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#### CROSSREACH REPORT TO THE CONGREGATION 2024

CrossReach is the Church of Scotland's social care arm. Every day, staff in this organisation show the practical side of faith by giving renewed hope to people in challenging situations or at breaking point. Over 70 services across Scotland help more than 28.000 people every year, through a unique whole-family approach so families impacted by mental health, dementia, disability, poverty, and homelessness, get the support they need to thrive.

For some, only a short association with CrossReach is needed; for some that support extends to years. Domestic violence, drug dependency, and other fields of social need that are often underfunded by public authorities, welcome the role played by CrossReach.

The Church and we, should be very proud of Cross-Reach and its mission. In the midst of the difficulties and challenges and changes facing the Church of Scotland we should be hugely grateful for having a Christian asset which works powerfully in the world delivering life enhancing, life changing and life saving services.

Our church supports CrossReach in a few ways. Financially, through our Wilson & Peter Bequest, we give a lump sum of several hundreds of pounds in alternate years to support the Bluebell Perinatal Service in Glasgow. This is one of CrossReach's Counselling services – a service which provides a confidential space to explore difficult feelings or experiences on a one to one basis. Here are comments from two parents who have used the Bluebell Service:

"My counsellor has guided me with so much care and intelligence through our sessions. I've learnt a lot about myself, and it's been an invaluable support during the first year of my son's life. Staff have been so kind to me and my son. I trusted them implicitly."

"I have been able to completely change my perspective and feel more positive. I am hopeful about life and my relationship with my children with my counsellor's help. I feel more able to face challenges and feel more like myself again."

We also currently send 50% of the tea and coffee donations after the service to CrossReach. We know also that individual members commit to monthly giving to the organisation, while others take the opportunity to support the work of CrossReach by buying cards and other merchandise.

We are not all in a position to offer support directly to CrossReach, but there are many who pray for the staff and services of CrossReach and there is nothing better than that.

#### From Rev Maggie Hunt

'Its Christmas!'....well no...not really. Not yet. We still have the wonderful season of Advent to enjoy first before Christmas comes. A season of hoping and wondering and preparing. And it is looking to be an advent of real joy here at All Souls Letham. Lots going on to suit the needs of our wider Letham community as well as offering a chance to explore spirituality and perhaps deepen your faith. There's lots going on with our sister churches in Forfar and Aberlemno and with the wider church across different denominations in the Forfar and Letham area – including an advent Bible study, a silver band concert and a joint BIG SING carol service for all to enjoy.

As mentioned last issue, we have a number of special services coming up which are especially created for members of the Letham community who usually 'don't do church'. They are designed to be extra welcoming, informal and open to people who come without belief or understanding of Christianity.

**Blue Christmas** – a special 30 minute community service for anyone who will find Christmas hard or sad this year – for whatever reason. Whether it is grief, family issues, money worries, work problems. Come and be with others who understand that it isn't the most 'joyful' time for everyone. Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> December at 1pm at Letham Church – all faiths or none are welcome. Tea, Coffee and cakes will be served afterwards.

A gift service on Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> December at 10.30am. Bring a toy, or a gift for an adult, for us to donate to folks who might otherwise not receive this year. Please don't wrap your gift but feel free to pop it in a bag. We are also hoping to have folks share their musical and creative gifts with us that morning too.

We have a "DIY community nativity play" on Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> December at 10.30am. It is just a fun hour together with old fashioned carols, dressing up and panto-style responses with no rehearsals and no set roles. It is great for kids who love taking part, adults who enjoy dressing up and friends who love carols but don't come to church usually. Bring the kids, grandchildren, friends, neighbours etc – everyone who comes gets to join in and be part of the fun. A festive feast of mulled wine, mince pies and treats will be served afterwards.

A traditional Watchnight service at 11.30pm on Christmas Eve. Come along, sing the old favourite carols, wait for the midnight moment when we light the candle and announce that Christmas has come. We'd love to see you – all are welcome of all ages.

In January we meet together to think about Epiphany – the realisation that something is more than it first seems. We look to the Wise Men's Star on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> and continue to seek, look and have epiphanies together each week through till February. A great introduction to church, to Jesus and to the writers of the Bible as we explore together week by week who this baby Jesus is.

