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Introduction

Homelessness is a deeply rooted issue that has persisted in the United States for decades, affecting every layer of society. It's a crisis that extends beyond the visible suffering we often see on the streets; it's a complex dilemma deeply entwined with economic inconsistencies and social disparities.

This book endeavors to offer practical solutions to homelessness by exploring various perspectives and innovative approaches. My goal is not merely to provide temporary relief but to develop sustainable communities that reintegrate the homeless into society, thereby stimulating economic growth and national well-being. This multi-faceted issue demands a concerted effort from all sectors of society, guided by comprehensive strategies and collaborative involvement.

In 2011, I began spending time in Washington, DC, working with Crowell & Moring law firm on a World Bank arbitration case representing my company. One day, while out for lunch with a few attorneys, I saw a homeless person with a broken arm. Concerned, I went outside and asked him what had happened. He told me he had been attacked at night, explaining that such attacks on people experiencing homelessness were becoming common, a cruel sport for some. Even today, I remember the fury I felt, unable to digest the fact that people could do this to others. Homeless people are our people; they are Americans. I hugged him and reassured him that God would care for him as He does for all Americans. When I turned around, I noticed the looks of surprise from the people around me, questioning how a suited-up man could be hugging a homeless person in the heart of Georgetown.

That night, I woke up around 3 am, worrying about the folks outside. I went out and walked the streets of Georgetown, close to the US Treasury, at the heart of DC. After about 10 minutes, I found a group of homeless individuals sleeping, around 8-9 of them. I stayed nearby without disturbing them for close to two hours. I was prepared to defend them, if necessary, even if it meant ending up in the hospital. Sometimes, protecting the innocent outweighs the consequences. This belief is a fundamental pillar of being a true American, a conviction that has guided me in my 30 years of geopolitical work, being an American by heart myself.

This routine continued for 10-12 days, becoming increasingly challenging. Working with the legal team during the day and patrolling the streets at night left me with little sleep. During this period, the idea of finding a solution began to take root. Over the years, whenever I was in the US, I engaged with homeless individuals, gaining valuable insights into their needs and how we can help them.

Some of my proposals you will read may seem odd or massive, but I am inspired by the great work of the US Army Corps of Engineers and the remarkable structures they have built. The US Military, ranked 19th globally in 1939, became Number 1 in just six years. I firmly believe in the American Dream and its

ability to create miracles when pushed to the brink. This belief has allowed the world to enjoy peace and prosperity for nearly 80 years.

My proposal to introduce over 50,000 foreign workers into these cities of hope is not just about meeting immediate labor needs. It is a strategic move aimed at creating a sustainable pipeline of skilled labor. By attracting qualified individuals from around the world, we can significantly enhance the inclusiveness of our workforce and lay the foundation for long-term socio-economic resilience. This emphasis on sustainability is a key aspect of the initiative.

Additionally, I am driven by the understanding that these foreign workers are motivated by a profound desire for a better life—a new beginning in America. The comprehensive package is designed to be globally competitive, ensuring that it appeals to a wide range of talent. I am confident that these individuals, in their quest for a brighter future, will demonstrate extraordinary commitment and adaptability, particularly during these towns' challenging initial stabilization phase. Their resilience will aid their integration and cultivate a culture of empathy and understanding towards our homeless population.

This initiative presents a unique opportunity for both sides: the foreign workers gain a fresh start and the chance to pursue the American Dream, while our homeless citizens are given the chance to reintegrate into society and reclaim their lives. This vision of mutual benefit is central to the broader narrative I aim to convey in this book.

My advocacy for establishing 100 Cities of Hope across the United States is not a random suggestion but a carefully planned initiative driven by a set of strategic objectives:

1. **Eradicate homelessness** by providing stable housing, employment, and community integration.
2. **Create vibrant towns across the U.S.** to spur economic growth and prosperity.
3. **Achieve inclusivity for homeless citizens** by reintegrating them into the economy with dignity, transforming the approach from charity to a mutually beneficial partnership where the benefits extend beyond initial support.
4. **Attract qualified foreign workers** through a novel visa program that co-finances the initiative and tackles stabilization challenges while these workers earn their new lives in America.
5. **Generate global goodwill** through the visa program, creating a positive perception of the U.S. and building a valuable database of skilled individuals eager to contribute to the nation's growth, particularly in the manufacturing sector.
6. **Accelerate the growth of U.S. manufacturing industries** by creating new jobs and fostering a self-sustaining economy that can thrive independently if needed.
7. **Expand and strengthen American cities** by transforming the Cities of Hope into thriving hubs that alleviate pressure on overcrowded urban centers, spreading opportunity across the nation.

