Recipe of the Month

From Sue Edwards – as served at the AGM buffet

Smoked Mackerel Paté

Ingredients

- 165g (one pack) smoked mackerel fillets
- 1 tsp fresh grated horseradish or 2 tsp of horseradish sauce
- Grated zest and juice of a lemon
- 150ml of double cream
- 1 tbsp mayonnaise or yogurt
- Ground black pepper to season
- Lemon and cucumber slices to decorate

Method

- 1. Remove the skin from the mackerel and check for bones
- 2. Flake the flesh into the bowl of a food processor and add all of the other ingredients except the pepper
- 3. Blitz to a consistency you like
- 4. Season with pepper to taste before piling into a dish and decorating with lemon and cucumber slices
- 5. Chill for 2 hours (or overnight) before serving

Added

C36 – Flowering shrubs (3 of different varieties – not roses)

G79 – 6 Chelsea buns

C32 – Display of cut garden flowers (More than 3 species)

Some jobs for the next few weeks...

The hours of daylight may be short, but the list of jobs isn't...

- Most of the seeds and berries have now gone so it's time to make sure that we feed our feathered friends – remember to put out water/defrost birdbaths in the chilly weather
- Harvest your winter veg for Christmas plates. Parsnips, leeks, brussels sprouts and winter cabbages, can all be left in the ground until you need them. It's difficult to harvest crops from frozen soil, so if temperatures plummet, cover the soil with straw
- If you have grown potatoes for Christmas, they should be ready now
- Keep kale, winter cabbages and other brassicas covered with netting to protect them from hungry pigeons. Remove any yellowed leaves, so that fungal diseases such as grey mould and downy mildew don't take hold
- Continue to plant bare-root fruit canes, bushes and trees, as long as the ground isn't frozen
- Winter prune apple and pear trees to control their shape and size, and to increase their productivity. If you didn't get around to it last month, you can still prune blackcurrants, gooseberries, redcurrants and whitecurrants
- It's not too late to lift and divide large clumps of rhubarb, replanting the outer sections into soil
 enriched with well-rotted manure. Alternatively, select a large clump to force for an early crop
 next spring
- Sow broad beans for a crop as early as May. Sow direct outdoors if conditions are mild (broad bean seeds should germinate within a couple of weeks and will then stop growing and enter dormancy until temperatures pick up in the spring). In cold conditions, sow into pre-warmed soil under cloches or fleece, or in multi-celled trays in a greenhouse/windowsill, which you can plant out later
- Boxing Day is the traditional day to sow onion seeds. Start them off in pots indoors or undercover, to aid germination. Plant the young onion plants out in spring, spacing them 10cm apart.
- Certain lettuce cultivars, such as 'Winter Gem', have been specially bred for their ability to grow
 at low temperatures and provide a harvest. Lambs' lettuce and Mustard greens can also be
 grown. Sow in pots in an unheated greenhouse or a cold frame, for the best results
- Prune climbing roses between now and February
- Hard prune any overgrown shrubs and hedges while they are dormant
- Snapdragons can be sown under glass, to flower from June onwards
- Sweet peas can be sown indoors, ideally in containers, such as cardboard tubes, which can then be planted into the soil, minimising root disturbance
- Order seeds and plan for 2025. Have you noticed some of the new classes in the BDHS Annual show? These could be just the thing for you
