We're Staying in North Philly!

The city government, Westrum Development, the media and others are preparing a North Philadelphia that will *not* include long-time residents, particularly those in Brewerytown. However, North Philadelphia remains overwhelmingly populated by people who grew up there, raised families there and won't be moved out by anyone. This is the story of one such family.

The year was 1953 and rumors about African-Americans being allowed to work and live in the heart of the historic, working class community of Brewerytown were taking root. Jobs were plentiful in the industrial corridor along 31st Street. Business districts were thriving along Girard Avenue and Columbia Avenue (later to become Cecil B. Moore Avenue). Only a year before *Brown v. Bd. of Education*, the promise of the dawning Civil Rights Era was already coming into focus.

On cue, a young and ambitious couple, Dolores and Harry Richardson, decided that they needed more room for their five children. They visited a house for sale on Oxford Street. Mrs. Richardson recalls, "We were a little nervous about buying that house – we were to be only the fourth black family to move onto the block. But, the house was just what we needed, an elementary school was right across the street (Sartain), and Fairmount Park was nearby. So, we moved in."

In those early days, Mrs. Richardson notes, "There was a mixture of races: white and black. Everyone got along, they talked to each other. Everyone was friendly and worked together. It was typical of what a neighborhood should be."

Mrs. Richardson is simply too modest to point out that she was one of the reasons the community functioned so well. She was president of the Sartain Elementary School's Home & School Association. She served as a classroom mother – a parent who volunteered as a teacher's aide, while observing how her children were being taught. She was a judge of elections for 18

years. Some of her most memorable roles were as president, secretary and treasurer of a block committee.

She recounts, "It was a good committee. Many wonderful people were involved, such as Mrs. Matilda Terry (recently deceased). We kept the neighborhood clean, worked with committeemen, police captains, city councilmen to get things done. When there was a death in the area, we would go from house to house raising money for flowers. Whatever funds were left, we gave to the family."

New cycles of change

Gradually, the white neighbors moved away during the "white flight" periods of the 50's and 60's. But, Mrs. Richardson quickly adds, "Good neighbors moved in. They were looking for a nice house to raise their kids. They were easy to get along with. There were lots of kids in neighborhood. It was a family setting; people got along very well together."

The Richardsons (cont'd)

Slowly, the neighborhood began to change again. "There was a complete turnabout, a lot of new neighbors, lots of sick elderly passed on, friends or relatives took over." But, even in the worst of days, Mrs. Richardson says, "This was still a nice block. Today, we hear arguments on corners sometimes. We know there is some drug activity on the side streets. And, yes, the old block committee is gone. But, this cycle will end too."

Mrs. Richardson knows that one important improvement would be more positive role models for young men. She often recalls her husband as an excellent example. Mr. Richardson was self-employed for 40 years. He manufactured draperies and slipcovers at his store on Susquehanna Avenue. Later, he moved his business to their basement on Oxford Street. Mrs. Richardson says, "He always wanted to have something to call his own. He setup a huge bench in the basement, bought lots of materials and ran his business very successfully here. He was a great husband and father."

They were married for 59 years. After his passing, one of her daughters, Peggy, moved back home to help look after mom. Peggy tells us, "When my kids were growing up, they always referred to this house as "the big house" and couldn't wait to come here to visit their grandparents. Our home has been so full of love and priceless memories that I just had to come back to continue this nearly 60 year tradition."

Mrs. Richardson isn't surprised that Brewerytown is becoming a hot destination again. Four years ago, she, Mrs. Terry and other neighbors joined AABRA to help keep the community informed about proposed housing, zoning and other changes. Peggy joined AABRA's Board. They have helped to ensure that AABRA is a significant contributor to Brewerytown's grass roots, self-improvement campaign. "My husband and I made the right choice," Mrs. Richardson concludes. "And, there isn't anywhere else I would want to be."

Though she has had health problems of late, Mrs. Richardson remains physically and mentally strong. Her children graciously help her when necessary. "I am very blessed," she says.

Brewerytown is a place where many families like the Richardsons have called home for decades. They have every intention of calling it home for decades to come, irrespective of the plans others have for our community. 