8. **Foster national unity** by transcending political differences, with Cities of Hope symbolizing a united effort to embrace each other and work towards a shared future—whether Democrat or Republican, we are all part of the same nation.

These objectives form the backbone of my proposal, which aims to turn untapped potential into thriving communities while simultaneously addressing one of our time's most pressing social issues.

One of the inherent challenges in founding new towns or cities is the classic dilemma of attracting both population and business activity. The absence of job opportunities deters people from relocating, while the lack of population discourages businesses from investing—creating a Catch-22 situation. However, this challenge is addressed head-on with the model I am proposing. By focusing on our homeless population—individuals in search of stability and a fresh start—, we can offer them an opportunity to relocate to these new towns, which will provide quality of life, healthcare, job opportunities, and more. These towns will present a compelling alternative for those seeking a renewed sense of purpose and belonging.

Moreover, this concept simultaneously brings job opportunities to these areas. Combined with my proposed financial architecture, it creates a robust framework for establishing and growing new cities and towns. Over time, these towns will naturally evolve into thriving ecosystems as the growth of supply chain requirements and other economic factors will inevitably drive their expansion. This approach will lead to the flourishing of new cities and towns across the United States, enhancing interconnectivity, stimulating economic growth, and contributing to the long-term sustainability of the nation's demographic landscape.

Furthermore, the surge in homelessness can be traced back to the de-industrialization that began in the 1970s. Reversing this trend by reindustrializing may well prove to be the most effective solution to this pressing issue.

I am proposing the establishment of basic industries within these towns, ranging from textile production to electronic assembly. The economic framework of these towns will be further diversified by incorporating call centers, greenhouses, waste-to-energy and waste recycling projects, and food processing and frozen food manufacturing.

In addition to the industrial focus, I have carefully considered the social dimensions of these towns. For instance, they could provide catering services to local businesses and government offices, which could potentially evolve into a program for offering free lunches to students in nearby schools. This initiative could be developed in collaboration with federal and state governments, NGOs, and private enterprises, creating a comprehensive model that integrates both economic and social sustainability.

In essence, while the initial perception of these homelessness transformation towns may be that they are primarily designed to assist and support our homeless population, I am confident that the long-term benefits they will bring to the United States as a whole will far exceed the immediate advantages to the homeless community. **This proposal should not be seen merely as an act of charity towards our**

homeless population; instead, it is about giving them a second chance—an opportunity for them to contribute significantly to our nation.

These individuals will play a crucial role in revitalizing our country by fostering the development of vibrant new towns in currently underutilized areas, attracting qualified talent to the U.S., and generating substantial economic value through their efforts. Furthermore, their involvement in social initiatives, such as free lunch programs for school children and other community-driven projects, will offer additional societal benefits.

This approach not only dignifies the concept but also resonates deeply with American values. I am confident that our homeless citizens will embrace this opportunity and, in doing so, help drive the positive transformation of our society.

In the ensuing chapters, I will examine historical trends and current data to understand the scope of the country's homelessness. I will dissect the economic, social, and personal root causes—factors like mental health, addiction, and domestic violence—that push individuals into homelessness. By evaluating federal, state, and local policy responses and analyzing past solutions, I aim to outline a comprehensive strategy that addresses both immediate needs and long-term objectives.

A crucial part of my proposed plan involves creating self-sustaining communities, particularly through the innovative concept of industrial parks. My overall goal is to contribute humbly to the issue of homelessness, recognizing the immense efforts already made by tens of thousands of dedicated individuals. I seek to assist in the broader problem-solving process that engages Americans at the federal, state, and NGO levels. Many organizations are tirelessly addressing this challenge and achieving remarkable results. **I have no doubt these great patriots will solve this issue.** There is no limit to what Americans can achieve; this is my unwavering belief, rooted in firsthand observations.

I firmly believe in the American Miracle and the boundless potential of what Americans can achieve, as has been demonstrated for centuries for the betterment of humanity. Americans have reached this level of progress and prosperity through blood, sweat, and tears, with nothing coming easily, all while internalizing the challenges of other nations and striving to help in every possible way. As one example, out of thousands, during the Second World War, Luxembourg lost 5,700 heroes, while Americans lost

5470 in Luxembourg—almost the same number of people. This is a great nation because Americans are good people, and God always rewards the good ones. Homeless citizens are a vital part of this great nation; they are Americans, and no solution should be considered too challenging or difficult to pursue if we believe it will help them and address the issue effectively.