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Children in P3 from Letham Primary School have been creating Campaign Posters for issues they feel most important in our community.

The children feel strongly about the on going issues with people not picking up after their dogs, not having a village food bank and a warm space, tackling pollution, planting more trees and addressing littering around the village

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#### TALES OF LETHAM STANES No. 10

"I've seen many a ruined building, but never a ruined stane." (Hugh MacDiarmid) GAEN ABOOT BOTTLES O' FIZZ

#### WERE UNKNOWN IN THE 1800'S

This month's stane is a happy collection of stone, metal and leather. What did the drouthy visitors to Dempster Park do when a drink was required on a het summer's day? A big stane houses the mechanism for a hand water pump - a relic of the past in Dempster Park

Excavating the memories of yet another relic, (that's me), I remember when the pump worked. Keeping in mind that the passage of time may enhance memorable moments, I recall it was a hot day in the park. Other drouthy craturs had already "fanged" the pump with a starter dash of water. To "fang" is a word that comes from the German "to catch" but also features in the old Scots language.

So, an enthusiastic couple of strokes on the outstretched pump handle brought a surging gush into your smiddy made cup of burnished metal. This was attached by a chain to the stone housing of the pump. Surely this was a heaven sent moment! A mugful of cool, almost aromatic water, tumbling forth. What a joy to drink; what a delight; and it was free! An exotic drouth slaker from the cool depths of the earth. The same metal mug was used by all and yet there are no records of plague or similar afflicting the users.

Wells are wonderful things. In 1789, Letham Farm was chosen for establishing the new village of Letham as the land was suitable for digging ever yielding wells. To sustain life, you MUST have water. Every house in the original village had a well. In 1947 all household water requirements were from wells.

Better off households had a pump installed to fill a tank in the attic, but many houses threw a small bucket attached to a rope into the well, before filling a bigger bucket or carrying the bucket directly into the house sink; or filing a reek blackened kettle, pot or basin. Mains water and sewerage were installed over the entire village by the 1950's. The wells were instantly redundant.

So, as a salute to wells, our stane for this month is a carved out obelisk in the village park. This obelisk houses a well pump and the mechanics required to get water from the well out of the earth. The pump handle and the water delivering metal stroup complete the above ground scene.

Below ground is a dug rounded well formed by stones. This cylindrical, 3 foot wide well, is where water gathers. The water remains fresh being constantly fed by new rain falling or via the ebb and flow of the water table. Wells can be 17 feet or more deep. Some still exist to this day to form an interesting feature in the garden. Some have been covered over with a slab of stone. Some have been filled in. But they are all a salute to the origins of the village. The well in Dempster Park still exists but no longer delivers cool water as Mr Health and Safety would surely have an ackapeevie if he learned that the public was drinking from wells – especially from the well in Dempster Park.

After spending a career working for the NHS, Lynda decided to embark on a course in Creative Textiles Techniques which has lead her onto specialising in Scottish land and seascapes using wool felting and also creating beautiful and unique botanical printing onto silk. Amongst these wonderful talents Linda also teaches felt making, pastel techniques and examples of her art can be found for sale at our own Hand Pict Showcase Gallery in Letham.

We were very fortunate to have Lynda join us and it was amazing to see her using leaves she had collected earlier in the year and then dried and rehydrated. She prepares her silk fabric by cleaning it in a weak iron solution then presses the leaves between two pieces of fabric before rolling up tightly with string and steaming for around 80 minutes. A process she has perfected and made to look simple.

Lynda brought along a collection of her silk scarfs for us to see and the end result is amazing, they definitely have The Wow factor. No two are the same, all were beautiful and so unique design and colour. Lynda uses natural products and tries to reuse and recycle whenever she can and is constantly on the look out for leaves of all shapes and sizes.

We all thoroughly enjoyed the evening and Lynne thanked Lynda for sharing her wonderful talent and for judging our competitions.


Lynne thanked members for the delicious tea with savoury and sweets provided.

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
