

## REPORT #1

### AN INCIDENT WITNESSED AT THE PARK

On Sunday 19th July, 2026 at approximately 5:00 p.m. an incident occurred at the Speyside Community Park, near the benches close to the walking track. This report gives details about what I, Davina Prince, witnessed on that occasion.

I was walking along the track with my mother when I noticed an elderly man seated alone on one of the benches near the flower beds. As we walked closer, I saw him suddenly slump forward and then fall sideways onto the bench. He remained still and did not respond when a nearby jogger called out to him.

My mother immediately went over to check on the man, along with two other park visitors who had noticed what happened. One of the visitors, a woman, checked to see if the man was breathing, while another person began calling for the park warden.

The park warden arrived at the scene within a few minutes and asked everyone to step back to give the man space. The warden checked the man's condition and then used a radio to request emergency medical assistance. My mother remained nearby in case further help was needed.

While waiting for the ambulance, the park warden kept the man in a comfortable position on the bench and continued to monitor him. Several park visitors gathered nearby but were asked to keep the area clear.

An ambulance arrived approximately twelve minutes later, and paramedics attended to the man before transporting him for medical treatment. The park warden remained at the scene afterward to complete a report of the incident.



## REPORT #2

### THE COMMUNITY CLEAN-UP DAY

On Saturday 18th July, 2026 at approximately 8:00 a.m. a community clean-up event was held along the riverbank on Orange Grove Road. This report gives details about what I, Amanda Davis, observed and took part in during the event.

The clean-up was organised by my family, along with several neighbours, in response to concerns about litter and debris that had gathered along the riverbank over recent months. Notices about the event were placed on the community notice board and shared with residents in the days leading up to the clean-up.

Approximately twenty-five residents took part in the event, including adults and children from the surrounding streets. Volunteers were divided into small groups, with each group assigned a section of the riverbank to clean. My family was responsible for the section near the old wooden bridge.

Volunteers were provided with gloves, garbage bags and litter pickers, which had been donated by a local hardware store. Throughout the morning, volunteers collected plastic bottles, food wrappers, broken furniture and other discarded items from the riverbank and the surrounding grassy areas.

Mr. Vishnu Ramnarine, a member of the community council, was present to supervise the collection of waste and to arrange for a truck to remove the filled garbage bags from the area. By the end of the event, over thirty bags of garbage had been collected and removed from the riverbank.

The clean-up concluded at approximately 11:30 a.m. with light refreshments provided for all volunteers. Residents expressed interest in holding similar clean-up events on a regular basis to maintain the area.



## REPORT #3

### A WALLET FOUND ON THE PAVEMENT

On Thursday 23rd July, 2026 at approximately 3:20 p.m. I found a wallet lying on the pavement along Northern Main Road, near the entrance to the community pharmacy. This report gives details about what I, Aaliyah Ramnarine, found and the actions I took afterward.

While walking home from school with my classmate, Kayla James, I noticed a black wallet lying on the ground near a bus stop. I picked up the wallet and showed it to Kayla before we decided to look inside to try to identify the owner.

Inside the wallet, we found a sum of money, along with an identification card, a driver's permit and two bank cards. The identification card displayed the name Mr. Kenneth Alexander and an address located in the nearby area.

Kayla and I did not remove any items from the wallet. We discussed the matter and decided that the safest option was to hand the wallet over to a police officer rather than attempt to locate the owner ourselves. We proceeded to the Sangre Grande Police Station, which was a short distance from where we found the wallet.

At the station, I explained to the officer on duty where and how the wallet had been found. The officer recorded the details of the incident, including the location, time and contents of the wallet, in an official report. I provided my name and contact information in case further details were required. The officer thanked Kayla and me for reporting the matter and confirmed that attempts would be made to contact the owner using the information found in the wallet.
