
PARIS TO LONDON ON ORDINARIES TO CELEBRATE THE 150TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE ORDINARY



The Pickwick Cycling Club and the French Velocipedistes Club decided to celebrate the anniversary of the Ordinary bicycle by the ride from Paris to London in 2023. The French appeared to be far more enthusiastic than the Brits with only 4 Brits brave enough to tackle it. I decided that I would get sponsorship for the ride for the Pancreatic Cancer Research Fund, for obvious reasons after mum was diagnosed with this horrible disease. Rather than do the ride on a modern, repro, penny farthing I decided to use one of my originals, a 54" Dan Rudge dating back to 1888. Obviously, it was treated to new bearings and a thorough overhaul before attempting the ride. Interestingly enough the four original machines caused the least mechanical problems. A couple of the repro machines were virtually destroyed.



The start was the Eiffel Tower and the French TV were in attendance. There were six of us in the British contingent, four riders and two team back up. The French contingent was considerably larger and we all were accompanied throughout the French section by various cycle clubs who helped manage the traffic.

Along the route we were welcomed by the mayors of the communities and fed and watered at Civic ceremonies. It was very popular with schools and they had a lot of school children lining the route all of whom wanted to sit on a penny, of course. This appeared to be the main difference between the two Countries, the French people embraced the whole concept and made the riders so welcome wherever we were.

I did have a slight accident right at the start but no harm done and the handlebars were soon straightened out. (Excuse the my French ①)
