# Threading a Serger



### **Description/Rationale:**

A serger is a specific kind of sewing machine that was created primarily to sew knit fabric and has four interlocking threads instead of just one thread. By the end of this workshop, a home sewer will be able to use a serger machine and basic sewing supplies to thread a serger and make a pillowcase.

### **Objectives:**

By the end of this session...

- 1. A sewer can demonstrate threading a serger successfully within 3 attempts.
- 2. A sewer will create a pillowcase.

## Participant's Guide

#### Supplies

- □ Serger with power cord and peddle
- □ Appropriate size needles
- □ Thread Ideally 4 different colors for learning to thread.
- □ Fabric for pillowcases Cotton quilting fabric precut two 20.5 x 33 inch rectangles of fabric. We will be using a 5/8 inch seam allowance.
- □ Tweezers
- □ Floss threaders (provided)
- □ Extra fabric for practice (provided)
- □ Extra light for threading/flashlight (optional)
- □ Sewing Scissors
- □ Magic clips (optional, provided)
- □ Hand upholstery needle for finishing serged edges (provided)
- □ User's/ Operator's manual for the serger.
- □ Pen/Pencil
- □ Notepaper

## **Pre-workshop Checklist**

- □ Learner brought sewing supplies from the list provided.
- □ Identify the differential feed dial.
- □ Identify the stitch length dial.
- □ Identify the upper knife.
- □ Identify the upper looper.
- $\hfill\Box$  Identify the lower knife.
- □ Identify the lower looper.




## Threading checklist


- □ Learner took each thread through the left and right hole thread guides top to bottom.
- $\hfill\Box$  Threaded in the correct order: Upper looper, lower looper, right needle, left needle
- □ Went through each thread guide in order.
- □ A successful stitch was made at the end of threading.



## Pillowcase checklist

Fabric was precut prior to the workshop
Both 33 inch edges are sewn
The short 20.5 inch edge is sewn
Learner chose how to secure the ends and executed one of
three ways successfully. (Circle chosen method).
Knot the two ends of the tail
Weave the tail under the stitches
Leave long tails
Hem the raw edge completely.
Choose one of three ways to finish the hem and completed
successfully. (Circle chosen method).
Leave the decorative serged edge of the hem
Fold and iron the hem to the inside of the pillowcase
Finish the hem on a standard sewing machine.

#### **Post-Test**

 $\hfill\Box$  The sewer can demonstrate threading a serger successfully within 3 attempts.