Although my proposed Cities of Hope concept may seem bold or massive, I firmly believe that this great nation can eradicate this chronic problem with the right approach and methods. The establishment of the US Interagency Council on Homelessness is extremely encouraging and gives me firm hope that this problem will be eradicated soon. **I just hope to add my small contribution to these efforts to support the collective mission.**

FACT SHEET: Biden-Harris Administration Announces New Initiative to Tackle Unsheltered Homelessness

Today, the Biden-Harris administration will announce the launch of ALL INside, a first-of-its-kind initiative to address unsheltered homelessness across the country. ALL INside is a key part of All In: The Federal Strategic Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness, which set a bold goal to reduce homelessness 25 percent by 2025 and ultimately build a country where every person has a safe and affordable home.

Through the ALL INside initiative, the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) and its 19 federal member agencies will partner with state and local governments to strengthen and accelerate local efforts to get unsheltered people into homes in six places: Chicago, Dallas, Los Angeles, Phoenix Metro, Seattle, and the State of California.

To accelerate ongoing efforts by local leaders, the Biden-Harris Administration will offer innovative and tailored support to participating communities for up to two years, including by:

- Embedding a dedicated federal official in each community to accelerate locally-driven strategies and enact system-level changes to reduce unsheltered homelessness;
- Deploying dedicated teams across the federal government to identify opportunities for regulatory relief and flexibilities, navigate federal funding streams, and facilitate a peer learning network across the communities; and
- Convening philanthropy, the private sector, and other communities to identify opportunities for follow-on support and collaboration.

In addition, the Administration will launch new efforts to address major barriers to housing, health care, and other support for people experiencing unsheltered homelessness. They include:

- The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) will provide technical assistance to help communities leverage federal programs like Medicaid to cover and provide housing-related supportive services and behavioral health care.

- The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, the Social Security Administration (SSA), and HHS will collaborate to address barriers that people may encounter when obtaining various forms of government-issued identification and other critical documents.
- The SSA will work with the communities and the federal *ALL INside* team to leverage data-sharing and regulatory flexibilities that can help facilitate access to support services like housing vouchers or Medicaid.
- The U.S. Department of Labor will connect the communities with local workforce boards and Job Corps sites to fully leverage local and state government employment opportunities for unsheltered youth.
- The Federal Emergency Management Agency will provide technical assistance to the communities to facilitate greater operational coordination in response to disasters, which often increase homelessness.
- HUD will help communities troubleshoot barriers to connecting people to rental assistance or housing programs, as well as assist communities to use regulatory flexibilities to speed up the processes enabling residents to move into properties and transition into permanent housing.

Additional USICH member agencies, including AmeriCorps, Department of Agriculture, Department of Justice, Department of Energy, Department of Transportation, the General Services Administration, as well as the Department of the Treasury, have also made commitments to support the ALL INside communities.

Today's announcement builds on historic support by the Biden-Harris Administration to help states and cities battle homelessness. President Biden's American Rescue Plan (ARP)—which represents the largest single-year investment in ending homelessness in U.S. history—helped prevent a surge of homelessness. Through the Treasury Department's State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund, for instance, the six ALL INside sites have invested more than \$2.5 billion in projects focused on reducing and preventing homelessness. The ARP provided \$5 billion for 70,000 Emergency Housing Vouchers—the first HUD voucher specifically for people experiencing homelessness beyond veterans. The ARP also delivered over \$21 billion in emergency rental assistance, standing up a first-of-its-kind national eviction prevention infrastructure that has helped 8 million struggling households make rent and pay utilities bills, and kept eviction filings below pre-pandemic levels in the 1.5 years after the end of the eviction moratorium. Through the House America initiative, HUD and USICH worked with more than 100 communities to make the most of the American Rescue Plan; and in just over a year, they helped more than 100,000 people experiencing homelessness move into permanent homes.

Earlier this year, HUD released a first-of-its-kind package of grants totaling \$486 million and approximately 3,300 housing vouchers to help 62 communities address unsheltered homelessness and homeless encampments, including \$60 million to Chicago, \$22 million to Dallas, \$60 million to Los Angeles, and \$36 million to other communities across the state of California.

The President’s Fiscal Year ‘24 Budget proposes unprecedented investments not only to urgently address homelessness but also to prevent homelessness, including through additional housing vouchers; emergency rental assistance; increasing the supply of affordable housing; and establishing a guarantee of rental assistance for extremely low-income veterans and youth aging out of foster care—two groups disproportionately at risk of and experiencing homelessness.
