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Finance Report May 2025

This will be a very different report from ones I have given before.

As you all know, on 1st April 2024 we joined in a Union and became Forfar All Souls. Rhona Nicol became the Treasurer, with previous Treasurers sending her weekly details of offerings.

Lowson became the lead church, and their OSCR number and bank account were used. The other bank accounts had to be closed. Unfortunately, DLK bank account is still open as, despite several reminders, 3 members are still paying in their Direct Debit into this account. Hopefully this will be settled soon.

I can't give you any details of the annual accounts for 2024 as there have been many, many problems joining the finances of the all the churches. This has taken a great deal of work by the Treasurer, and then the Partner of the Accountancy firm refused to sign them off because of 2 Trusts, one of which is the Wilson Peter Trust managed by us. He has been told that this Trust has a separate OSCR number and bank account, and that they are a completely different entity and not part of All Souls' finances. All I can tell you is that there was a deficit in 2024.

I have been promised that the money in our Renovation Fund will be used for the renovation of the grounds of Letham Church. Other reserve moneys will be used to make up the costs.

We have requested that the Manse be put up for sale - again. And now await the General Trustees' instructions. They have many properties to sell so it might be a while yet.

TALES OF LETHAM STANES No. 14

A DAUD OF RED SANDSTONE HAS ENTERED SCOTTISH HISTORY – BUT IS IT A FRAUD? (Part 2)

Last month, we looked at some of the history surrounding the Stone of Destiny, but where does this Stone enter the lexicon of stones concerning Letham?

At one time, we had a Scout Master who also did a spell as Sunday School Superintendent and latterly became the Beadle of Letham Church. His name was Pete Robertson, affectionately known in the village as Auld Pete.

He reports that he had to see our then Minister, Rev Davidson, at Dunnichen Manse about some Kirk business. Upon entering the Minister's office, he found a stone looking awfully like the well news papered Stone of Destiny. Speaking with Mr Davidson a number of years later, when asked about this event, he said, "I couldn't possibly comment." This sighting of the Stone of Destiny took place the evening before its early morning appearance at Arbroath Abbey. So we can imagine it was laid off at Dunnichen in preparation for the following day's activity at Arbroath Abbey.

The theory is that the Abbot at Scone had the real Stone whistled away for safekeeping, buried in the nearby hills. The Stone has, after following many a circuitous route, now found itself on display at the old City Halls in Perth which have been converted into a Museum, where it is free to see.

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VE Day 8th May 1945

Two ladies, long-time residents in our village, recalled their childhood memories for In the PICTure.

Mrs Muriel Gray was 10 years old in 1945, living with her parents and brother in Knightswood, Glasgow. Their home was directly under the flight path of German bombers which, during the war, regularly visited Clydeside. Hence the need for emergency buildings known as Anderson shelters placed in gardens, away from falling masonry.

Muriel recalls the air raid sirens shrieking, rousing everyone from slumber and out into the cold shelters. Over time the adults lined the shelters with wood and sourced paraffin heating stoves whilst rich tea biscuits and flasks of tea provided sustenance until the all clear sounded.

A bomb did hit the housing nearby and Muriel remembers the earth-shattering noise of the explosion followed by many small birds twirling around, these having been released from damaged bird cages. Another vivid memory was seeing large queues of children with gas masks and name cards slung around their neck, awaiting evacuation to the country. Whilst she cannot recall street parties or dancing at the end of the war in 1945, Muriel remembers visiting Girvan, an unexpected treat. Difficult days but on looking back she feels there was strong camaraderie amongst both children and adults which enabled the tough times to be endured.

Mrs Ethel Carnegie was nearly 11 years old on VE Day, 1945. She lived in Carmyllie with her grand-parents next to Carmyllie school, her parents believing she was a safer there than walking 3 miles back and forth to school from her own home. Readers may also remember Ethel's brother, Marshall Rae who, being much younger and not at school, was permitted to stay with his parents. All the adults worked the land, using horses for which Ethel's Dad was both blacksmith and farrier. A small detachment of Land Army ladies also assisted, working the land providing food for Angus. Most families also used the Co-operative store for food shopping where most foodstuffs were scarce and rationed. It was a few years after war ended before Ethel tasted a banana.

Like most rural families, heating was open fires or stoves, light was from Tilley lamps, news came via the radio and even in the country blackout was enforced.

As Muriel, Ethel has no recollection of street parties or dancing to celebrate VE Day, however, as a treat some time later, Mum, Dad, Ethel, and Marshall travelled by train from Friockheim to Arbroath for a day out, truly a rare event.

Thinking of the 1940s, Ethel can hardly believe the progress there has been over the last 80 years but feels that the lessons of past wars have not perhaps been learned.

FAIRTRADE



During Fairtrade Fortnight last year, the Fairtrade Foundation asked people to take action and encourage their MPs to **be the change** for the farmers and workers whom we rely on every day. The response to this request over the next 6 months was good - MPs all over the UK know how important fairer global trade is to their local community and some have pledged to play their role in changing it for the better.

What was achieved?

Supporters who asked their MP to be the change: **3742**

Local communities that got involved: 636 out of 650 constituencies in the UK

MPs who pledged to 'be the change': 134

In February 2025, The Fairtrade All-Party Parliamentary Group was reformed to promote Fairtrade within Parliament; to deepen the relationship between local Fairtrade supporters and parliamentarians; and to further raise awareness of the importance of fairer trade.

The Fairtrade Foundation recently reported some important news about Sainsbury's and Fairtrade -

"We have been brewing something very exciting with our longstanding partner Sainsbury's and can announce today that all of their brand 'by Sainsbury's' black tea will now be Fairtrade!"

They pointed out that tea farmers and workers currently face huge challenges due to rising costs and the increased impact of climate change. When shoppers choose Fairtrade tea, this means that the farmers can sell more on Fairtrade terms and are able to put healthy food on the table, invest in their communities, look after their families and plan for the future.

Fairtrade tea will be starting to arrive on the shelves over the next few weeks and should be widely available at Sainsbury's stores from June.

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
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
