Forfar All Souls @ Letham Property Report April 2025

It has now been a year since Dunnichen, Letham and Kirkden became Forfar All Souls @ Letham. It has been a year of organising the committees and getting to grips with how to best serve this new parish of Forfar All Souls. Unfortunately a convenor for the property committee has still not been found so the Management Groups of the 3 churches and the Anchorage are still, at this time, looking after their own properties. This makes it difficult sometimes to see the way forward for getting some works done but we are deeply committed to maintaining these spaces so they can continue to serve as places of worship, fellowship, and community. We also recognise the importance of keeping everyone informed about the state of our church, hall and manse. This report outlines the current conditions, maintenance efforts, and any upcoming projects for all three buildings.

But first, the Presbytery Annual Building Records Inspection was held last month and I'm pleased to report that ours passed.

Church Building and Hall Update

In July last year we had a visit from the Presbytery Buildings Officer, Jamie MacNamara. Jamie has a wealth of experience in the building industry and is a conservation surveyor and heritage specialist. He gave the buildings a thorough going over and although we still await a written report from him, he found our buildings to be in very good condition with only some work to be done on the exterior walls of the church and the louvered window below the church bell. Recently, we had to replace the handle on the church door. The interiors of the church and hall are in good shape and all annual checks to fire alarms, fire extinguishers and electrical appliances have been completed with only a replacement fire alarm in the kitchen needed. A new TV screen was installed in the rear of the sanctuary to assist the minister and visiting preachers. Outside the gardens have been ably looked after by Bruce. We are very grateful for the time he has spent on them so that we can enjoy the lovely colours of the seasonal flowers planted.

Manse Update

In October the manse became vacant. We asked Jamie MacNamara to take a look and advise us of anything that needed doing. As it is now policy that, if a manse is not needed for a minister, it should be sold we have spent the months since then getting it ready for sale. The gutters have all been cleared out and the decorators have been in to freshen up the hallway, 3 bedrooms and the bathroom ceiling. Volunteers came in to give it a clean after that work was completed. The garden and paths have been cleared of weeds and moss, the grass cut, the railing at the front door painted and the door cleaned, all also done by volunteers. Many thanks go to those willing souls.

It is now up to the General Trustees to put the property up for sale and as the building is now empty, for insurance purposes, all utilities have had to be turned off, we hope it will not be long before this happens.

Upcoming Projects and Financial Considerations

An application was put to the session for the completion of Phase 3 of the church plans. It was agreed that this could go forward and the finance committee have taken on the task of finding funding for this. These plans will see the provision of ramps to the fire exits at the back of the hall and church, landscaping to provide accessible parking and to solve the drainage problem at the gate which floods whenever there is heavy rain.

Conclusion

The church, hall and the manse are in good condition overall, and we are thankful for the continued support and care from our congregation. The next few months will be focused on maintaining the buildings and addressing minor repairs. We are confident these efforts will ensure the longevity of our spaces for years to come.

At rest - George Alexander Rennie



George Alexander Rennie (known fondly to us all as Geordie) was born on 17th October 1948 in Broughty Ferry, Dundee and passed away peacefully at Strathmore Hospice, Forfar on

17th February 2025 after a short illness. Geordie's funeral was held at Parkgrove crematorium on 7th March 2025 at which there was standing room only. A true reflection on how well known and how well thought of our Geordie was. A collection made for local charities at the service raised £1100 and has been distributed within the village to four local groups.

Geordie moved to Letham with his foster mum and her two daughters and grew up in The Square in Letham and then later East Hemming Street. He went to Letham Primary school and left school starting work with D Japp, Slaters. The story goes they travelled around on a motorbike and sidecar (Geordie in the sidecar ladder and all). A remarkable sight, I'm sure. He then worked with other local firms Nicol builders, Adamson builders, Mitchell of Letham, Peebles potato merchants and latterly Lumgair Brothers, Gask Farm where he remained for twenty years up to retiring at sixty.

Geordie was a worker and a real perfectionist, his work had to be right no matter what job he was doing. He was a dab hand at drystane dyking and would often comment that he couldn't get on for people stopping to admire his handiwork and asking if he could do a wee job for them. He was always happy to help anyone out and in his younger days helped with putting up the marquee for the scouts, he never ever missed a date. He helped at the scout dances and has helped numerous friends in their gardens.

Geordie loved a blether and loved to hear everyone's news and keep up to date with what was happening in the village. He especially had time for all bairns and aye had a penny in his pocket for them. He is one of our real Letham 'worthies' and a friend to so many, he will be missed and remembered by us all.

TALES OF LETHAM STANES No. 14

"I've seen many a ruined building, but never a ruined stane." (Hugh MacDiarmid) A DAUD OF RED SANDSTONE HAS ENTERED SCOTTISH HISTORY – BUT IS IT A FRAUD? (Part 1)

Edward I, King of England, the so called Hammer of the Scots, in his quest to subjugate Scotland, issued an order to a group of soldiers in London to travel up to Scone, in Scotland, and bring back with them the Stone of Scone which the Scots used to crown their Kings upon. At the same time, he ordered at great expense, a new golden throne with a space underneath the seat for the Scottish Stone of Destiny.

The soldiers duly arrived at Scone Abbey and received a jolly reception from the Abbot. Ushered into the dining hall, they were entertained with a welcoming cup of mead. They were assured that the Stone would be brought to them. After several generous cups of mead, a stone was presented to them. It looked the part – was big and heavy – and had two iron carrying handles.

"That was easy", thought the soldiers, as they set off to take the Stone back to London. On arrival, the soldiers proudly presented the Stone they had received at Scone Abbey. When King Edward I cast his eyes upon it, he turned to the soldiers and red faced with anger, he exploded to them, "You fools! You have got the wrong Stone." The order for the golden throne was cancelled. An aged seat was secured from a school where the Dominie used to sit at school Assembly. A joiner was called in to alter the chair to take the Stone the soldiers had brought from Scone.

After a long line of monarchs had been crowned on this Stone in Westminster Abbey, three Scottish students took the Stone. When they moved it from the chair, it fell into two parts, and in the history of the event, the students were said to have expressed the opinion "They have broken our Stone and have not told us!" The sojourn out of Westminster Abbey came to an end when the Stone was left before the High Alter in Arbroath Abbey.

This is all very well, but where does this Stone enter the lexicon of stones concerning Letham? (to be continued......)





The Wanderers wish to thank ROOT Central One, in Letham, for their most generous donation of bramble, rose, beech and birch hedging and also their big reduction in the price of two beech trees. The Council Ranger Service gave their permission for the planting, which Midge undertook along with 2 Rangers, Friends of Forfar Loch and young helpers on Sunday 6th April. It is hoped bird nesting will resume in 2026.
