#### Letham & District Community Council The History of Letham Paths

Letham is blessed with a network of paths in and around the village, many of these would have been lost had it not been for Jim Cosgrove starting to cut them and ensure that they are accessible to all of us. He was an active member of the Scotways Charity from its early inception. Letham & District Community Council has been a member of Scotways since that time.

More recently all Local Authorities were required to draw up plans of CORE Paths (but not required to maintain them!) Letham has a CORE Path Plan, but some paths were missed off this plan. A Core Paths plan is not required to be the only source of information about rights of way.

Letham & District is determined to ensure ALL our paths & rights of way are accessible for all of us and are mapped and publicised appropriately with the help of our Local Authority, Scotways and The Ramblers of Scotland.

Since the time of Jim Cosgrove, Letham paths have been kept accessible through the help of volunteers. Equipment has been bought for them to use, mainly through donations given by individuals and through grants obtained by Letham & District Community Council. The original ride on mower was bought with a grant obtained by Letham & District Community Council.

Letham & District Community Council hold a separate bank account solely to hold donations for Letham Paths. Currently the volunteers are involved with installing some appropriate drainage where paths have become waterlogged in recent years. This work will use a considerable amount of funds just for materials. Without volunteers to carry out the work the funds we hold presently would not cover the cost of the work.

It should be noted that Letham & District Community Council ensure that the equipment used by our volunteers is insured appropriately and the volunteers discuss and arrange maintenance of the paths with Letham & District Community Council.

The maintenance of Letham Greens is also, mainly carried out by the Paths Volunteers, using the same equipment, BUT agreed with the members of Letham Feuars Committee. (Letham Feuars' Committee hold Title to the Greens).

More recently, when the original ride on mower reached the end of its useful life, we were very fortunate to have Letham Feuars' Committee funding a replacement mower.Sadly, funding for **replacement** equipment is not readily available, but thankfully Letham has the Feuars' Committee willing to work in partnership with The Community Council for the benefit of everyone. Donations have been received from the committee for many years, as this fulfils one of the charity aims of Letham Feuars' Committee, through helping to look after the environment.

Letham & District Community Council is happy to receive donations for Letham paths and will ensure that our paths can remain accessible for all of us to use appropriately. *Isobel Sword*

#### Defibrillator update

The Letham and District Community Council committee can now provide an update on our ongoing defibrillator fundraising efforts. In 2024 we set out to raise money to increase defibrillator numbers and accessibility for public use in Letham and surrounding areas. We are delighted to announce that we have been able to purchase the defibrillators and outside cabinets we need to achieve this and work is underway to organize fitting of these life saving devices which will be accessible 24hours per day for everyone to use when needed.

The total amount raised from Just Giving Fundraiser, Keystore cash collection and donations directly to LDCC committee members was a staggering £1497.21 with a further £500 donation from The Letham Keystore and £200 donation from the Letham Santa sleigh collection.

We would like to thank everyone who donated with a special thanks to Rags and Curtis at The Letham Keystore for supporting us by collecting on our behalf and their very generous donation. We could not have achieved this without all of your generosity! It is very much appreciated.

We look forward to providing you with an update when the work is completed and the committee plan to organize further CPR training session if anyone is interested in learning a life saving skill. Our fundraising efforts will continue to ensure this life saving equipment is maintained and ready for use when needed. LDCC

Hospitality in the 3 worship centres, Aberlemno, Lowson and Letham, is planned and organised by the All Souls Hospitality Team. This team is ably assisted by a willing group who help prepare and serve at each of the events. While people tend to be based in the place they worship most frequently we can be called on to help out in other worship centres if needed. Our Warm Spaces event, providing soup and cakes on a Friday, continued through January until the end of March. We welcomed a regular group each week and we started again at the beginning of November. Thanks go to the Keptie Bakery and the Keystore for their donations of bread, cakes and milk each week.

Our first joint hospitality event of 2024 was the service of union in the Lowson on 21<sup>st</sup> March. The team organised a lovely supper after the service and many commented on how nice it was to be able to meet people from the other worship centres in our union.

We organised a Strawberry afternoon tea here in Letham on  $22^{nd}$  June. This was well attended, with many coming from Forfar, and a very enjoyable time was had by all.

Our next event was the FairTrade breakfast here in the church on 15<sup>th</sup> September. This was an opportunity to highlight the work of FairTrade and enjoy a lovely breakfast while taking part in the service.

This was followed by our harvest lunch, after the service on  $20^{\text{th}}$  October, when we enjoyed a selection of lovely soups and puddings.

Our Christmas event was Cakes and Carols here on 19<sup>th</sup> December. Everyone who attended enjoyed the lovely service led by Maggie, the singing and the cakes. To round off the year we served mulled wine, mince pies and shortbread after services on 22<sup>nd</sup> December and Christmas Eve.

I must say a huge thank you to the dedicated team here in Letham who are always willing to donate and help with teas every week after the service and the various social events. Social events are a very important part of worship and they would not happen without the willing helpers. Your efforts are much appreciated.

Having a large team of helpers ensures the same people are not called on for every event and we would always welcome extra helpers.
