quite upsetting to see this old lady's situation, but she was used to it, I think. She took everything in her stride, just telling us to throw things out. You make two piles — a keep pile and a throwaway pile — and there were no tears, she just got on and dealt with it."

No News is Good News

Five years have passed since WH Malcom Limited submitted a proposal for the building and operation of an incinerator/gasifier at 865 South Street, Whiteinch / Scotstoun for waste disposal.

A public meeting was duly held on 23rd February 2016 when Glasgow City Council rejected the application. WH Malcom Limited lodged an appeal which was initially placed in the hands of a reporter whose recommendation would normally have been decisive.

However, due to the public sensitivity of the project ie the local feelings which were demonstrated in our campaign, we understand that the decision-making was taken over by Scottish ministers. Unbelievably we are still waiting on that decision to be announced!
