Wirksworth Welcomes Twin Towns

2nd – 6th July 2026

In sunny weather more like the south of France than England, 18 people from Die in France and 25 from Frankenau in Germany, with ages ranging from 9 – 80, enjoyed hospitality in 24 Wirksworth homes at the beginning of July.

Despite long journeys on Thursday 2nd July, guests enjoyed the Friday morning welcome with the chance to meet old friends and new, enjoy home-made biscuits from WTA members and hear a welcome song performed by the Wirksworth hosts and sign on for workshops reflecting the weekend's themes of "nature" and "music".

They enjoyed the options of a ukelele or singing workshop or clay workshop or visits to Wild Maple Field and Stoney Wood on Friday before a civic reception in the evening.

There were over 120 guests providing a convivial atmosphere – as well as the visitors and their hosts, many local organisations were represented as well as the outgoing and incoming Heads of Anthony Gell School, Malcolm Kelly and Helen Smith. The red wine was from the local vineyard, Matlock Wines and cheese from one of our members farm, Smith Hall Organics. Peak Brass played, while Mayor of Wirksworth, Cllr Steve Thompson, put down his instrument to welcome all guests. Steve is well travelled and familiar with the benefits of twinning and he gave an inspirational speech about the opportunities that learning a musical instrument can bring, especially as an international language. Clare Wesson from France handed over a hamper of produce from Die with local Clairette wine. Corinne Bastet from Frankenau presented us with a book about their National Park and said they were

also making a donation to Aquabox. Then everyone enjoyed shared meals - “fuddles” – in the summer evening sun with various host families.

Guests could choose a tour of the town, a walk in the countryside around the town ending with a visit to the cinema for a brief history of the building and refreshments or a wildflower walk, before a celebration meal for everyone, catered by local firm Zest. The entertainment was provided by local young sax player Jake McGuire, followed by songs from the Singing Twinners scratch choir and a lively half hour of music from UkeWirks.
